LASSIES FROM WOODVILLE IN GREAT VICTORY

A group of lassies from Woodville town came to the county seat last night to participate in the basketball carnival at Ross gym, stage one of the features in the preliminary contests supplementary to the Little Big Seven tangle between Fremont and Sandusky.

These Woodvillian girls not only came to town in the way of transportation but they also came into town by reason of a victory, surprise, upset and astonishing defeat of the Fremont Lassies. It was the first time the Fremont basketballettes have been given a trimming on their own floor in many a year and the setback was administered in a neat and convincing manner.

The early scrimmages of the initial quarter indicated that Woodville was no set-up and when the period elapsed and the count was five all, the folks in the pews, among them some Woodville boosters, realized that a considerable ball game was in the making.

A little Miss Kelly was doing most of the bucketing for the visitors while another small, clever lass, Miss Demmel, was keeping Fremont in the game and missing lots of buckets besides. Miss Demmel shot six fielders and two charity tosses during the contest, but real hard luck, Friday the thirteenth stuff, evidently trailed her. The ball would not stay put when she hurled it bucketward at least a dozen times, although it played merry-go-round and high wire walker along the rim of the basket only to fall out instead of in.

Miss Kelly had an able aid in a Miss DeMuth who shot five sizzlers from the floor and sank a pair from the donation ribbon. These two girls shot their team into the astonishing victory, although Miss Littler hoisted in a foul and a floor shot.

The half time accounting was 15 to 12 in favor of the girls from Woodville but it was still anybody's ball game. Woodville, the Kelly-DeMuth combination boosting the apple, held its lead 23 to 19 and the half. The Misses Demmel, Benner and Mooney tried to shoot it out with the Woodville targeteers but they were off the range time and time again, some of them easy shots, too.

Another factor in the Woodville victory was the work of Miss Graham on the guard line. This player, sister of the famous Graham brothers of Woodville high basketball team, was in the game at all times and starred in working the ball out of the danger zone and getting it back to the Woodville sharp shooters. Fremont's defense also worked well at times, Miss Empke doing a good job, but the Woodville forwards percolated the point getters through gaps in the wall and that's that. It was a fast game, an interesting contest and one that gave the crowd its best entertainment of a long evening of caging.

Miss Jackson shot her team out in front at the third quarter returns which registered 30 to 26, but the Fremont combination, displaying plenty of the old fight and determination, came right back and displayed the real Amazon spirit, standing toe to toe with the home towners and exchanging shot for shot. In this hectic quarter the score was tied no less than six times and the crowd was in the throes of heart twisting excitement until the Fremont Lassies twinkled like a flock of stars, put the final point in the old bucket and won by a slender edge, but they won and that's that.

The Fremonters showed great improvement over their last appearance when they dropped a game to Woodville.
