Pelfrey makes no bones about it. Behind home is where the heart is.

"I told everybody, 'Guys, this is the first time I've been relaxed in this game.' From the time we got on the bus until now, I just had this weird feeling," Pelfrey said about the pitching change.

Whatever that feeling was, Pelfrey might want to bottle it. In 4 2/3 innings, she struck out eight and allowed only three hits in lifting her record to 3-1. She recorded six of her first seven outs on K's.

"She got the job done. She got us five innings and that took time off of Kooz's arm," Ross coach Cheryl Schell said. "When she settled down, she did fine."

Pelfrey had made just two starts prior to Wednesday.

"I don't know what the feeling was, I was tense," she said. "From the time we got out of school I was tense. I don't know, my mentality wasn't there, I guess. It was just a weird feeling. ... I get myself psyched out sometimes."


Pelfrey added a 2-for-4, two-RBI performance at the plate, including a run-scoring double in the sixth inning that accounted for Ross's final run.
