FREMONT HIGH WINS DUAL MEET FROM BELLEVUE

Fremont high school won a dual track meet from Bellevue on the fair grounds Saturday afternoon, but it wasn't a walkaway in one sense of the word as the final count was 58 to 45, but it showed that F. H. S. has the makings of a fair track outfit that should give a good account of itself during the big L. B. S. affair in Oberlin.

Harold Wendler of course, was Fremont's chief point getter, and Nuby, famous color star, was the hero for Bellevue.

F. Peters of Fremont, picked off the shotput with 35 feet and 11 inches to his credit, and Starr of the visitors, was second; McCarthy, Fremont third. In the century dash, Nuby waltzed in a winner with the mark of 11 seconds for the event. Aigler of Bellevue, was second, and Hank Stahl of Fremont, came in third.

"Casey" ones of Fremont, won the 440 yard dash, with McCarthy second. The time for the winner was 55 seconds. Wendler and Brokate tied for first place in the pole vault, each making 9 feet. Starr of Bellevue, won the discus toss, doing 100 feet and 11 inches, while McCarthy of Fremont, was 10 feet behind.

Clark of Bellevue, won the half mile event in 2:18. Aigler, Bellevue, was second, and Hunsinger, Fremont, third. Wendler slipped on his wings and floated in an easy winner in the broad jump. He did 19 feet, 4 inches. Nuby of the visitors, was second, and Kreilick was third.

Jones won the 220 dash in 24:01, closely pursued by Nuby and Hank Stahl. Kreilick of Fremont, won fame when he took the stick in the high jump at 5 feet, 9 inches, which is going some for a high school boy. This mark is said to better the L. B. record by two inches.

Clark of Bellevue won the mile run in 5:22. "Mike" Dunigan of Fremont,

was second, and Nuby third. Al Brokate tossed the javelin 118 feet, 2 inches and was an easy winner. Fremont won the mile relay event that closed the meet.

The afternoon was, with the exception of a chill wind, ideal for the sport and a fair sized crowd turned out for the doings.

Coach Vannorsdal has a pretty fair gang of trackers and some of the 1922 crop will make the best of them step down at Oberlin.

Fremont high took another step toward perfection in the track and field athletic line Saturday afternoon when it mopped up the Norwalk high delegation by the count of 68 to 36. The meet was held on the county fair grounds and in doing this stunt the Fremonters overcame a piece of opposition that was supposed to have some class. Jones, newcomer in Fremont high's stardom annals, again proved himself to be the brilliant factor in the meet. He picked off three firsts in three dash events and stepped close to record time in all of them.

The Fremont team shows much evidence of being a well balanced organization and will go into the Sandusky affair next Saturday with much confidence and the scaps of Bellevue and Norwalk hanging to their belts.

FREMONT HIGH FINISHED THIRD IN BIG MEETING

Fremont, Sandusky and Lorain high school track and field aggregations engaged in a three cornered session in the Erie county seat of learning Saturday afternoon and, Sandusky being on its own territory, won the fracas by the count of 88 points while Lorain was gathering 80½ points and Fremont was busy counting up 34½.

The one principal reason that Fremont lost is due to the fact that Sandusky and Lorain had flocks and herds of athletes who were out there garnering up the drippings from the platter after the main events had been served. These little thirds, fourths and fifths always have a great bit to do with final results in a track meet, and the winning contender usually has a small army of athletes mingling in all the doings.

Sandusky took 8 of the first place positions out of the 14 chances during the afternoon. Lorain took four first pew stations, while Fremont picked off two.

H. Krebs of Sandusky, was high man in the festivities, having taken down 19½ points for his share of the spoils of the entertainment.

Fremont showed her speed in the high jump when Krelick stepped out and won the event with a mark of 5 feet, 8 inches, which was easy for him. Wendler won the broad jump with the nifty mark of 19 feet, 1½ inches. Brokate got second in the pole vault and Wendler third.

Jones of Fremont, got a fifth in the 100, second in the 440, and Stahl of Fremont, fourth in the 220 hash. Tim McCarthy of Fremont, got a fourth in the discus toss and Brokate tied for fourth position in the high jump.
