Ross Enters BC Sports Day

Berra In Hero's Role For Yankees After Goat Action

Scores Four Runs
Against Cleveland;
Lemon Loses First

CLEVELAND (AP)—Idle today, the Cleveland Indians were still in first place, but their five-game winning string was over and so was Bob Lemon's pitching victory chain of five in a row.

The New York Yankees jumped on Lemon for four runs in the eighth inning last night and then added three more in the ninth off Ray Narleski to come from behind and win, 11-5.

The Yankee hero was none other than the goat of Tuesday night's game here—catcher Yogi Berra.

This is what the squat Yankee catcher, the Bombers' "big man," did last night: Scored four runs himself, got three hits and a walk in five at-bats, and drove in two runs. In the third inning he hit his third homer of the year into the right field seats with none on.

Lemon, who started last season with six victories, yielded three runs in the first inning in a rally that included a walk, a wild pitch, and singles by Hank Bauer, Berra and Joe Collins. Then he appeared to regain his control and except for Berra's homer in the third put the visitors down 1-2-3 for six straight innings.

Schools Compete Friday At Marion

All member teams of the Buckeye Conference, newly-formed a year ago, will be meeting as a complete unit in athletics Friday at Marion when the First Annual Sports Day is presented.

Fremont Ross will have a tennis, track and golf team competing in the daylong program of activities, according to John Tittsworth, faculty manager of athletics.

Competing in the variety program along with the Little Giants will be Findlay, Lorain, Elyria, Marion and Sandusky.

In addition to the three sports listed above, there is also to be a round of baseball played. Ross, however, lost a qualifying round last week to Marion, 5-3, and thus was eliminated from further diamond action. Marion has been scheduled to play the winner of the Lorain-Elyria game.

Starts At 10 a. m.

The day's program opens at 10 a. m. when the tennis teams break into play with two singles players from each school and one doubles team allowed to enter.

At 1 p. m. the golfers take to the fairways and meet in medal play. Then at 3:30 p. m. preliminaries in track begin with field events to start at 5:30 p. m. and track finals at 7:30 p. m.

Baseball action gets under way at 3 p. m.

Foursome to round out the Little Giants' squad will include Blair Frazier, Charles Lamb, Tom Rollins, and John Stahl.

Jack Decker said that the tennis players will include Bill Bowlus, Larry Harris, for the doubles team; and Charles Montgomery and Henry Warner.

Covering the athletes who will compete in the track events, Mackey said that Dick Sabroske, Ward Sewell and Ken Shaffer will be in the 120 high hurdles.

Jim Tiller and Pat Shanahan are in the 100 yard dash; and the mile will feature Ross's Jim Hasselbach, Dick Stevens and Dan Wasserman.

Bill Smiley, Walter Hurse, Pat Shanahan and Beebe Schneider are to be in the 880 yard relay running with Dick Beal and Horace Sewell in the 440 yard.

On the 180 low hurdles will be Shaffer and Ward Sewell.

In the half mile run it'll be Dick Zilles and Ken Stull, with Tiller and Shanahan in the 220 yard dash.

Beal, Shaffer, Zilles and Horace Sewell will team up in the mile relay. Dave Wolshuck is to be in the shot put competition, and will also enter the discus with John Goodeman.

Bill Daugherty will be the lone Ross pole vaulter in the running. Sylvester Burel and Tiller have been listed for the broad jump event and both will also see action in the high jump.

Marciano Floored By Sparring Mate

CALISTOGA, Calif. (AP)—Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano was "properly nailed" and floored yesterday by a sparring mate's left hook to the jaw.

"It was a knockdown, no question about it," said Peter Wilson, of the London Daily Mirror. Wilson was one of five British boxing writers watching Rocky work out with Toxie Hall, of Chicago, a 200-pounder.

There was no question, either, that the second knockdown in Rocky's career couldn't have come at a better time in the buildup for Marciano's May 16 title defense against British challenger Don Cockell in Kesar Stadium.

Rocky, floored by Jersey Joe Walcott's left hook for a four count in the first round of their Sept. 23, 1952, title fight, is a heavy favorite to beat Cockell by a knockout.

Manager Al Weill, seemingly surprised at seeing Rocky on the canvas in a training workout with 16-ounce gloves, recovered quickly to exploit the punch.

"It only goes to show," he said, "that anything can happen when two men are in there swinging." Wilson, telling what he saw, said, "Both men threw left hooks. It was Hall's that landed."

1st Annual Sports Day For Buckeye League Is Success

Ross Track Team Has Top Showing Of Local Entries

With all six member teams of the Buckeye Conference competing Friday at Marion in the first annual Sports Day, Fremont Ross merged fourth in track, finished sixth in golf and the tennis team lost out in opening rounds of competition.

Reports from Marion stated that the event was one of the highpoints of the spring sports program there and was described as a highly successful venture in the newly-formed conference.

First place in track went to Marion Harding's squad which garnered 85 points. Others to place included: 2. Sandusky, 41; 3. Elyria, 27; 4. Fremont Ross, 23; 5. Findlay, 16 and 6. Lorain, 15.

In golf the top honors went to Findlay's foursome which posted 325 for the low score. Harry Lane, of Findlay, scored the low medalist winner total of 77. His teammate, Bob Morris came through with a 78. Only other player to go below 80 was Willie Peptone, of Sandusky, who posted a 79.

Other standings in golf were: 2. Sandusky, 325; 3. Marion, 338; 4. Elyria, 342; 5. Lorain, 358 and 6. Fremont Ross, 379.

Tennis results include: Ron Meyers, Sandusky, winning the singles match by stopping his teammate, John Routh. Doubles team from Elyria consisting of Bob Davis and Joe Strong won over Findlay.

There was also a round of baseball played with Lorain coming up with the win defeating Marion, 5-1. Ross did not enter this competition as the Little Giants of the Coach Lawrence Doren were eliminated last week in qualifying rounds.

First in the track for Ross were gained by Jim Tiller who covered the 100 yard dash in 18.1 seconds and took first place in the 220 yard dash with a time of 22.4 seconds.

Looking into the day's competition for the Ross tennis team, reports show that Coach Decker's players lost in two singles and in a doubles playoff.

Henry Warner was defeated by Steve Link, of Lorain, 7-5, 6-2 and Gary Shilling was defeated by 10-7, Blackford, of Findlay by scores of 6-1, 6-4.

Going out into doubles play Larry Harris and Bill Bowlius, needed earlier to meet Findlay in the final, ran into misfortune when Bowlius turned an ankle and was handicapped as the Ross team lost to Elyria by 4-6, 6-4 and 6-4 counts.

Ross netters doubles play were lining up in good stead, according to Jack Baron, former tennis player at Ross when Bowlius had the ankle incident which cut across their leading play to that point. Baron followed the Ross men through the entire day's action and reported that all six teams saw action in the conference net state.

Individual results in the golf showed that Ross' Blair Traylor toured Mardel Country Club in Marion with an 85, getting 44 out and 41 on the way in to lead the local linksmen.

Charles Lambh posted a 93 and second honors. Third was Tom Rollins with a 94 and John Stahl carded 107 to complete the Little Giants' foursome.

Taking the golf team to the Sports Day were J. Howard Wingard and Tom Stahl, the latter of whom kept scores of local action. Stahl said that the foursomes included a Ross, Findlay, Marion and Elyria player in each. Sandusky and Lorain arrived later to tee off in the day's action.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — This is the day Nashua, the odds-on favorite, answers the big question in the 81st and richest of all Kentucky derbies.

The opinionated bay colt from William Woodward's Belair stud places his enviable record of 10 victories and two seconds in 12 races on the line against nine other razor-sharp 3-year-old horses at 4:30 p.m. EST.

And at the end of the mile and one-quarter, a colorful \$25,000 added test of speed and stamina, some 100,000 spectators and the unseen television and radio audience should know whether Nashua is worthy to have his name written alongside the truly great of the turf.

Many already have attached the label "great" to this royally bred son of Nasrullah.

But there are others who ask that the pride of Belair, conditioned by 80-year-old Sunny Fitzsimmons and ridden by Eddie Arcaro, prove himself again today in the country's No. 1 glamor horse race. They asked him to do it against such worthy rivals as Summer Tan of Galloway, Ohio, Swaps and the one-two punch of Racing Fool and Flying Fury.

There's no doubt but what he'll be the choice of the crowd packed in the rambling stands extending for five-sixteenths of a mile and overflowing into the infield. He opened at 4 to 5 in the betting.

Some of the experts even have predicted that Nashua will endanger Whirlaway's derby record if the early pace is fast enough. Whirlaway set up the race standard of two minutes, one and 25 seconds in 1941.

If all of the 10 overnight entries are in the post parade as the bands strike up "My Old Kentucky Home", the winner will bank a net of \$108,500 of the gross purse of \$152,500.

For Nashua this would mean a jump in total earnings to \$585,840. Nashua rates his lofty position as the horse to beat today chiefly because of his triumphs over Summer Tan, the 2 to 1 second choice.

Swaps, third choice at 5 to 1, gets his big boost from Californians, where he won the Santa Anita Derby.

Racing Fool, working on a string of four straight victories including the recent Blue Grass stakes, is the speed horse of the team. Flying Fury, victor in Tuesday's derby trial, is best in the late stages of a race.

Making up the remainder of the field are: Jean's Joe, Honey Alibi, Nebona, and Trim Destiny.
