Five lettermen form the nucleus for the new Little Giant squad. They are Clarence Klinck, George McCord, Del Hetrick, Steve Brudzinski and Glenn Bliss.

Besides these, there are several other outstanding candidates for the team, including Fox, Campbell, Rice, Driftmyer, Carter, Deemer, Berlecamp, Auxter and Beeker.

The first night practice consisted entirely of limbering up exercises and a lengthy drill on shooting baskets. Hard work will come

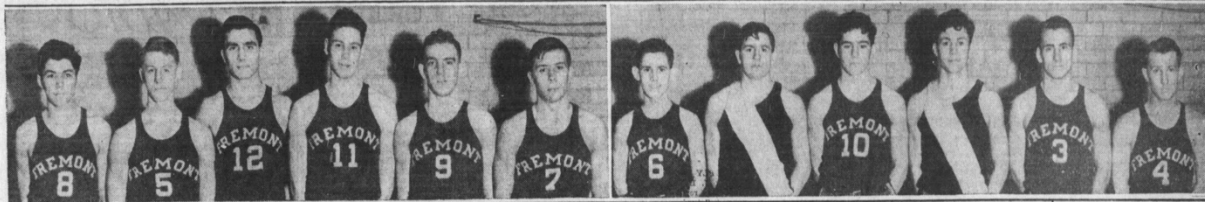
about Wednesday, Coach Oldfather said.

In the meantime, Coach Bernarde Hoffman had his Crimson Streaks of St. Joe at work in Educational Hall, getting ready for the season's opener Friday night here with Gibsonburg.

Gibsonburg for several years has whipped together a good basketball team, and Coach Al Welter hopes for another formidable team this winter. It will be the first game for the Streaks.

St. Joe has four men back from last year's team which defeated Fremont Ross twice and which lost only two games all winter. They are Hank Miesle, Carl Fischer, Paul Mosser and Don Chudzinski. The battle for the other position is wide open.

Ray Peterson, a junior, has been doing well at the tip-off post, while two sophomores, Henry Deetz and Robert Muenzer, can handle the guard positions with the best of them. Richard Brandes, a junior and guard, is another player Coach Hoffman and his boys will have to watch.

Elyria took an unexpected reversal in its opener with Ashland last week, but the following night gave real evidence of its power by trimming Cleveland John Hay. The Eels were decidedly off color in the Ashland encounter, scouts who saw the game declare.

Coach Oldfather is devoting a lot of time this winter to getting his team in good physical condition. "We want to play four quarters of hard, driving basketball, and we want five boys who can finish the game at the same pace they started," Coach Oldfather warned his team this week.

In the game last year at Elyria, the Little Giants went down in defeat, and this time hope to avenge the upset.

Coach Bob Oldfather picked Friday the thirteenth for his Ross High Little Giants to make their debut for the 1935-36 basketball season, and it remained for Elyria's Eels to make the day either lucky or unlucky for the purple clad warriors.

Anyhow, the Little Giants and the Eels will clash at Ross gymnasium Friday night at 8 p. m. in the inauguration of the Ross basketball season, and Coach Oldfather is banking on four veterans to usher the schedule in with a victory.

Two veteran guards in Glenn Bliss and Del Hetrick will be in the starting lineup, and George

McCord, veteran tipoff man, will begin at center. Clarence Klinck gets one of the forward positions, and the other will go to one of three newcomers to the team—either Fred Rice, Pete Fox or Biz Driftmyer.

Elyria brings to town a team of veterans, which has already played two games, losing the opener to Ashland and defeating Cleveland John Hay the next night.

Coach Roy Clymer has Gerber and Novak at forwards, Scott at center and Myer and Cross at guards. Scott is the high scorer of the quintet, and the man on whom the Little Giants will center their defense.

The game will be preceded by a preliminary at 7 p. m. between two Ross high reserve teams. The Eels are not bringing their seconds along. Rube Bechtel and Gus Skibbe will blow the whistles.

LITTLE GIANTS DROP 29 TO 23 DESPITE RALLY

Eels' Lead in First Half Carries Them to Vic- tory Friday

A luckless "Friday the thirteenth" first half in which they were able to score only two field goals in 29 attempts at the basket brought a 29 to 23 defeat to Fremont Ross high's Little Giants in the opening game of the season against Elyria.

The Little Giants played their bigger and more experienced foes to a standstill in the last two quarters, matching point for point, but their inability to count early in the contest was fatal.

Rally Futile

It was a sensational rally which Coach Oldfather's boys staged in the third quarter. Trailing 11 to 5 when the period opened, the Ross quintet turned on the power and in less than five minutes had not only tied the score at 12-12, but had pulled ahead by two points.

The closing two periods of the game were typical of the kind of contest the Little Giants waged on the football team last fall. Slow starters, the Ross athletes never hit their stride in the early periods of the game.

Only George McCord and Clarence Klinck were able to register field goals in the first half, and both of these came just before the second quarter ended. The Little Giants peppered the basket with shots in the first five minutes but just couldn't force the ball through the nets.

Scott Scores

In the meantime, Elyria was making the most of the scoring prowess of their lanky center, Joe Scott. An accurate shot, Scott scored three times from the field in the first half, while Meyer and Cross, two fine guards, were getting the other two baskets.

Del Hetrick started scoring in the third period for the Little Giants when he dropped in a foul at the expense of Pfaff. And then the Oldfatherites broke loose. McCord scored two points on a fine dribble in, and after Meyer dropped through a foul for the Eels, Klinck and Bliss tied the game at an even dozen apiece with a pair of short shots. Hetrick then hooked through his favorite shot and the Little Giants were in the lead, 14 to 12.

McCord Out

At this stage in the game, however, McCord was caught for his fourth personal foul, and when he left the net, the Elyrians started to register again, and on a pair of fielders by Mike pulled to a 16 to 14 advantage as the third period closed.

Mike added two more field goals at the start of the final quarter, and put his team in a lead that proved the winning margin. Scott also managed to break away for two more fielders in the last quarter, while the Fremont points were added on fielders by Bliss and Wolfe.

It was Mike, the Elyria right forward, who really turned the tide of battle for the Eels. Held decisively in check during the first two quarters and for the first five minutes of the third period, Mike came through for four field goals just when Coach Roy Clymer's quintet needed points most.

Both Off Form

Both teams were badly off color from the foul line. The Little Giants counted only five points out of 15 charity tosses, while Elyria scored five points in 16 attempts from the free line.

The play of the Little Giants was gratifying to the near capacity crowd which turned out for the season's inaugural. It was marked with a flashy passing attack and a determination to win that has been missing on Ross teams the past two years. All ten of the players on the Fremont squad got into the game, and all played well. They should be a formidable team before the season is much older.

New Unies

The Little Giants appeared in flashy new blue and white uniforms, with white predominating on the home floor. A new striped stocking, blue and white, added to the natty appearance.

LITTLE GIANTS SCORE TRIUMPH IN THIRD PERIOD

Pete Fox Leads Scoring
as Oldfather's Five
Takes Victory

Flashing a brilliant passing attack, Fremont Ross high school defeated the Tiffin Junior Order Home quintet Friday night at Tiffin, 23 to 15, to annex its first game of the season.

With Pete Fox showing the way with five field goals and a foul the Little Giants ran up ten field goals and eight fouls to capture the tilt. The Juniors threatened only in the second period when they moved to within two points of Coach Oldfather's team, and in the early part of the third quarter when the score was tied, 14-14.

The Ross cagers led 11 to 9 at the half, but in the third quarter due mostly to three field goals and a foul by Fox, the Little Giants



took a 21 to 14 lead, which they held for the rest of the game.

Coach Oldfather's team featured a well-directed passing attack and a fast breaking offense, and showed decided improvement at dropping the ball through the loop.

Junior Order attack was built on a "squirrel cage" offense, which worked none to effectively after the Little Giants had solved the maneuvers of Coach Rabbit Starrett's team. The Juniors were led offensively by Lester, a long shooting guard, who tallied four field goals and led his mates with eight points. Lester kept the Juniors in the game in the first half with three long two pointers. In fact, the Juniors were able to score only four field goals the first two periods.

Open Effectively
The Little Giants opened the game a little more effectively than in the Elvira fracas a week ago. They scored three field goals by McCord, Hetrick and Fox, and a foul by Klinck and were ahead 7 to 3 at the end of the first quarter. The Junior Order basketballers had managed only three points during this same time, on a fielder by Lester and a foul by Coble.

The Ross quintet bogged down somewhat in the second quarter and with Lester leading the way with two long shots, the Starrett coached team pulled up to a 11 to 9 count at the half.

The third quarter was all Fremont. Fox opened the last half with a foul goal, and then went under the basket for a field to give the Little Giants a 14 to 9 lead. But the Juniors tied the score at this point on a field goal by Lester, another two pointer by Quick and a foul by Moser.

The Little Giants took time out to talk over the situation, then rapidly pulled into a lead they never relinquished. Hetrick, Fox and Klinck each scored field goals before the quarter ended and were ahead 21 to 14 at the start of the last period.

Full To Lead
Fox added another fielder and McCord a foul to make the score 24 to 14 before the Juniors managed to get any more points. Then Moser caged a field goal and Oren duplicated his effort to cut the Little Giant's lead to 24 to 18. Fox came back for a field goal, however, and Hetrick and Elias added fouls before the game ended, while the best Coach Starrett's team could do was a foul by Oren.

Coach Oldfather sent his entire squad into action in the game, but the five starters carried the brunt of the Fremont attack. The replacements saw only about a minute and a half of service.

The Little Giants will be idle now until next Friday night, when they entertain Coach Purlett's hopefuls from Tiffin Columbian. It will be Fremont's first Buckeye conference game. Columbian lost its initial start in the league Friday night by falling to Findlay's Trojans, 38 to 12.

LITTLE GIANTS SET FAST PACE IN LEAGUE WIN

Fremonters Become Factors in Buckeye Loop by Decisive Victory

Fremont Rose high school's Little Giants branded themselves as very definite contenders for the Buckeye conference basketball title by winning their opening league encounter from Tiffin Columbian, 41 to 25, Friday night at Rose gymnasium.

Utilizing a fast breaking offense, the Rose cagers registered 25 field goals through a week. Columbian quieted. It was the most decisive defeat the Little Giants have handed any team in recent years.

Led by Clarence Klinck, who totaled 15 points to capture high scoring honors, the Little Giant team set a fast pace throughout and were scoring just as heavily and traveling just as fast as the final gun as on the opening play.

Every one of the ten Rose players scored at least one field during the 25 minutes of play. In addition, the Fremonters showed decided improvement from the foul line, scoring 11 charity tosses out of 17 attempts.

Flashy Passing

Virtually all of the Fremont baskets were scored after the ball had been taken under the loop with a flashy passing attack and some smooth floor work. Time after time, the Little Giant offensive players were in the clear for shots, having created the Columbian guards completely.

When the Little Giants had to drop back to defensive play, which wasn't often, they offered a man for man style that Columbian was unable to penetrate. Most of Tiffin's seven fielders were scored from beyond the foul line.

On numerous occasions, the Little Giants, by alert defensive play, intercepted Columbian passes and converted them into scores. Once, while the reserves were in the game, Rice grabbed a Tiffin pass under his own basket and rolled it in for two points.

The Little Giants were impressive in their victory. It is a matter for speculation as to what the score might have been had the regulars played the entire frame.

Indicates Power

The score by which the Little Giants defeated Columbian indicates Coach Bob Oldfather's quietest will be hard to get along with during the Buckeye league play. Their victory was more decisive than that which Findlay registered over Tiffin last week.

The 1925-26 edition of the blue and gold from Columbian was the weakest that Coach George Burkhett has ever brought out of the Seneca county seat. The Columbian players are handicapped by lack of size and do not handle the ball with the precision of other Burkhett-coached squads.

The Oldfatherites opened with a basket by Klinck right after the opening tipoff, when he looped one in from near the foul line. Gauckler, Tiffin forward, scored from underneath the basket to tie the count, then Fox dropped in a foul to give the Rose cagers a lead they never relinquished. McCord, Billas and Klinck added fielders and Hetrick a foul before the quarter ended to give Rose a 15 to 2 advantage at the close of the period.

Hit Fast Pace

The second quarter found the Little Giants at their best, and they added 22 points to their score while holding Columbian to four points on a basket by Libby and fouls by Gauckler and Libby.

During that whirlwind period, Fox scored three fielders, Klinck scored two fielders and three fouls, McCord two goals, and Hetrick two fielders and a foul. Columbian was completely baffled by the fast breaking Little Giants and offered very little resistance. Seven times, the Rose players took the tipoff directly for field goals.

Coach Oldfather sent in his replacement troops at the start of the third period, and they stayed in until just a minute and 35 seconds before the end of the game. The replacements, paced by Big Driftway who scored three fielders and a foul, outplayed Columbian almost as completely as the regulars.

Scoring Frequent

Rice, Driftway, Campbell, Brudzinski and Wolfe all scored during the third period and when the quarter was ended the score had mounted to 48 to 14.

The reserves kept up their attack until the regulars finally came back into the fracas. When the replacements left the game, the score read 55 to 20.

After the starting players returned, three field goals were added in rapid succession, two by Klinck and one by Hetrick, to run the score just above the 60 mark.

The hapless Tiffin Junior Home basketball team, buffeted around severely by its foes this season, took another on the chin Friday night, but is looking at its game Saturday night with St. Joe high school with murder in its eye.

The Juniors Friday night dropped a 25 to 16 decision to Bucyrus at the Crawford county Redmen outclassed the Juniors on the Bucyrus court. Although Junior Home has not been able to elicit this season, players say they are ready to score an upset victory on their home floor against the Fremont parochial five. LITTLE GIANTS CAPTURE FIRST OF CITY SERIES

McCord, Klinck, Mosser
Leading Scorers in Hol-
iday Fracas

A strong foothold on the city's mythical scholastic basketball championship was gained by the Ross high school eagles Wednesday night at Recreation hall as the Little Giants turned back St. Joe's High, 33 to 21.

Victory in the first encounter this season between Fremont's two high schools went to Ross high when Coach Bob Olfender's quiet opened up in the last period with a dazzling attack of clever pass work and successful shooting. Passing the ball around swiftly, Captain Clarence Klinck, George McCord and company rapidly widened the 19 to 15 margin which stood at the close of the third period.

St. Joe basketballers showed improved form in the last half, but had difficulty whittling the Ross lead below 10 points in the final stanza. Four points on two successful free throws and a fender by Fischer brought the score to 25 to 19, the nearest the Crimson Strikers came to the leaders in the closing quarter.

Attack Falters
From that point midway in the fourth period, St. Joe shooters were unable to mark up a field goal, tallying their final two points on charity tosses by Chudinski and Fischer.

Main spokesman in Ross' last period apart was Klinck, who shot in his last three tries in rapid fire order.

Klinck, who on Monday night submitted to a Clarence Klinck blood transfusion for the benefit of his brother, played nearly the entire game and shared scoring honors with Paul Mosser, flashy St. Joe forward.

The battle was hard fought from start to finish with foul calling plentiful on both sides. A total of 34 penalties was inflicted, 19 being marked up against the Little Giants and 15 called on St. Joe. Bias and Fox were waived from the contest in the closing minutes via the personal foul rule.

Better Percentage
Shooting 11 field goals out of 33 attempts in the last half, a pleasing 30 per cent average, turned the game toward the Giant's side of the score book.

St. Joe, on the other hand, had a slight edge in dropping in free throws. The Crimson Strikers scored nine points on 22 attempts, while Ross was successful in five out of 17 tries from the 15-foot line.

St. Joe failed to show as good form as seen previously this season. Both teams started off cautiously, neither setting a field goal in the opening stanza. Four minutes elapsed before either team slapped a point up on the score board and not until midway in the second quarter did Klinck find the mesh for the first field goal of the game.

Teams were deadlocked, 2-2 at the end of the first period and all at the intermission. Only four seconds late in the first quarter was St. Joe in the fore. The Strikers took a lead of 7 to 6 as Mosser broke loose on a five-point scoring spurge. A one-handed toss by Pete Fox gave Ross an 8-7 lead, but Don Chudinski evened matters before the half ended with a successful FERA throw.

Forwards Score
Brightest spot in the St. Joe lineup was Paul Mosser who came to his team's rescue when points were badly needed. Carl Fischer, high scoring St. Joe forward, was unable to break loose in the first half, but chalked up seven points in the last two periods.

McCord, Ross veteran center, playing brilliantly throughout the game, scored three fielders in the last half and held a slim margin at the tip-off duty over the inexperienced St. Joe center, Oberhauser. Sparkling work was turned in by guards of both teams, with Bias and Hetrick of Ross, outscoring Captain Hank Miesle and Don Chudinski.

Bruce Brufatis, who entered the game late in the second period, in place of Klinck, and broke the deadlock with a pretty toss soon after the third period had got under way. Bias and McCord got set on shots to quickly widen the lead.

"Big" Driftmyer replaced Bias when the latter was ruled out of

the game, and proved a sparkling center in the last three minutes. He dropped in a long throw before the game ended.

Early Troubles

The Little Giants may find some trouble with John Wickham, the six foot-four inch center, who played fullback on the Findlay football team. He counted ten points against Lima.

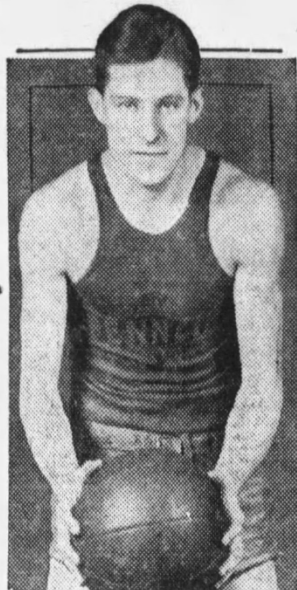
Brothers Feature

George McCord, Fremont center, and little Stu Driftmeyer, who took Glenn Blinn place in the lineup when the veteran left hander was sent to bed with an attack of influenza, assumed their share of glory in the victory by figuring prominently in a dazzling passing attack by the Little Giants and by holding their men to one and two points, respectively.

Crippled Lineup
It was a badly crippled lineup which Coach Bob Oldfather was forced to send into battle. With Blinn ill, Del Hetrick, suffering from a bad head injury, was called into action, but he could not stand the pace and had to give way soon to Campbell. On top of that, Clarence Klinck, ace scorer for the Little Giants, was banished from the conflict early in the third period, just when the Ross attack had started to function.

The Little Giants refused to be covered by their bad luck, though, and fought gamely and were rewarded with victory. The triumph not only enabled them to even the score with Findlay, but it also allowed them to gain a tie with the Trojans for second place in the Buckeye conference standings. It was Findlay's second defeat of the season, their other coming from Sandusky's Blue Streaks.

Polen almost single handedly put an end to the Ross quarter's ambitions. He seemed untoppable in the first half, sinking shot after shot from seemingly impossible positions on the floor. He scored a total of 22 of his team's 32 points, 13 of them coming in the first half. He tallied seven field goals in eleven attempts in the first and second periods.

Start in Third
The Little Giants really opened up in the third period, moving to 25 points on fielders by Campbell and McCord and two goals by Brudinski, as well as fouls by Campbell twice and by Driftmeyer once. All Findlay could muster this period was three fouls by Polen and two goals by the same scoring demon.

At the very beginning of the last quarter, Campbell and Brudinski scored from the field and McCord dropped in a foul to tie the count at 30-all, then Fox came through with a basket to give Ross a 32 to 30 advantage. For fully three minutes, neither team scored, then Hartman knitted the count when he scored both attempts as he was fouled by Driftmeyer. Then with only 25 seconds remaining, Fox came through with his game winning basket from near the foul line. The game ended with Fremont holding desperately to the ball.

LITTLE GIANTS BREAK TIE FOR CLOSE VICTORY

McCord and Hetrick Turn
in Fine Floor Work;
Driftmyer Scores

Bucyrus high's Redskins became the fifth straight victims of the Fremont Ross Little Giants when Coach Bob Oldfather's crippled quintet took a 24 to 19 verdict at Bucyrus Saturday night.

Still playing without the services of Glenn Bliss, veteran guard who is ill with influenza, and deprived of the services of Clarence Klinck, leading scorer, who was banished at the start of the second quarter on personal fouls, the Little Giants won through a tight defensive game.

With George McCord and Dal Hetrick playing excellent floor games, the Ross team grabbed an early lead, then slumped in the third quarter and was forced to come back strong in the closing minutes to earn the decision.

Free Throws Count

Their five point margin can be traced to great extent to deadly work from the foul line. The Little Giants were given only five charity tosses in the entire game, but cashed in on four of the opportunities.

On the other hand, the Redskins failed to take advantage of their free throws, and scored only three points out of 12 chances. Referee Chuck Wertz called 11 personal fouls on the Little Giants, and but five on the Bucyrus quintet in the rough battle.

Considerable credit must go to Wade Campbell, who took Klinck's place in the lineup, and came through with a fine performance. His floor work was steady and his defensive play better.

Little Giants Lead

Bucyrus took momentary lead at the start of the contest when Ekelberry dropped in a free throw, but Klinck knotted the count a few seconds later. Then McCord came through with a field goal which gave the Little Giants temporary advantage. Reece, star center for the Redskins, tied it up again, but Biz Driftmyer hit one just before the period ended to give the Purple a lead it did not relinquish until the middle of the third period.

Driftmyer sank another to start the second period, and after Reece dropped in another for Bucyrus, Fox made good on a free toss, and McCord scored twice and Driftmyer once before intermission to give the Little Giants a 14 to 5 lead.

Redskins Spurt

The Redskins made a determined stand at the start of the second half, and two felders by Dye, and a basket each by Reece, Culver, and Bender put Bucyrus ahead, 15 to 14, before Coach Oldfather's team started to click again.

Then Fox tallied on a charity throw, and after Bender had also scored a foul goal, Driftmyer sank a basket and Hetrick came through with two in a row to put the Ross-men again in command, 21 to 15, as the last quarter started.

They exchanged point for point in the last eight minutes Campbell's felder and foul adding three points for the Little Giants and Ekelberry's foul and Reece's fourth goal manufacturing three tallies for Bucyrus, making the final count, 24 to 19.

Press Asses

By LEE FARIS

The writer was leafing through some basketball scorebooks the other afternoon, looking up the season's records for Fremont's two scholastic basketball teams, and suddenly became statistical-minded.

What a wealth of material those cold figures in the score book can reveal! We couldn't help but wonder at the time how many coaches take advantage of their official record books to get a true insight on their team's performances.

Now we hasten to add that we don't pretend to be telling coaches how they should coach their ball clubs—the grief is theirs and not ours, and they're welcomed to it. But, never the less, we believe a lot of coaches would be surprised at what the pencil marks in the book will show with a little study. It happened that the writer was looking at a score book containing the games of Fremont Ross high when he was "stricken" with this statistical strain, so we'll use those records to bear out our thoughts. Any other score book for any other team would serve the purpose just as well.

For instance we find that the whistle-blowing officials have called a total of 154 fouls on the Little Giants in their 12 games to date. Most fouls were called against the purple in the St. Joe fracas New Year's night, when 19 infractions were cited. Next to this, the Little Giants violated the rules 18 times in their fracas against Sandusky.

Getting a little more personal, Clarence Klinck carries the doubtful honors of having been "blown out" of the most games. The officials put Clarence on the bench five times, or as many times as all the rest of the team put together. Klinck was guilty of four personals in each of the following games: Findlay (both here and there), Sandusky, Fostoria and Bucyrus.

McCord has been given a sideline seat twice by the referee, in the Elyria game and in the Fostoria battle. Fox was lost in the St. Joe encounter, and Hetrick in the Sandusky melee. Bliss left the St. Joe game on fouls.

A total of 33 personals have been called against Klinck, 28 against McCord, 24 against Hetrick, 20 against Bliss, 12 against Fox, eight against Brundinial, and of all things, fourteen against Little Biz Driftmeyer.

Wade Campbell has been called seven times for personals, three of these in the Findlay game when he was stopping Chad Folen, the Trojan's sharp shooting forward. Two are registered against Charley Wolfe and six against Fred Rice.

In a summary, the Little Giants have lost men by fouls ten times during the campaign, while their opponents have lost 14 men.

The Little Giants committed the least number of fouls against Junior Order Home, only four being detected. On the other hand, the Juniors were caught fifteen times that night. Evidently the roughest game was the Fremont-St. Joe clash, as a total of 32 fouls were called. This is traced to the fact that the game was on a smaller floor. In that game, the Ross quintet was called 19 times and St. Joe 13.

It's funny how far you can go with the statistics out of a score book, once you get started. It seems there's no end. We hope it makes as interesting reading as it does figuring.

For instance, if you don't believe what you've read about the Little Giants being a hot half team, look what the score book says. The Ross cagers have scored 228 points in the last two quarters compared to 168 in the first two periods.

And from what the records show, the Little Giants must be very careful of their opponents in the third quarter, for the most points have been registered against the Ross team in that period—85 of them.

The purple boys have scored 82 points in the first quarter, 86 in the second, 106 in the third and 122 in the fourth. It looks like they gather momentum with the clock.

On the other hand, Little Giant foes have scored 68 points in the first quarter, 72 in the second, 85 in the third and 75 in the fourth.

Here's something else rather interesting.

In the 12 games the Little Giants have played, they have been outscored from the field three times—and those are the three games they have lost so far. Elyria outscored the Ross five in goals, 12 to 9; Findlay turned the trick the first time, 11 to 9; and Sandusky outscored the Oldfatheries, 14 to 10.

In the Tiffin Columbian game at Tiffin, field goals were even up, 11 each. In all the rest of the games, the Little Giants had the edge in action shots, their biggest margin being in the first Tiffin Columbian encounter when they registered 25 to 7.

LITTLE GIANTS BATTLE ST. JOE FOR CITY TITLE

Ross Quintet One Up on Defending Champs; Saints Ready

"Last Stand" for St. Joseph's High school cagers and their chances for the mythical city championship will be staged Friday night on the Ross floor. Already one up on the Crimson Streaks Coach Bob Oldfather's team will attempt to settle the question of city supremacy right away.

With five straight victories behind them, the Little Giants are all set to finish the season with a whirl and enter "dark horse" circles for tournament competition. Equally anxious to end its season with a bang is the Upper Croghan street parochial team.

The Saints' hard-fought game against Maumee High Tuesday night definitely showed Fremont basketball fans the Streaks are not lying down on the job. All steamed up over their two-point loss to Maumee, St. Joe might be hard for the Rossites to handle Friday night.

In Winning Stride

Not since January 17 have the Little Giants tasted defeat. They have won from Fostoria, Findlay, Tiffin Columbian, Bellevue and Bucyrus since last finishing on the short end of a score. Their last setback was at the hands of Sandusky High school.

Ross High school has nine games chalked up on the right side of the scoring sheet and three encounters draped in black. Losses have been suffered at the expense of Sandusky, Findlay and Elyria. St. Joe has a 500 average at the moment. Of seven setbacks two have been administered by one point and two by a pair of points.

The Ross High school forces will probably be strengthened by the return of Glenn Bliss who has been kept from team activities by an attack of flu. Bliss has been working smoothly with the Ross quintet this season and was a thorn in the side of more than one high-scoring cager.

Streaks In Form

One advantage will be held Friday night by the Saints. They have already participated in one basketball encounter this week, while the Little Giants have been idle since last Friday night. In that time St. Joe swept Gibsonburg by a 52 to 28 score and battled strenuously with a fast-stopping Maumee quintet. St. Joe will attempt to stay away from the disastrous feature of its first game with Ross High and of several contests this season. The tragic event in a number of games has been a terrific bogging down in the last period. If St. Joe could have played 24 minutes of basketball instead of 32, their record for the campaign would have stood several notches better.

Against Ross High, the Saints kept on even terms in a first half of little scoring. Both teams were even at first period finish, 2-2 and at the half, 8-8. Only four points could be gained over St. Joe in the third period, but the Little Giants rapidly climbed into a wider lead as the last quarter progressed.

Close Battle

Friday night's battle is expected to provide another close race for Carl Fischer and Paul Mosser, of the Saints, and Klinck and McCord, of the Ross team, for high scoring honors. Mosser and Klinck scored 10 apiece in the first contest and the other two seven each.

Should there come any break at all in the weather, one of the largest crowds of the local high school season will be on hand for the game. And their efforts to tramp through deep snow or brave dropping temperature probably will be rewarded with a providing of an outstanding cage exhibition.

MANY ROOKIES TO GET CHANCE AGAIN

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—P.—Outside of Connie Mack's big deals with Tom Yawkey's bankroll, International League clubs did the biggest business in ivory with major league clubs for the 1936 campaigns. A check-up of the official club rosters of both leagues today disclosed that 26 International league stars were sold, traded or transferred to big time since the close of last season. The Southern Association was second with 21. The Texas League ranked third with 18, followed by the American Association and the Pacific Coast League which sent 18 players each of the majors.

Little Giant Offense Too Fast For Streaks Who Relinquish Crown

Taking the lead in the first five minutes and never relinquishing it thereafter, Fremont Ross high school's Little Giants laid claim to the city mythical scholastic championship Friday night by defeating the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's, 45 to 21, in a game at Ross gymnasium.

Miesle Sparkles

Miesle was the only one on the parochial team who was able to shake loose from the Ross defense with any consistency. Carl Fischer and Paul Mosser, key men in the St. Joe attack, were held to four points between them. Mosser getting the only fielder. The sixth Streak basket was scored by Jim Oberhauser, lanky center, near the end of the first half.

Clarence Klinck proved the leader of the Little Giant attack and was credited with nine fielders and two fouls, a total of 20 points during his three quarters in the ball game. Klinck was shooting with deadly accuracy, three of his five field goals in the last half coming from difficult positions.

George McCord and Del Hetrick turned in good floor games for Coach Bob Oldfather's quintet, and Oberhauser and Miesle featured St. Joe's play, both offensively and defensively. There were times when both Fischer and Mosser flashed offensive ability, but neither was able to find the range.

Record On Fouls

Streaks Fall Behind

Last Period Slow

St. Joe was in the role of defending champion Friday, having won the mythical title last year by defeating the Little Giants two straight. They did not relinquish their crown without stern protest, but they were not quite equal to the task.

Two For Giants

Sandusky was conquered last week by Findlay's Trojans, who a week earlier had been given a setback by Coach Oldfather's club. It was the Trojan victory that made the three-way split of championship laurels a possibility.

Staged Comeback

In their former meeting on the Ross gym floor here, Sandusky topped the Little Giants, 40 to 30, in a game marked by a splendid last half comeback by the Oldfatherites. Corder and Maag, forward and center for Sandusky, were the scoring artists in that melee.

Arrangements have been made at Sandusky to take care of the largest crowd in the history of basketball there. Special bleacher seats have been erected to take care of the overflow.

Officials for the game Friday will be Bob Young, of Lima, a former Ohio Wesleyan star, and Bill Pressing of Norwalk, a veteran arbitrator of the court game. A preliminary between the reserve squads of the two old rivals will precede the headliner.

LITTLE GIANTS HAVE LEAD BUT STREAKS RALLY

Overtime Game Gives Title to Sandusky; Ross Goes to Third

Ross High school eagles for more than 30 minutes Friday night thought they were traveling a different road in their basketball game with Sandusky High, but the path ran over the same precipice as previously, another loss to the Blue Streaks. Sandusky topped the Ross five, 39 to 37 with Maag's field goal in an overtime period, at Sandusky.

Holding a five point lead with less than two minutes left to play, the Little Giants believed a victory over the Sanduskyans was theirs and a share in the Buckeye High school league basketball title virtually in the bag. But the home forces never gave up in those closing minutes and did the unexpected-pulled even with the Rossites, 37-all, before the final gun.

Maag Is Hero

Tall, curly-headed Jim Maag, Sandusky center, broke loose in a three-minute overtime period to score a field goal and cap the game. In the extra session "Big" Driftmeyer tossed one which seemed destined to split the match but it fell short. A few seconds later, Glenn Bliss missed a charity toss and Maag raised the game from the fire.

The contest was a slugging affair played before nearly 1,800 fans, including a large number from Fremont. Except for an initial charity throw in the opening minute by Don Whittaker to start scoring activities, and a tie at 11-all, the Fremonters were ahead until the final seconds of the struggle.

Take Big Lead

Ross High ran its lead to 25-27 before Sandusky opened its last stand. Captain Jack Belstein tossed in a free throw and Maag came back with three points on a fielder and free throw. Near the end of the third period the Fremonters had claimed a 26 to 16 advantage.

Krueger, Blue Streak guard, scored his only action shot of the game to bring Sandusky's points to 23 and Maag again went under to get a field goal and a free throw, putting Sandusky in the fire, 26 to 25. Driftmeyer sent a long shot through the hoop to switch the lead again and the game looked like Fremont's once more.

Foul The Score

Driftmeyer a few seconds later suffered with the calling of a foul and Belstein dropped the ball through. Before another tipoff, the game was over. Heavy infliction of penalties in the closing minutes cost the Little Giants their game and a share in the basketball championship.

Klinck and Fox were ruled from the tussle late in the fourth quarter, while "Benny" Campbell, who had been playing a nice game, was ejected on four personals earlier. Don Whittaker suffered the same treatment in the last two minutes. Maag had three called on him before the final stanza started and Coach Wallace Glenwright removed him for the crucial moment which was to come.

Hopes Revived

The lanky center went back in at the start of the final period to revive Sandusky's rapidly sinking hopes. With a comfortable lead and two minutes to go, Ross eagles attempted to hold the ball but could not control it as one eagle suffered under the 15-second rule and an intersection was snaged by a Sandusky player.

Until the closing minutes, the Little Giant's were holding an edge in free throws made, but their playing grew rough. Officials B-H Young and Wilder were in dispute with the crowd until the game was nearly over. The crowd was noisy while Ross players were standing at the 15-foot strip. Referee Young on one occasion gave Klinck a second charity throw because of the disturbance.

Passwork Good

Fremont's passwork overshadowed that of the Sanduskyans, but the latter held an edge in work under the baskets. Late in the game the Streaks were able to break away from the Fremont defense in little better form. Pete Fox played one of the best games of his high school days, but could not see action at the close. The same applied for Klinck, although his last-half showing did not approach that given earlier in the game.

McCord was a main scoring cog in the first two periods, but his offensive playing fell down somewhat in the last half. Bliss entered the game late to give the Fremonters new pep. Driftmeyer snagged one fielder and never missed a free throw, but his scoring activity was slightly below normal.

All but Fox, Wolfe and Rice are seniors.

Record Is Good

The Ross Little Giants finished the season with a record of 13 victories and five defeats, one of the best records amassed in recent years. This gave them a win percentage of .722.

The team scored a total of 604 points in its 18 games, and since a high school game is played in eight minute quarters, this gave the Little Giants a record of better than a point a minute. Their average points per game was 33.5.

Free Shot Mark

The opponents of the Little Giants averaged 25.6 points a game, a total of 462 points being scored against the Ross cagers. The highest score for the Little Giants was the 61 to 20 victory over Tiffin Columbian and the lowest score was against Ashland, a 27 to 20 defeat for the Oldfatherites.

Ross made 152 out of 271 free shots, a percentage of 56.1, while their opponents made 130 out of 280 shots, a percentage of 46.5. Ross turned in the best foul shooting performance against Fostoria, sinking 11 out of 13 attempts.

Little Giant cagers committed 242 personal fouls during the year, and their opponents committed 219.
