COACH GABEL EXPECTS BIG SQUAD MONDAY

Defending League
Champs Book 18 Con-
tests; Only 7 At Home

Eddie Gabel will do the quick-change act from director of athletics to basketball coach at Ross high Monday when he expects some 35 or 40 candidates for the Little Giant varsity to report for practice.

The Purple mentor will have five lettermen, two players who saw considerable action last year and eight members of the 1941 reserve team as a nucleus for the squad that will be defending the Buckeye league title and will play an 18-game schedule, all but seven of the games on the road.

Returning lettermen will be Co-captains Glenn Bingman and Dave Brocksieker, both guards although the latter may be shifted to forward; Dick Myers and Jim Wis-bon, both c-ters, and Pete Michaels, last year a valuable utility player who saw service at every position.

Additional Material

To this nucleus will be added Norb Porczak and Rusty Overmyer, who were on the varsity squad, and Bugs Frey, Ed Seils, Len Brudzinski, Dick Rodenhauser, Bob Fox, Warren Inks, Walt Robitski and Harold Knudson, up from the reserves.

Coach Gabel expects to cut the squad down to 10 or 12 players after the first week in an effort to whip it into shape for four straight road games, the first on December 11.

Only two of the 18 games are in doubt. Coach Gabel said the trip to Hamilton depended on transportation facilities while he had not yet heard definitely from Fremont St. Joseph's in regard to their date. The schedule, at present, is as follows:

LITTLE GIANTS SURPRISED BY PORTERS, 31-26

Rossmen Lack Speed
In Inaugural; Brook-
sicker Tallys 14

The Little Giants opened the cage season down in Port Clinton last night and finished up on the short end of a 31 to 26 score, because they couldn't get going in the first two quarters.

As might be expected in the initial game, the Portmen were a bit rusty and it was this speed that marred their play last year when Snook Jenkins was roving far and wide. On the other hand, it was the fourth game for the Porters and that experience under fire was clearly apparent all the way.

Woe of the Little Giants was also bad under both bankboards the first half with their opponents monopolizing rebound play and this, to a large extent, enabled them to carry a slim going half-time lead that stood up although they were outscored in both the final chapters.

Team Promising

There was nothing wrong with the Little Giants, however, that a few more games and a couple more practice sessions won't cure. They must speed up their game, put more zip into their passing attack and polish up under-basket play, but all that should come in a hurry now that the ice has been broken.

Dave Brocksicker, shifted from guard to forward, blossomed out as a definite scoring threat, caging six action shots and a pair of free throws to pace both quintets. Glenn Bingman also played a stellar defensive game and was a key man in moving the ball down the floor.

Dick Myers was pretty much bottled up all evening by Dick Brough, lanky center, and Dick Bloom, husky forward who is also over the six-foot mark and didn't get much chance to do anything.

Bad Second Period

The Little Giants drew first blood and a pair of baskets from in close by Brocksicker gave them a 4 to 0 lead before Port Clinton evened it up. A short shot by Dick Rodenhausen put the Rossmen out in front again but a pair of buckets by Brough gave the Big Red an 8 to 6 advantage at the quarter and a lead they never relinquished.

The second quarter was bad. Four straight swift shots boosted the lead to 16 to 7 before Brudzinski's first medium long shot, but Port Clinton's short attack soon shot it up to 22 to 9 and the half ended, 22 to 13.

After the intermission, the Little Giants pulled their defense out a bit further and broke up the Porters' under-basket play and managed to pick up two points in a slow period.

Rally Is Short

Trailing, 24 to 17, they went after the game with unusual stanzas and managed to draw within four points of the leaders before a questionable foul was called on Brudzinski. Dick Selgo cashed in both ends of it and that was the turning point. A basket and a free throw by Brocksicker cut the margin to three points again in the closing minute but Dick Bloom dropped in a two-pointer to seal the verdict.

Without doubt, Coach Eddie Gabel will be able to polish up his team's play to a considerable extent before they tackle Tiffin Columbian in a Buckeye League tussle next Friday.

TORRID GAME EXPECTED AS RIVALS MEET

St. Joe Game To- night First Home Tilt For Rossmen

A torrid scrap is expected tonight when the Ross and St. Joseph's high basketball forces tangle at the Little Giants' stronghold in the first of a two-game series that will decide the city title.

Past performances have proven that previous games mean nothing when these two natural rivals get together and the games with each other have usually been the best on either schedule. For instance last year, when the Little Giants were hotter than the Sahara, they had trouble downing the Streaks by eight points, 24 to 16. Even Snooks Jenkins, who averaged almost 16 points a game for 20 tilts, was held to a lone field goal and seven points by the Streaks.

This season should not prove an exception to the past. While the Streaks have lost three games in a row and the Rossmen have broken even in two, there won't be that much difference tonight. Indications are that the two quintets will be about evenly favored at game time.

May Make Changes

Coach Eddie Gabel is starting his usual line-up of Dave Brocksieker and Dick Rodenhauser at forwards, Dick Myers at center, Len Brudzinski and Glenn Bingman at guards and doesn't expect to do much substituting.

Coach Jim Marinis, starting his first season here, was a bit undecided on his team. While he is expected to use Bob Parks and Joe Durnwald at forwards, Len Mossner at center, Bud Ochs and Bob Chudzinski at guards, he intimated that he might make several shifts. The Streaks practiced on the bigger Ross court last night and are on edge for the game.

A preliminary between the two reserve teams will get underway at 7 p. m. and aside from it being the Little Giants first home game, it is the only holiday contest on the boards here.

LOSERS LOST ON SPACIOUS ROSS COURT

Brocksieker And Ro- denhauser Pace Attack Which Started Early

Ross high Little Giants turned the first game of the 1942-43 city series into a romp last night, handing the St. Joe Crimson Streaks a 61 to 23 wallop in a game that was figured, beforehand, to be good.

Without reflecting a bit on the Streaks, the game was never a contest. Undoubtedly bothered by the larger Ross court and the bankboards suspended in mid-air, the upper Croghan street lads were never a factor. They did their best and displayed plenty of fight, but were obviously out of their class.

The inaccuracy that has marked the Streaks' play thus far this season was apparent again Tuesday night and they sank but one field goal the entire first half, a shot from the side by Bob Chudzinski shortly after the second period started.

Many See Action

The Rossmen, obviously out to run up a score, lost little time in getting started. With every member of the starting line-up scoring at least one point, the Little Giants ran up a 15 to 3 count in the first quarter. In the second, Dick Rodenhauser spearheaded an attack that made the margin 27 to 6 at halftime.

Coach Eddie Gabel substituted liberally in the second half and at one time had most of the reserve team in, but it cut little ice. The Streaks scored more points but so did the Little Giants, topping their first half efforts.

Dave Brocksieker was effective at short range while Glenn Bingman distinguished himself by sinking four shots, all from far out in the court, and playing a stellar defensive game. As if this wasn't enough, nine of the 11 Ross players who saw action cracked the scoring column.

Brocksieker High

It wasn't much of a game from a spectator standpoint and there is little use in trying to make it one. The Streaks fought, but it was a hopeless and one-sided battle.

Brocksieker, with 17 points, and Rodenhauser with 14, paced the Little Giants while Chudzinski's seven made him high for the Streaks.

It was the Little Giants first home game of the season and was witnessed by a surprisingly small crowd. It was also the last game for either team until early in January.

LONG LAY-OFF DIMS SHOOTING EYES OF CLUB

Fan-Shaped Bank- boards Also Factor In Holding Score Down

Stale from too long a lay-off and shooting against fan-shaped bankboards for the first time, the Little Giants fell before a mediocre Elyria high team last night, 24 to 16, on the latter's court.

It was the lowest score that the Rossmen had been held to in several seasons and it was largely because of their own inaccuracy, especially under the basket, where they missed untold shots. They weren't so hot from the foul line, either, cashing in on but four of 11 free throws.

The stodginess was general. The five points registered by Dick Rodenhauser made him high man for the Little Giants and their second half showing was especially dismal. Only five points were chalked up in the last two cantos, one action shot in each period, and that cost them the ball game.

The Pioneers weren't any too good on their own court although some stellar defensive play by Glenn Bingman and Len Brudzinski kept them pretty well bottled up.

Led at Half-Time

Starting very slowly, the Little Giants twice came from behind to end the first quarter in a 4 to 4 tie and then forged into an 11 to 9 halftime lead after again coming from behind on two occasions. Leading 13 to 11 in the early part of the third canto, they dropped behind, 15 to 14, as the stretch drive started.

Elyria ran the score to 18 to 14 before Walt Robitski dropped in the only two-pointer of the final quarter and then the Pioneers went on a belated scoring spurt, netting six points in the last minute to safely tuck away the contest.

It was the second defeat in four games for the Little Giants and had Coach Eddie Gabel slightly worried with the league game with Fostoria but two days away. However it may have been the warm-up that the Rossmen needed to get them back into the swing of things before the important Buckeye clash here Friday night.

Coach Gaoel took but eight men on the trip and as a result there was no Reserve game.

playing here the same night. The Little Giants are meeting Fostoria in a Buckeye league game and need a victory to claim at least a share of the loop lead with either Findlay or Bowling Green.

Strong Opposition

As for the Streaks, they will not only be meeting an old foe in Clyde, but also will be trying to break the losing streak that has seen all five games played thus far go against them.

It appears that both teams are in for torrid struggles. Fostoria has played five games and won three of them, with one of the defeats coming at the hands of Bowling Green. The Redmen have averaged 27 points a game, five less than the Rossmen, but their defensive record isn't as comparable. Opponents have averaged 35 points against them while Fremont has held the opposition to 25.

Coach Eddie Gabel said that Forward Dick Rodenhauser had missed practice this week while he doctored a cold, but that he expected him in the starting lineup tonight.

Have Won Five

Clyde looms as an even more formidable foe for the upper Croghan street cagers. In six games, Coach Art Hendricks' charges have lost but one contest, a five-point decision to Oak Harbor. They have played a fairly representative schedule for a small Class B school and have averaged 36 points per game.

This, then, is the crew that Coach Jim Marinis' cagers, with five consecutive losses charged against them, must stop. Despite this, the two quintets appear evenly matched. The Streaks have been scoring if they haven't been winning and have averaged 32 points a game.

LITTLE GIANTS TOP FOSTORIA IN SLOW GAME

Chalk Up Second League Verdict By 36-25 Score Here

The Little Giants were still sharing the Buckeye League lead today by virtue of a 36 to 25 victory over Fostoria. In a game played here last night, but credit for their lofty position should be equally divided with the visitors.

The Fremonters won their second tilt in loop competition, but they didn't look good while doing it. By no stretch of the imagination could the Friday night contest be called a good one by the standards of what is expected in a circuit that is—or has been—as fast as the Buckeyes.

Without a doubt the long lay-off from classes and too much leisure time was partly responsible. The Little Giants were far off form in their shooting, both from the court and the foul line, and their passing game was slow enough to go into ecstasies about. One of the smallest crowds on record saw the game.

Shooting Poor

But ragged as the Rossmen were, the Redmen were worse. For a capsule criticism of the marksmanship the statistics will do as well as anything. The Fremonters cut loose at the bucket 84 times and connected 15 times. The Redmen, showing little inclination to shoot, fired 34 times and made seven action shots.

At the foul line the visitors had the edge, cashing in 11 of 19 free throws while the Little Giants were making good on just half of the dozen chances they had.

It must be stated, however, that the Purple and Gold was not under high handicap. Dick Roedenhauer, out all week with a cold, didn't start and he was plainly weak when he did get in. Dick Myers collected two personals early in the game and only made sporadic appearances although he was hot while he was in there. He dropped in three fielders in rapid succession at the start of the game.

Before the game ended all of Coach Eddie Gabe's crew was playing under wraps. Walt Robitski went out on fouls, Dave Brocksieker, Myers and Len Brudzinski each had three and the others had two apiece.

Game Was Slow

The game was slow all the way, but especially in the first half. The Little Giants got away to a 9 to 3 lead, but saw it dwindle to 9 to 8 at the quarter. Fostoria made but one action shot the entire first period and only one point the second and the half ended 14 to 9 in favor of the locals.

The third period was a bit better and as Brocksieker was holding the hoop for 10 points, the Rossmen tallied 11 markers for a 25 to 17 margin. Brocksieker paced the scoring again in the final canto, in which another 11 points were scored, and the outcome was never in doubt.

Brocksieker, with 11, and Myers with 10 points, set the scoring pace with nine of the 11 Fostoria players who got into the game scoring with Feisel and Hatterman sharing "honors" with six apiece.

There is little doubt but that the Little Giants must snap out of their lethargy and round into form in a hurry if they are going to have a chance with the high-gearred Bowling Green quintet next Friday night.

MYERS CAGES 17 POINTS IN 3RD LOOP WIN

Brocksieker Accounts
For 14 As Rossman
Stay At Top Of Heap

Snapping back to the form they showed against Tiffin Columbian and running up their second highest score of the season, the Little Giants cleared another Buckeye league hurdle last night, defeating Tiffin Junior Order, 39 to 25.

The victory was their third straight in league circles and left them at the top of the heap, tied with Findlay, with Bowling Green to face yet this week.

Dick Myers and Dave Brocksieker accounted for Rossman to a well-earned victory in a game that was fast and action-packed from start to finish and saw them fight from behind to take the lead in the second stanza. Myers registered 17 points and Brocksieker 14 for their heroic efforts thus far.

While it was this pair that spearheaded the attack, they received plenty of assistance otherwise from the other six players that saw action. Stellar defensive work played a big part in the victory and Hugh Ferguson, the Home's scoring ace, was held to nine points, three of them of the gift variety, while the tall Tolson boys only caged five apiece.

Start Slowly

Dick Brogenhausen still battling a cold, didn't score a point at all with Walt Rohitski starting in his place. The Little Giants were off to a slow, and somewhat ragged, start and trailed not only at the quarter, but for all but two minutes of the entire first half.

Slowly but surely, back on their defense, and not controlling rebounds, the Little Giants let the visitors take a 10 to 6 first period lead. Brocksieker scored Fremont's first basket and the other four points were caged by Myers. Myers, Edwards, Steele, Ferguson all evening, narrowed the count with another basket at the start of the second quarter but Junior Order, counting heavily on free throws, forged to a 13 to 8 advantage before the Little Giants found their rhythm.

Dick Myers again scored from under the bucket and after Edwards had counted, he and Brocksieker dropped in two-pointers to make it 15 to 14. With two minutes to play, Dave caged a follow-in shot and then Myers sank another from the side to give the Little Giants an 18 to 15 half-time lead.

Take Control

After the intermission the game was all Fremont. Brocksieker scored 16 points and ended with six points and Myers added four to his total. Nori Porczak, sub forward, also stepped in with two action shots, both coming at times when the Juniors started to threaten. The visitors were held to five points in this stanza and that signified the end. They went to pieces.

Len Brudzinski went out on foul late in the third quarter and Coach Eddie Gabel substituted liberally in the fourth, finishing the game with Tom Bingman as the only regular in the fray. At that, they scored on even terms.

It would be hard to find fault with the play of the Little Giants after that somewhat ragged first quarter, but if there was any it was in the free-throwing department. Given 13 free throws, they converted exactly one. Myers got that in the last heat. Bingman also sank one in the fourth but somebody was over the line and it didn't count.

On the other hand, foul shooting was the Junior's forte. They caged in 11 of 20 chances which, with their seven action shots, kept them in the game at least part of the way.

BOTH TEAMS UNDEFEATED IN LOOP PLAY

St. Joe Also Sees Action, Traveling To Lima St. Rose

The cage teams of Ross and St. Joseph's high split assignments again this week with the result that the home card lists just one game—the Buckeye league clash between the Little Giants and Findlay on the former's court tonight.

While this game is on the boards, the upper Croghan street Streaks will be in Lima, playing the powerful St. Rose quintet in their only game of the week.

Fremont fans may not have any choice as to what they will have served up to them, but it will certainly be a tasty dish, seasoned with a bit of championship flavor. Neither the Little Giants nor the Trojans have been defeated in league play thus far and this is the final game of the first round.

Although all the six teams will face each other once again this season the winner of tonight's clash will have a big edge toward the title. One defeat will not necessarily put either out of the running but both need a win, the Rossmen to retain their championship and the Trojans to dethrone them.

Toughest Foe

Without a doubt the Hancock county visitors will be the toughest quintet that Coach Eddie Gabel's crew has faced as yet and they will need to be at their best to escape unwanted results.

In Ted Trask, clever little forward, Coach Carl Bachman has a fast slippery court man adept from shooting from all angles and all distances. He has been carrying the scoring load all the way and is pacing all league players in points at the present writing. In four circuit clashes he has averaged 15 points.

Against this proven point-getter will be Glenn Bingman and Lenny Brudzinski, the former perhaps the league's best defensive man and the latter ranking well up on the list.

The Rossmen have three, possibly four, scoring threats in Dave Brocksieker, Dick Rodenhauser, Norb Porczak and Center Dick Myers, but in only one game to date has more than one of them been 'on' the same night. At least two must find the range against the Trojans.

Every indication is that the game may well be the highlight of the current season insofar as the Fremont court is concerned and it should draw a capacity house.

St. Rose Strong

Coach Gabel indicated that he would start Brocksieker and Porczak at the forwards; Myers at center; Bingman and Brudzinski at guards. Coach Bachman will rely on Trask and Lawrence in the forward court, Hause at center, Steegman and, probably, Krause in the back court.

Not so much is known about the impending meeting of the two Parochial schools, St. Joseph's and St. Rose, and with gasoline rationing it probably doesn't make so much difference as few fans drive 60 miles for a game these days. The Saints bumped off Lima St. Gerard Tuesday night.

The Streaks have given evidence several times of late of breaking into the win column but so far have been unable to do it but once in seven starts. This week may see them finally break through, but they are facing a team that is usually strong although nothing is known of their record this year.

SPOTTY PLAY COSTS PURPLE LEAGUE LEAD

Little Giants Blow Five-Point Halftime Lead In First Loss

The Findlay Trojans pushed the Little Giants off the top rung of the Buckeye league basketball standings, which the two had been sharing since the campaign opened, last night.

The final score was 39 to 31 and marked the close of a game in which neither team showed to any advantage. The Little Giants, after a good start, played one of the poorest games of the season, and the Trojans weren't much better.

TRASK POSTS NEW BUCKEYE SCORING MARK

Findlay Forward Nets
136 Points; Dick Myers

Dick Myers, Little Giant center, made the mythical all-Buckeye basketball team at a guard position, a tabulation of the ballots of coaches and sports writers revealed today.

With the exception of Co-Captains Glenn Bingman and Dave Brocksieker, both of whom were given honorable mention, Myers was the only Ross player named by any of the selectors for either first or second team honors.

The first team is about as representative a quintet as could be selected with five of the six schools represented. Only Fostoria missed placing a player and not a single Redman was mentioned for either the first or second teams.

Sharing honors with Myers, who received votes for every position—forward, center and guard—on either the first or second team, are Ted Trask, brilliant Findlay forward; Capt. Gene Moore of Tiffin Columbian; big Dale Nelson, Bowling Green center, and Hugh Ferguson, flashy Junior Order guard.

Has Top Scorers

The mythical team sports the league's top scorers with one exception. Trask led the parade with 136 points, followed by Ferguson, 118; Nelson, 103, and Myers, 102. Next in line was Findlay's Bill Lawrence, with 97, but the best he could do was make the second team, with Moore, sixth ranking scorer with 88 points, beating him out.

Not only is the all-league team a representative combine, but it combines height with speed and individual brilliance in addition to great scoring power.

Both Trask and Ferguson were unanimous choices, receiving every first team vote cast. Nelson received five first team and two second team votes for center and one for guard on the second team, for a total of 18 points.

Myers also received 18 points, but his balloting was scattered, as those picking the teams apparently felt he should be worked in some place. The Little Giant pivot man pulled four first team votes, two at center and two at guard, and six second team votes, three at center, two at forward and one at guard.

Ferguson Repeats

Moore was also picked for several spots and on both first and second quintets. The speedy little Columbian, who missed several games because of illness, received three first team votes, two for forward and one for guard, and eight

second team nods, three for forward and five for guard, to amass 17 points.

Several of the players on the second five just missed making the grade. Their final totals were: Lawrence, 16; Omar Tolson, 12; Oscar Tolson, 11; Steegman, 14, and Krauss, seven.

Ferguson, who made the all-league team last year as a forward, is the only repeater. Both Myers and Nelson were on the second five last season and moved up a notch this year.
