Voggenthaler coaches last season at Ross

Al Voggenthaler is entering his last season as wrestling coach at Fremont Ross.

Voggenthaler, a head coach for 28 years including 19 at Ross, will retire as coach and teacher at the end of the school year.

"It's time to go," Voggenthaler said. "I've been involved in wrestling since 1951, my freshman year in high school."

Voggenthaler, a native of New York who came to Ohio as a college student at Bowling Green State University, pondered retirement last year.

The time didn't seem right, however.

"I sort of committed myself to a couple of those kids who were state qualifiers," he said. "I want to kind of shepherd them through."

David Boda, a 103-pounder, and heavyweight Chad Green return for the Little Giants after qualifying for the state tournament a year ago.

Little Giants hope to fill holes

Fremont Ross will seek to conceal holes in its wrestling lineup — at least until it develops depth at 145, 152, 160 and 171 pounds.

"We'll be doing well in the lower weights, but once we get past 140 or so, we don't have any experience," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said. "We have good bookends. David Boda at 103 and Chad Green at heavyweight both went to state last year."

Thirty-two wrestlers are out for the squad this year, including seven returning lettermen.

"We're down from last year, but (32) is not an unusual number," Voggenthaler said.

While Boda, a junior, and 112-pound letterman Dave Alejandro

anchor the Ross lower weights, Green and 189-pound letterman Brian Moreno will hold up the upper end of the lineup.

"What we're going to have to do is build up a lead in those lower weights then hang on until the two upper weights," Voggenthaler said. "As a tournament team, we shouldn't be too awfully bad."

"Those lettermen should be placers in a tournament, and we have championship potential in some weight classes."

Moreno is trying to drop weight to 181 and will be out at least another two weeks, according to Voggenthaler. Green, meanwhile, will wear a mask after suffering a broken nose in a scrimmage against Swanton.


The biggest holes in the lineup are at 140 and 160, which were filled by Dan Lopez and Terry Carter last year. Rodney Pettiford and Fred Schnee are likely candidates to fill those spots.

Ryan Riedmeier is penciled in at 119 pounds, but freshman Shawn Heidelberg could also see action there. Voggenthaler said Riedmeier was the Little Giants' "utility man" a year ago.

Matt Kanan and Jaime Hernandez are at 125. Hernandez lettered as a freshman but didn't wrestle last year.

Letterman Daniel Costilla, a co-captain with Green, and John Lugar will wrestle at 130 and 135 pounds, respectively.

Ross opens the season Wednesday at home against Maumee.




Ross debuts tonight

Little Giants escape with 30-29 win

An emphatic pin by heavyweight Chad Green gave Fremont Ross a 30-29 high school wrestling victory over Maumee Wednesday night.

Ross trailed 29-24 entering the final match.

"I knew I had to work hard to pull through for the team," Green said.

Maumee heavyweight Todd Webster, a senior wrestling for the first time since his freshman year, appeared tentative and was penalized one point for stalling in the first period.

Green led 4-0 when he pinned Webster with 26 seconds left in the second period.

"I got frustrated because he wouldn't wrestle," Green said. "Then my mask started slipping and I couldn't see."

"I think (Webster) was wrestling conservative to hold his lead, but I can't be sure because I don't know what kind of wrestler he is."

Green wore a mask to protect a broken nose.

"The nose never bothered me one bit," he said. "It feels fine; it feels good to win."

As pressurized as the heavyweight match was, it was as important that Ross's Marcus Holbert was able to avoid being

pinned by Maumee's Pat Farley at 189 pounds.

"My 189-pounder should have pinned," Maumee coach Mike McDermott said. "He's a captain, and he didn't even try."

Farley defeated Holbert 18-7 on the strength of seven take-downs and a near fall.

But not a pin.

"We told Marcus when he went out there not to get pinned," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said. "We figured 'Greeny' could polish off the heavyweight.

"That was a good one."

Holbert weighed in closer to 171 than 189; Farley wrestled heavyweight for the Panthers last year.

"We're pleased that Holbert stayed away from the guy and did what he had to do to stay off his back," Voggenthaler said.

Maumee, which forfeited the 103-pound match because of an injury, held the lead twice.

The Panthers led 13-10 after Jeff Kern pinned Jaime Hernandez at 130 pounds, but Ross got a pin from Daniel Costilla at 135 to regain the lead. Maumee's David Calabrese pinned Fred Schnee at 171, putting the Panthers back on top 25-24.

The Little Giants led 10-0 after David Alejandro beat Mario Foster 13-2 in the 112-pound match.

"(Alejandro) wore the kid down and beat the kid," Voggenthaler said.

Maumee strung three victories together, capped by Kern's pin.

Costilla's first-period pin and John Lugar's 16-1 technical fall

over Sean McDermott at 140 gave Ross a 21-13 lead.

Josh Masiker made it 21-16 with an 8-6 decision over Ross's Rodney Pettiford at 145.

Ross's Lamar Shepard defeated John Heagy 12-9 at 152, keeping the Little Giants in front. Shepard broke a 6-all tie with Heagy and held on.

"We needed to have that," Voggenthaler said.

Bill Pickard dropped a 14-7 decision to Maumee's Fred Saylor but avoided yielding three valuable team points.

Saylor had Pickard on his back as time expired and settled for a minor decision.

In junior varsity action, Emmanuel Heidelberg, Shawn Heidelberg, David Contreras, Josh Winters, Andy Reardon, Michael Parks, Rob Vargo and Matt Hull earned exhibition wins for Ross.



Ross, Clay wrestle to 29-all deadlock

Fremont Ross needed more than Brian Moreno's 5-4 decision over Oregon Clay heavyweight Jason Buckley Wednesday night.

Moreno's victory gave Ross a 29-29 tie with Clay in a high school wrestling match.

Ross coach Al Voggenthaler made reference to the cliche "a tie is like kissing your sister."

"Sometimes that isn't all bad," he said. "It depends on whether or not you have a good looking sister."

The Little Giants swept the first six matches against the Ea-

gles — taking a commanding 26-0 lead. The Eagles fought back to take a 29-26 lead after Ross forfeited at 189 pounds.

Moreno, filling in for co-captain Chad Green at heavyweight, salvaged the tie.

Green, who recorded a pin last week to give Ross a 30-29 victory over Maumee, was out of town visiting a sick relative.

The Little Giants were also without the services of Daniel Castillo at 135.

"I'm pleased with the way we wrestle with all the holes we had in the line-up," Voggenthaler said.

"We were confident there, but we knew Clay's middleweights were awesome."

David Boda started the night out for Ross by recording a 16-1 technical fall over Tony Hernandez as the buzzer sounded to end the first period.

David Alejandro followed Boda at 112 with a pin in 3:23, and Ryan Riedmaier (119) wracked up a 14-0 decision to give the Little Giants a 15-0 lead.

Jaime Hernandez and Matt Kanan both recorded decisions before John Lugar scored a 17-1 technical fall, making the lead 26-0 lead.

Ross has 3 top seeds at Rogers tourney

TOLEDO — Fremont Ross and Port Clinton are among 16 teams scheduled to compete in the Rogers Tournament beginning today.

Wrestling begins at 4 p.m. and will resume Saturday at 11 a.m. The finals are scheduled for 7 p.m. Saturday.

Dave Boda (103), John Lugar (135) and heavyweight Chad Green of Ross earned first seeds at Thursday night's seeding meeting.

Brian Moreno at 189 earned a second seed, while Ryan Riedmaier (119) and Dave Alejandro (112) were seeded third and fourth, respectively.

"(The seeds) are pretty close to what I expected not knowing who was coming in," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said. "A lot of it is based on what they did last year and not this year."

Ross third at 15-team Ross meet

Three Fremont Ross wrestlers won individual championships and the Little Giants finished third in the 15-team Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament Saturday.

Lightweights Dave Boda (103) and Dave Alejandro (112) along with heavyweight Chad Green were the Little Giant winners.

Springfield Local won the team title with 183 points. Swanton was second with 160½ and Ross had 157. Wapakoneta was fourth with 129 and Wauseon was fifth with 120.

Port Clinton finished ninth with 86½.

In other matches Saturday, Oak Harbor routed host Columbus DeSales 50-17 and Genoa finished fifth out of 16 teams at the Sylvania Southview Invitational. Rogers Invitational

Brian Moreno, 189, added a second for Ross. Also for the Little Giants, Jaime Hernandez (125) was fourth, Ryan Reidmaier (119) was fifth and Rodney Pettiford (140) was sixth.

Port Clinton's top finishes were thirds by Mike Reynolds (112) and Mike Darr (135), a fourth by Sam Cuevas (152) and fifths by Chris Martinez (125) and Kevin Postma (171).

Boda had three falls among his four wins in the two-day tournament. In the finals, Boda defeated Jeff Puntieri of Rogers 8-6. Boda's quickest pin was in the semifinals, a 21-second effort against Brian Berkebile of Swanton.

Alejandro defeated Shane Keewan of Springfield easily in the finals 7-1, but Green was forced into overtime to upend John Hammerstein of Wapakoneta 4-2 to win his title.

Moreno lost to top-seeded Seth Gresser in the finals 18-4.

Boda and Green had been seeded first, Moreno second and Alejandro fourth.

Robbie Ovall of Springfield was voted the outstanding wrestler by the coaches and Bob Juarez of Anthony Wayne won the trophy for the most falls in the least amount of time, three in 2:09. Boda used 3:12 to records his falls.

Ross will host Lima Senior 7 p.m., Wednesday.

Lightweights lead Ross charge against Lima

Fremont Ross coach Al Voggenthaler's reluctance to turn up the heat put Lima Senior in the boiling pot.

Ross, 2-0-1, benefitted from six straight wins at the outset and flattened the Spartans 48-18 in a high school wrestling match Wednesday night.

Voggenthaler juggled his lineup, moving his first four lightweights up a notch and inserting freshman Emmanuel Heidelberg in at 103 pounds.

"We just had a match last Wednesday and a two-day tournament (Toledo Rogers Invitational Friday and Saturday)," Voggenthaler said, "and with the flu going around, I did not want to boil them down to make weight."

Instead, the Little Giants boiled the Spartans. By the time the sixth match was over, Ross led 30-0.

Heidelberg, the new kid on the Ross block, was not sweet music for Lima's Albert Medley as the freshman pinned the Spartan in 38 seconds.

David Boda, the first of the four who shifted to a higher weight, followed with a technical fall at 112. David Alejandro scored a major decision and Ryan Riedmaier pinned Justin Halverson of Lima in 1:04 of the 125-pound match, making it 21-0.

Jaime Hernandez continued the Ross run with a decision, and John Lugar gave Ross its sixth straight victory, pinning Jorge Becker in 90 seconds at 135.

The only question remaining was what the final score would be.

Fred Schnee, 171, and Brian Moreno, 189, topped off the Ross win with falls and heavyweight Chad Green's ceremonial walk onto the mat for a forfeit ended the Little Giants' rout.

Ross was pushed to the last weight class in its first two matches before earning a win and a tie.

"It was nice to have a little breather," Voggenthaler said.

The Little Giants can breathe easy until hosting Fostoria Dec. 27.

Ross flattens Fostoria 48-16

Fremont Ross cruised to its second straight dual meet victory Thursday night behind the wrestling of its lightweights.

"It's going to be the same all year," Ross coach Al Voggenthaler said after the Little Giants' 48-16 victory over Fostoria. "Win it by 135 and hang on.

"We didn't know that much about (the Redmen), so it was kind of hard to prepare."

A decision by Ross's Emmanuel Heidelberg at 103 pounds was followed by Dave Alejandro's pin at 112 and Ryan Riedmaier's fall at 119.

Ross, 3-0-1, led 22-0 after Shawn Heidelberg's forfeit victory at 125.

Emmanuel Heidelberg filled in for Dave Boda, who failed to make weight. "He ate too many Christmas cookies," Voggenthaler said.

Heidelberg defeated Rob Moore 12-3, while the pins by Alejandro and Riedmaier came in 3:52 and 2:38, respectively.

Shawn Heidelberg filled in for Jaime Hernandez, who missed the match with an injury.

Matt Kanan wrestled at 130 in Hernandez's absence and dropped a 6-5 decision to Brook Piper — the first points for the Redmen.

John Lugar won by forfeit at 135 for Ross, and Rodney Pettiford earned a 22-7 technical fall at 140 before Fostoria won three of the next four matches, making the score 36-16.

Included in Fostoria's short spurt was Andy Miller's victory by default over Fred Schnee, who injured his right elbow in the second period. Ross's 152-pounder, Andy Reardon, wrestled to a 15-8 decision in the same stretch.

Brian Moreno picked up the Little Giants' third victory by forfeit at 189.

"I didn't realize they were going to have three forfeits," Voggenthaler said.

Ross heavyweight Chad Green finished off the Redmen, pinning Joe Anderson in nine seconds.

Mackey mat tournament is Voggenthaler's last at Ross

One thing has been a constant at the Mal Mackey Memorial Invitational Wrestling Tournament: Al Voggenthaler.

Voggenthaler, coach of the Fremont Ross wrestling team, and Dick Sherman, former Ross athletic director started the Ross High School tournament 18 years ago. Saturday, Voggenthaler will coach in his final Mackey tournament.

"Dick Sherman and I started

it," said Voggenthaler, who will retire at the end of this school year. "I got the tournament going and he put the name on it."

Mal Mackey, more widely known as the most successful football coach in Ross history, also began the school's wrestling program. Mackey was the school's first mat coach and Voggenthaler followed him.

The 18th tournament will be no different for the Ross coach.

"I kind of look at it like every

other one," Voggenthaler said. "This (tournament) will be much stronger than it has been in some time.

"Of course, it was stronger last year than I realized."

Voggenthaler's team was favored to win its fifth consecutive Mackey title in 1990 but instead finished a distant third behind champion Lakota and runner-up Clyde.

"I don't think the kids were lis-

tening to the coaches last year," Voggenthaler said, "and their clocks got cleaned."

This time around, Voggenthaler said it would be nice for his Little Giants to win his last tournament, but, he said, "I'm not holding my breath over it.

"We are more aware of how strong the tournament is," he said, "but we don't have the fire-power this year."

Voggenthaler rates Clyde and Lakota as being very close.

Lakota is also following the same path to the Mackey tournament as it did in 1990.

The Raiders, as they did last season, won the the Fremont St. Joseph Central Catholic Holiday Tournament in December. The Fliers, as they did last season, were second to Lakota at St. Joe.

Ross has a 3-0-1 dual meet record and finished third in the Rogers Tournament in December.

Along with those three schools, Waite and DeVilbiss of Toledo, Sylvania Southview, Vermilion and Centerville comprise the field.

Wrestling begins at 11 a.m. Saturday in the Ross gym with the finals at 6 p.m.

He also helped organize the Mackey tournament when it began as a junior varsity tourney.

Then, Voggenthaler who has been known to be unable to resist a quick quip added, "I'll probably be selling tickets or something."

Lakota coach Bob Young said, "It seems like every tournament we are in (with Clyde), it is nip and tuck."


"If there was a key tonight, it was everyone on the team scored points for us; it was a team effort all the way up."

Cody Roth took the 112-pound crown for the Raiders, defeating Ross's Dave Alejandro 4-2 in a close championship match.


Raiders Eric Lippert and Ryan Tyson won back-to-back crowns at 135 and 140, respectively.


Green, Boda named most valuable at Ross

Voggenthaler honored by Ohio House


