# Ross Wins District Swim Title

Qualifying 12 boys for the state finals next week end at Ohio State's fine natatorium, Ross high's Little Giant swimmers won the district title Friday afternoon at Bowling Green State university. Ross counted 110 points against 88 for Sandusky and 12 for Lima Senior high.

Coach George Gruse's boys took three individual events—getting one, two, three in the 100-yard breast stroke and 100-yard back stroke, and also knocked off the

200-yard medley relay.

Sandusky took four individual firsts, plus the 200-yard free style relay, Ross being six-tenths of a second behind the Blue Streaks in the latter event. Lima failed to score a first or second, getting only a third in the 50-yard free style and, of course, third in the relays. This year's team is the first Lima has had.

## Youngsters Pile Points

A check through the summary sheet would indicate that the Ross

tank squad will be a tough one for a long time to come. Al Hetrick, a senior, won first place in the 100-yard free style, and other seniors, John Baxter, Tom Hite, Bill Gwinup and Ed Nickel, were a big help in piling up points. However, Gruse's underclassmen, including three sophomores in the 150-yard medley, a junior and two sophomores in the 100-yard breast stroke, a sophomore, freshman and junior in the 100-yard back stroke, two freshmen and a junior diver, came through to run up the score to help win the district trophy.
