

Ross, Clyde, Genoa defeat baseball foes

The Ross Little Giants broke a 1-1 tie with three runs in the third inning and then cruised to an 8-1 opening-day baseball victory over Maumee at Anderson Field Thursday.

Jay Bowers and John Rios led the 10-hit offensive attack for Ross while Tom Pena and Doug Gallagher did the honors from the mound.

Bowers and Rios each had three hits. Bowers also knocked in two runs.

Pena started and went five innings to gain the win. He struck out six batters and walked one while giving up five hits and one unearned run.

Gallagher followed with two innings of two-hit, shutout ball. He struck out four and walked none.

"Being the first game, I thought we did really well defensively," Coach Chuck Lindsey said of his teams' one-error performance. "And I was surprised with our hitting. I thought we would have more trouble with that because we haven't been able to get outside much."

Ross blanks Harding; Streaks beaten 15-2

Ross won the way Coach Chuck Lindsey thought it would Monday afternoon in the first Buckeye Conference baseball test for the Little Giants.

The Little Giants used two of their three hits in the second inning to push across a run and then rode defense and the four-hit pitching of Brian Humbarger to a 1-0 win over Marion Harding.

"It was our pitching and defense," Lindsey said after guiding his team to its second win against a tie in three games this spring. "That's just like I said it was going to be this year — pitching and defense — and that is what won it."

In other area games, St. Joe was bounced by Sandusky St. Mary's 15-2, Tiffin Calvert edged Clyde 3-1, Lakota blanked Otsego 7-0, Eastwood rolled over Gibsonburg 14-6, Old Fort squeezed past Seneca East 7-6 and Woodward defeated Genoa in a slugfest 15-9.

Jay Bowers doubled and stole third to set up Ross's run in the second. Jim Burkett followed with a single to give Humbarger the run he needed.

The right-hander fanned nine and did not walk a batter.

Ross loaded the bases in the sixth with two out but did not score.

ST. MARY'S 15, ST. JOE 2
