Fremont will engage in the annual Buckeye League track and field meet at Harmon Field Saturday, against Tiffin, Sandusky and Findlay. The Little Giants, who dropped only one meet this year, have shown marked improvement in the last few weeks and are expected to make a bid for the title. Sandusky's team, second in the Mansfield relays, will have strong representation.

Harmon Field was scheduled to be mecca for 100 schoolboy athletes from Fremont Ross, Sandusky, Findlay and Tiffin Columbian High schools Saturday p. m., for the annual Buckeye League track and field meet.

With Fremont expected to gain a foothold in the League top flight of scorers, indications from pre-meet records would indicate that Sandusky should cop the lion's share of points.

The Sandusky High squad is the defending champion in the conference meet and has gone strong in track competition this year.

Fremont has the best record of the other schools in the league, having dropped only one meet, to Mansfield.

Fremont Entries

Fremont's entries include a likely winner in the 120-high hurdles and 220-low hurdles in Pete Fox. The competition in the conference will be keen, however.

Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff is expected to use the same squad which he drilled in preparation for the Oak Harbor practice meet scheduled for this week, but which failed to be pulled off when the expected visitors did not show up.

Jim Spangler and Leland Erchenbrecher will be out for Fremont in the hurdles.

The mile relay team is expected to consist of Jack Forgerson, Burdette Ballard, Wilson Dunlap and Forrest Bingman, or Eugene Hofelich.

Sandusky Retains Buckeye League Title; Ross High's Squad Takes Second Place

Pete Fox Sets New Mark in High Jump When Six League Records Fall; Medley Team Wins

Fremont athletes set two of the six new marks established Saturday afternoon at Harmon Field, when Sandusky High school retained its track and field title in the Buckeye League.

Sandusky scored 92 points. Fremont was second with 60½ points. Findlay brought up third with 36½ points and Tiffin trailed in last place with 33 points.

Take Early Lead

The Little Giants snatched an early lead, in the track competition, leading at the end of seven events as follows: Fremont, 36½ points; Sandusky 33; Findlay, 18½; and Tiffin 9.

Sandusky topped the next event, the 200-yard hurdles, and was never behind the remainder of the meet.

Fremont was first in six of 16 events. Jim Rosemond took first in three of the seven taken by Sandusky. Pete Fox bettered his own League mark in the high jump, and had another first in the 120-yard high hurdles in which he broke the old Harmon Field record.

League Records Clatter

The six new league marks were: Medley relay—won by Fremont, including Leland (Pete) Erchenbrecher, Ray Horn, Charles Wolfe and Sam Broshous, in 3:40 minutes, breaking the old mark of 3:42 set by Sandusky in 1938, and the Harmon Field mark of 3:41.

High jump—won by Pete Fox, Fremont, with a jump of 5 feet, 9 1-8 inches, breaking the leap record of 5 feet, 7½ inches he made last year.

Shot put—won by John Wickham, Findlay, with a heave of 48 feet, 2½ inches, breaking the old conference record of 45 feet, 10 inches he set last year, and the Harmon Field record of 46 feet, 6½ inches. Pete Fox threw the shot 45 feet for second place, to set a new school record here.

220-yard dash—won by Jim Rosemond, Sandusky, for curve track, in 23 seconds flat, bettering the old mark of 23.3 by Web McMurry, Sandusky, last year. It was also a tenth-second faster than the old Harmon Field record.

Half-mile run—won by Riedy, Sandusky, in 2:06 minutes, bettering his own 2:08.6 of 1938. Reinbolt, Fremont, did the same distance in the 1936 time, two years ago.

Discus—won by Charles Maag, Sandusky, with 126 feet, 9 inches, bettering his old throw of 119 feet made last year.

Fremont Does Well

Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff's men gave a good accounting of themselves. Only in field events did they fail to show much ability.

Fremont relay team won the half-mile event, Sandusky being disqualified when a runner cut out of lane in front of Fremont.

Pete Fox was in second place in the 220-yard low hurdles when he lost his stride and fell over a hurdle.

Fremont was disqualified in the mile relay for failure to pass the baton in proper distance.

In the medley, won by Fremont, Sandusky's relay team was second after losing time when Ed Oglesbee collided with LaMarr Senne.

Millard (Merlie) White won the pole vault in 10 feet, 3 inches, but was not pressed to win.

Jim Rosemond, Sandusky athlete, was main stay of his team in the running events, with first in the 100-yard, 220-yard, and 440-yard dashes.

Rogers, of Sandusky took early lead in the mile run, but was passed just in front of the stadium at the beginning of the last lap by Norman Keller, Ross sophomore, who won it in a fast 4:42.5-minute clip.

Miss Kuntz Awards

A rostrum was placed in front of the stadium and the winners of each event were called to their places there to receive Buckeye League ribbons, represented by Miss Genevieve Kuntz, school librarian.

As the athletes prepared to receive their ribbons, four trumpeters announced the fact, after which George Gruse, announcer, gave the name of each winner.
