# Redskins slips past Ross

## Bodager's tosses seal win

When the chips were down, Tom Bodager let his kid do the work.

Jason Bodager, son of the Port Clinton coach, hit two free throws with 12 seconds remaining and the Redskins survived a pair of Ross bombs for a 55-54 high school boys basketball win Friday night in the Redskins' teepee.

Port Clinton is 2-0 and Ross 0-1.

"When I put him in," the Port Clinton coach recalled, "I said, 'Jay, can you make the foul shots?'"

He did, and Dad was walking around on cloud nine.

"Again, any kid in that situation ... it's a tough place to be," Bodager said, "and you want them to respond."

Jason, Jay to his folks, had three first half points, canned a three-pointer in the third quarter and sank the key free throws to put the Redskins up 55-51. That was enough as Port Clinton survived a pair of back-to-back three-pointers in the final minute by Ross's Adam Bulger.

Bulger's first long bomb came from NBA three-point length, cutting Port Clinton's advantage to 53-51 with 20 seconds remaining. His second, also from nearly 23 feet out, came with seven seconds remaining.

On the inbounds pass, Port Clinton survived a wild scramble in which two Little Giants touched the ball but could not get control.

"We had our chance to win it at the end," Ross Coach Pat McGhee said, but pointed out that his team, "missed too many easy shots."

Some of those easy shots came

from the foul line, where the Giants were six of 17.

In the first quarter, the Little Giants had trouble missing, getting seven points from Nick Hall and hitting nine of 18 shots for a 19-10 lead. Less than a minute into the second quarter, Ross led 20-10 but the wheels began to come off at that point.

What was falling for Ross in the first eight minutes, would not fall in the final 24. What was missing in the first quarter, began to go in for the Redskins.

Bill Wight, a lanky 6-9 senior, canned eight second quarter points on his way to a game-high 18, and the Redskins went past Ross 28-27 on Eric Rumball's lay-in with 1:16 remaining in the half. Ross never led again but tied the game 48-48 with 1:54 to play on Brad Hammer's second three-pointer.

Wight's free throw 18 seconds later put Port Clinton ahead again.

Port Clinton's biggest lead was nine points, late in the third quarter.

"We could have folded when we got nine down," McGhee said, "but we played hard all night. I am pleased with the effort but we just missed a lot of shots from within 15 feet and those are shots we are capable of making."

"These kids will learn from this and will come back tomorrow (tonight against Bowling Green at Fremont)," McGhee said.

"My guys did not let up," Bodager said while sounding like McGhee, "even when they got down by nine."

"Bill Wight did a great job for us. That was a whale of a

game."

Rumball canned a trio of three-pointers, the third after a Ross turnover, giving the Redskins a 52-48 lead with 1:05 to play.

"That three-pointer he popped

was not by design," Bodager pointed out.

Rumball finished with 12 points. Bulger led Ross with 15 points and Brad Hammer had 11. Bulger and Hammer had a pair of three-pointers each.

Ross held a 46-32 rebounding advantage. The Little Giants made 22 of 63 shots and Port Clinton 19 of 46. Port Clinton had 19 turnovers, two more than Ross.

# Not pretty, but a win for Ross

An artist would not be jealous but Pat McGhee will settle for the picture his team painted Saturday night.

The Little Giants got their first victory of the season over Bowling Green 69-66 their home opener. It was a win McGhee, the Ross coach, put in perspective by describing it as "not pretty."

"It's a win, though. We'll take it," he added.

Ross, 1-1, led by as many as 11 points early in the fourth period but the Bobcats managed to come within two points late in the game.

The first period was chaotic, with both teams committing turnovers frequently.

Bowling Green, 2-2, led 14-12 going into the second. The Bobcat lead grew to 21-16 on Chris Ketner three-pointer 5:30 remaining. Ross recovered, tying at 24-24 with three minutes remaining and went ahead 26-24 on Mike McGee's turnaround jump shot. The half ended knotted at 33-33.

McGhee said he stressed execution to his players during the half.

"We told them that they had to be getting back on the boards," McGhee said. "This game was a

complete reversal from last night (Friday, the Giants lost 55-54 to Port Clinton). We played terrible in the third period last night."

Brad Hammer paced Ross to a 40-35 lead, hitting a three-pointer and a two-pointer back-to-back. Hammer finished the night with 13 points, including a trio of three-point goals.

Ross managed to hold on to a 49-43 lead going into the fourth period. Using Nick Hall under the basket and outside, Ross extended the lead to 64-53 with just over four minutes left in the game. Hall finished with 23 points.

Ross could not put the Bobcats away as Bowling Green, sparked by the three-point bombs of Ketner and the overall play of Greg Titus reduced the Ross advantage to 68-66 with 41 seconds remaining.

With Ross running a stalling offense, 6-7 senior Mike Wolfe was fouled with 16 seconds left. Wolfe made the first of two shots to put Ross up 69-66.

Bowling Green has two chances at tying the game in the remaining seconds but both three-point attempts missed, the last by Ketner was partially blocked.

"We told the players that they were gonna make a run at us," McGhee said. "They're a good team. Good teams come back."

Both Adam Bulger and Tracy Hufford fouled out for the Giants, but McGhee said the foul trouble did not worry him.

"I think we did a pretty nice job with the rest of the kids. We played 10 kids. We did a nice job getting balanced scoring. I was pleased with our depth tonight."

Titus had 24 points for Bowling Green and teammate Topher Gideon added 19.

"We expended a lot of energy in the first half," Bowling Green Coach Tom Rex said while explaining he felt his team ran "out of wind," in the third quarter.

"We played with a lot of intensity and it was a super effort. The way we finished impressed me. This was our third road game in the past five days. The (Boston) Celtics don't even play that much," Rex claimed.

# Ross opens BCC season at Findlay

Pat McGhee cannot see any real weaknesses with his Ross High School boys basketball team but he also can see no real strengths.

"What we have to do," McGhee, in his second season at Ross, said, "is improve in practice and in games each week; I guess you would call it getting more consistent."

The Little Giants split a pair of games last weekend — losing to Port Clinton 55-54 and defeating Bowling Green 69-66. McGhee felt that his team should have been 2-0.

"We had a chance to win it at Port Clinton, and when you don't win when you have a chance, you feel bad," McGhee said.

Against Bowling Green, Ross led by 11 in the fourth quarter before the Bobcats closed the

gap to two points.

"We kept putting them on the foul line," McGhee said. "You don't do that when you are leading by 11."

Tonight, the Little Giants will take on Findlay in the Buckeye Central Conference opener. The game could be billed a "battle of cellar dwellers" because Findlay was picked fourth and Ross fifth

# Ross edges Findlay in two OTs

FINDLAY — Before the Fremont Ross-Findlay basketball game Friday night, Ross head coach Pat McGhee and some assistant coaches took some antacids.

After the game, McGhee and his assistants probably needed an antacid the size of Texas.

The Little Giants needed two overtimes to defeat the Trojans 65-63. The win gives the Giants, 2-1, a 1-0 start in the Buckeye Central Conference.

"Anytime Fremont beats Findlay in anything, it's a great victory for the community," McGhee said. "It was more than

10 guys and some coaches, it was everything. We try to build our program around that idea, and tonight it paid off."

The first half gave no hint of what was to come. Both teams played ragged, with turnovers and fouls dominating the game. Ross, behind the defensive play of Adam Bulger, who blocked two shots, was able to erase a 6-2 lead by the Trojans to lead 12-8 after one period. The Giants would not lose the lead until the first overtime.

Ross stretched its lead to 18-11 midway in the second before Findlay began one of its many comebacks. Taking advantage of Ross mistakes and trips to the

foul line, the Trojans managed to even things at 22-22 just under two minutes left in the half. The Giants defense strengthened, though, and a Brad Hammer bomb for three points gave Ross a 25-22 halftime lead.

The Little Giants had a chance to put the game out of reach in the third period. Led by Nick Hall, who ended the night with 21 points, Ross stretched its lead to 41-38. Before the Giants could recover, the Trojans trailed by one, 43-42.

Both teams scored to make it 45-44, when Hall drove for a lay-up and was fouled. He hit the free-throw, giving Ross a 46-44 lead with 3:39 left in regulation.

A Findlay turnover gave Ross the ball, and Mike McGee, who ended with 16 points, scored to give the Giants a 50-44 lead, but again, Findlay came back. With Ross leading 54-51, Findlay's Rick Renz stole the ball and was fouled with 0:13 left. Renz hit the first free throw, but missed the second. The Trojan's John Neer grabbed the rebound and laid it in to send the game into

overtime.

Both teams were ineffective in the first overtime, and after three minutes, the game was tied 56-56, forcing another overtime.

After the teams exchanged baskets, Hammer hit a three-pointer to put Ross up 61-58. The Trojans closed to 61-60 but McGee was fouled and made both free throws to put Ross up 63-60.

Findlay's Jeff Bova erased all security of a three-point lead in one blow, hitting a three-pointer to even the score. Ross took the ball, worked it inside to Bulger, who hit the winning bucket with

## Ross-Lancaster clash highlights busy weekend

Pat McGhee is a realist. He knows that his Ross High School boys basketball team could be 0-3, not 2-1.

"Every game we have played," the Ross Coach said, "has been close, but we felt that would be the case at the beginning of the season. Now, the schedule is stepped up a notch."

McGhee's team will host Lancaster in a Buckeye Central Conference clash to help kick off the Ross athletic weekend. Saturday afternoon, Coach Sue Wolf's girls team will also host Lancaster in another BCC test.

Also Friday, the Ross wrestling team will begin wrestling at 4 p.m., the first of two days of competition in the Rogers Tournament at Toledo Rogers High School. Saturday, semifinal wrestling begins at 11 a.m.

McGhee comes to the point with Lancaster.

"We don't know much about them," he admitted. "That is one problem with the conference; you really don't have much to scout them on a school night."

The Golden Gales have been reduced to a moderate wind during the early season, bringing a 3-3 record into Fremont. Tues-

day, against Columbus Watter- son, Lancaster came out on the short end of a 74-63 count.

"One thing I have heard about them," McGhee said, "is they are a very good fundamental team and they have three starters back, and they have good size — 6-6 and 6-5 — inside."

Bart Leohner, Tim Graham and Tim Woodward are the Lancaster veteran starters. McGhee rates the 6-4, left-handed Woodward as the Golden Gales' best player.

Ross is coming off a 65-63 overtime victory over Findlay, a game that it led by 13 in the third quarter.

"We played well in spurts," McGhee said about that game, "and we held together pretty when Findlay made a nice run at us.

"One thing I found out in that game," McGhee continued, "is that the kids found out they could play without the big people: (Nick) Hall and (Adam) Bulger. Both of those had to to sit on the bench for most of the second quarter because of fouls but, after being behind by two at the end of the quarter, we came back and was ahead at the half."

The Ross girls game begins at 1 p.m., Saturday.

# Ross enters new territory

## Little Giants first in BCC

It was a learning experience for Ross, and Lancaster had no alibis.

The Little Giants found themselves in a dubious position atop the Buckeye Central Conference basketball standings after knocking off Lancaster 54-48 at Ross High School Friday night.

Ross, 3-1, 2-0 in the BCC, has a half-game lead over Newark, 1-0. The Golden Gales slipped to 3-4, 0-1. It is one of the few times in Ross basketball history that the Little Giants have led a conference race.

Against Lancaster, Ross appeared to be on its way to a romp, leading by as many as 18 points late in the third quarter.

The Little Giants built the big lead with a balanced attack throughout the contest.

Kevin Crawford scored six first quarter points as Ross led 13-8. Arlo Brown came off the bench to score eight second period points and the Little Giants led 32-17 at halftime.

Although Mike McGhee tossed in six points in the third quarter, the Ross lead was reduced to 44-32 after three quarters. Nick Hall scored eight of his game-high 19 points in the final quarter.

"It was very unselfish out there," Ross Coach Pat McGhee said.

Adam Bulger's bucket with two minutes remaining in the third quarter put Ross up 42-24 before Lancaster began to claw its way back.

"We weren't playing well in the first half," Lancaster Coach Tim Shumaker said. "We

changed a few things at the half but we just played harder in the second half."

McGhee said the circumstances were strange for the Little Giants.

"It was a new situation," he said. "(The Giants) have never played with a lead like that.

"We moved the ball well (to build the big lead). The players without the ball were moving. Once we got organized, the offense worked well."

Shumaker was troubled by some officiating calls and at one time, flung his tie to the floor. But he refused to lay blame on the men in stripes.

"You can alibi about the officiating and about the long trip," he said, "but they would just be alibis."


While Shumaker felt his team's stronger effort got the game close, McGhee thought different.

"I think it was more of case of we got a little tentative toward the end of the third quarter," McGhee said. "We were not executing."

Lancaster cut the Ross lead to 50-46 on Jon Holland's bucket with 1:50 left to play.

Hall hit a pair free throws before Steve Gellerstedt tipped in a missed shot with less than 25 seconds remaining. Brad Hammer sealed the Ross win with a pair of free throws with 12 seconds left.

Defensively, McGhee said a quartet of defenders — McGhee, Crawford, Bulger and Tracy Hufford — hampered the efforts of Tim Woodward, the Gales' top scorer. The 6-4 senior finished with 13, the same as Holland.

# Ross has hands full with Whitmer

Ross jumps into the fire tonight in the first round of the Northwest Ohio Holiday Prep Classic.

"I figure you are (to win it) going to have to play Whitmer some time," said Ross Coach Pat McGhee.

Ross will find out quickly if Whitmer is the team to beat, playing the unbeaten (5-0) Panthers 9 p.m. tonight in the Class AAA opener at Centennial Hall on the University of Toledo campus. The winner of the game will play the winner of the other semifinal between Toledo St. John's and Toledo Central Catholic Saturday at 9 p.m. for the

AAA title.

"The kids won't be in awe of Centennial Hall," McGhee said. "That is not our concern. Our main concern is the big front line of Whitmer. That line is 6-7, 6-6 and 6-5."

Rick Rightnower, a 6-7 senior, is the Panthers' top player according to McGhee. Rightnower signed a preseason letter-of-intent to play at the University of Toledo next season. He is averaging approximately 20 points per game.

"Rightnower plays almost everywhere," McGhee said. "He will help bring the ball upcourt and he will go inside, too. It's not going to be a one-man job stopping him."

Also on the front line is 6-6 Craig Michaelis and 6-5 Mark Szlachcic, an All-Ohio tight end this fall.

"Michaelis holds the Whitmer season record for rebounding and Szlachcic is 215 (pounds)," McGhee said, "and they have a couple of very quick guards."

Ross is riding a three-game winning streak after Friday's 54-48 victory over Lancaster. The Little Giants led by as many as 18 points.

"(Lancaster) made some key shots and we threw the ball away on a couple of consecutive possessions," McGhee said. "We have to avoid that when people make a run at us. Hopefully, it was a learning experience."

McGhee called the big lead a "new situation" for his team.

"Close games are normal situations for us," he said. "It's the big lead that is new. Hopefully, we will have that opportunity (big lead) several more times."

McGhee was pleased with players coming off the bench Friday night, pointing out the play of Arlo Brown, Mike Wolfe and Kevin Crawford.

"I thought (Tracy) Hufford rebounded well and passed well," McGhee said. "Hufford did not score but he does a lot of little things you don't notice. There are a lot of different ways to help a team."

And Ross will need all those little things against Whitmer.

# Whitmer foils Ross comeback 57-52

TOLEDO — Pat McGhee saw a meaning to something that he felt deep down was meaningless. "Comeback?" the Ross boys basketball coach asked and then answered, "It doesn't mean a thing if you don't win the game."

Whitmer, now 6-0, made it meaningless, beating Ross 57-52 in the first Class AAA game of the Northwest Ohio Holiday Prep Classic at Centennial Hall.

The Ross comeback was dramatic:

- It featured a Ross defensive effort that held Whitmer to three baskets and 16 shots in the final 16 minutes;
- It came within a point of erasing a 19-point halftime deficit;
- It featured four three-point shots;
- It softened McGhee's thinking of comeback effort.

"Actually, it does mean something," McGhee said. "It showed that we can play with this type of team. It also showed us that you have to be ready to play in the first half against teams of this caliber."

Whitmer, with 6-5 Craig Michaelis tossing in 14 points, bulled its way to a 38-17 halftime lead.

"Then we went into our Dr. Je-kyll and Mr. Hyde syndrome," Panthers Coach Rick Kaifas said. "We preach team concept but the 'me stuff' came out in the second half."

"I feel that Ross played well (in the second half)," Kaifas said. "and we played sloppy."

Mike Wolfe came off the bench to pace the Ross second half charge. The 6-7 senior scored 10 points in the third quarter, and coupled with the defensive effort, had Kaifas mumbling.

"Getting a basket?" Kaifas responded when asked if he wondered when his team would get the elusive bucket. "I was wondering if we would ever get a shot."

"In the first half, we did have a very good shot selection," McGhee said, "we seemed to be tentative but in the second half, we played the type of ball of which we are capable."

Ross chopped the Whitmer lead to 44-32 after three quarters.

The Tigers, 6-1, led 30-22 at the half but after the early second half spurt, had a 48-30 advantage. The lead never dipped below 15 from that point.

# Newark sours ending for Ross

It was a sour ending to what had been a sweet game for Ross.

Newark coupled a key defensive effort with a Ross defensive lapse in the final 10 seconds to defeat the Little Giants 50-48 in a Buckeye Central Conference boys basketball game Tuesday at Ross High School.

"We wanted to deny the ball to (Nick) Hall or Hammer," Newark Coach Gary Walters said, "because we felt they were their best foul shooters. If they had gotten the ball in, we were going to foul, but not them."

The strategy worked. Tracy Hufford could not find a Little Giant open and the Wildcats took over after the five-second violation.

"I am not going to blame anyone," Ross Coach Pat McGhee said. "All we had to do is get the ball in bounds and we did not get it in; we just did not get the job done."

Still with 10 seconds remaining and clinging to the lead, McGhee felt his team could survive.

"We had to play good defense for 10 seconds," he said, "but we had a defensive lapse."

Bob Coffey, a 6-5 senior, took advantage of the lapse, driving the right side of the lane for a layup with two seconds remaining, putting Newark up 49-48. Jeff Brown added the final point, hitting one of a pair of technical free throws when Ross called timeout but did not have a timeout remaining.

The bitter ending soured what had been a good game for Ross.

"We played exceptionally well for three quarters," McGhee said, "but we were a little tentative on offense in the fourth quarter."

"Defensively, we held them to 50 points and that is great de-

It was Ross that dictated policy in the final eight minutes, pouring in 30 points, the high water mark this season, while limiting Woodward to 15.



Moments after Buckeye Central Conference foe Zanesville stopped the Little Giants 54-51, McGhee said he felt the game yielded some positive results for his team.

"I'm very pleased with the club," McGhee said. "We had a super crowd, the kids hustled, and we improved from last week."

With all the positive aspects though, the Little Giants still fell short in a game that seemed to go their way early. In the first quarter, Giants guard Brad Hammer poured in eight points to give Ross a 14-12 advantage.

Hammer topped a trio of Ross double figure scorers with 14 points. Adam Bulger added 11 and Arlo Brown 10.

The Little Giants' good

The Little Giants, 6-8, will take on former Buckeye Conference rival Sandusky, 9-4, after having an off-night this evening. The rest may benefit Ross when the speedy Blue Streaks run into the gym.

"They are quick," Ross boys basketball Coach Pat McGhee said. "Maybe quicker than they have been in the past."

Otherwise blink, and a Blue Streak could be past a Little Giants.

Added to the quickness factor is Sandusky possesses a number of good athletes McGhee said. "When they put five guys on the floor," McGhee said, "I think they all can dunk it."

But Sandusky's quickness may dictate what defense McGhee's team uses.

"I look for us to play more

zone defense," the Ross coach said. "We will try to make them shoot from outside and then keep them off the boards."

"It cuts down on the things you are trying to prepare for," the Ross coach explained. "You have to pick one or two and hope you do them all right as opposed

to working on a whole game plan. Today, we have to review and then play it Saturday."

The game is the first of three in seven days for Ross. Tuesday, The Little Giants host Oregon Clay and travel to Marion for a Saturday date with Harding.

Saturday afternoon, the Ross girls team has a 1 p.m. game at Zanesville, 12-5 and 5-1 in Buckeye Central Conference play. Ross is 2-13 and 1-5 in BCC games. Zanesville defeated Ross 46-41 Dec. 29.

**ROSS NOTES:** In BCC stats, the Ross girls rank fifth offensively with 40.7 points per game but hold down second defense, permitting 49 per contest.

Individually, Amy Schepflin is seventh in two-point field goal and free throw shooting, making 55 of 138 from the floor for 40 percent and 43 of 74 foul shots for 58 percent. Schepflin is eighth in scoring with 10.2 average, just

behind teammate Shelley Hetrick's 10.9 ppg. Schepflin is third and Cindy Laird fourth in rebounding with 7.9 and 6.4, respectively, averages.

Hetrick leads in three-point goal accuracy with nine of 14 for 64 percent. Point guard Kim Borys leads in assists with slightly over four per game. Shannon Watts is third in assists with 2.3 per game.

In boys stats, Ross is second defensively, permitting 57 points per game and is third in offense with 56.6 per contest.

# Clay shakes Ross in two OTs

Ross boys basketball coach Pat McGhee was more concerned with his team's lack of emotion than in Tuesday's 78-67 double overtime loss to Oregon Clay at Ross High School.

The Little Giants, trailing 59-44 with less than two minutes remaining in regulation, used a barrage of three-point goals to catch the Eagles at 60 with five seconds remaining, sending the game into overtime.

"I am more disappointed in the way we played overall; we were missing the emotional element," McGhee said after his team fell to 6-10. "I am proud of the way the kids played at the end, coming back like that, but the fact is, if we had played to our potential, we would not have been in that situation."

Brad Hammer led the Little Giants' frantic final minutes, hitting a trio of three-pointers in the span. The Ross junior made five of six three-point attempts in the period while scoring 17 of his 31 points, but it was Hammer's shortest shot of the quarter that got Ross into overtime.

Hammer's rebound bucket off Tracy Hufford's missed layup with six seconds remaining tied it at 60-60. Hufford had stolen the ball from Clay's Marc Strickland near the top of the key but missed the driving layup.

The Ross comeback was ignited by Hammer's three-pointer with just under two minutes left, cutting the deficit to 59-47. There were 52 seconds left when Kevin Crawford launched a three-pointer to make it 59-50.

After a Clay timeout, the Ross defense forced two turnovers and Hammer nailed three-pointers, the last with 34 seconds left, cutting the Clay lead to 59-56.

Jim Cox hit one of two free throws, putting Ross down by four with a half-minute to play but the Little Giants' Nick Hall drove the lane for two with 18 seconds left. On the toss-in, Hufford came up with his steal and Hammer hit the tip.

"When we got a 12 to 14-point lead, I wanted to sub," Clay Coach Doug Dippman said, "but we had a couple tough calls go against us, then they hit the three-pointers and we lost the ball a couple of times against the

press."

Add that up and Ross scored 16 points in the final two minutes including 13 in the final 52 seconds.

Ross had its chances of winning in the first overtime. Hall made two of four free throws for a 62-60 lead but John Valentine's bucket brought Clay even with a half-minute left.

Hufford missed a shot with 20 seconds left but Clay's Jeff Ladd was called for charging under the Eagles basket. Ross got possession with 11 seconds to score but on the trip downcourt, the clock malfunctioned, zooming to 20 seconds. Ross had to bring the ball downcourt again but the Little Giants failed to get off a decent shot.

"We had a chance to win it," McGhee said, "but we did not get the shot we wanted. I don't know whether the clock had anything to do with it but we just did not get the shot."


Hammer was to have gotten the shot in the middle but the Clay defense would not allow any penetration, forcing Hammer to pass off to Darrin Critchet whose desperation shot at the buzzer was off the mark.

Overtime number two belonged exclusively to the Eagles. Ladd's bucket and free throw 15 seconds into the extra session gave Clay a 65-62 edge and started the Eagles on a 16-5 scoring binge. Hammer sank a pair of foul tosses but Clay ran off the next five points and the game was over. Not even Hammer's seventh three-pointer of the game with 1:03 to play could bring Ross back.

"The whole game of basketball is emotion and momentum," McGhee said. "We did not have either until those last two minutes and in the overtimes."

Outside of the comeback, there were a couple of other bright spots for McGhee's team. Freshman Todd Clark stepped into the starting lineup and scored 14 points. In the final quarter, McGhee inserted sophomore Shane McConnell into the lineup and he responded with a pair of buckets. McConnell had scored 21 points while leading the Ross junior varsity to a 69-60 win over Clay.

# Findlay's bombers at Ross

The Findlay "bomb squad" is the last regular season opponent tonight for the Ross High School boys basketball team.

Todd Jensen, Jeff Bova and Grant Haggard are the chief bombers for the Trojans. Jensen and Haggard, combined, have made 47 percent of their three-point attempts.

McGhee said the season finale is important for several reasons.

"First, it's against Findlay and I think anyone in Fremont gets excited about that," he said. "Second, you want to play well going into the tournament. You need a solid game to build on."

"Third, it is the final home game for the seniors and you want to play well in a game like that."

Ross will play Oregon Clay Tuesday at Lake High School in a Division I sectional tournament game.

NOTES: Findlay Coach Roger Renz will be after his 300th high school coaching

victory. He coached four years at Continental, seven at Defiance and the last 10 at Findlay. He is 299-143.

# Bulger's layup produces Ross win

Adam Bulger was staring at a life sentence.

"I knew if I missed that one, I would be running '7s' the rest of my life," the 6-3 Ross junior said after his layup with one second remaining gave Ross a 58-56 victory over Findlay Friday in the Ross High school gym.

"7s?" Ross Coach Pat McGhee said, "Oh, they are seven lengths of the gym in 38 seconds."

And something to avoid.

Bulger earned his reprieve, grabbing Nick Hall's missed shot and putting it back in for the game-winner.

An easy shot? Not on this night for Bulger.

"I think I missed six of them (layups)," he said, "and I was afraid of missing another one...especially that one."

He didn't, and Ross pulled off a season double, sweeping the Trojans and ending both team's

regular season with 8-12 records. Findlay's loss dropped it to 4-4 in the Buckeye Central Conference while Ross (3-5) ended a five-game conference losing streak.

Hall, who finished with a game-high 18 points, was the object of McGhee's attention after Ross had called a timeout with eight seconds left.

"We wanted to get the ball to Nick and let him play 'one-on-one' anywhere he could," McGhee said. "Bulger threw the ball into Hall, but Findlay defended it well Bulger really hustled because he got down for the rebound."

Hall's shot from deep in the left corner came up short and into Bulger's hands.

About the missed layups, McGhee said it may have been a case of Bulger trying too hard.

"He missed the first one and he may have gotten a little frustrated," he said.

Neither team led by more than

six points with the Little Giants enjoying that lead, 33-27, shortly before halftime. Hall canned 14 of his points in the first half and Brad Hammer tossed in seven of his 15.

"Hammer played a good, solid game," McGhee said.

Hammer had three three-pointers, including one that put Ross up 53-49 with three minutes to play.

Mike Wolfe's 10-foot jumper at the buzzer put Ross up 45-40 at the end of three quarters but Brian Ashworth came off the Findlay bench, and scored eight straight points to put Ross down 48-45 three and a half minutes into the final quarter. Todd Clark's free throw broke the Ross famine and the Little Giants regained the lead on Bulger's shot from the middle of the lane and Hammer's rebound shot.

Ross built a 55-51 lead but Jeff Bova hit a free throw and Todd

Jensen's bucket cut the lead to 55-54. Clark hit a free throw with 26 left but Jensen tied it with a jumper from the circle at the 12-second mark, setting up Bulger's last second stay of execution.

"The key to the game was their (Ross) offensive rebounding," Findlay Coach Roger Renz, who was deprived of his 300th win, said. "They would force shots but get the rebound for the layup."

Ross outrebounded the Trojans 43-38 with 23 of the retrieves off the offensive board.

Arlo Brown, Mike McGhee, Bulger, Hall and Wolfe shared the rebounding duties for Ross. Brown and Wolfe had two blocked shots apiece.

Jensen had 16 points but Ross cut his three-point shooting and that of Bova and Grant Haggard down to practically nothing: one of three.

"They had hit seven or eight three-pointers in each of the last
