Loop Title Next Goal For Ross Swimmers

Fremont Ross has an excellent chance to become the first Buckeye Conference swimming champion Saturday at 2 p.m. in Sandusky when the conference's initial swim meet will be held.

Only four of the eight Buckeye schools have swimming teams, and Fremont owns victories over the three other participating teams. Ross knocked off Sandusky, 58-37, beat Mansfield Senior, 59-36, and twice defeated Findlay, 54-41 and 53-42.

Diving preliminaries will be held at 11 a.m. and the finals during its regular place in the meet.

Medals will be given to boys placing first, second or third and a team trophy will be awarded.

Fremont Mentor Bill Faunce said Wednesday that he has not decided upon a line-up and he may not know who will go where until meet time.

However, these Little Giants will make the trip: Jack Kramer, Bob George, Jim Brehm, Bob Lozano, John Tuckerman, Jim Foreman, Larry Sloan, Bob Hite, Bill Roth, Brad Christy, Ron Roberts, Bob Lloyd, Charles Fangboner, Greg Arndt, Norm Demmel, Ken Hilty and Manager Jim Lankford.

Sandusky looks strong in the medley relay (1:51.1) and 100-yard butterfly (1:02.2). Mansfield has power in the 100-yard backstroke (1:03.4) and 100-yard breast stroke (1:11.1). Findlay should show well in the 200-yard individual medley (2:22.9), 50-yard free style (23.7) and 100-yard free (53.2).

Fremont's best shot, believes Faunce, will be the 200-yard free and 400 - yard free style with Sloan carrying the Ross colors. He has done 2:01.3 and 4:38.6,

respectively in those events. Foreman appears the lad to beat in the butterfly (1:00.3) and 200-yard IM (2:21.5). Ross' divers, Bob Lozano and John Tuckerman, have taken nothing less than a first or second place in any meet this season.

Ross Times Among Team's Best:

Fremont Grabs First Buckeye Swim Title

Fremont Ross swimming team won the first annual Buckeye Conference tank meet Saturday in Sandusky, out-pointing the host Blue Streaks, Mansfield Senior and Findlay. Fremont's winning point total was 84.

Sandusky had 54½, Findlay had 41 and Mansfield trailed with 23½.

Of the 11 events held, Ross' Little Giants won eight firsts and three seconds.

Fremont, which next goes after a repeat championship in the district meet in Bowling Green Friday, February 28, failed to win the diving, 50-yard free style and 100-yard free style.

Mike Holmes of Sandusky won the driving with 253.40 points. Bob Lozano of Ross was second with Lloyd placed second in the 100-

Joe Diver of Findlay captured both the 50 and 100-yard free style events in the times of 23.1 and 52.7, respectively. Ron Roberts of the Little Giants took second in the 50-yard free with a time of 24.8 and Ross' Bob Lloyd placed second in the 100-yard free with a time of 53.9.

Fremont's times were among the best turned in by the Giant tankers all season.

AL Meets Friday On Finley Situation

BOSTON (AP)—The American League lost the World Series, the All-Star Game and attendance last season. Now comes a Feb. 21 summit meeting when fellow owners decide whether to lose Charles O. Finley.

Time twice has run out on deadlines for Athletics' owner Finley to sign a lease with Kansas City officials.

So far, there's no agreement reached or action taken. Midnight Saturday passed and Finley's adamant two - years - or nothing lease stand appeared to stymie the AL as effectively as Sandy Koufax had the pennant-winning Yankees.

President Joe Cronin took the first step Sunday by announcing the Friday meeting to which Kansas City officials are invited.

Cronin hints the owners may be ready to carry out their threat to oust Finley, made at the last owners' meeting Jan. 16 when Finley's request to move the franchise to Louisville was killed 9-1.

Finley reaffirmed Sunday night he would be at the controls when Kansas City opens the season.

Since the previous owners' meeting, Finley has threatened a law suit if the league attempts

for sale, it's not on sale today, nor will it be tomorrow. I would not sell the ball club for \$10 million. I'll be in Boston for the meeting Friday."

Finley's reference to not selling concerned an alleged offer to sell for \$7 million, which he called a "manufactured lie."

Finley remains firm on the two-year lease. Kansas City officials had insisted on four years or more until an 11th hour, three-year compromise was suggested by city councilman John Maguire Saturday.

That proposal died amidst questions of delegates authority, sincerity and aptness of thought.
