# Ross Enters BC Sports Day

## Berra In Hero's Role For Yankees After Goat Action

Scores Four Runs Against Cleveland; Lemon Loses First

CLEVELAND (AP)—Idle today, the Cleveland Indians were still in first place, but their five-game winning string was over and so was Bob Lemon's pitching victory chain of five in a row.

The New York Yankees jumped on Lemon for four runs in the eighth inning last night and then added three more in the ninth off Ray Narleski to come from behind and win, 11-5.

The Yankee hero was none other than the goat of Tuesday night's game here—catcher Yogi Berra.

This is what the squat Yankee catcher, the Bombers' "big man," did last night: Scored four runs himself, got three hits and a walk in five at-bats, and drove in two runs. In the third inning he hit his third homer of the year into the right field seats with none on.

Lemon, who started last season with six victories, yielded three runs in the first inning in a rally that included a walk, a wild pitch, and singles by Hank Bauer, Berra and Joe Collins. Then he appeared to regain his control and except for Berra's homer in the third put the visitors down 1-2-3 for six straight innings.

## Schools Compete Friday At Marion

All member teams of the Buckeye Conference, newly-formed a year ago, will be meeting as a complete unit in athletics Friday at Marion when the First Annual Sports Day is presented.

Fremont Ross will have a tennis, track and golf team competing in the daylong program of activities, according to John Titsworth, faculty manager of athletics.

Competing in the variety program along with the Little Giants will be Findlay, Lorain, Elyria, Marion and Sandusky.

In addition to the three sports listed above, there is also to be a round of baseball played. Ross, however, lost a qualifying round last week to Marion, 5-3, and thus was eliminated from further diamond action. Marion has been scheduled to play the winner of the Lorain-Elyria game.

### Starts At 10 a. m.

The day's program opens at 10 a. m. when the tennis teams break into play with two singles players from each school and one doubles team allowed to enter.

At 1 p. m. the golfers take to the fairways and meet in medal play. Then at 3:30 p. m. preliminaries in track begin with field events to start at 5:30 p. m. and track finals at 7:30 p. m.

Baseball action gets under way at 3 p. m.

Foursome to round out the Little Giants' squad will include Blair Frazier, Charles Lamb, Tom Rollins, and John Stahl.

## Marciano Floored By Sparring Mate

CALISTOGA, Calif. (AP)—Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano was "properly nailed" and floored yesterday by a sparring mate's left hook to the jaw.

"It was a knockdown, no question about it," said Peter Wilson, of the London Daily Mirror. Wilson was one of five British boxing writers watching Rocky work out with Toxie Hall, of Chicago, a 200-pounder.

There was no question, either, that the second knockdown in Rocky's career couldn't have come at a better time in the buildup for Marciano's May 16 title defense against British challenger Don Cockell in Kezar Stadium.

Rocky, floored by Jersey Joe Walcott's left hook for a four count in the first round of their Sept. 23, 1952, title fight, is a heavy favorite to beat Cockell by a knockout.

Manager Al Weill, seemingly surprised at seeing Rocky on the canvas in a training workout with 16-ounce gloves, recovered quickly to exploit the punch.

"It only goes to show," he said, "that anything can happen when two men are in there swinging."

Wilson, telling what he saw, said, "Both men threw left hooks. It was Hall's that landed."
