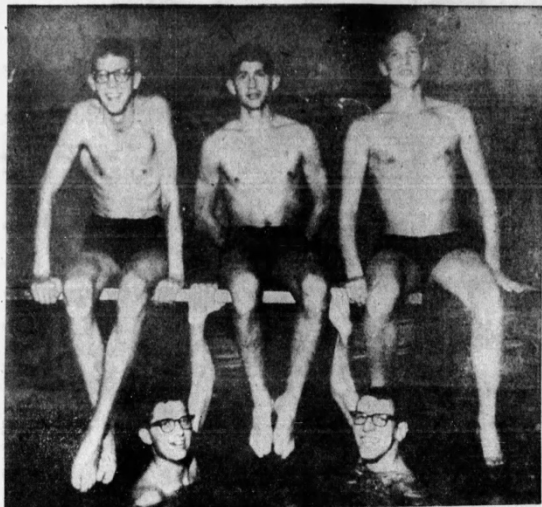

Faunce Optimistic About Ross Swimmers But Speedy Jim Parker May Not Be Ready

Other than one dark cloud hanging overhead, Ross high swim coach Bill Faunce is optimistic about his 1962-63 tank crew now working out for the long swim season ahead.

The dark cloud in question is whether double letter winner Jim Parker, who holds two school records and shares in a third, will recover from a back injury sustained during the summer. He is undergoing treatment now. Should Parker be unable to answer the bell, Faunce, his assist-

ant Jack Balsizer and the entire team will feel the effects of the loss.

Faunce, on the other hand, has reason to be optimistic about this year's version of Ross high swimming team. He has, excluding Parker, five lettermen and a quantity of juniors who saw considerable action last year but not enough to earn a monogram.

Other double letter winners are Jack Jaisler, backstroke and breaststroke (actually Faunce feels he can swim any stroke), and Tom Lloyd, freestyler. Jim Hetrick, freestyler, Neal Wensinger, freestyler, and diver Bob Lozano.

Lost Three

Faunce lost through graduation three breaststrokers, Bill Knoke, Bob Morris and Tony Stern. "We may be hurting a little in that department," Faunce announces. "We also lost Bob Cliburn, a 50 and 100-yard freestyler."

First action for the squad will be Thursday night at 7:30 when Faunce will run the inter-squad meet. "From the results of that meet," Faunce explains, "We'll be able to determine our traveling squad of 15 boys."

Actually, Faunce will have little more to do than keep the inter-squad meet rolling smoothly. Four honorary co-captains were picked, Lloyd and Parker on the Purple squad and Jaisler and Hetrick on the Whites. These honorary captains then make out their own lineups prior to the meet.

Ross' inter - squad swimming meet between the Purples and Whites Thursday night at the Junior High pool ended in a draw as the Purple, down by seven points going in the final event, came back to tie.

Three new school records were set. Jack Jaisler broke two, the 200yard individual medley and 100-yard breast stroke. Larry Sloan snapped the other, the 400-yard free style. Jaisler finished the individual medley in a time of 2:25.3, breaking Jim Parker's record of 2:30.8 of last year.

Jaisler came in after the 100-yard breast stroke in a time of 1:10.2, breaking Bill Knoke's 1962 record by two seconds.

Sloan finished his race in 4:57.2, breaking the old mark set by Charles Fangboner last year of 5:19.6.

He also swam a leg of the record-breaking 200-yard free style relay team of Larry Sloan, Charles Fangboner, Tom Lloyd and Jaisler which came home in the time of 1:39.0. Old record set in 1953 by Bob Lucas, Jack Rose, Ned Frantz and Goerge Hirschberger was 1:40.0.

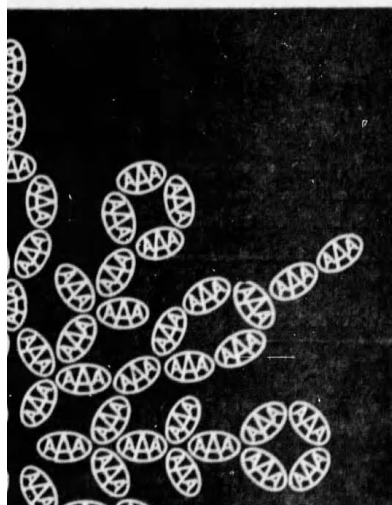

Little Giants Vie Findlay In Swimming

Idle since December 15 when they torpedoed Massillon 74-21, the Fremont Ross Little Giants return to pool action this Saturday when they visit the YMCA pool in Findlay.

Meet time is 2 p.m.

Findlay, which lost a pair of close decisions to Ross last year (44½ to 41½ and 44-42), has not met competition this season. Steve Siford, a diver but a lad who can swim any stroke, is the outstanding tanker on this squad. Ken Bowman, a 100-yard free styler, and Joe Diver, also a 100-yard free styler, can be expected to give the Giants some trouble.

Coach Bill Faunce of Ross said the Findlay pool is much shorter than what the Giants are used to. The pool is only 20-yards long, old and the water is quite cloudy, making turns difficult to see.

Faunce also will give Jim Parker a chance to see what he can do in competition with his injured back. Parker, one of the stars of last year's team, has been inactive so far.

Ross Swimmers Come Back To Edge Findlay, 49-46

Fremont Ross had to put on a determined rally in the final three events Saturday afternoon before gaining a 49-46 swimming decision over Findlay at the YMCA in Findlay.

Ross swim mentor Bill Faunce said his team went into the action a little over-confident but he hopes the boys have learned a lesson.

"After beating Massillon so easily a few weeks ago," Faunce commented, "they thought they were going to walk away with this meet."

Most outstanding race of the day was turned in by Jack Jaisler of Ross who once again broke his own record in the 100 - yard breast stroke with a time of 1:08.4, bettering his old mark by two seconds that he set earlier this season. Faunce also was encouraged by the performances of Jim Foreman and Bob George.

Ross trailed 42-28 with only three events. But the Little Giants fought back to win the 400-yard free style, 100-yard breast and 160-yard free style relay.

Ross' next competition will be Friday afternoon at the Junior high when Perkins invades for a 4 o'clock meet.

Two Meets For Giants' Swim Team

Picking up their schedule after a slow season's start, the Ross high swim team will be engaged in two tank duals this week—one an also important scrap with rival Sandusky.

Ross travels to the Blue Streak pool Thursday night when the Little Giants hope to snare their first victory over Sandusky in two years. Starting time Thursday is 7:30.

Western Reserve Academy will visit the Fremont Junior high pool Saturday afternoon at 3 with what Ross Coach Bill Faunce calls a much better team than the one they had last year when Ross earned a 43-43 tie.

Western Reserve's top swimmer is Larry Whitner, who can swim any stroke and do it well but specializes in the distance free style and 100 - yard backstroke.

Sandusky's chief threat again is Bill Zorn, one of the top swimmers in the state and who is a strong candidate for the state's 100 - yard butterfly championship. He also swims in the 100 and 200 - yard free style events. Faunce said his times in these events have been excellent so far. Zorn swims the 100 - yard fly in 56.5, the 200 - yard free style medley in 2:04.0 and the 200-yard individual medley in 2:16.0.

Coach Ray Morrow, in his first year at Sandusky, also can count on two freshmen boys to give good performances. They are Mike Holmes in diving and Dave Estel in the sprints. Sandusky also is strong in diving through the efforts of Steve Springer.

Sandusky has lost two meets this year, one to Kent State high school, regarded as a favorite for state laurels and Upper Arlington.

Ross will be banking again on record-breakers Tom Lloyd and Jack Jaisler to gain points.

Sandusky Edges Ross In Swim Dual, 53-42

Sandusky's swim team captured both relays, worth seven points each, and went on to defeat Fremont Ross in a swimming dual Thursday night in the Blue Streak pool, 53-42.

Ross had led 36-34 going into the final three events, all won by the Streaks.

Tom Lloyd of Fremont set a school record in the 100-yard free style race with a time of 52.3, breaking Gordon Tod's mark of 53.2 set in 1959 in the state tournament.

Ross Coach Bill Faunce said his swimmers turned in a "fine job." He also said the best race of the night was in the 400-yard free style when Giant Sophomore Larry Sloan nearly defeated Bill Zorn, one of the state's strongest all-around swimmers. Sloan led Zorn during the entire race until the final 20 feet when the Sandusky flash nosed ahead. Sloan's time of 4:36.2 was 20 seconds faster than he has ever gone in the event.

Sandusky will visit Fremont on February 21. Ross' next meet is at the Junior high pool Saturday at 3 against Western Reserve Academy.

Ross Tankers Scuttle Western Reserve

After finishing second in the first two races, Fremont Ross' swim team stormed to nine victories in the next 10 events Saturday afternoon here to sink the swimmers from Western Reserve Academy 59-36 in a meet described by Coach Bill Faunce of Ross "as closer than the score indicates."

Ross trailed 13-3 at one time before pouring on the steam.

Little Giant swimmers bounced back after a tough defeat last Thursday in Sandusky. "They needed this one very badly," Faunce said, "as they took the Sandusky defeat hard."

More records were set or tied by Ross' two tank aces Jack Jaisler and Tom Lloyd. Lloyd swam the 50-yard free style in 23.7 which ties the time he set 10 days ago

against Perkins here. This is a school record. Jaisler set two records—pool and school. He swam the 100-yard breast stroke in 1:08.8 to break the mark of 1:09.2 he set against Perkins, and then finished the 200-yard individual medley in 2:22.2, shaving two seconds off his own best time set this season against Massillon.

Faunce also was pleased with the showing of Jim Parker in the 100 - yard butterfly event. Parker finished second to Jim Foreman but has been swimming only short races to date because of a back ailment. He is slowly rounding into shape and could be a big factor in Ross' hopes during the final six weeks of the season.

Lloyd's anchor job on the 200-yard free style relay pulled Fremont out of trouble. Lloyd started behind but finished strong and Ross earned a .07 victory in the race.

Ross' next meet will be against Akron Buchtel at the Junior high Friday night at 7.

Sudden Death Gives Barnum PGA Golf Title

PORT ST. LUCIE, Fla. (AP)—Long-hitting John Barnum, who at 51 is a golfer in a class by himself, has added another tournament to his string, and there's no telling how long he'll stick around to play the youngsters in the sport.

The 6-foot-3½ former Texan now working for the Blythefield Country Club in Belmont, Mich., whipped Ansel Snow and Chick Harbert in a "sudden death" playoff Sunday to win the PGA's \$25,000 National Golf Club championship.

It was no surprise, for mild-mannered John had proved himself still as tough a competitor as many of the young fellows by winning the Cajun Classic in November in Louisiana.

Thus, he became the first pro to win a major tournament on the PGA tour after passing his 50th birthday.

He came to the end of the regulation 72-hole route Sunday in a deadlock with Snow, 40-year-old pro from Keswick, Va., and Har-

Lloyd was a bit over-anxious and left the starting block a split second before Parker touched in. At the time, Fremont was leading by a body length. Ross finished with a time of 1:49.1, which would have set records. Sandusky's time was 1:50.5.

Lloyd came back to make up for his mistake by flashing to a new school record in the 100-yard free style with a time of 52.0, breaking the old record of 52.3 he set this season. Lloyd wiped out the record held by Gordon Tod, a swimmer from that 1959-60 squad. Tod was present at Thursday's meet.

Bill Zorn of Sandusky broke a pool record in the 100-yard butterfly by finishing with a time of 56.6. He established the old mark two years ago here.

Sandusky defeated Ross 53 - 42 last month in Sandusky. Ross' record is now 8-4 and the Little Giants close out their regular season Saturday afternoon in Lima in a tune up for the district. Sandusky has been inactive for a week and the loss was only the third meet for the Blue Streaks out of their pool.

Best times for Fremont boys were turned in by Ron Roberts, 50-yard free style; Bob Hite, 200-yard individual medley; Norm Demmel, 200 - yard IM; Jim Parker, 100 - yard butterfly; Bill Roth in the 100-yard back stroke; and Greg Arndt, 400-yard free style.

Bob Lozano can wear a feather in his cap for his big victory over Steve Springer in diving. The Ross Junior became only the second to down Springer in dual competition this season.

Old Vs. New

As the years go by Jack Dempsey's terrific knockout punch becomes strong and bigger—so the stories go. This is a myth.

Tangible proof, however, that today's athletes are better in most ways than those of years gone by can be seen right here in Fremont. And we only have to go back 10 years to show you the difference.

This story deals with swimming, its records and times.

Comparisons will be made between the 1963 STATE CHAMPIONSHIP Fremont Ross swimming team and the 1953 team that won the district but didn't get a smell downstate. Yet, today's squad would run circles around the 1953 team.

Want proof?

Coach of the 1963 team is Bill Faunce, who also was a member of the 1953 squad when he weighed a mighty 128 - pounds — but that's another story.

Faunce brought us the proof.

First we must explain that there was no event known as the 400-yard free style in 1953. Also, the four-man 200-yard medley relay team of today was run with a three-man relay in 1953 because they did not have a breast-stroker. In 1953, the individual medley was of 150-yards in length. Today it is 200-yards.

Starting with the 200-yard medley relay and using only the free style, butterfly and backstroke times, here is how the 1953 championship squad shapes up with what our boys did this season. Also, the winning time in the state in each division this season will be noted.

In 1953—1:25.3. 1963 — 1:24.8. Winning time at state — 1:14.8.

The 200 - yard free style: 1953-2:05.7. 1963 — 2:03.9. At state — 1:50.5.

50-yard free style: 1953—24.9. 1963 — 23.5. At state — 22.3.

100 - yard fly: 1953 — 1:05.8. 1963 — 59.6. At state — 55.0.

100 - yard free style: 1953—54.2. 1963—52.0. At state—49.5.

100 - yard backstroke: 1953—1:04.7. 1963 — 1:00.7. At state—55.0.

100 - yard breast: No event in 1953.

200-yard free style relay: 1953—1:40.0. 1963 — 1:38.7. At state—1:31.5.

Why such a big difference today as compared with only 10 years ago?

Said Faunce: "There are at least four reasons. (1) Boys are starting to compete at an earlier age. (2) Coaching techniques and training schedules. (3) Boys are bigger and stronger. (4) Swimming is becoming a year around program."

Moreover, the 1963 squad holds every record on the Ross school books.
