Giants Play At Bedford

Ross high's 1958-59 basketball team will depart Fremont about 4:30 p.m. Wednesday for the Cleveland area to participate in the initial cage outing of the season for the Little Giants.

Coach Leroy Marquette's cagers tackle Bedford of the Greater Cleveland area Wednesday night. Ross Reserves meet the Bedford Reserves at 7 p.m. with the Varsity contest to follow.

Starting lineup indicated by Coach Marquette consists of the following:

F — Denny Stine, 5-11 Sophomore.

F — Steve Cecil, 6-0 Junior.

C — Charles Pankratz, 6-2½

Senior.

G — Roger Mann, 5-8 Senior.

G — Harry Walter, 5-11 Senior.

Possible starters include either Mike McCarthy, 6-1 senior or Reuben Lozano, 6-1 senior at a forward berth in place of Stine. The latter sustained a knee injury last year that hasn't fully recovered. His starting status is pending.

Not slated for much duty Wednesday due to injuries received in football are guards Terry Collins, 5-10 senior and Jim Ohms, 5-10 sophomore. However, they will be on the traveling squad for the Varsity as will 6-2½ Sophomore forward Dave Pankratz who may see some action.

Lloyd Both, 6-1 Junior, who reported late after the football season quit the team last night. He told Coach Marquette that he planned to work after school through the basketball season.

"I'm well pleased with the progress of the squad," Coach Marquette said. The new cage mentor, replacing Al Ziemke, had three highly successful seasons at Miller City before taking over as headmaster of Ross high's basketball team.

"Boys out for the team have shown considerable interest and the spirit, attitude and hustle have been encouraging," Marquette opined. "We're probably regarded as an easy mark by other Buckeye Conference teams but I think we'll show them a thing or two this season."

Press Tactics

Marquette stresses a press defense, usually all over the court. However, he said the press can be relaxed to meet situations. Also, the new coach likes a running game, stressing a fast break.

"We're not a racehorse team, though, but speed is essential," he added.

Marquette beams at the board work from Cecil and Charles Pankratz, transfer with his brother Dave from Idaho. "They're really tough off the boards," Marquette commented.

Bedford reportedly is not too big a team but employs a rugged zone defense. Team is well coached. Bedford is usually tough in its league and won it last year.

Ross Cagers Open At Home Tonight With Holland Invading New Gym

Ross high opens its home basketball season tonight in the new Fremont Ross Senior high school gymnasium in the new high school building. Reserves play at 7 p.m. and the Varsity at 8:15 p.m.

Opponent is Holland, located just outside Toledo on the west limits.

Both teams have suffered one

defeat thus far in their only outings. Ross lost to Bedford 61-48 and Holland was pounded by Toledo Macomber 80-25.

New Ross Coach Cot Marquette said he probably will go along with four of the five starters in the Bedford game but the fifth man is doubtful. Expected to be

in the Ross lineup as starters are Steve Cecil, 6-0, Jr., forward; Charles Pankratz, 6-2½, Sr., center; Roger Mann, 5-8, Jr., guard and Harry Walter, 5-11, Jr., guard. Denny Stine, 5-11½, sophomore, fifth starter against Bedford, has been bothered with knee trouble and may give way to Reuben Lozano or Mike McCarthy at the other forward berth. Both are 6-1 seniors.

"Lozano has looked good in practice this week, especially on defense," Marquette commented.

Probable starters for Coach Ellis Dunmeyer's Holland quintet:

forwards, Howard Griesinger, 6-0, and Floyd Anderson, 6-0; center, Paul Reid, 6-0; and guards, Jim Bollinger, 5-11 and Dave Osborn, 5-11. All are seniors except Reid who is a sophomore.

None of the starters who played against Ross last year as the Little Giants won 83-59 are included in the starting lineup for Holland tonight. In fact, only one player, Larry St. John, forward of seven who got in last year's game for the visitors is included in the first 10 players of Holland.

Slim Turnout Watches Easy 56-24 Victory

Holland Defeated
By Little Giants

A slim turnout of no more than 600 fans watched Fremont Ross roll to an easy 56-24 triumph over Holland Tuesday in the first basketball game in the new gymnasium of the new Fremont Ross Senior high school building.

Victory gives the Little Giants a 1-1 record while Holland suffered its second setback with a win. The Ross cagers play next at Norwalk against Norwalk high Saturday night.

Reserves game also went to Fremont 27-21.

Grab 9-0 Lead

Ross romped to a 9-0 lead before Holland scored and was never in trouble. The Little Giants led 18-4 at the quarter, 36-8 at halftime and 48-19 after three periods.

The visitors, an inexperienced club, made only two field goals in the first half and seven in the game. Ross scored well in the first three periods, hitting on 20 of 49 shots for 40.8 per cent but, in a ragged fourth period when substitutes were flowing freely from both benches, the Giants made only three of 17 shots. For the game, Ross connected on 23 of 66 attempts for 34.8 per cent and 10 of 20 free tosses for 50 per cent. Holland made only seven of 42 shots for 16.7 per cent.

Lozano The Spark

The scoring and rebounding of substitute forward Reuben Lozano, 6-1 senior, sparked the Little Giants. Lozano netted 10 points to pace the Purple and White in the scoring department. Steve Cecil and Harry Walter chipped in with nine apiece and Roger Mann added eight. Substitute guard Galen Otter led Holland with seven.

Lozano and Cecil paced Fremont board work. They accounted for most of the 30 defensive rebounds picked off by Ross. Charles Pankratz and Denny Stone also helped some on rebounds.

New Ross Coach Cot Marquette thought the Ross cagers looked much better than they did in a loss in effort to Bedford last week.

"Our press defense was applied more and it looked better," Marquette opined. He also said the shooting was better but not as good as it could be. "We missed some easy shots in close," he explained.

Rebounding was much better with Cecil and Lozano especially getting position for offensive rebounds," the Ross mentor said. "We're still slow in getting back on defense. The press is a bit rusty but the boys are beginning to grasp it and should do a better job in future games. We tried a little zone press to go along with our regular man-for-man press. The press works better when the fellows work in pairs to double team an opponent. That still must be worked on."

Better Ball Handling

Marquette also liked the way the team moved the ball. "Our ball handling looked good, especially in the first and third quarters," he observed.

Cecil pulled on lame after only six seconds had gone by in the game. He came down on the ball of his heel and it caused a limp. However, the junior forward was back in the lineup before the first period closed.

Mann and Lozano tossed in a pair of fielders each in the first quarter to ignite the Ross attack. Mann scoring on a set and push shot and Lozano on a short jump and a rebound.

Cecil's two jump attempts highlighted a 12-point second period for the Little Giants. Lozano's three jump shots and a pair of field goals by Cecil late in the

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New Gymnasium Aids Athletic Program At Ross

A sports showplace in the new Fremont Ross Senior high school building is the new gymnasium.

First basketball game in the new gym was against Holland December 2 with Ross making the gym debut a successful one with a victory. First wrestling match in the gym was on December 3 as Ross battled Bowling Green.

Seating capacity of the collapsible bleachers, both sides of the court and at one end, is 1,650 but at least 2,000 fans could be crowded in for special sports events. The Class "A" and Class "AA" District basketball tournament and the District wrestling tourney in this area will be held in the new Ross gym in February.

A large curtain, extending from the ceiling to floor, can be lowered during the school day to allow separate playing spaces for both a boys' and girls' physical education program.

The gymnasium also is a combination auditorium with a stage occupying one end. The auditorium can be used for special school events like graduation exercises and honor day programs.

There is a spacious parking lot located just off the main entrance of the gymnasium.

Coach Cot Marquette said he has four probables for tonight's starting Ross lineup with the fifth position still undecided. He'll probably go along with Roger Mann, 5-8 junior and Harry Walter, 5-11 junior at the guards, Charles Pankratz, 6-2½ senior at center and Steve Cecil, 6-0 junior at one forward. The other forward spot will be occupied by any one of the three, Denny Stine, 5-11½ sophomore, Mike McCarthy, 6-1 senior or Reuben Lozano, 6-1 senior.

Ross has a 1-1 record with a loss to Bedford and a win over Holland.

Norwalk had won two straight games, over Fremont St. Joseph and Clyde, before bowing 52-41 to unbeaten Mansfield Madison last night at Mansfield. Leading the Norwalk scoring were Bob Middaugh, 6-2 junior forward and Dave Culver, 6-3 sophomore center, each with 11 points. Guard Jeff Laycock, 5-11 sophomore, had seven points, Butch Carpenter, 6-0 junior forward had five, Norb Pelham, 5-9 senior guard, posted four, Bob Fowler, 6-2 senior center one and Guard Allen two. Norwalk Hands Ross Second Season Loss

NORWALK — Ross high's Little Giants, hampered by 28 fouls charged against them, dropped their second of three outings here Saturday to Norwalk's Truckers 58-52. Norwalk is now 3-1.

The Little Giants, ahead except for a brief Norwalk lead in the first quarter, controlled proceedings in the first two periods. Coach Cot Marquette's cagers cashed in 10 of 20 field goal efforts for 50 per cent in the first half to gain an intermission edge of nine points, 28-19.

However, 17 fouls were charged against the Little Giants in the first half, Harry Walter, Charles Pankratz and Reuben Lozano all hamstrung with four personals each.

Relax Defense

The Little Giants had to relax their defense in the last two quarters and could do little rebounding. Result - Norwalk got the shots it wasn't able to manage in the first two periods. The Truckers made only five of 26 basket tries in the first half.

The Truckers, scoring on eight of 15 attempts in the third period, finally caught the Little Giants at 37-37 with 1:44 remaining in the stanza. A fielder by Ron Allan gave Norwalk a 39-37 edge, first host team lead since midway in the first period. Roger Mann scored for Fremont just before the quarter ended to send the teams tied 39-39 going into the fourth quarter.

Ross, on free throws by Steve Cecil, Walter and Mann, kept ahead of the Truckers, 42-41 before Dave Culver rebounded for Norwalk to put the Truckers on top 43-42. Walter scored on a one-hander to give the Giants a one-point bulge. Culver and Walter traded baskets to leave Ross ahead 46-45 with 3:57 to play.

Ross fortunes changed then, Walter picking up his fifth personal to join 6-2½ center Pankratz on the sidelines. Jankratz fouled out in the third quarter. Four other Little Giants, Denny Stine, Mann, Mike McCarthy and Lozano had four personals at the time.

Allan cashed in a free toss and Norwalk took command on fielders by Culver and Jeff Laycock and two free throws by Allan. Mann's two free throws were matched by Bob Middaugh of the Truckers to give Norwalk a 54-48 edge with only 1:49 to play. Culver's basket followed to provide the clincher.

Ross played excellent defensive ball in the first half and rebounded well on the defensive end of the court. The fouls changed tactics in the second half, however.

Fouled Out

Coach Marquette, commenting on the game, said "The referees'

calls had us fouled out of the game at the half. It caused us to quit rebounding for fear of losing any one of three men, later three more on personals. It also hurt our defensive game which we had to relax due to the constant foul calling by Officials Mel Hoerig of Tiffin and Aeillo of the Norwalk area. The kids let up in the second half because they were "scared out."

"I know one thing, those two referees will never work another game for me," Marquette commented. "We made mistakes in the second half and, of course, some of the foul calls were justified . . . but, many weren't and the large number of fouls knocked the boys' spirit."

There were 45 fouls called in the game, 28 against Fremont and 17 against Norwalk. Most of the fouls were called under both baskets, not out court.

Mann led Ross high's scoring with 18 points, Walter had 10 and Pankratz nine. Middaugh led Norwalk with 18, Culver had 16 and Allan 13. Ross hit on 19 of 45 shots for 42.2 per cent and Norwalk on 20 of 57 tries for 35.1 per cent. From the foul line, Norwalk made 18-of 37 and Ross 14 of 22.

Ross high's Reserves lost 39-32. Jim Ohms had eight points, Scott Decker and Dave Pankratz seven each for Coach Denny Lewis' seconds. Al Kangars led Norwalk with 13.

Frankie Albert Calls It Quits As Coach Of Pro Frisco 49ers

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Frankie Albert, saying he and his family have had their fill of boos from fans, bows out Sunday as coach of the National Football League San Francisco 49ers. A sellout crowd of 59,000 will jam Kezar Stadium for the windup game against the Baltimore Colts to watch the curtain drop on the Albert story.

It's a fantastic story... All America quarterback whose left-handed passing sparked Stanford through an undefeated season in 1940 and on to victory over Nebraska in the Rose Bowl... linkup with the 49ers in the year they organized, 1946... a tosser of 29 touchdown passes in 1948... an assistant coach at 35 and head coach one year later.

The 1958 official 49er year book even has a title for the story: "Frank Albert... man of destiny."

But for Albert both as player and coach the story lacks the one thing for which the 49er fans have yelled the loudest—a championship team. Sunday the 49ers will have to whip the Baltimore Colts to finish at 500. They've won five, lost six.

Albert's 49er coaching record is 18-16-1.

It was failure to win a championship which brought about the firing of Buck Shaw, the 49ers' first coach, after the 1954 season. Albert, an emotional fellow, was on the fringes of the news conference at which Shaw's discharge was announced. Tears streamed unchecked down his cheeks. He was an ardent admirer of Shaw.

A one-year tenure by the late Norman P. (Red) Shrader got the 49ers no nearer pay dirt. Then Albert took over. In 1957, he came so close. The amazing 49ers, fea-

Kuharich Meets With University Officials, Press At Notre Dame

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP)—Joe Kuharich, Notre Dame's newly appointed football coach, begins setting up house today.

Kuharich, who Monday officially succeeded the ousted Terry Brennan, returns to his native South Bend and alma mater to meet with university officials and the press.

Kuharich might reveal some of his plans for the 1959 season but it is doubtful he will name his staff at so early a date.

The present Notre Dame staff includes assistant coaches Bernie Crummins, Hugh Devore, Bill Fischer, Bill Walsh, Bernie Witucki and John Zilly. There were indications some will be retained.

Kuharich, 41, a former Irish guard, signed a four-year contract — the longest ever given by Notre Dame.

"I am flattered and proud that they (Notre Dame) decided to give me the opportunity," said Kuharich. "It always has been my hope and prayer that I could return to Notre Dame."

In 1951, he guided the University of San Francisco to an undefeated season and then signed to head the Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League. He left collegiate ranks with a 25-14 record.

After a 4-8 season with the Cardinals in 1952 Kuharich left the team following a flareup with managing director Walter Wolfner.

Kuharich returned to the pro ranks in 1954 and piloted Washington to a 3-9 season. The fol-

lowing year he was named Professional Coach of the Year when Washington finished with an 8-4 record.

The Redskins have been slipping ever since. They were 6-6 in 1956, 5-6-1 in 1957 and 4-7-1 this season. Nevertheless, Redskins owner George Preston Marshall thought enough of Kuharich to sign him to a five-year contract last year.

Marshall released Kuharich of his commitments and immediately signed Mike Nixon as head coach. Nixon had been Washington's backfield coach. Nixon has been coaching for 15 years—13 with the pros—but never has been the boss man.

Brennan, meanwhile, is looking for a job at the age of 30.

He says he's interested in coaching if the right opportunity comes along. His qualifications include five years of experience at Notre Dame where his teams won 32

Ross Loses 61-33 To Findlay In Buckeye Conference Game

Fremont Makes Only Eight Field Goals; Six Players Benched

FINDLAY — Field goal famine continued to plague the Ross Little Giants who dropped their fourth straight Buckeye Conference game, a 61-33 setback here last night to the Findlay Trojans.

Ross also lost the Reserves game, but by a much narrower margin - 33 to 25.

Six Fremont members sat on the bench during the games, out due to disciplinary measures. Two are Varsity performers, Senior Mike McCarthy and Junior Steve Cecil and four Reserves, Jim Ohms, who plays parttime with the Varsity, Gary Beatty, Dick Schepflin and Dick Dundore.

Violated Rules

Coach Leroy (Cot) Marquette, Ross head coach, said the six had violated training rules. He restricted them to the bench for a week, although they are allowed to dress for games and are required to report for practice.

The Little Giants, averaging less than 10 field goals in three previous Buckeye starts, didn't fare any better Tuesday. They made but eight against Findlay, one in the first and fourth quarters, two in the second and four in the third. Findlay, meanwhile, found the range on 20 of 51 field attempts for 39.2 per cent and was successful on 21 of 26 free throw tries, 80.8 per cent.

Ross made one field goal in only six tries the first quarter, only two of 13 in the second and but one of 14 in the final stanza.

Only in the third quarter were the Little Giants able to manufacture a decent field goal percentage, hitting four of nine shots for plus 40 per cent. The percentage was good but the number of attempts below par.

Altogether, Ross tallied eight field goals while getting only 42 cracks at the Findlay goal for a woeful 19 per cent.

Two major factors stand out in Fremont's pitiful showing on field attempts. One, lack of rebounding, especially on offense. This accounts for the well below average number of tries Fremont is getting each game. To be able to compete in the Buckeye Conference, a team must try at least 50 shots, preferably 60 or more.

Passing Drawback

Another drawback, probably the big one, is the Purple and White's inability to move the ball well. Passes are either intercepted or they are delayed too long or they are not directed to the right player. Or, they are by-passed, a breaking player not getting the pass at all while getting into position for a good shot.

The passing deficit forces Ross to shoot from long range, oftentimes out of position. Lack of rebounding gives the opposition the ball too many times.

Main difference in the game last night was Findlay's ability to move the ball and Fremont's lack in the same department. Findlay's all-court press was applied throughout the game but it didn't bother the Little Giants too much in the back court. It was the Trojans' tight inner ring around their own basket that hurt Fremont the most. Ross just couldn't break players through the Findlay wall.

Ross fell behind 16-6 at the quarter as a field goal by Center Charles Pankratz and two free throws by him plus two free tosses by Roger Mann represented the entire Ross scoring.

Pankratz didn't add another point in the game after giving Ross a 5-2 lead with his rebound effort and pair of gratis shots. Pretty pass patterns set up Findlay's Bill Lee, Chuck Hickie, Hugh Davis and Tom Lear for nifty fielders late in the quarter to pull the Findlayites ahead.

The Little Giants had a chance to come back in the second stanza. Findlay seemed to be bothered somewhat by Fremont's tightened defense and Ross began to show some

board strength. However, the offensive lack on the part of the Little Giants hindered the possible spurt.

Ross had 13 field attempts and Findlay only nine in the second period but Marquette's cagers could cash in only two while Coach Bob Werley's Trojans hit on three. Both teams were confined to long range and both were missing. Findlay outscored Ross 12 to 6 in the quarter, with the aid of six free throws, to take a commanding 28-12 halftime bulge.

Lee, a versatile, agile performer at either center or guard, handled himself well in the third quarter. The 6-1 Findlay senior tapped in three rebounds, springing high after a Trojan miss on a shot, and connected on a pretty turn around shot. Findlay uncorked 18 tries at the basket and Ross only nine in the period.

Findlay's subs took over in the final chapter and outscored Ross 6 to 11.

Scoring honors went to Lee with 13 points followed by Findlay Guard Hugh Davis with 11, sinking four long range baskets. For Ross, even though he made but one field goal, 5-8 Junior Guard Roger Mann was the leading scorer with 11 points, making nine of 12 free tosses. Harry Walter was next with eight markers.

Crowd of possibly 1,400 attended the game in the Findlay high gym. Findlay crowd was enthusiastic and was sparked by a high school "pep" band.

Reserves Stay Close

Ross stayed close in the Reserves games, trailing 6-3 at the quarter and 14-7 at halftime. Findlay spurted to a 25-13 advantage after three periods.

Coach Dennis Lewis had three Ross Reserves scoring all but four of the 25 Fremont points. Maury Gnepper with eight, Dan Moran with seven and Dave Pankratz with six. Gnepper was "deadly" on long one-hand push tries.

Findlay's attack was concentrated on the one-man antics of Guard Mike Lanning who potted 20 of Findlay's 33 points.

Ross Varsity is now 2-6 for the season and 0-4 in the league. Findlay has a 7-3 overall mark and 2-2 conference showing.

Next game for Fremont will be on January 9 at Sandusky in a B. C. affair. On January 10, Ross plays at Fostoria.

SANDUSKY — Competition in the Buckeye Conference for the Ross high Little Giants is, to say the least, somewhat one-sided in the 1958-59 basketball season. The Purple and White, drubbed by Sandusky's Blue Streaks 60-33 here last night, have now played half of their league games, meeting each conference foe once. Record for the Little Giants is 0-5. And the five setbacks have been devastating.

Cochair Leroy (Cot) Marquette's charges lost by 25 points (65-40) to Lorain, by 36 points (84-48) to Elyria, by 15 points (53-38) to Marion Harding, by 28 points (61-33) to Findlay, and by 27 points to Sandusky.

In the five league engagements, Fremont has totaled 172 points, an average of 34.4 per game. Opponents have compiled 323 points, an average of 64.6 per game.

Tonight, Ross seeks its third victory to go with seven defeats against a tall, favored Fostoria high quintet at Fostoria. The Giants are 2-2 against non-league foes, winning over Holland and Tiffin, Columbusian and losing to Bedford and Norwalk.

It was a sad afternoon and evening for four Fremont cage teams that invades Sandusky. The afternoon, Fremont's Eighth graders lost to Sandusky Eighth 35-22 and the Junior high Ninth graders were defeated by Sandusky's Freshmen 38-28. Ross high's Reserves also were topped by Sandusky's Reserves 48-26 in the prelim to the Varsity game.

Varsity game had the same flavor as in previous contests in which the Little Giants were defeated plus one more added deficit. 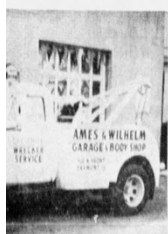

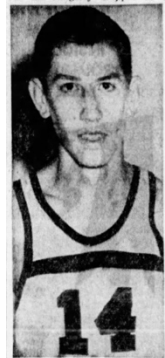

Norwalk holds a decision over Fremont Ross this year, 58-52.

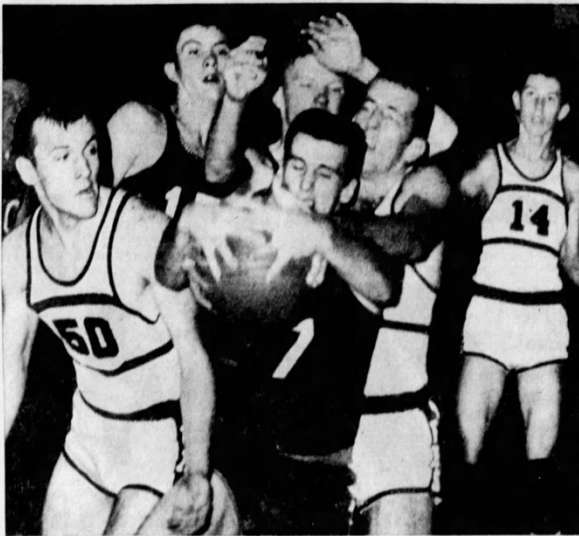

Bellevue Falls 41-36; Late Rally Gives Giants Verdict To End 7-Game Losing Streak

Seven game losing streak of the Ross high Little Giants was halted in the Senior high gym Tuesday night when the Fremont hoopers rallied in the second half to hand Northern Ohio League leader Bellevue a low scoring 41-36 setback.

Ross high has now won three games and lost 10, all three victories in non-conference action and all on the new Ross gym court. Fremont is 0-7 in the Buckeye Conference.

Held scoreless in the first period, 5-11 Junior Guard Harry Walter took charge of the Ross attack the next three quarters to pump in 23 points, high mark for a Little Giant player this season. The 23 markers represent more than half of Fremont's 41 total.

Walter was especially "hot" in the third stanza when Ross assumed a lead it never relinquished. The outcourt sharpshooter potted four field goals and three of four free tosses in the quarter for 11 points.

Trailing 21-17 at halftime, Walter flipped in two straight fielders to tie the score at 21-21 with 6:42 remaining in the third chapter. Bellevue regained the lead on 6-2 Phil Beachey's foul shot but Steve Cecil put Fremont on top 23-22 with a long one-hand bank shot. Dave Hutchins, 6-3½ Bellevue center cashed in a charity toss to knot the score at 23-all.

Walter dropped in a push shot from long range, a jump shot from side court and two free throws to provide Ross a 29-23 margin. Charles Pankratz, 6-2 senior center, tipped in a basket to up Ross high's lead to 31-23 and Coach Cot Marquette's cagers were never headed.

Excellent On Boards

Ross entered the fourth quarter with a 34-27 bulge, canning seven of 20 shots in the third period plus three free throws for a 17-6 scoring edge over the Redmen. Pankratz, 6-1 Senior Mike McCarthy and 5-11 Sophomore Denny Stine turned in some excellent rebounding in the third and deciding quarter. Cecil and 6-1 Senior Reuben Lozano also helped out earlier in the rebound department.

Bellevue had a miserable mid-game night with field attempts. Starting early in the second quarter, the Redmen missed 10 straight attempts before sinking one just before the half. They missed seven in a row to start the second half. That made 18 tries for baskets by Coach Burnell "Curly" Hoffman's cagers with only one finding the mark. Beachey's push try late in the third period was the only floor success for Bellevue in the period, the Redmen sinking one for 13.

Jere Crosby, 5-10 long range bomber for Bellevue, who had meshed five field goals and two free throws in the first half, was held pointless in the third period, connected on a long jump attempt to start the fourth stanza reducing Fremont's lead to five points, 34-29. Hutchins added a free throw to chop off another point but didn't get to shoot again although entitled to another chance on a one-and-one situation. This prompted a howl from Coach Hoffman.

Referee had exchanged signals with official scorekeeper Clarence Schiefer of Ross high. Schiefer had indicated a one-and-one but the official thought he had signaled only one attempt. Play continued as Coach Hoffman stormed the scoring table and exchanged words with Schiefer. Before play was halted, two live ball situations had occurred. Ref-

eree was going to give Hutchins his second try but Ross Coach Marquette pointed out the two live ball happenings. This nullified any play back. The "burning" Hoffman returned to the Bellevue bench and action continued.

Roger Stann, 5-8 Junior guard, hit a free throw for Ross matched by Beachey of Bellevue. Cecil, 6-0 Junior forward, gave Ross a boost with a push shot but Crosby kept Bellevue hopeful with a steal, drive and layup.

There was no scoring, both teams wasting opportunities, from the four-minute mark to 1:21 to play in the game. At that point, Walter, on the move, took a mate's pass, continued his drive for a layup and Ross led 39-33. A Bellevue free throw followed but the Redmen didn't score again until Crosby hit on a jump try with 21 seconds remaining to cut Ross high's advantage to three points, 39-36. Walters pair of gratis shots at the 16-second mark ended the scoring.

Bellevue has a 4-0 showing to pace the NOL but hasn't done well outside the league. Loss to Fremont was the Redmen's fifth non-loop setback. Overall Bellevue is now 7-5 for the season.

Sixth Best Total

The Little Giants netted 15 field goals, sixth best total in the 13 games played thus far. In an initial season win over Molland, Ross made 23 fielders and in a victory over Tiffin Columbian (December 16, 1958), last year win until last night, the Purple and White collected 16 baskets. Fremont made 22 fielders against Bedford in the cage opener back in November, pumped in 19 against Norwalk early in December and 16 against Lorain a week and a half ago, all in defeat.

Ross Upsets Marion 49-48

First League Victory For Little Giants

Lozano's Goal In Last Minute Decides Close B.C. Contest

MARION — Most important basketball victory of the season was scored by Fremont Ross in an upset over Marion Harding here Friday night, the Little Giants topping the Prexies 49-48 in a Buckeye Conference contest.

It was a first in several instances for the Purple and White. Win represents the first in league play this year for Ross; first victory for Fremont in the conference under new head coach Leroy (Cot) Marquette, and first triumph for Ross in the Buckeye hoop since knocking off Marion 50-49 at Marion last year (1957 verdict for Fremont in the 1957-58 cage season in the league).

Ross led most of the way in the game after Denny Stine's field goal put the Giants on top 2-0 to start the first quarter. However, Coach Marquette's cagers had to rally in the fourth period for the victory after falling behind by five points, 46-41.

Coach Marquette termed the victory a "sweet one" and said his charges played a "fine game." He especially liked the work of Guards Harry Walter and Roger Mann plus substitute Guard Jim Ohms who "fed the key" all evening.

"Offensive play of the guards plus our overall defense and back line rebounding earned us the victory," Marquette commented.

Back Line Work
Back line of Mike McCarthy, Reuben Lozano and at various times Steve Cecil, Charles Pankratz and Stine accounted for 28 rebounds picked off by the Little Giants against the tall and rugged Marion crew.

"Our defense held Marion to only 13 shots in the first half of which they made five field goals," Marquette explained. "Free throws allowed them to keep pace with us in the first half." Marion made 13 of 23 free tosses in the first two quarters. Ross had 20 free throw chances in the game and made 11 for slightly over 50 per cent with Walter earning five of six and Cecil five of seven. The Prexies taking advantage of 28 personal calls on Ross, had 41 foul line opportunities but cashed in only 22 for just over 50 per cent.

It was fouls that almost cost Ross the game. Three Fremont players fouled out in the fourth period. Mann with 3:39 left in the game, Cecil with 2:36 remaining and Walter with two minutes to play.

"Losing Walter and Cecil took away our main scorers," Marquette observed. "However, Ohms (a sophomore) and Stine stepped in to do a good job in place of Walter and Mann out court and Pankratz, Lozano and McCarthy took care of the board work the rest of the game."

Offensive Punch Nil
Lack of offensive punch hurt the hoopers of Coach Leroy (Cot) Marquette for the "ump-teenth" time this season. Ross, rebounding and playing excellent defensively, stayed close for three periods, trailing at the quarter marks 7-5, 18-14 and 32-28.

Two quick baskets and a pair of free tosses by Sandusky to open the fourth stanza spelled the Purple and White's downfall. Jon Jackson, SHS forward, netted a push shot from behind a screen, Ray Young connected on two foul opportunities and Jackson rebounded in a two-pointer to push SHS ahead by 10, 38 to 28.

First offensive production for Fremont in the fatal fourth was a long one-hander by Guard Roger Mann with 3:18 left in the game. The Streaks came back with two "quicknesses" by Walt (Junebug) Williams and that was the game. Ross setback could be summed up in its lack of offensive rebounding and inconsistency from long range.
