LITTLE GIANTS FAVORED OVER TOLEDO SCOTT

Crimson Streaks Host Townsend Township Quintet

With injuries the predominant factor, the 1947-48 scholastic basketball campaign opens here Tuesday night as Al Ziemke's Little Giants of Ross host Toledo Scott while St. Joseph's Crimson Streaks entertain Townsend township.

The Giant-Bulldog clash will see the Rossmen rather heavy choices to repeat the lop-sided victory registered last year over the Toledosans despite a string of mishaps which has benched three Purple and White cagers.

Lloyd Bischoff went out of the lineup with a dislocated shoulder while Don Hulka and Bob Beeker joined the "sideline contingent" with a twisted knee and bad ankle respectively.

Meanwhile, Ziemke, commencing his first season at the helm of the Rossmen who were piloted heretofore by Eddie Gabel, currently trainer for Western Michigan's Broncos, indicated that Ralph Grubs would be a surprise starter at one of the forward berths, teaming with Dick Baron. Sam Sims will replace the graduated Dick Porczak at center while Bob Beck and Walter Weinhart will be at the guards.

All with the exception of Grubs, are lettermen. The latter played reserve ball last year at center and will be used with Sims in Ziemke's double-pivot set offensive. On the defense, the Rossmen will settle into a zone style. First line replacements include Tex Frey.

LITTLE GIANTS IMPRESSIVE IN 55-23 DECISION

Ralph Grubs Is Star Of 1947-48 Cage Inaugural

Exhibiting a surprisingly accurate attack and a stubborn zone defense despite only two weeks of drills, Ross high's Little Giant cagers romped to an impressive 55-23 victory over Toledo Scott Tuesday night at the Croghan street gym.

In winning, the Rossmen made Al Ziemke's debut as tutor of a Class A quintet an extremely successful one. The former Ashland assistant came up with a veteran-studded lineup that exceeded all possible predictions.

During the first five minutes of play, the Little Giants appeared likely to convert the clash into a rout as they held Andy Kandik's crew at bay while rolling 14 points through the hoops. During this time, the rebound work of Ralph Grubs and the deadly shooting of the 240-pound football tackle—who was starting his first varsity game—along with that of letterman Dick Baron, sent the Purple and White racing into a long lead they never relinquished.

The ball handling during the first period was exceptionally sharp and bad passes were held to a minimum. But in the second and third stanzas, a relapse set in. The locals as tough as ever on the defense—but their offense fell apart at the seams.

Lay-up shots were missed by every member of the combine and the ball handling became ragged. But, in the final canto—even with a lineup studded with second-stringers, the Rossmen regained their eye. Only the final whistle and free substitutions by Ziemke, who really opened "the gates of mercy" in this first encounter, prevented the score from resembling a debacle.

Scott Can't Hit

At no time after the first 30 seconds were the visiting Bulldogs "in" the game. Grubs opened the scoring with a pivot shot and added another before Baron came through with a push shot from the foul line. Scott called time in an effort to reorganize a sadly deficient zone defense after which Bob Beck, Baron, Walter Weinhardt and Grubs connected in rapid succession for a 14-0 lead. At the five minute mark Porter King converted a charity toss for Scott's initial counter.

They were not to tally their first goal from the field for an additional seven minutes during which time Baron and Grubs personally escorted the Rossmen to a 21-4 margin. It was not until early in the third period that the Bulldogs again hit from the floor with King doing the honors.

Held on even terms in the second period, the Little Giants broke loose again in the third canto as Grubs sent four shots swishing through the nets. In the final period, Johnny Auxter, Baron, Sims, Ed Nighswander, Tex Frey and Bob Becker took over the scoring chores, unleashing a 19-point attack while the Bulldogs were collecting 13—three more than their total for the first three stanzas.

Some 600 fans witnessed the clash in which nine of Ziemke's 11 players reached the scoring column. The lone Rossman who failed to see action were Don Hulke and Lloyd Bischoff, both of whom were riding the bench with injuries.

Grubs edged Baron for individual scoring honors with 14 points to the latter's 13 while Beck and Weinhardt each tallied six. Bill Geiger was Scott's "big gun" with seven points—six of 'em in the last period.

In the preliminary, the Ross reserves dropped a 33-18 decision to the Toledoans.

Romping into a ridiculously loose to completely engulf a weak Tow of Fremont St. Joseph's registered 48 cage inaugural at Educational.

The shifty floor captain of the parochials assumed command of the passing attack and passed up shot after shot in order to feed the pellet to a mate. When the evening was over, Vince, usually the Streaks' top point-maker, had a single goal to his credit—but the assists he made on others failed to show in the statistics.

Jack House bagged eight points during the hectic second-period uprising and Tom Ackerman and Yeager contribute six apiece. In the following canto, it was virtually the same story with Joe Young and Ackerman topping the attack. When the festivities were concluded, Yeager wound up with the scoring honors on 15 points while Ackerman and Young trailed one

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ROSSMEN TREK TO P. C. WITH RATED SQUAD

St. Joe To Host Weak Fostoria Combine At Ross

Seeking their second successive victories of the 1947-48 cage campaign, Fremont Ross and St. Joseph's—both again in the favorites' role—clash with Port Clinton and Fostoria St. Wendelin's respectively Friday night.

The Little Giants, after unveiling unexpected power and defensive ability in their inaugural Tuesday against a weak Toledo Scott combine, take to the road for the Porter tilt while the Crimson Streaks inaugurate a new "home game" policy by moving into vacated Ross gym for their clash with the Mohawks.

Despite a 43-38 loss to Lakeside in the opener last week, Coach Mel Carl's Redskins are expected to provide Al Ziemke's crew with a serious test.

There is little question but what the Porters' passing prowess will better that of the hapless Bulldogs and, in Dave Krupp and Bob Lorenson, the hosts will have a decided offensive threat.

Center Benched

This combine, along with a newcomer, Bill Belshaw, accounted for all but three of the P. C. points against Lakeside. The Porters were weakened for the Stone Crusher clash by the loss of 6' 4" Harold "Nook" Masing who was sidelined due to a scholastic deficiency. His status for Friday's clash against the Rossmen is still uncertain.

In his absence, Marv Grover, a 6' 1" lad, will start at pivot post with Krupp and Lorenson at the guards and Belshaw and Gene Havener teamed in the front court.

Against this combine, Ziemke is expected to retaliate with Ralph Grubs and Dick Barons at forwards; Sam Sims at center, and Walter Weinhardt and Bob Beck at the guards. All but Beck are seniors and all but Grubs are returning lettermen. It was the latter who was a rather surprise star of the Ross-Scott clash.

Carl, starting his first year as head coach of the Redskins, has revolutionized the Porters' style of play.

He has abandoned the former zone defense style in favor of a man-to-man. On the attack, the Porters have dropped their slow, set methods for the higher-scoring fast break mode.

Krupp was shifted from a forward, where he specialized in one-handed "flip" shots, to a guard to bolster the backboard defenses while Belshaw was converted from a set-shot to a high-scoring offensive threat.

The Rossmen will continue their tight 2-3 zone defense in which Sims and Grubs play the dominate part in "under-the-basket" work, and a double-pivot, set offense which features the shooting threats of the entire combine.

The Porters will be attempting their second hurdle of a rugged 16 game schedule which includes Libbey, Central Catholic, Wood-Ward and Waite of Toledo; Bellevue, and Ashland.

Meanwhile, at Ross another high scoring game appears in prospect as Kenny Herman brings his Mohawks to Fremont for another in the series of family feuds with brother-in-law Bob Smith.

Little Giants Edge Porters In Overtime By 46-45 Margin

Climaxing a terrific last-period rally in which they came from far behind to deadlock the count before capturing a 46-45 overtime decision, Al Ziemke's scrapping Little Giants from Fremont Ross recorded their second straight triumph of the campaign at Port Clinton Friday night.

Rated a rather lop-sided favorite following their easy victory over Toledo Scott in the opener, the Porters were bowing to Lakeside, the Rossmen trailed almost from the opening whistle to the last minute of the regular contest.

Mel Carl, in his first year as tutor of the Redskins, had his crew primed for this one. No longer did the Porters resemble the bephazard outfit which missed shot after shot in losing to Class B Lakeside.

Their fast-breaking offense infiltrated Ross' zone set-up with remarkable precision. In the early stages of the tilt as Dave Krupp co-ordinated the attack with deadly flip-shots.

In the end, though, it was the stamina, fighting hearts and accurate shooting of Dick Baron, Sam Sims and the rest of the Rossmen that paid off in nice dividends and completely obliterated whatever cockiness that might have existed in the Little Giant ranks.

Lady Luck Smiles
Of course, Lady Luck had her fling. And this time she was smiling strictly on the Rossmen. For after Sims had deadlocked the score at 42-42, Bob Lorensen stepped to the free throw line for a charity toss which would have settled the outcome. He missed.

Then again in the overtime, with Ross ahead 46-45 and less than a minute remaining, Lorensen again was awarded a free throw. Again he missed. Moments later a Port Clinton foul which sent Bill Belshaw from the game gave the Rossmen possession out of bounds at mid court. They successfully froze the ball for the remainder of the tilt.

But, it was not quite as simple as it appears. For some 30 minutes of the contest, the rooting was strictly one-sided. And well it might have been as Krupp paced the Porters to a 15-10 first quarter lead; a 24-20 intermission margin, and a 33-24 third quarter advantage.

Inability to convert more than eight of 17 free throws nearly resulted in defeat for Ziemke's crew who tallied 19 times from the field. On the other hand, the Redskins registered only 17 goals, but dropped in 11 of 19 charity tosses.

Krupp paced the individual scorers with 10 goals and three free throws for 23 points—the lone Porter to hit with consistency, while Baron meshed eight shots from the floor and added a quartet of foul throws for 20 markers.

Fouls hampered both defensive setups. The Rossmen lost Walter Weinhardt at the start of the final period and Bob Beck midway through the overtime. The Porters, in addition to Belshaw, lost Marx Grover at the start of the extra session via the five-four fouls.

With Belshaw, Grover, Krupp and Lorensen each hitting, the hosts raced into a 10-2 first quarter lead and only lost minute shots by Weinhardt and Baron prevented the Redskins from gaining a commanding advantage at the outset. The second quarter was evenly contested, with Krupp bagging seven of P. C.'s nine points but the Little Giants were literally snowed under in the third canto during which they tallied only four points while the Porters were hitting the hoops for nine.

At the two-minute mark in the final period, it looked like a certain upset. The Porters had a 38-27 margin and Weinhardt had already been lost from the Ross defense.

Then Bob Becker connected on the second of two free throws and followed with a filder to make it 38-30. Baron meshed three successive one-hand "flip shots" to make it 38-36 but Steve Roslar connected for a free throw for the Porters. Beck then hit from the floor but Krupp's effort made it 41-38. Grover then boosted a charity toss in and once again the game appeared over. But Baron connected on two free throws and Sims came through with the tying basket.

Beck missed a brace of foul shots to open the overtime and Bob Fritz failed in one effort for the Porters. Baron then swished the cords to give the Rossmen the lead for the first time in the game and Sims followed with the game winning shot. But the Redskins were not finished. Krupp tallied to make it 46-45 and then came Lorensen's free throw—a shot that would have sent the tilt into a "suicide death" second overtime.

Featuring the accurate shooting of Vince Swint, Glenn Sailer and Tom Ackerman, the Crimson Streaks of Fremont St. Joseph's tallied their second successive victory of the campaign Friday when they blasted Fostoria St. Wendelin's, 49-32, at the Ross hardwood.

The game represented the opening of a new "home game" policy of Bob Smith's crew whereby six of their eight Fremont conflicts are slated for the Little Giants' den.

At no time were the locals in danger as their zone defense held Kenny Herman's Mohawks at bay until late in the final period when Smith cleared the bench and used a lineup composed in the main of underclassmen.

Ackerman, Swint and Sailer alternated at accounting for the entire scoring effort of the Crimson Streaks in the opening canto which saw St. Wendelin's trailing 12-5.

Jim Whitta commenced to find the range in the second period for the Mohawks but his five-point performance was clouded as Swint sent four shots zooming through the cords as his white-clad teammates grabbed a 27-15 margin at the intermission.

"Opens The Gate"
Here again Smith made frequent substitutions in an effort to "open the gates of mercy" for brother-in-law Kenny Herman, and, at the same time, provide his second stringers with invaluable playing experience.

Sailer and Tommy Yeager picked up the loose ends of the Streak attack in the third canto with the latter bagging his entire evening's total of five points during the eight-minute session.

The Mohawks rallied in the final chapter to outscore St. Joe, 11-9—but the deficit was too great to even threaten. At one time in the fourth quarter, the Crimson Streaks rolled out in front by a 20-point margin—47-27.

Only Alf Ritzler and Whitta were able to find the hoops with any consistency for the visitors who were dropping their second successive outing. Ritzler bagged 10 points and Whitta tallied eight. Meanwhile, Swint, who was used as the key man in Smith's passing attack during the Townsend conflict in which the parochials piled up 77 points, was moved to the front court for the Mohawk clash and came through with seven goals from the field and a free throw to bag the individual scoring honors with 15 markers. Sailer, switched from his normal forward berth to guard, came up with six fielders while Ackerman netted eight points.

The Streaks completely dominated the play, including the rebounds under both baskets with Ackerman, House and Young instrumental in this performance.

In the preliminary, the Crimson Streak reserves kept pace with the varsity by knocking off the Mohawk second-stringers, 22-14.

LITTLE GIANTS FOR CONTEST VISIT TOLEDO

Crimson Streaks Host Gibsonburg On Ross Hardwood

Both confronted with their most serious tests of the campaign, Ross and St. Joseph's return to a heavy pre-Christmas cage schedule Tuesday night against highly regarded quintets from Toledo Woodward and Gibsonburg respectively.

Al Ziemke's Little Giants trek to the lair of the Polar Bears, generally regarded as Toledo's top quintet and defending champion of the City League as well as the 1947 district tournament winner, in quest of their third successive victory.

Woodward, again under the guidance of Wilson Weis, opened with a 54-40 victory over Bryan but bowed to a powerful Alumni crew last week, 33-24.

This tilt saw the Polar Bears come up with one of their worst performances in recent years as they tallied only five times from the field while committing innumerable passing and defensive errors.

Lack Experience

Only one holdover from his championship combine greeted Weis at the start of practice—Jack Smith, a forward. The balance of the Woodward lineup will include Bob Rutkowski in the front court with Smith; Dave Sayers at the pivot, and Ed Houghtaling and Jim Chubner at the guards.

Against this array, Ziemke is expected to retaliate with the same lineup that blasted Toledo Scott 55-23, and then edged Port Clinton in an overtime thriller, 45-46.

This would send Ralph Grubbs and Dick Baron into the front court with Sam Sims at center and Bob Beck and Walter Weinhardt at the guards.

Bob Smith's Crimson Streak parochials will likewise be in quest of their third successive triumph when they host Gibsonburg's powerhouse on the Ross hardwood.

As yet untested, St. Joe has romped to easy 77-32 and 49-32 victories over Townsend and Fostoria St. Wendelin's respectively with the second-stringers playing a majority of each tilt.

Glenn Saller and Tommy Yeager will move to the forwards against the Golden Bears with Tom Ackerman at center and Vince Swint and Joe Young in the back court.

Also seeking their third victory will be Bob Krotzer's Gibsonburgers who have blasted Elmore, 37-27, and Genoa, 48-30, while losing to Class A Toledo Central Catholic, 44-35.

The Golden Bears will take to the hardwood with Harry Leid and Dick Schlea at the forwards, Paul Stengel in the pivot and Harley Pertner and Jim Driftmyer at the guards.

WOODVILLE COPS THIRD CAGE WIN

WOODVILLE, O., Dec. 8—Behind the shooting of Sam Florio and Ralph Myers, Woodville's highly-regarded Warriors romped to their third successive victory in four outings Saturday night by edging Jackson township, 47-35.

Myers and Florio, each bagged 14 paces to pace the Warrior attack while Jack Warner connected for 10 counters to top the losers. Woodville copped a 32-9 decision in the reserve encounter.

LOCAL TEAMS FACE RUGGED CAGE TESTS

Confronted with their most severe tests of the infant campaign, the Ross and St. Joseph's high school quintets resume competition tonight, each seeking a third successive victory.

The toughest row apparently faces Al Ziemke's Little Giants who hit the road to Toledo where they engage the defending city and district champion Polar Bears of Woodward, tutored by Wilson Weis.

The 1946-47 Rossmen bowed to Woodward by a 42-31 margin, and the Polars will be a rather heavy favorite to repeat tonight, despite the fact that only one letterman will be in the starting lineup.

Woodward has spit two outings thus far, rocking Bryan, 54-40 in the opener, before bowing to a powerful Alumni quintet, 33-24 last week. Against this, Ziemke's crew has edged Port Clinton, 46-45 in an overtime thriller, and routed Toledo Scott 55-23.

LITTLE GIANTS DROP 10-POINT TILT TO BEARS

Sam Sims, Dick Baron
Pace Fremonters
At Toledo

In a game marred by 41 personal fouls, Toledo Woodward's defending district champion Polar Bears handed the Little Giants of Fremont Ross their first defeat of the 1947-48 campaign Tuesday night by a 43-33 margin.

Although the outcome followed closely pre-game expectations, nevertheless it was an inability to hit from the foul line that was instrumental in the Rossmen's downfall. Of 25 charity tosses, Al Ziemke's crew succeeded in bagging only nine while the Polar Bears were sinking 15 of 24 foul shots.

The Rossmen lost Bob Beeker midway through the third quarter via the five foul route while Bob Beck was flagged from the floor on one of the first plays of the last period. Woodward likewise lost two first stringers through rule infractions with center Dave Saygers trailing out a moment behind Beeker and Bob Rutkowski taking the same road near the conclusion of the contest.

Wilson Wells' crew, again one of the pre-season favorites for the Toledo city and district Class A championships, broke in front when Jack Smith, lone returning letterman from the 1946-47 combine, netted a free throw. Ross went to the fore for the only time in the tilt a few seconds later when Dick Baron found the hoops with a push shot.

Bears on Spree

Woodward snatched a three-point lead during the first period and then raced into a 23-14 advantage at the intermission as Saygers paced a 14-point uprising with a brace of fielders and as many foul shots.

The Little Giants whittled a 27-15 third period deficit to 27-21 as Beeker bagged a field goal and two free throws and Sims followed with a pivot shot. But four successive charity tosses by Ed Houghtaling, Rutkowski, Smith and Saygers again gave the Polar Bears a huge lead which they maintained throughout the balance of the tilt.

During the third quarter, the Rossmen missed a chance to whittle the Woodward lead considerably when they failed to connect on eight of 13 foul shots while the Polar Bears were hitting five for six.

The work of Sims on rebounds under both baskets highlighted the Ross attack along with the offensive showing of Beeker and Tex Frey. Baron, however, paced the Little Giants' point-making with four fielders for eight points while Sims hit for seven markers. Ray Verner and Saygers topped the individuals with 11 points each.

It was Woodward's second triumph in three outings.

BARON PACES ROSSMEN TO LOOP TRIUMPH

**Fostoria Bows 40-39
To Ziemke Quintet
For First Loss**

Fremont Ross and Fostoria met in another of their bitterly-contested Buckeye League basketball games Friday night—but, with the addition of yard-line markers, the tilt might well have been a football clash.

As a matter of record, the Little Giants walked off the court with a thrilling 40-39 victory. But it was only through the medium of 14 successful free throw conversions in 15 attempts that enabled Al Ziemke's crew to come through their initial league encounter unscathed.

A total of 45 personal fouls, along with two technical infractions, were called during the contest which constantly threatened to break out of the control of officials.

The final 90 seconds of play saw the Rossmen attempt to halt a Fostoria rally by stalling tactics at mid-court. The aroused Redmen committed every football defense possible, including a tackle or two, in an effort to obtain possession. As a result, five personal fouls were logged against Art Wilson's contingent during the last 40 seconds. On each of these occasions, the Ziemke crew took the ball out of bounds.

Take Early Lead
An overflow crowd saw the Rossmen race into a 9-0 lead during the first 4½ minutes of play during which time the Fremont defense functioned almost to perfection while Dick Baron was hitting the cords with remarkable consistency on one-handed push-shots from the foul area.

Three quick baskets near the end of the period sliced the Ross advantage to 11-9. The two teams battled on even terms for three minutes of the second stanza before Baron hit for two quick buckets to enable the Little Giants to stay in front, 22-15 at the intermission.

The play of both teams during the first half was exceptionally clean considering the rivalry between them. While Baron's offensive efforts, which netted 15 points during that time, equalled Fostoria's scoring performance, nevertheless it was the "unsung" work of Ralph Grube under both baskets with more or less dominated the Ross attack.

The Little Giant football tackle alternated between guarding assignments on Fostoria's two top pivot men, Blm Thrallkill and Ray Pastorous, holding them to a collective four points until forced out of the tilt via the five-foul route. While the purple-clad Fremonters were compiling their first half lead, their passing was virtually perfect, and well executed blocks enabled Baron to break into the clear time after time.

And at this the Redmen had a distinct advantage. Only the work of Grube, Sam Sims and Bob Beck under the baskets prevented the host crew from taking a huge lead. Midway through the third period the Fostorians lost John Royer through the medium of five personal fouls. And then their attack bogged. For it had been the offensive work of this substitute guard who had dominated the Redmen's play.

Wilson's combine sliced their deficit to 30-25 during the third canto—but always appeared on the verge of unleashing a torrid rally. That came in the final moments, though.

With three minutes remaining, the count stood 37-35 in favor of Ross. Then Sims connected for his home fielder of the session but Carlos Jackson retaliated for the Redmen. Charley Switzer missed a free throw but Thrallkill dropped in a one-pointer to make it 39-37. Then Thrallkill dumped an overhead pivot shot to deadlock the count—the first time in the game that Fostoria had not trailed. A few seconds later, Baron fouled by Jackson while in the act of shooting, converted the first of two tosses and then chose to take the ball out of bounds.

At this state, the game became rough—but good. Thrallkill went out of the game with 42 seconds remaining after committing two fouls in three seconds.

The Rossmen were on the verge of defeat when Beck missed a lay-up shot and the Redmen recovered with 35 seconds to go. But a wild pass went out of bounds and the game ended with the Rossmen still in possession and stalling at midcourt.

It was the first loss in four outings for Fostoria and the third

Exhibiting a lagging brand of ball which threatened throughout the game to result in an upset defeat, Ross high's Little Giant cagers rallied in the final nine minutes of play here Friday night to edge Tiffin Columbian, 43-40.

The win, fifth in six outings for Al Ziemke's Rossmen, placed the Purple and White temporarily in command of the Buckeye League race with two straight loop conquests while defending champion and favored Findlay has but one triumph in league play. LITTLE GIANTS BEATEN 58-27 BY HOT CREW

**Ziemke's Boys Put Up
Hard Fight Early In
Tilt; Reserves Fall**

Al Ziemke's Ross high cagers made a battle of their important Buckeye league game last night with Findlay's Trojans for only one quarter, falling by a 58-27 count after holding the highly-rated defending titlists to a 10-11 first period count.

The Little Giants, leading the Buckeye loop until last night after winning over Tiffin and Pistoria, played the Trojans to a standstill during the first eight minutes, a few seconds after the second frame started even holding a 12-11 edge over Carl Bachman's boys.

But the Little Giant offense bogged down at this point and the defense went along with it. Only one more point was added by the hosts in the remainder of the period, while Findlay—already winner of eight in a row—moved along to a 24 total at the half-time.

Third period found the Little Giants still slipping farther behind and the three-quarter pole saw the score, Findlay 38, Ross 19, the ultimate victors getting 14 against six points in that session.

Two Go to Bench

Findlay added 20 against eight in the final canto. Ross lost Bob Beck and Bob Becker in the final period, while Walt Weinhardt and Lloyd Bischoff needed only one more infraction to draw the thumb toward the bench.

The Trojans' Dick Barrett, high point man for the evening, caged the first bucket from close in, but Dick Baron tied it up with a peg from the side. However, that ended Baron's scoring until the game was almost over, the local team's offensive threat being well covered by the sharp Findlay defense. Ross went ahead 3-2 on Beck's charity toss, but Findlay ran the score to 9-4 as Al Steegman came through with a bucket and three free tosses and Bob Moore hit for a free throw. A basket and two fouls by Sims and a bucket and free toss by Weinhardt completed the Little Giants' first period scoring at 10 with Barrett clicking again to make it 11 for Findlay.

Ahead Just Once

A basket by Sims put Ross ahead 12-11 just after the second period started, and that was all, so far as Ross' having a chance for victory was concerned. The invaders ran the score to 22 before Ross hit another free throw.

Findlay, after it got clicking, showed the finesse and accuracy which gave it the Buckeye title last year and sent it through the district and regional tournaments to the state finals. Carl Bachman's boys dropped a decision to East Liverpool there, Middletown winning the state consolation.

Moore, the other starter, hit for seven.

Findlay scored on 20 free attempts out of 28, for a splendid percentage, while Ross fell one score short of a 50 per cent figure, getting 11 out of 23.

There were 42 fouls called, 24 on Ross and 18 on Findlay, the latter team not losing any of its athletes although Dunlap and Steegman each had four infractions called against them.

Findlay's reserve team, paced by Bill Gaines, a tall colored lad who looked good enough for the varsity, won handily, 43-29 from the Ross seconds. Jim Jones and Dick Sherman were high for the losers, getting eight and seven points, respectively.

Ross is booked for two encounters next week, both on the home floor.

Trailing 10 points to the rear in the individual scoring race is Vic Janowicz with 89 points from his guard berth. Paired with the former in the front court will be John Vanco with Bob Hengartner, 6' 3" football end, at center, and Bill Bock at the other guard. Alternating with this aggregation are Ollie Glass, a 1946-47 first-stringer, Ralph Moyer and Allen Struck.

Same Crew

Against this combine, Al Ziemke is expected to resort to his normal starting quintet of Dick Baron and Ralph Grubs at the forwards, Sam Sims at center, and Walter Weinhardt and Tex Frey at the guards.

A preliminary between reserve teams of the two schools will precede the varsity clash at 7 p. m. The Rossmen host Norwalk in another rugged test Friday night.

Meanwhile, over at Ashland, C. E. Taylor's unbeaten Taylor-Tots, defending district champions, collide with an unbeaten Mansfield quintet, 1946-47 district runners-up, in what is expected to be a preview of the coming tournament. The A's have copped six straight outings, one less than the Tygers.

LITTLE GIANTS SCORE UPSET ON COMEBACK

Last Period Rally Is
Top Factor; 800 See
Sixth Victory

A terrific last-period rally which netted 18 points, enabled an underdog Ross high school to score its most astounding upset of the last three campaigns Tuesday night when the Little Giants came from far off the pace to capture a 54-50 thriller from Elyria.

Some 800 fans witnessed the till which reached the climatic stage with four minutes remaining as the Rossmen first scrapped savagely to overcome a scoring deficit and then retain possession of the ball in a two-minute stalling spree which completely demoralized the Pioneer defensive structure.

The game was exceptionally cleanly contested considering the bitter football rivalry between the two schools and at times resembled an Elyria "walkaway."

It was without question the best game yet played by the Little Giants who were recording their sixth victory in eight starts. It was the fourth defeat in nine outings for the Pioneers who have been confronted with a rugged schedule.

Hit on Long Shots

The Pioneers appeared content at the outset to merely rush the ball across the mid-court stripe and then let fly with remarkable accuracy from far out on the floor. Meanwhile the Rossmen were bumping their heads against a wall in attempting to counter against Elyria's shifting man-to-man defense. But, late in the game, the fallacy of these long shots was proven as the Pioneers were unable to either click on field goal attempts or to work the ball through a tightly woven zone defense that constantly pressed for possession.

The last four minutes of play saw the count deadlocked on two occasions and the lead change hands at seven other intervals as first one team and then the other countered on shots that consistently brought the crowd to an upright position.

Added to the confusion was a decision at the 3 1/2 minute mark by Referee Bill Everhart, which resulted in:

1. An Elyria field goal due to a ruling by the official that Ralph Grubs had touched the hoop in attempting to obtain an Elyria rebound.

2. A five-minute "consultation" between Coach Al Ziemke and Captain Dick Roe of the Rossmen, Captain Vic Janowicz of Elyria, Everhart and his officiating companion, Warren Schnakel. The discussion concerned Everhart's interpretation of the rule in which Janowicz agreed with Ziemke and Baron that Grubs had not touched the hoop.

3. A reversed decision on a free throw which Everhart first allowed John Yanco on the same play and then disallowed.

Elyria, behind the sharp-shooting antics of Bill Beck and Vancos from mid-floor, romped into an 18-12 advantage in the first period as the Little Giants twice tied the count but could never assume command. Two minutes later, the Fremonters tied the score at 18-18, only to fall eight points off the pace 30 seconds later as Bob Hengartner and Janowicz each connected with a brace of fielders in rapid succession. From there until the officials time-out in the fourth period, the Pioneers were never headed.

Baron connected on three shots and a free throw to pace the 14-point Ross attack in the second period which narrowed the deficit to 29-26 at the intermission.

Elyria moved out in front, 37-29 midway through the third stanza but Sam Sims tossed in two quick baskets, Walter Weinhardt added another and Baron converted a charity toss to make it 38-36 at the end of the period.

Tex Frey sliced the count in half with a free throw as the final chapter opened and then the game commenced to get hot. Janowicz swished a long one to make it 40-37 and Baron connected on a side court effort and added a foul shot to tie it up. Janowicz then blew a try from far out but dropped the follow-up through the hoops only to have Grubs retaliate on a rebound to again deadlock the issue. Janowicz, the Pioneers' All-Ohio footballer who was flagged from the game in the final 45 seconds via the five-foul rule, converted a free throw to send Elyria to the fore. But Weinhardt's driving lay-up made it 44-43 in favor of Ross. Then came Vancos' disputed try which shoved the Pioneers ahead.

Baron connected on another long one and Hengartner retaliated for the Pioneers on a bunny. Then Baron put the Rossmen in front to stay with a fast-break, one-handed try from the foul circle and Weinhardt scored on a drive-in to make it 50-47. Hengartner added two free throws to slice the Ross lead to one point but Sam Sims came through on a pivot shot and then added a "dipper" basket after the Pioneers had committed four fouls in an effort to obtain possession as the Rossmen stalled at midcourt. Hengartner's follow-up with five seconds remaining closed out the scoring.

In the preliminary, the Ross reserves grabbed a 36-22 victory as Dick Sherman connected for 17 points, 15 of them in the final two quarters.

LITTLE GIANTS HIT COMEBACK FOR DECISION

Sims, Baron Connect
To Pace Purple's
Late Attack

In another of those rousing last-minute rallies that are rapidly becoming synonymous with Ross high school's basketball efforts, the Little Giants outpointed a stubborn Norwalk crew Friday night by a 50-49 margin before some 1,000 fans.

It was the seventh victory in nine outings for Al Ziemke's white-clad Fremonters and their third by a one-point margin. In only two instances have the Rossmen copped a decision by more than four points.

The Little Giants started slowly and were on the brink of defeat constantly through a lackadaisical style of play that included their poorest passing efforts of the year; a ragged defensive performance, and at times, an absolute void on rebounds.

Meanwhile, Norwalk, through the medium of eagle-eyed Bill Shew, who paced the individual scorers with 16 points, and an unerring accuracy from the free throw line where they converted 13 of 16 charity tosses, threatened throughout to lock up the tilt.

Late Rally Wins

It was not until the final five minutes of play that the Rossmen rallied to pull the game out of the fire. And the outcome remained in doubt until the final horn which saw a last-ditch Norwalk effort fall far short of its mark from midfloor.

The visitors raced into an 8-2 first period margin as the Little Giants continually threw the ball away on attempted fast breaks. During the stanza, Ziemke's crew fired but nine times at the basket—and never once retrieved the rebound for a follow-up shot.

LITTLE GIANTS SEEK 9TH WIN IN 11 OUTINGS

Tygers Paced By High Scoring Nick Gagich; Height Featured

Seeking their ninth victory in 11 outings and one of the most astounding upsets of the campaign, Al Ziemke's Ross high cagers invade Mansfield Tuesday for their annual clash with a powerful Tyger quintet.

Paced by All-Ohio Nick Gagich, a three-year letterman, the Tygers have romped to nine victories in 11 starts thus far, bowing only to Ashland's unbeaten "Taylor-Tots," 1947 district tournament champions, and Springfield.

The A's ended a six-game Mansfield winning streak with a 41-31 conquest, while Springfield again upset the Tyger hopes Saturday night with a last-ditch 30-29 triumph that wrote another upset into the state's scholastic cage annals.

Gagich, who tallied 207 points in Mansfield's first 10 contests, needs only an eight-point average for the balance of the season to shatter the school's all-time scoring record.

Tough Proposition

Operating from a guard berth, Gagich has proven equally dangerous from all parts of the floor during the current campaign in averaging 20.7 points per game.

Height is the keynote in the Tygers' success with Burt Lindsey, 6' 3", 220-pound Negro giant at center, the bulwark on rebound work, aided in a double pivot offensive by forward Norb Shibinski, who tips the beams at 205 pounds on a 6' 2" frame. Teaming with the latter will be Paul Ferguson, the midget of the crew at 5' 7", while Shelley Swank, a 5' 11" letterman hold-over pairs with Gagich in the back court.

Against this combine, Ziemke is expected to utilize his "first-string six" composed of Dick Baron and Ralph Grubs at the forwards, Sam Sims at center, and Tex Frey, Bob Beck and Walter Weinhardt splitting the guard assignments.

The Rossmen will be seeking a repeat performance of their 1947 effort when Sims, Weinhardt, Baron and Beck teamed with Dick Porczak, lone commencement "fatality," for an upset 37-31 victory over the Tygers here. Only Gagich returns from that Mansfield starting crew.

Back home from a long and sad road trip to Mansfield Al Ziemke's Ross high basketballers returned to lengthy practice grinds today in preparation for the defense of their Buckeye League runner-up laurels.

The Little Giants, who dropped a 60-43 foul-laden decision to Mansfield Tuesday night on the Tygers' hardwood, host Fostoria's dangerous Redmen Friday with a victory virtually clinching second place in the Buckeye circuit. First place is out of the question for the entire loop ensemble—Findlay's five-time champion Trojans once again appear to be an entire circuit in themselves.

Outcome Ties Up Race

Outclassed for the final 22 minutes of play by a rangy Fostoria quintet which took advantage of numerous poor passes and a lackadaisical performance on rebounds off both baskets, Ross high's Little Giants bowed to the Redmen Friday night, 39-32, before one of the largest crowds of the local cage season.

The final period was a ding-dong affair until the final 3 1/2 minutes when the Redmen went on a six-point spree to ice the outcome.

The win deadlocked the two teams for runner-up honors in the Buckeye League race, two full games behind Findlay.

In the reserve game, the Rossmen staged a last-ditch uprising for a 25-24 verdict. Grade school teams from Atkinson and Hayes competed in an "added" attraction which proved to be much of a crowd pleaser although little attempt was made to keep score.

Sports Scribes To Fete Yank Pilot Feb. 1

NEW YORK, Jan. 24—UP—Manager Bucky Harris of the New York Yankees, who took a dispirited and disgruntled bunch of ball players and led them to a world championship, was named today by New York baseball writers to receive their annual Bill Slocum award for long and meritorious service to the sport.

The 51-year-old Yankee pilot will be presented the award at the annual dinner of the New York writers on February 1, climaxing a long managerial career which started when he won two pennants in a row as the "boy wonder" of the Washington Senators in 1924 and 1925.

Harris was selected for the award for his accomplishment in restoring to the Yankees the pre-war eminence that made them the most feared dynasty in baseball—and he had to battle almost overwhelming odds to get the job done.

The wrinkle-faced one-time coal mine employee from Pittston, Pa., didn't want to manage the Yankees, but he agreed to take over the job in 1947 when Larry McPhail was unable to find another capable pilot available.

At the start of the campaign, the players grumbled over interference with operations of the team by McPhail, who arranged for them to do all of their traveling by plane and who ordered them to make frequent banquet speeches and other public appearances.

Bucky's darkest day as Manager was on May 22 when the team was on the verge of open revolt. Four stars, Joe DiMaggio, Charley Keller, Aaron Robinson and Johnny Lindell had been fined for not posing for army photographers and two other players, both rookies, were fined for not attending a banquet.

War Vets Insert In Cage Game V

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 24—UP—A red-shirted team that takes its basketball sitting down has elevated the cage game to a new sporting high.

And these war-wise Charlieaters from the paraplegic ward at McGuire veterans hospital here are proving to the customers—and opponents—that theirs is no arm-chair outfit.

A varsity spot on the McGuire five calls for a better-than-average athlete with an educated arm and an eye for the goal. Legs don't count for a thing.

Wheelchair basketball was introduced by a navy doctor, Commander Gerald Gray, who made sure that the young athletes who failed to walk away from the war could still play the game. Birmingham general hospital at Van Nuys, Cal., started the ball rolling and the word soon got to energetic Bill Prickett at McGuire's.

Prickett is a 24-year-old ex-army P-F-C who lost the use of his legs in a glider crash at Dayton, O., during the war. He now blows the whistle and the vets roll up for instruction.

LAST-MINUTE FREE THROW DECIDES TILT

Dick Baron Outpoints
Dean Todd In Wild
Basket Spree

Their luck still as good as ever in the "close ones," Ross high's Little Giant basketballers added the scalp of Bellevue's Redmen to their belts Tuesday night—and a few more gray hairs to the head of Coach Al Ziemko—when they came up with a 59-58, last-minute victory.

Little Giants' Hopes Of Tourney 'Seed' Are Blasted

Another of those hot rivalries between Fremont Ross and Sandusky was renewed Friday night on the Blue Streaks' hardwood with Vic Malinovsky's host crew again blowing "hot" to cap an "in-and-out" season with an upset 56-48 victory over the Little Giants.

The loss was a blow to the Fremonters' hopes of gaining one of the seeded posts in the Class A district tournament at the drawings to be conducted today at the Sandusky Junior high school. Pro Ring Debut Ends In Death; Second Fatality In Seven Days

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 28.—UP—Police and boxing authorities today investigated the death of Leroy DeCatur, 20-year-old boxer who dropped dead last night during his first professional fight.

DeCatur collapsed in the last round of his four-round fight with Frederico Herrera, 20, of Yuma, Ariz. He went down so suddenly that some of the fans in Legion Stadium booed him.

DeCatur had never been knocked out in his 40 amateur bouts.

The young Negro lightweight, a track and football star at Jefferson high school, had a slight edge as his fight went into the fourth round. None of the blows exchanged had appeared exceptionally hard.

Then Herrera connected with a left hook to the body and followed with a right to the jaw.

DeCatur stood upright for about two seconds. He appeared stunned. Then he crumpled to the canvas. His head hit the ring floor hard. Ringsiders said he never moved after that.

DeCatur was carried from the ring on a stretcher and Dr. William F. Carver applied artificial respiration for 15 minutes in an attempt to revive him. The fighter's death was not announced to the near-capacity crowd.

Carver said he believed DeCatur died instantly in the ring. He said he could not give the cause of death until he had examined the body more thoroughly.

Herrera said DeCatur was winning when he died.

"I honestly thought I was losing the fight," Herrera said. "DeCatur never showed any signs of being hurt from any of my punches. When I hit him the last time I stepped back because I thought he was going to come out fighting."

DeCatur's manager, Joe Rhodes, said his fighter always was in the best of condition and was very conscientious about his training.

His death followed by a week that of Negro boxer Sam Baroudi, Akron, O., who was killed in a bout with Ezzard Charles, Cincinnati, at Chicago.
