### **Ross Aqua Giants need a brand new swimming facility**



Art Bucci may be able to walk on water this year.

No, he won't be a receiver of a heavenly edict, he will be a victim of the masses in what I fondly call the "the smallest puddle under a roof in northwest Ohio."

The Ross swim coach will have approximately 100 kids in grades 7-12 taking part in his program and to drop that many kids in the hole that barely passes as a swim pool at the Fremont Junior High School, Bucci will be able to prance across the water on bodies.

He's won't try that, though, it's just a way of saying, brother, it will be crowded in the tank at the junior high.

"The trouble is," Art said while seated in the cubby hole that passes as his office in the swimming pool locker room, "is people feel I am thinking only of the competitive part of the swim program when I say we need a new pool."

"Sure, that is part of it, but this community needs a pool; the school needs a pool. It would open up programs for the community...senior citizens, handicapped work, etc." he pleaded.

Bucci explained how he will work around the various team practices. He has swimmers in grades 9-12 divided into two groups — the Purple and the White plus the seventh and eighth grade teams.

The early season practice schedule has the eighth grade from 3:45-10 p.m. and the seventh at 4:15-5 p.m. with those times alternating. The Purple will lift weights from 6-7 a.m. and swim 5-7 p.m. The White will swim from 5:30 to 7 a.m. the days the Purple team members lift weights in the morning. The schedule reverses when the White team is in the weight room.

Bucci's normal day during swim season begins around 4:15 a.m. and ends around 9 p.m.

"I can accept that because I am the coach," he said, "but it still is too crowded in the pool."

The junior high pool is four lanes, 25 yards long. It ranges from three feet to nine feet in depth. The recommended depth for diving is 12 to 15 feet.

"We are getting letters now from school saying they will not dive here," Art disclosed, "and you cannot blame them."

Above the diving board at the Fremont facility, is a metal plate — there used to be a grease spot — where divers can spring up and touch the ceiling with their hands and if the diver is not careful, get his head reshaped.

Two years ago, a diver from a visiting school hit his head on the bottom of the pool and it required stitches to close the wound.

Bucci's swim team needs more space because it is possible that if you put two teams in the pool area, there would be no room for spectators, not to mention inadequate locker room space.

To complicate matters, Ross will have a girls team. There are more than seven girls out for the sport and Title IX, the instrument that mandated equal opportunities for girls in high school and college sports, and the Ohio High School Athletic Association say you must have a team for them. The right situation

is to have boys and girls meets combined and that would double the problem of the locker rooms.

Bucci's basic point is that a new pool, built in a combined effort of the board of education and the City of Fremont, could be used all year by the schools and the public. The school would use it during the day up until approximately 5 p.m. with the public having it after that. The public's use would be lengthened when the swim season is over and during the summer.

Art feels that renovating the Rodger Young Park pool and using it only three months of the year is not feasible. He also feels that pool is poorly located, saying that a facility at Ross High School would be ideal.

Personally, I can see the need for a pool facility both for educational purposes and naturally, competitive swimming. I don't like the fact that at present, Ross is facing the possibility of a swim schedule that will be entirely on the road.

But I also can see that it will take a great deal of cooperation between the factions and the willingness of the Fremont citizens to get a pool built. It's needed but not visible in the near future.

## Big turnout nets first girls team, flexibility

Nine years from now, maybe Art Bucci will have 88 kids on his varsity swim team at Ross High School. At least that's the number following the same growth pattern as it has in Bucci's nine years.

If that happens, he may face more stringent crowding at the junior high natatorium that serves as the watery home of Bucci's Aqua Giants. That is another story, though.

Nine years ago, Bucci had 11 swimmers on his team; this season, a total of "44 kids" he said.

"Sixteen of those are girls," Bucci said, "and that means we will have the first girls team in Ross history."

Last season, there were five girls on the Aqua Giants and because the Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) mandates that if there are at least seven girls to make a team, the girls had to swim in boys' events.

"We can run double dual meets — boys and girls alternating events — and that could make it crowded in our pool," the Ross coach pointed out. "We may get 80 swimmers in there from both school and hey, where are we going to put the parents?"

Despite that, Bucci's numbers problem is a pleasant one for him.

"Our numbers give us more flexibility than I have ever had," he said. "We can do a lot more with those numbers. Now it is possible to outguess other coaches on how we are going to swim individuals where the low numbers pretty much took that out of the strategy."

It will also allow some specialization he offered.

Bucci has six lettermen back on the boys teams and six on the girls.

Co-captains Mike Robbinette and Tracy Turner, both seniors, anchor the varsity boys team. Turner is a returning letterman while the remainder of the lettermen are juniors Jon Lagrou, Tom McDonald, Brian Mowry, Andy Scott and Bill Taylor.

The girls team will be led by veterans Kelly

Sabiers and Heather Winning.

Winning competed in the state meet last season. "Our goal for the girls is to shoot for a .500 season and like the boys, get as many as we can into the district meet," Bucci said.

Some of the promising newcomers on the girls team include ninth grader Jamie Brudzinski and sophomores Julie Schaaf and Kathy Sabiers.

"We also have some young kids, both boys and girls, who are just realizing that water is wet," Bucci laughed.

The biggest problem facing the girls team this season, Bucci said, is that most of the teams they will swim against have had teams in the past.

On the boys side, Scott and Mowry are half of the quartet of the medley relay team that finished 13th in the state meet last season.

"We have so much depth this year," Bucci said as a smile crossed his face, "it's almost like having a new pool."

McDonald, Taylor, Turner, Mowry and Scott qualified for the district meet last season and a sixth, diver Jon Lagrou qualified but did not compete because of a head injury.

The season, unofficially kicks off Saturday with the annual Purple-White intrasquad meet. The first swimmers hit the water at 1 p.m.

CASTALIA — Fremont Ross, relying on "youngsters," captured the initial swim meet of the season, splashing past Margaretta 103-63 Tuesday in the Margaretta High School natatorium.

"We left many of our veteran swimmers home," Ross Coach Art Bucci said as he described the meet as sort of a baptism of fire for the younger members of the team.

Ross freshman Steve Schaaf won the individual medley and the butterfly while classmates Paul Bietz and Todd Vogel won the 50 free and breaststroke, respectively.

"For a lot of them," Bucci said, "it was the first big meet and they had to get the jitters out."

The Aqua Giants won nine of the 11 events, losing the 100 free and the freestyle relay.

Ross veteran Bill Taylor won the 200 and 500 freestyle events while another returning letterman, Tom McDonald, took the backstroke.

Ross sophomore Ryan Nuhfer surprised teammate Jon Lagrou by winning the diving event. Lagrou, a returning letterman, was second.

The other Aqua Giants first was turned in by the medley relay team of McDonald, Vogel, Schaff and Mike Robinette.

Ross will host the Wauseon boys and girls team at 5 p.m., Tuesday, Dec. 4, in its next meet at the Fremont Junior High School natatorium.

## Ross girls win, boys lose by same score

It was a night of "ifs" for the Ross High School boys swim team but for the girls, it was a night of records.

The Ross girls swim team, the first in the school's history, debuted with a 39-37 victory over Wauseon but the boys were nosed out by the Indians by the same score.

The meets at the Fremont Junior High School national standards — diving was out — because of the refusal of Wauseon to permit its divers to compete. The Indians are the first of several schools expected not to dive at the Fremont facility because of the low ceiling and the shallowness of the pool.

Dan Lease, referee for the meet, said that he could have ordered competition in the diving.

"According to the rule book," Lease explained, "if it is not agreed to in writing before the meet, the swim program cannot be altered. If I had wanted to and the Ohio High School Athletic Association will probably tell me that I was wrong not to do it, I could have ordered them to dive."

"I would have done that," Lease continued, "I felt that it's a gentlemen's sport and I would go along with what the coaches agreed upon but technically and legally, I could have ordered the event to be held."

There was no written agreement Lease pointed out, saying that it was verbal between

Bucci and Wauseon Coach Jay Magee.

"If we had done it, the boys would have won," Ross Coach Art Bucci said, as he disclosed the primary "if" in the Aqua Giants boys loss. "I figure we would have one-two'd 'em (first and second). That would have been the six points."

The Ross diving duo of Jon Lagrou and Mike Nighswander did dive but it was strictly for show.

A couple other "ifs" that sunk Ross came in close finishes. Brian Mowry was edged by .42 seconds in the individual medley and Andy Scott was touched out in the 50 free by three-tenths of a second.

While the boys record slipped to 1-1, members of Bucci's girls team can claim a winner and the highest placer in other events established either pool or school records because it was the first all-girl meet in the antiquated facility.

"Now they can tell their kids in future years, 'Bucci laughed, "that they were record holders for the year."

The girls will be competing again in the Fremont pool until after the first of the year.

Sophomore Julie Schaaf won the 50 and 100

freestyle events and swam a leg of the winning medley relay to pace Ross. She won the 50 in 26.5 seconds and the 100 in 59.88.

Heather Winning captured the butterfly in

1:08.65 and Kelly Sabers was first in the backstroke in 1:13.4. Members of the medley relay included Winning, Schaaf, Sabers and Julie Smith, winning the event in 2:08.9.

"The girls won with depth," Bucci pointed out. "Wauseon had only one swimmer in some events."

The Ross coach, while pleased with the girls opening win, was logical. "Hey...it was a great win — they are 1-0 — if we quit right now, it would be a helluva record."

"There will be a 'what if' though, down the road, that will hand us our lumps."

Joy Neuenschwander led the Wauseon girls, winning the 200 and 500 freestyle events. The former in 2:07.0 and the latter in a quick 5:33.71. In the boys meet, Ross stroked to a 1-2 finish in the medley relay. The quartet of Tom McDonald, Todd Vogel, Steve Schaaf and Paul Bietz recorded a 1:54.2 to finish 14 seconds ahead of another Ross squad. The Aqua Giants, however, were to win only two other events including a 1-2 finish in the breaststroke.

McDonald took the backstroke in 1:02.81 and Mowry won the breaststroke in 1:11.53.

The meet was deadlocked at 33-33 heading into the final relay.

"I swam a few kids out of their normal strokes," Bucci admitted. "I moved them around to see what they could do."

Ross will be competing Friday and Saturday in the Bowling Green State University Invitational Relays.

# Ross girls fourth at BG swim meet

BOWLING GREEN — Fremont Ross set two girls meet records while finishing fourth in the Bee Gee High School Relays at Cooper Pool on the Bowling Green State University campus.

The Lady Aqua Giants scored 90 points to finish behind winner Sylvania Northview's 168, Findlay and Mansfield Malabar tied for second with 154. Fifth went to Sandusky with 88 while St. Ursula was sixth with 78.

In the boys portion of the relays, Ross came in eighth in the nine-team field. Perennial power

Toledo St. Francis won with 220 points while Brother Rice of Detroit was second with 132. Third went to Malabar with 114, fourth was Sylvania Northview with 112 with Findlay and Sandusky tying for fifth at 105.

Rounding out the field were Sylvania Southview with 86, Ross with 78 and Ayersville at 38.

"There are just too many good swims for our kids to name them all," Ross Coach Art Bucci said, "but the meet was great for us because most of our kids got to swim."

The Ross Lady Aqua Giants set meet records in the 200- and 300-yard backstroke relays. Kelly Sabiers, Julie Schaaf, Julie Randolph and Heather Winning were on the 200 team, finishing in 2:09.14, nearly seven seconds quicker than the old mark of 2:16.0 held by Sylvania Northview.

In the 300 back, Sabiers, Schaaf and Winning made up the team that chipped more than 10 seconds off the old mark of 3:42.5 set by a Malabar team. The Lady Aqua Giants trio clicked off the distance in 3:32.12.

The Ross boys had three fourth place finishes. The team of Andy Scott, Bill Taylor, Tracy Turner and Brian Mowery was fourth in the 200 free relay in 1:36.5 while the quartet of Scott, Steve Schaaf, Todd Vogel and Mowry was fourth in the 400 IM in 4:22.93.

The final fourth place finish was in the 400 free relay with the team of Mowry, Taylor, Turner and Scott finishing in 3:40.39.

# Ross swimmers sweep PC foes

PORt CLINTON — Art Bucci received an early Christmas present Tuesday as both his Ross boys and girls high school swim teams picked up victories.

The boys splashed past Port Clinton 97-74 and the girls withstood a 1-2 Port Clinton finish in the final event of the meet for an 86-80 win. The Ross boys team is now 2-2 while the Lady Giants are 2-1.

Port Clinton was six of the 11 boys events but Ross's depth, paced by a 1-2-3 finish in the diving event, was the Redskins' undoing.

Sophomore diver Ryan Nuhfer piled up 165.55 points to give Ross the diving win. Mike Nighswander came in second with 152.40 but that point total qualified him for the Northwest Ohio District Meet. Ty Weikert's 132.60 total, a season high, took third for the Little Giants.

Andy Scott got Ross's initial first with a 2:01.06 clocking in the 200 freestyle. Brian Mowry took the 200 individual medley in 2:20.41 as Ross finish 1-2 in the event. Freshman Steve Schaaf was second, just .05 points behind Mowry.

In the 100 backstroke, Tom McDonald was a winner by four seconds with time of 1:03.37.

## 2 changes made in Ross schedule

Two home meets have been switched to away meets on the Ross High School swim schedule this season.
