Smith, Miller, Liggins, Nighswander, Schneider, Farrar, Fegley, Cote, Gladieux Countians Advance To Mansfield Regional

Little Giants Place Third

SANDUSKY — Fremont Ross will be represented by a sophomore and four juniors when the action begins at the regional AA track meet at Mansfield Malabar high school Saturday.

Sophomore Tom Liggins will be joined by Chuck Miller, Earl Smith, Bruce Schneider and Tom Nighswander.

Woodmore's Dave Fegley will be competing in the shot put. Smith has a ticket for the 880-yard run. Schneider qualified in the pole vault and Nighswander is entered in the discus.

Ross finished third in the 14-team field at the district. Sandusky, as expected, took first with 146 points. Ross was 10 points behind the Toomans, who beat them earlier in the week at a regional meet.

"The meet went just about as we expected," Little Giant coach Ron Brant said. "We knew Sandusky was going to take the team title. Then it was going to be a battle between us and Columbia for the second spot."

"On the bus going to Sandusky Coach Steve Front and I tried to figure out how many points we would score. We thought it would be 49-49," Brant said.

"We didn't score all the points where we figured we would. But our kids gave a real good effort. I wasn't disappointed."

Smith, who ran the 880 for the fifth time, set a district record in winning the event. He was clocked in 2:00.6. The old mark was 2:01.5 set by Barney Liesley of Sandusky in 1965.

"Front and I were disappointed," but the district record is still as good as the school record which Karl set at the Buckeye Conference meet last week.

"Don't get me wrong. That's probably the best time he could have had Saturday considering the conditions. The wind was gusting between 10 and 20 miles an hour."

"There wasn't much doubt about the outcome," Earl led the entire race. He was certainly the fastest runner in the event. The other kids just couldn't keep up with him. Earl was in a class all by himself."

"Earl stands a good chance of going to the state meet. He seems to be relaxing more when he runs the 880."

Miller and Liggins finished second and third. The shot put was by Sandusky's Jim Kennedy. His winning put was 31-7. Miller's second place put was 49-5. Liggins' best put was 48-7. Liggins also finished sixth in the 100-yard dash.

Both boys had one of their top efforts of the year," Brant said. "Miller's second place put was the best of his career. Tom has been around 48 all year. He has been pretty consistent."

"Credit for the performance of the weight must go to coach (Gary) Ricker. He's the one who works with these boys all the time."

Nighswander finished third in the discus with a throw of 141-8. Two Sandusky cindermen—Mark Deming and Bob Rogers—took the top two spots. Denning won the event. The winning throw was 159-3.

Michaels provided the biggest surprise. He had been the Little Giants' third best high jumper.

"We weren't even planning to enter him," Brant said, "but Wednesday he started working on the 'Fosbury Flop.' He was doing so well in practice that we changed our entry and he beat out Rich Sheely for the bar. He didn't even compete in very many dual meets for us this year. When he did he rarely placed. Kim's performance was our most pleasant surprise of the meet."

Front meet records were broken. Joining Smith were Crabb (pole vault), Jeff Tanchen, Sandusky (mile run), Rich Brown, Sandusky (two mile run) and the Sandusky mile relay team.

Other winners included Alex Angney, Vermilion, high jump; Bob Hunt, Tiffin Columbian, 120-yard high hurdles; Elmer Lippert, Sandusky, 100 and 220 yard dashes; Alex Turkey, Port Clinton, 440-yard dash; Dave Fegley, Woodmore, 180-yard low hurdles, and Mike Churchwell, Sandusky, long jump.


Sandusky's 880 yard relay team won that event, also.

Fegley, Farrar Qualify For Two Events

SANDUSKY — Woodmore's Dave Fegley and Clyde Rich will be trying to qualify in two events for the state track meet when they journey to Mansfield Malabar and the AA regional meet Saturday.

Other Sandusky Countians who qualify for the regional are Fegley's teammate, Dave Cote and John Gladieux of Lakota.

All four earned regional berths while competing in the district meet at Sandusky's Strobel Field last Saturday. Fegley was the only one of the four who qualified with a victory. The others finished either second or third in their events.

Fegley, who competed in the Class A state meet at Columbus in 1969, is entered in the high and low hurdles. He won the low hurdles Saturday, but lost to Columbian's Bob Hunt in the highs by a tenth of a second.

It was only the second time Fegley has been beaten in this event this year. The first time was in a dual meet against Fremont earlier this year. He placed third to Ron and Greg Weber.

At the Blade Relays last month, Fegley edged Hunt in the finals.

Farrar placed second to Fegley in the low hurdles and was behind Sandusky's Bob Crabb in the pole vault. Farrar was clocked in 21.1, four-tenths of a second behind Fegley. It was two-tenths better than Hunt, who finished third.

In the pole vault, Farrar checked in with a 13.4. Crabb, considered one of the top vaulters in the state, won the event with 14.5.

Cote qualified for regional competition with a third place finish in the high hurdles. He was clocked in 15.9 eight seconds behind Fegley.

Gladieux finished second to Fremont Ross' Earl Smith in the 880 yard run. Gladieux, who is the Sandusky Bay Conference champion, was timed in 2:02.6. Smith's winning time was 2:06.6.

Front will be represented in four events at the regional. Alex Tucker qualified in the long jump and 440 yard dash. He's also a member of the mile relay team.

Tucker won the 440-yard dash with a :51.2 time. Bellevue's Harry Lee was second. In the long jump Tucker finished second behind record-breaking Mike Churchwell of Sandusky. The Redskins' Arnold Priddy placed second in the mile run.

Lee and Mark Hammersmith were the only individual qualifiers for Bellevue. Hammersmith placed second in the high jump.

But both Bellevue relay teams—the 880 and mile—qualified for further competition. In both events, the Bellevue entry was second to Sandusky.

Genoa's mile relay team will be in the regional, too. The Comets finished third behind Sandusky and Bellevue.

Other area competitors placed at the district competition but didn't earn a berth at the state meet.

Woodmore's Steve Front finished fourth. It missed a trip to Mansfield by only two points. The Wildcats' Tony Hernandez was fifth in the mile run.

Don Myers of Margaretta placed fourth in the 440 yard dash. The relay team of the Polar Bears finished fifth.

Bellevue's Jim Burrows in the 220-yard dash.

Lakota place winners included Jim Deer, who finished sixth in the 100 and Jeff Gabel, a sixth place finisher in the 440 yard dash.

Oak Harbor's Tony Gaines was sixth in the 880 yard run. Genoa had two fifth place finishers—Bruce Goldine (100-yard dash) and Don Drummond (shot put).

Bellevue finished fourth in the team race with 35 points. Port Clinton (32) and Woodmore (30) finished fifth and sixth, respectively. Genoa and Lakota each had 10 points. Margaretta finished with four and Oak Harbor had one—M.C.
