Ross swimmers to be 'more versatile'

Ross's 1981-82 swim team is not as strong as it was last year ... Coach Art Bucci admits that.

"We do have more versatility, though," he points out, "and because of that, we will cause teams problems."

The Little Giants tankers have only two seniors on the 20-member roster, one that lettered last season and one that did not swim but is an experienced competitor in the water.

Ross has six lettermen: co-captains Brian Overmyer and Randy Randolph plus Randy Penrod, Ty Heslet, Steve Rodd and Tod Winning. Overmyer and Penrod are the squad's seniors, the rest are juniors.

Penrod lettered as a sophomore but did not come out for the team as a junior.

"We had some good state (participant in the state swim meet) people last year," Bucci said. "Mike Mowery, John Isaac, Dave Sanna and Brian Beck — we lost them and they all went to the state two years in a row.

"This year is going to be a rebuilding year but we have some quality kids that I think can get to the state meet," Bucci said.

"We have some good sophomores; some of the most talented that I have had here," the Ross coach pointed out, "and we have the juniors who swam last year."

Bucci said the number of swimmers who can swim the different strokes and the distances will enable him to maneuver his

100 free sprint, will be at the shorter distance along with Rodd and Heslet.

Penrod, Tad Winning and Lowther are the main butterfly tankers with Overmyer, Rodd and Burke Mitchell in the 100 free. Black along with Isaac and Process are the 500 freestylers.

UPPER ARLINGTON— Ross won only three events but swim Coach Art Bucci could smile despite absorbing a 110-62 loss in the season opening swim meet for the Aqua Little Giants.

"I'm very pleased," the Ross boss said. "The young kids are coming through; we had some good swims and I am very pleased with the times this early in the year."

Randy Penrod, a senior who lettered as a sophomore but did not participate in the Ross program as a junior, won two events and sophomore Chris Black the other for the Aqua Little Giants. All three winning times for Ross were near the school records.

Penrod won the individual medley

and the butterfly. He missed school records by seven-tenths of a second in both. In the IM, Penrod posted a 2:08.4 and in the butterfly, 56.8.

Black was 1.2 seconds off the Ross record in the 500-yard freestyle, splashing to the finish line in five minutes, two and nine-tenths seconds.

Mark Lowther finished second in the butterfly and Brian Overmyer was second in the 100 freestyle for Ross's other top finishes.

In the 400-yard freestyle relay, Ross was second with the team of Penrod, Steve Rodd, Overmyer and Black. The quartet posted a 3:39.3.

Bucci, when he took over the Ross program a few years ago, was not blessed with "numbers." He had a team with 12 members, another with 13 and one with 11

which he referred to by the movie title with appropriate added words such as "Dirty Dozen plus/minus one."

Now with nearly two dozen tankers, Bucci watched his team wallop his past reminders, Wauseon, 128-33.

The Little Giants swept the top two spots in five events and swept the top three spots in two others.

Randy Penrod broke a Ross school mark held by Kirk Hess with a 55.9 clocking in the butterfly. The old Ross mark was 56.10.

Chris Black broke the Wauseon

pool record in the 200 freestyle with a clocking of 1:52.82.

Penrod also won the medley and Black added the 500 freestyle to his first place list.

Ty Heslet captured the 500 free sprint, Brian Overmyer took the 100 free, Jim Ferguson won the backstroke and Randy Randolph won the breaststroke. Both Ross relays won easily and the diving went to Troy Overmyer. All three Ross divers topped previous personal high marks in the event.

LIMA — Ross won both ends of a double dual swim meet Saturday, defeating host Lima 63-20 and Middletown 52-24.

"I switched by lineup around," Ross Coach Art Bucci said, "to see how the versatility is and I was surprised."

Chris Black and Tad Winning had personal bests in the individual medley for the Little Giants while Randy Penrod turned his top time in the 500 freestyle.

Diver John Albrechta qualified for the district competition, posting 153.45 points to win that event.

Ross, now 3-1, also had personal best time swims in the 500 freestyle by Sandy Process and Steve Rodd in the 200 freestyle.

Sandusky swimmers defeat Little Giants

SANDUSKY — Ross's tankers didn't give Art Bucci much to brag about during a 99-73 loss to Sandusky.

John Stauffer set two Sandusky High School pool records and the Blue Streaks won eight of 11 events to topple the Little Giants.

"We had some good swims," Bucci, the Ross coach, said while sorting through the results, "but there were some I wouldn't write home about."

Stauffer set new marks in the 200 individual medley and the 500 freestyle. He won the former in 2:04.62 and took the latter event in 4:55.65.

Ross's three victories went to the medley relay quartet of Mark Lowther, Randy Randolph, Randy Penrod and Ty Heslet. Bucci pointed out the split time of Randolph in the event. The co-captain splashed the butterfly leg in 24.9 seconds.

"That is a heck of a swim," Bucci said.

Penrod won the 100 freestyle sprint and Lowther took the backstroke for the Little Giants over first place finishes. Penrod won his event in 51.60 seconds while Lowther took his in 1:04.54.

"I wasn't overjoyed by the loss," Bucci admitted, "but I feel that we will give them a better meet when we get them at home on Feb. 2."

Ross will be back in action at 1 p.m. Saturday when it travels to Napoleon.


The Little Giants tankers were spurred to the win by Brian Overmyer and the 400-yard relay team of Chris Black, Randy Penrod, Steve Rodd and Overmyer.

Overmyer won the 50 and 100-yard freestyles. He splashed the former distance in 24.3 seconds and took the longer sprint in 53.8 seconds.

The freestyle relay team posted its best time of the season, 3:33.89, in winning that event. The time is the third quickest in the district this season.

Other Ross winners included Black in the individual medley (2:09.98), Penrod in the butterfly (56.00) and Randolph in the breaststroke (1:09.27). The medley relay of Jim Ferguson, Randolph, Mark Lowther and Ty Heslet also won, posting a time of 1:54.4.

Ross will entertain Findlay Thursday in a 4:30 p.m. game at the Fremont Junior High School natatorium.

Ross pool Findlay's friend

Ross swim coach Art Bucci had hoped that since Thursday evening's dual meet with Findlay was his team's first home meet of the season, it would work towards the Little Giants' advantage.

But, as it turned out, the old four-lane pool at Fremont Junior High proved to be Bucci's nemesis as the Giants dropped a 44-39 decision to the Trojans.

The reason the four-lane pool turned out to hurt Ross, according to both Bucci and Findlay Coach Rock Snow, was the fact that it allowed each team to enter only two swimmers per race.

Snow, who picked up his 100th career coaching victory with the win, elaborated, "In a six-lane pool (which Findlay has), I imagine Ross could have beaten us because they have more depth than we do."

Bucci agreed, but he didn't want to use it as an excuse. He said, "The kids gotta get hungrier. They have to make it happen. Swimming is a sport where hard work really does pay off."

As for last night's effort, Bucci said he was feeling "half and half. We got some good times."

The bubbly Ross coach cited four specific events where he was pleased with the results. They were:

— the 200-yard individual medley which was won by senior Randy Penrod in a personal best time of 2:08.0, which was .5 off the school record set by Kirk Hess.

— the 200-yard freestyle which saw sophomore Chris Black win it with his best time (1:50.9) this year and junior Steve Rodd come in third in a best-ever time of 2:01.0.

— the 100-yard freestyle where Rodd came in third with another personal best of 54.2.

— and the meet's final event, the 400-yard freestyle relay which featured Ross' Brian Overmyer turning a five-yard deficit for his team into a five-yard lead on the third leg to spur the win in a time that Bucci said "will probably put us in the top 18 in the state."

Ross won a total of five events out of the 11. The Little Giants' other winners were Penrod in the 100-yard butterfly and Black in the 500-yard freestyle.

"Our younger kids gotta come through for us," Bucci said. "We are six weeks away from districts."

The Giants, now 4-3, will be in Massillon Saturday for the Perry Relays.

Findlay is now 6-4.

The Ross High School swim team finished fifth out of 11 teams in the Massillon Perry Relays Saturday.

The top performance for the local tankers came from the 200-yard freestyle relay team of Randy Penrod, Chris Black, Steve Rodd and Brian Overmyer. That group placed second in a time of 1:46.11.

Other top performances for the Little Giants were:

—in the 400-yard individual medley relay where the team of Black, Mark Lowther, Tad Winning and Penrod finished third in 4:39.2.

—in the 200-yard butterfly relay where the team of Black, Lowther, Winning and Penrod finished fourth in 1:59.4.

—in the diving competition where Ross finished fifth behind the performances of Troy Overmyer and Dan Ackerman.

—in the 400-yard freestyle relay where Brian Overmyer, Rodd, Ty Heslet and Burke Mitchell led Ross to a fifth-place finished.

—in the 200-yard medley relay where the team of Jim Ferguson, Randy Randolph, Brian Overmyer and Rodd came in sixth in the time of 2:03.2.

Ross swims past Perkins

SANDUSKY — Ross jumped into Perkins' pool and crawled out with an 87-85 high school swim meet victory Tuesday.

"It was a barn burner," Ross Coach Art Bucci described the watery event. "It's tough to win on the road but our tankers rose to the occasion; a complete team effort was there."

The Little Giants won eight of 11 events including two apiece from Chris Black and Randy Penrod but it was the 400-yard freestyle relay that pulled it out for Ross.

The freestyle quartet of Penrod, Steve Rodd, Brian Overmyer and Black splashed to a 3:30.98, nearly three seconds quicker than Perkins' crew in the meet finale.

The meet had been deadlocked 79-79 before the final event of the day.

Black won the 200 and 500 yard freestyle while Penrod took the individual medley and the butterfly. Black took his events in 1:53.63 and

5:07.25. Penrod took the IM in 2:10.74 and the fly in 56.26 seconds.

Overmyer won the 100-yard freestyle in 52.86 seconds and Randy Randolph took the breaststroke in 1:10.20.

Ross's medley relay of Jim Ferguson, Randolph, Mark Lowther and Ty Heslet opened the Ross day with a victory in 1:53.94.

Bucci clicked off a couple of improvements from his team. "Troy Overmyer made a 20-point improvement in diving," he said, "and you can't overlook a 15-second drop in time by Dave Hetrick in the 500 free.

"Heslet," Bucci added, "was consistent in all of his swims."

Overmyer was second in diving with 177.60 points while Hetrick finished fifth in the 500 in 6:19.15. Heslet swam on the medley relay finished third in the 50 freestyle and fifth in the 100 free sprint.

Ross is now 5-3 in dual meets.

Ross sinks Margaretta

CASTALIA — Art Bucci did not go to sleep but he had to stifle a few yawns in Ross's ho-hum 106-65 victory over Margaretta Saturday in a high school dual swim meet in the Polar Bear pool.

"The times were nothing to talk about," the Ross coach said, "but we did have some great performances by our younger swimmers."

He pointed out the eight seconds drop in the 500-yard freestyle by Dave Hetrick and the seven seconds drop by Jill Isaac in the same event.

Bucci was also happy with a pair of pool records that his chargers set. Chris Black backed his way to a 1:00.4 in the backstroke and Randy Penrod cracked the Margaretta pool mark in the 100-yard butterfly with a 57.8.

Ross won eight of the 11 events.

The next meet for the Little Giants is Saturday when Sylvania Southview visits. The meet will begin at 2 p.m. in the Fremont Junior High School natatorium.

Ross tankers ease past Southview 44-39

Ross defeated Sylvania Southview Saturday in a high school swim meet that Ross Coach Art Bucci termed the best this season under the circumstances.

The circumstances in the Little Giants' 44-39 victory deal with the team's preparation for the district meets which are approximately four weeks away.

"It's the best swim meet we have had considering we are tired," Bucci said. "We have been swimming 45,000 yards a week and four and one-half hours a day because we are getting ready for the districts."

"For being a very, very tired team, it was really a good meet."

One pool and one Ross school record was set in the meet at the Fremont Junior High School natatorium.

Jim Burns of Sylvania Southview eclipsed the pool mark in the 200-yard individual medley. Burns finished the race in two minutes, six and five-tenths seconds, three-tenths of a second quicker than the mark posted by Chip Palazzo of Sandusky in 1977.

Taking second in that event was Randy Penrod of Ross with a 2:06.7 which broke the Ross school mark. Kirk Hess had held the old mark of 2:07.5 set in 1975.

Penrod came back later in the meet to win the butterfly in 55.9 seconds which equaled his school record in the event.

In the final event of the night, Ross's freestyle relay team of Penrod, Steve Rodd, Brian Overmyer and Chris Black won in 3:28.8, missing the school record by three-tenths of a second.

The Little Giants tankers won the first event of the day, the medley relay in 1:54.4. Jim Ferguson, Randy Randolph, Tad Winning and Ty Heslet made up the team.

Black followed with a second in the 200 freestyle, losing to Doug Roll of Sylvania. Roll posted a 1:52.2 and Black 1:53.0.

Overmyer gave Ross its second first place of the meet, winning the 50 freestyle in 24.5. That time was quick enough to qualify Overmyer for the district meet.

Mike Abrahamson of Southview took the diving with 166.90 points with Doug Ackerman of Ross Second with 146.85. Pernrod took the butterfly next and Ross was off a three-event sweep.

Rodd won the 100 in 53.3, the first time that he has won that particular event. Black took the 500 in 5:03.5, shading Roll by a half second in the long distance race.

Southview's Dave Steele won the backstroke in 1:04.9 with Ferguson second in 1:08.6, a two-second drop off his season best going into the meet.

The Little Giants polished off the meet with the freestyle relay win.

Ross's next meet will be against Sandusky Tuesday at the junior high pool. The first event hits the water at 6:30 p.m.
