FREMONT HIGH BOWS TO LORAIN IN FAST DUEL

Fremont high opened its league basketball season at home Friday night with Lorain. This was one of the fastest battles ever played on a local floor.

The fast Lorain quintet started off in the first minute of play by making a free throw. "Jumpin' Joe" Hurley enraged by this sudden start, made a brave attempt to make one from the center of the floor and Zink followed with a try from the enemies' territory. At this point Gove came out with one of his famous shots from the center of the floor, giving the visitors a lead of three points. Fremont seemed to find itself here and with some of the prettiest passing sent the ball to Zink who tossed one in from under the basket. The quarter ended with the score 3 to 2 in Lorain's favor.

In the second period Lorain got away for a fast start and again tossed one into the net. Lorain was called for a broken dribble and Zink added one more point. The purple and white crew, by some very clever passing and floor work, gave Lerch the ball and he tossed it through the hoop from in front of the board.

Lorain alarmed at this sudden comeback, took time out. When play was resumed a foul was called on Fremont. Gove then took a terrible wallop at Lerch, who was trying for a shot, nearly putting Judy out of the game. Referee Slocum gave Fremont two chances to score. Coach Collins protested the decision but when asked whether he would go on with the game or not, quickly assented. Judy then got his revenge by making the two free throws allotted to him. The lead was short-lived, however, for Horn speared one from the right corner of the floor and Smith repeated from the same place. Score at end of half, Lorain 9, Fremont 7.

The second half started fast and looked as if that period would be as good as the first. Both teams soon tired, however, and the game commenced to drag. This period was noted for the football tactics used. The players fell on the ball as if they thought it was to be held to the floor. Comcsak started the scoring by making two points from under the basket. Lorain was given the ball for a free throw which gave the visitors one more point.

Referee Slocum reversed his former decision and waived the point. Lorain shot one from out of bounds.

Lorain's two attempts to put the inflated leather in the net failed. Then Zink speared two free throws. Hurley had a couple of nice chances to even up the score but his powerful shoves put the ball over the backboard.

The fourth period was a repetition of the third. Both teams being unable to keep their feet. Zink started the scoring by getting one from the front of the board. Lorain made a free throw. Zink then missed two free shots. Zink also shot one after the whistle blew. Warner tossed one in from under the basket.

Thatcher tossed the big pill into the fish net on a free throw. Hermy Schneider then in a brave attempt to keep the ball, took a flying dive into the sidelines that reminded of some of "Windy" Wendler's dives off of the top of Tucker's mill. The dive was a little too much for Hermy's already

tired anatomy and he was retired.

Al Foos took his first crack at big league basketball. This quiet little lad is a find for Coach Taylor's six-footers. He may be an inch or two shy of the much touted six feet but he's all there when it comes to taking the ball away from the opposition. "Foosy" played only a few minutes, but that was enough to show what he can do.

A little better placing of the leather will give the Taylorites next week's game at Norwalk. If Joe Hurley will just put a little less energy behind those long shots of his, Fremont will not need to worry over the score. Zink never misses the ring, but still that keeps them from dropping through.

A great crowd saw the contest which was a hard one to lose. Coach Taylor will keep on trying to work out a winning combination with the

Fremont high took defeat but not a drubbing at the hands of the much "tooted" Sandusky high quintet Friday night in Sandusky. The snappy passing and shooting of the blue and white squad before the game made them the high favorites of the evening. The first quarter increased the confidence of the Sanduskians, even though the majority were disappointed at the showing made. The purple and white players, on the other hand, showed much improvement and a different style of play from that which had been displayed on the local floor so far this season.

The scoring was opened by Homberger inside of two minutes after the first whistle blew. He quickly followed it by successfully placing a free throw inside the net. It was during the second half that excitement became the most intense. Both teams played a faster game. Sandusky had difficulty to keep the ball located, but did so often enough to give themselves a chance to make their spurt at the end of the last quarter and get the winning point.

Foos was taken out in the third period to make way for Lerch. Both boys played a nice game, favoring the long shots. Wingard clearly stands out as the best player on the Fremont team. He did make mistakes during the evening, but threw himself so heartily into the correction of them that everyone felt that he did his share and more. Taylor's squad seems to have profited by the Bellevue game and no long shot was left uncovered in case it should go wrong. There was always some one down there under the basket to give it more shove to send it in. The passing, though much improved, is still somewhat slow. To the poor refereeing of Referee Vaughn of Elyria, is laid the blame for the last, and most undeserved defeat of the basketball season. Hooted throughout the game by the local fans, Vaughn threatened to give the visiting team many more chances to run up the score. He seemed to know the style of play indulged in by the Oberlin players and never ceased to watch Taylor's crew. Many of his decisions were contested, at one time during the game both coaches went to the center of the floor for conference.

At only one point of the game were the Fremont players able to take the lead. This was at the opening of the second period, when Wingard took the ball on the jump and neatly laid it in the net, and immediately followed this with a shot which he earned by intercepting an Oberlin pass.

An Oberlin player dribbled down the west side of the court with Wingard in hot pursuit, when in the belief of the Fremonters, the Oberlin player stepped out at the side line. He proceeded down until he was under Fremont's basket and shot, making the goal.
