FREMONT COMES UP SHORT, 61-43:

## DeVilbiss Ends Ross Dream

The end of a long and surprisingly successful basketball career came to a jarring halt for Fremont Ross Saturday night in Toledo as a tall and slick-shooting DeVilbiss Tiger (front) handed the Little Giants a 61-43 setback in the finals of the Toledo district cage tournament.

DeVilbiss, which had tied for second place with three other teams in the Toledo City League, earned the right to represent this area in Friday's opening round of the northwest regional tournament in Bowling Green. DeVilbiss carries a 174 record while Ross closed with a 157 log.

It was no disgrace to lose to the likes of the hot-shooting Orangemen who hit 33 per cent of their first half shots and finished the contest with 23 of 31 for 63.4 per cent.

Ross cannot only 16 of 31 shots and totaled 31.4 per cent from the field, the lowest average for Fremont since early in the campaign.

Moreover, Ross was generally getting only the one shot before the rangy Tigers cleaned the boards and hustled down court to set up their offense which featured the inside work of clever Center Dave McClellan, 65, and the corner shooting of 64 Mike Eastop and 64 Gord Zaha.

McClellan led a balanced DeVilbiss attack with 17 points, followed by Eastop's 14, Zaha's 13 and Clyde Lykins' 10.

Ross did not have a player in double figures, all starters sitting out portions of the game. Ross Hagerty and Kurt Hasselbach earned eight points each and Don Binkley came off the bench to get six.

After the opening tip-off, DeVilbiss fell into a zone defense and those tall lads from Toledo further hindered the Little Giants by keeping their arms raised high. Ross, a deliberate team move of the season, really slowed down the works and took its time shooting during the early going. Fremont had hoped to pull DeVilbiss out of its planned defense.

"We passed up some good shots in the first half," judges Coach Dick Norman.

Still, Ross got off one more field try in the first period but DeVilbiss—67. However, the Tigers made five of theirs and Ross only three.

After one and one-half minutes of the quarter, Hasselbach worked clear of the zone defense to pot the first basket on Fremont's first try. Zaha clinched for the Tigers but Dave George came right back to regain the lead for the locals.

McClellan's basket and a free throw by Eastop pushed the Tigers ahead 5-4 but Hagerty cannot a rebound shot and Ross was on top again at 6-5.

Fremont was never to lead again as DeVilbiss scored eight of the game's following

nine points to grab a 13-7 quarter lead.

DeVilbiss was getting good position on Fremont and hogging most of the rebounds.

Fremont opened up slightly in the second quarter, taking 14 shots but making only four for

a half-time total of 32 per cent.

DeVilbiss connected on seven of 14 second stanza fielders, giving the tigers a torrid 12 for 21 the first half.

Eastop was the big noise for the hungry Tigers as he

meshed five long shots from

the side and the Tigers moved to their biggest lead of the game at that point, 24-13, with 2:13 remaining.

Coach Norman shuffled his line-up the entire second half, pulling his regulars from time to time as he sought a winning combination. Wally Smallees had to leave the game for a brief spell in the third quarter when he picked up his third personal foul. He later added a fourth.

When Smallees took his seat on the bench, McClellan started to hit from close range and Ross dropped back by 21 points, 45-24, in the late stages of the third period.

Ross went the final six and one-half minutes of the third quarter without scoring a basket, living eerily on five free throws during that span.

DeVilbiss went into a one-and-one foul shooting situation with 4:07 left in the quarter.

Ross erupted at the start of the fourth period and made a bit to overhaul DeVilbiss' big lead. Binkley scored on a rebound shot and the husky senior came back to tally after stealing the ball. Hagerty hit from the corner and Ross was down by 13 points, 65-52.

Eastop and McClellan scored in rapid fashion to thwart any Ross dream of an upset.

Ross shot 31 times in the second half as compared to 22 field tries in the first two quarters.

## Records Mean Nothing In Regional Cage Play

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Ohio's high school basketball teams are away season records this week and go into regional tournaments on even terms in the race for state finals berths.

Paul Walker, who has piloted Middletown to several state titles, has often said:

"Any team that can reach the regionals is capable of going all the way, no matter what its record is."

The 16 Class AA teams have left 497 foes in their wake, and the 16 Class A clubs have eliminated 311 foes to win the coveted regional spots.

The Class AA contingent,

which has an over-all 216-50 record against 212-46 last year, ranges from Elyria's 167 on the bottom to Lexington's 241 at the top.

Richmondale Southeasters, with 24-0, is the lone unbeaten team in the trophy, and the Class A records range down to Lockland's 157. Overall, the A quintets have a 327-48 record, much better than the 208-97 of a year ago.

Dresden Jefferson's state champs and Mogadore are the lone Class A clubs to reach the regionals two years in a row—but repeaters in the big school class are Cleveland East Tech, Cleveland East, Elyria, Portsmouth, Canton McKinley and Delaware.

(6) and Cleveland East Tech (10), while in Class A the survivors are Celina ICHS (2), Southeastern (5), Brilliant (9), Strasburg (8) and Columbus University (10).

Tournament play gets under way Tuesday in Class AA at Kent as Cleveland East Tech tangles with Youngstown Woodrow Wilson. Wednesday, on the same floor, Cleveland East meets Akron North, with the winners clashing Saturday for the state berth.

All other play is scheduled Friday and Saturday, with the winners moving to the state meet at St. John Arena March 20-21.
