Track Team Opens Wednesday

Ross' Attitude Good

"The attitude has been good. The kids are really working hard. I'm pleased with the way things are coming along."

In a nutshell, that summarizes the feelings and opinions of Ross high school track coach Ron Brant as the Little Giants prepare for their opening meet of the season next Wednesday at Marion Harding.

"We're hoping for a good year," Brant continues. "We have 12 lettermen back and they form a good nucleus. We also have a number of fine sophomores who should break into the starting lineup and provide some depth."

Brant and his three assistant coaches—Steve Frontz, Dick Cannode and Gary Ricker—have been holding practice sessions with the entire squad since the first week of March. The distance runners have been working out since January.

"The distance runners also participated in the cross country program," Brant says, "they have just continued to stay in shape. I'm hoping we score well in the distance events throughout the season."

Heading the list of distance runners are Joe and Allen Widman, twin brothers. They will be joined by Rick Scott, Tom Hoffman and Kirk Stone. All five lettered in cross country last spring. Hoffman was a letter

winner on last year's track squad, also.

Joe Widman is slated to run in the 880 and mile. Brother Al will compete in the two mile. So far, Al is the only runner listed among the two milers.

"A couple of kids who we thought would come out didn't," Brant says. "It has caused us a few problems and we might need to do some juggling."

Joe Widman ran the two miles indoors several weeks ago. His time was 6.5 seconds better than the current school record. Al ran the same distance at the same time beating the record by 6.3 seconds.

Frontz has charge of the sprinters. Outstanding candidates in the 100, 220 and 440 yard dashes include Earl Smith, Len Ferguson, Bill Burkett, Steve Tooman, Larry Sheffield, Tom Liggins, Lionel Burel, Fred Burel, John Heidelberg, John Graham, Ed Pendrey and Mike Scully.

Smith, Burkett, Tooman and Pendrey are ticketed for running in the quarter mile. Smith, Burkett and Tooman are returning letter winners. Smith, who's only a junior, tied for second in the Buckeye Conference meet with a time of 51.2 last season.

"The quarter mile should be one of our better events," Brant says. "All of those kids are

capable of scoring for us in every week's opener are Ben Lopez, John Werling, Bruce Schneider, Perry Shenk, Claude Price and Barry Hawk.

Sheffield and Ferguson are two-year lettermen who will run in the 100 and 220. They are also slated to compete in the long jump.

Liggins will run in the sprints and 880 relay. He's also listed as one of the top competitors in the shot put.

Liggins, a sophomore, who starred for the Little Giants in football last year, gaining first team honors in the Buckeye Conference, has apparently recovered from a December knee operation.

"He has been working on strengthening the knee since January," Brant says. "It (the knee) appears to be okay. Tom hasn't had any problems and he has been working awful hard since we've gone outdoors."

Candidates for the high and low hurdles and the pole vault are under the tutelage of Cannode.

In the pole vault, contenders for the three openings in next

week's opener are Ben Lopez, John Werling, Bruce Schneider, Perry Shenk, Claude Price and Barry Hawk.

But, the boy the coaching staff hoped would be the top pole vaulter, Mike Tooman, won't compete this season. He has been felled by mononucleosis.

Tom Nahm, Kerry Pitts, Mike Ruland, Mark Shimer and Bill Shaffer are the leading candidates for the hurdle positions.

Ricker has charge of the shot putters, discus entrants and high jumpers, Tom Nighswander, Bob Kusner and Chuck Miller are the top discus contenders. Miller and Nighswander are returning lettermen.

In the shot, Ricker is working with Liggins, Miller, Larry Johns, Scott Merritt, Andy Sale, Bob Weiler, Gary Cooper and Bill Fleming.

Chuck Celek, Kim Michials and Mike Bloom are slated for high jump duty.

Little Giants Lose Track Opener

Marion — Marion Harding scored 12 first places en route to an 86-41 track meet victory over Fremont Ross here Tuesday afternoon. It was the first meet of the season for Ross.

Highlight of the Ross performance was Al Widman's victory in the two-mile run. He ran the event in 10:23.3, 14.2 seconds better than the previous Ross record. The old mark was set by Tom Hoffman in the 1969 Buckeye Conference meet.

Al Schneider picked up a first for the Little Giants in the pole vault. Ross' Larry Sheffield topped the long jumpers.

Sheffield was the top point-getter for Ross in the meet which was held on Harding's all-weather track. Sheffield, a senior, was second in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

The hosts held only a 23-22 edge in the field events. Ross entrants took a second in every event but the long jump. The Little Giants also had three thirds in the field events — the shot put, discus and high jump.

Ross had five second places and three thirds in the running events. Marion runners swept two events — 180 yard low hurdles and 880 yard run.

The Little Giants have two more dual meets this week. Coach Ron Brant will take his squad to Fostoria Thursday. The first home meet is slated for Saturday at 2 p.m. Clyde will provide the opposition.

FOSTORIA — Fostoria high school's track team proved no match for Fremont Ross here Thursday afternoon.

Coach Ron Brant's Little Giants made a shambles of the dual meet bringing home an easy 106-21 victory. Ross entrants placed first in all 15 events and the Little Giants missed taking the second spot in only one event.

"We had a good workout," Brant said. "The kids ran some good times but there is room for much improvement. You could see the difference between the Marion meet on Tuesday and this one, however."

"Our big meet is Saturday. The kids are really looking forward to that one. It should be a real good meet. It looks like both team are pretty even. They might have an

edge in the field events and we should have the advantage in the track events. The meet will go down to the wire."

Ross swept two events in waltzing to its lopsided win. The Little Giants had all three place winners in the mile and 180 yard low hurdles.
