Ross "5" Nips Alumni, 58-57

Basket By Level In Closing Seconds Ices The Verdict

Ross high school's varsity found a tougher crew of alumni on hand to welcome the season's basketball opener Tuesday in the Little Giant auditorium . . . tougher, that is, when compared with the 1955 quintet.

But John Level's long shot with 14 seconds left in the final period pulled Coach Al Ziemke's crew out in front for keeps for a close but victorious 58-57 win. Attendance was at 200.

Last year the varsity rolled comfortably to a 75-60 victory to flip the lid on the cage campaign. Last night, things were different. The alumni worked the varsity to a stiff battle, and at one point just before the first half ended, led by a 31-20 margin.

Second half saw the varsity peck away at the graduates' lead, and eventually the under-grads took over for the win.

In the opening game another crew of alumni turned out a 60-49 win over the squad that will ultimately be fashioned into the Ross reserve ranks.

Charles Houdeschell was the high point man in the first game for the Ross ranks, getting 11, but the work of Dick Baron was the pace-setter as he laced nine goals through the nets and added two gift shots for 20 markers.

Coming along in the windup game, Jack Lee picked off eight field goals and four gift shots for 20 points to pace either team in scoring. Dean Doren had 16 on four goals and eight free throws.

Only two points separated the squad as the final period started, score reading 46-44, alumni's favor at that juncture. Level, who made all of his 10 points in the final period shot for the bucket, but basket interference was ruled, the basket was missed, and officials credited two points on the infraction and the game was knotted. It was the first time since the score was 4-4 in the opening session that the varsity drew up to the alumni.

With 1:02 minutes left, Clarence (Charlie) Glover laced a fielder to make it 54-53 for the varsity. Doren hit for the alumni and it was 55-54. Jim Houghtaling hit a goal, alumni led then, 57-54. Glover picked off another goal, 57-56, and was fouled. He missed the first shot, losing a chance at the second. Then came Level's decision and that was the ball game.

Ross Rolls To 77-37 Victory Over Holland In Point Spree

First Period Close, But Big Assault Follows Into A Rout

Holland high school started out with a pretty good show of opposition Friday night in Ross high gymnasium, holding the Little Giants to a slim 13-11 lead at end of first period. But then the roof caved in, and Coach Al Ziemke's crew steamed out to a 77-37 win on a snowy night with approximately 300 in the audience.

For the Little Giants, the win was the first in interscholastic play although they stopped the

on a technical call in the closing minutes after a difference of opinion on a penalty call.

Charles Houdeschell planked in 14 points and Jim Hailey 12 to pace the Ross reserves to a 49-16 victory. Holland was held to a field goal in the first period and a fielder in the third period as a dozen Ross players saw action.

Ross isn't in action Tuesday, but travels to Fostoria next Friday for a brace of games with the Redmen.

Alumni Tuesday in a close contest. Coach Robert Sieren's Hollanders were losing their second straight in the outing.

Jack Lee took over the scoring laurels again, getting 23 on 10 fielders and three gift shots. Fred Middleton followed him with 19 and Al Price, who entered in the third period for his first appearance, bagged 10 on five fielders. That trio was the only double-figure scorers for Ross last night.

Lee's two buckets and Clarence Glover's single goal in the first period helped Ross stay 6-6 with Holland. Then John Level put in a lay-up shot, Ross went out front 8-6 and held the lead the rest of the game.

At one point in the final period, with 1:19 minutes remaining, Ross held a jumbo-sized 42 point lead. In the third period Holland was snuffed out without a field goal. The team bagged a point on Summerville's gift shot with 0:51 seconds remaining, only factor that prevented the white-washing that period.

Ross' richest rewards were reaped in the third period as they got 25 points with Lee and Price each hitting eight for the cause.

Glover picked off his fifth personal foul with Ross leading 63-29 in the final session and was excused from the game. Marv Miller was lost to Holland in that period on the five foul ruling. Price was benched by the referees

McDonald's Goal Nips Little Giants

FOSTORIA, O. Freezing the ball for the last minute of the final period, Fostoria high's Redmen carried the game with Ross into a double overtime Friday before edging the Little Giants by a 44-42 score on the winner's floor.

Doug McDonald laced the shot through the nets with 1:39 minutes of the second overtime to win the game for Coach Art Wilson's crew, taking the second victory in two starts.

Ross is at one win, one loss now after the Holland victory for the inter-scholastic opener. Coach Al Ziemke's team held a one point lead at end of the first period and a four point, 19-15 lead at the half, but slipped behind by a point after the third period ended.

With 1:25 left in the fourth period, Mark Walter hit the bucket that tied the score at 42-42 and sent the game into overtime. Nothing was scored in the overtime session and the game went into another session, Fostoria getting two points on McDonald's bucket.

Walter made 10 free throws in the second half and added a bucket to get high scorer honors with 12, while John Level had 10 on five fielders for the runnerup honors. Jack Lee was held to four last night after getting 20 and 23 in the first two games.

Fred Middleton and Phil Page went out of five fouls, Middleton in the end of the third period and Page with 1:18 of the fourth remaining.

By way of coincidence, it is noted that two years ago on the Fostoria court, Ross eked out a one point overtime win over the Redmen; last night the tables were turned.

Fostoria also took the reserve game with Jim Halley getting 14 points and Charlie Houdeschell bagging 10 for one-two scoring honors for Coach Paul Raines' team.

Clyde high school's Flyers worked effectively in the fourth quarter from the free throw line, when the pressure was on, and came up with a tight 53-52 victory over Sandusky St. Mary's in a Sandusky Bay Conference meeting on Clyde's floor.

Six foul shots, four for four by Norm Noss, and two bagged by Jerry Gray in the final period set up the points that took the game in the closing moments.

For Clyde the win was the first against one loss in league play and the second win in two starts. Coach Ed Wagner's Panthers lost the second in two starts and first in league play against no wins.

Noss was the high pointer for Clyde getting 14 on six goals and two free throws, while Larry Cappuccini had 22 as the game's pace-setter for St. Mary's.

In Lakeside's gym, the Stone crushers broke the victory drought by getting their first win against Gibsonburg by a 64-67 margin after grabbing off a 35-27 intermission lead.

Fremont Reserve Team Handed Loss By 62-46 Margin

LORAIN, O. — Ross high's Little Giants, who had a 10 loss, no win record in the Buckeye Conference last season, went against Lorain's Steelers Friday on the latter's court, and gave the Steelers a time of it before falling 64-58. The Steelers, by the way, had a 9-1 record last season and ended up as league champions.

In the preliminary game the Ross reserve five lost a 62-46 encounter as Coach Paul Raines' spares had a rough time finding a place as the leader all evening.

Lorain entered the game smarting under successive setbacks by Cleveland Glenville and Mansfield, and was searching hard for that first win in the kickoff to conference play.

Ross trailed by only three points at the half and at the start of the fourth period had only two points on the deficit side which kept them from holding their own on even keel with the Steelers of Coach Al McConihe.

An extra spurt in the final session, however, brought home the win for Lorain as they got four more points than Coach Al Zienke's quintet, which now has a two win, two loss season going, including the alumni victory. In loop play Ross holds a 0-1 record.

Ross traded points evenly with Lorain until shortly before the first half ended and the score was knotted 27-27. Ron Ferlic, at 6'4", dunked in two free throws at the point and the Steelers made their break for the lead which they didn't relinquish.

John Level hit the high scoring leadership for Ross, getting 14 trailed closely by Jack Lee with 14 and Clearance Glover who had 13. Lane Becker had 12 to round out the foresome of Little Giants who had double figure scoring for the Rossmen. Ferlic stayed abreast of Level in scoring, also getting 15 while Bill Fazekas had 14 as runnerup.

Fred Middleton, who entered the game second in Ross scoring with 31 points to 48 for Lee, the leader, bowed out in the fourth period on the five foul ruling, but was shut out of points during his play.

Tall Bob Anderson, Ross' 6'6" reserve pivot man, had 17 points to pace the team while Charles Houdeschell had 14 as runnerup. The reserves lost their third game in four starts.

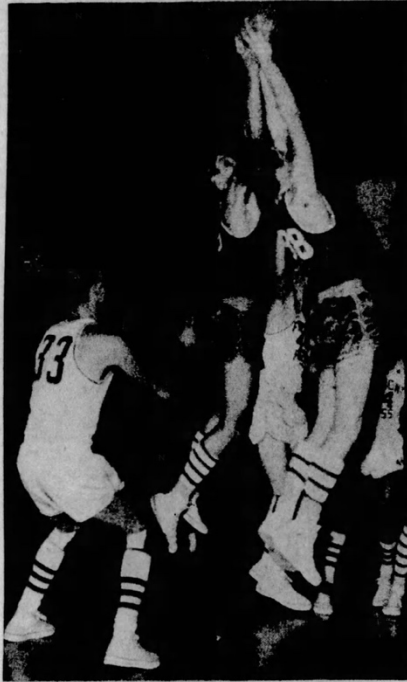

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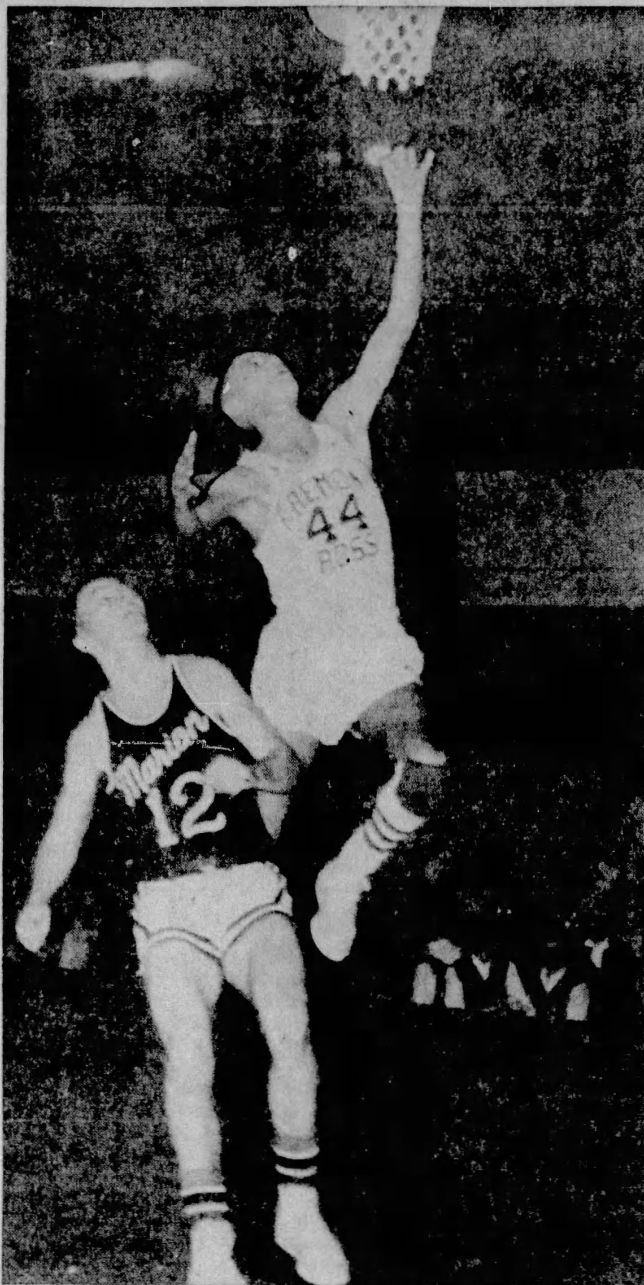

The basketball shoes gave the Giants solid footing on the hard field and they broke away fast. The Bears wore similar shoes but they had rubber cleats.

Giant fullback Mel Triplett who gained 71 yards in 13 carries, smashed through the middle for 17 yards and the first touchdown, bowling over umpire Sam Wilson.

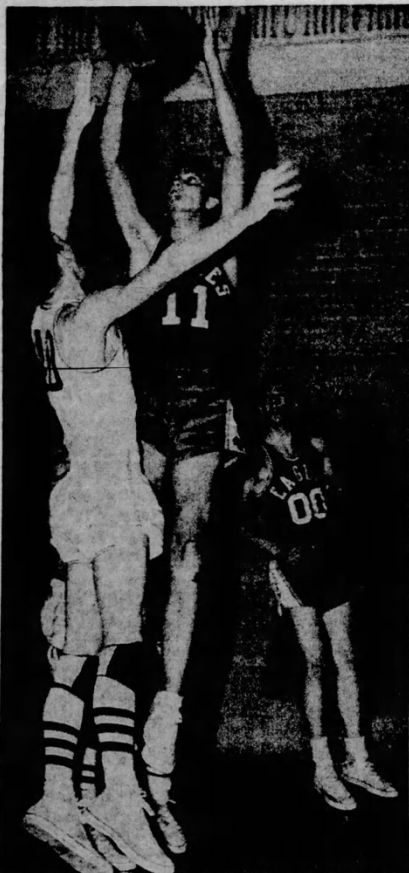

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Less than three years after he launched his professional boxing career, young Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif., believes he is ready to meet Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson.

"I think I could fight Patterson now," the 24-year-old Machen told sports writers Friday night after he had pounded his way to a unanimous decision over Joey Maxim, the former light heavyweight champ and the only man who ever beat Patterson.

"But my next move is up to my manager (Sid Flaherty)," Machen added. "I'll do whatever he says." Flaherty has indicated that he won't rush Machen into a title fight.

Already the No. 3 contender in the heavyweight division, Machen now has won 20 straight professional fights, 14 by knockouts.

The quick - handed Californian almost made the 34-year-old Maxim his 15th kayo victim.

He rocked Joey with two left-right combinations in the seventh, bounced him off the ropes with another right and sent him to his corner bleeding freely from a cut over his left eye.

In the ninth, Joey went down under a right hook to the jaw for a count of nine, and he needed all his wealth of experience to stave off Machen and last out the round.

Judge Gus Jacobson scored the 10-round 99-90 in Machen's favor, Judge Fred Aaronson 97-93, Referee Eddie Coachman 98-94 and the Associated Press 99-93.

There was no local blackout of the nationally televised and broadcast fight but 3,508 fans turned out, paying a gross gate of \$12,220.

Maxim came in at 192½ pounds, several pounds over his best fighting weight. Machen scaled 190½.

Billy Brown, matchmaker for the International Boxing Club, said last week that Machen's next fight would be with Harold Carter, the No. 5 heavyweight contender, in Madison Square Garden next month.

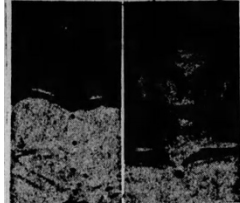
