The Rossmen are tentatively scheduled to open April 11 with the inter-class meet. They triumphed in six of seven dual meets last year.

Myron Robertson Cops Three Firsts In Annual Affair

Scoring a clean sweep on all firsts, the seniors soundly trounced the three underclass squads in Ross high school's first annual inter-class meet at Harmon field Monday.

In addition to garnering the 14 firsts, the seniors also added six seconds and five thirds for a 93-point total, while the juniors trailed with 26, followed by the sophomores with six and the freshmen with a single third, that in the mile relay.

Myron Robertson was the individual standout as he posted victories in the 120-yard high hurdles, 220-yard low hurdles, and high jump, in addition to running the second leg on the winning half-mile relay team.

Bob Sampsel and Herb Wright were two-time winners, with the former bagging the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes, while Wright clicked in the shot put and discus throw.

Bob Semer copped the mile run, Fred Stetzel broke the tape in the 880-yard event, John Ballenger annexed the broad jump, Don Sheely the pole vault, and Bernie Kellogg took the 440-yard dash.

Dick Mohler, Ballenger and Sampsel joined Robertson in taking the 880 relay while Kellogg, Dick Schell, Stetzel and Jack Barlow teamed for the mile relay.

Walter Weinhardt paced the juniors with runner-up points in the shot put and discus.

The Little Giant varsity will trek to Lima Central Friday for their first dual meet of the season and are tentatively scheduled to formally open the home campaign against Lima South Tuesday, April 22.

Ross Track, Net Teams Post Victories At Lima Central

Dominating the first place awards, Ross high school's Little Giant trackmen journeyed to Lima Friday afternoon for their first dual meet of the season and a 64-54 victory over Central.

The Rossmen copped 10 of the 14 events while the Dragons nearly pulled the meet out of the fire through their ability to pick up second and third place points.

Meanwhile, Bill McConnell's tennis team was racking up its second successive triumph, a 4-1 job, over Central's netters.

Doubles victories by the Ted Hilty-Bob Bodenlos (6-3, 6-3 over Dean Bacon and Jim Stapleton) and Dick Baron-Lloyd Bischoff (6-3 in a single clash over Bob Tschantz and Ted Stapleton) combines iced the outcome.

Hilty copped a 6-1, 6-4 decision over Tschantz in the singles while Baron was forced three sets to down Jim Burkholder, 4-6, 6-4, 6-2. Bischoff bowed in a heart-breaker to Ted Stapleton, 10-12, 5-7. The latter was the longest match of the year for a Giant netter and probably one of the longest in the school's tennis history.

Robertson Clicks

The track victory was fashioned through 10 firsts in the 14 events with lanky Myron Robertson setting the pace with triumphs in both hurdle events, the broad jump and high jump. Bob Sampsel copped the century and 220-yard dashes as well as anchoring the 880-yard relay team to victory.

Other firsts were taken by Bob Semer in the mile run; Walt Weinhardt in the discus and Don Sheeley in the pole vault.

Parker Blubaugh, Central's all-Ohio backfield candidates, picked up three seconds and a third to pace the Dragons who finished on top only in the mile relay, 440-yard dash; half-mile run and shot put.

Following Bob Brickman's triumph in the latter event, the score stood Ross 47; Lima 44. But Sheeley soared to an even 10 feet in taking the pole vault while Robertson gained the nod in both jumping events to clinch the outcome.

Ross Garners Only 3 1-2 Points In Class A

Clyde's surprising Fliers romped to their second successive Class B championship at the annual Toledo DeVilbiss Night Relays Friday by edging Oak Harbor, the favorites, 54 1/5 to 46-1/6.

The host Tigers likewise garnered their second straight title by compiling 78 1/3 points to far outdistance the Class A field where Fremont Ross finished in 12th place with 4 1/2 points.

Myron Robertson was the lone point-maker for the Little Giants, garnering fourth in the 120-yard high hurdles and deadlocking for third in the high jump.

LITTLE GIANTS MEET ASHLAND

Newest innovation of the local track season will be inaugurated at Harmon Field Tuesday evening when the Little Giants of Ross high collide with Ashland in a twilight dual meet.

Coach Lester Binkley's squad, bulwarked chiefly by seniors, finished 12th in the Toledo DeVilbiss night relays, but are unbeaten in dual meets thus far.

Similarly, the A's haven't yet tasted defeat in a two-team meet, and appeared possibly better balanced than the Rossmen off comparative performances in the Newark and Wesleyan Relays.

Scheduled to get under way at 6:15 p. m., the meet was moved back in an effort to revive spectator interest in a sport which formerly held a leading position among scholastic springtime activities.

A similar experiment at Mansfield recently resulted in a turnout of some 1,200 fans.

Barring further rains, the track will be in "good" condition, a little soggy but not too wet to prevent fair times.

LITTLE GIANTS COP TWILIGHT CINDER MEET

**Rossmen Gain 62-56
Verdict In Last
Event**

Showing exceptional balance in the field events, Ross high school's Little Giant cinder squad copped a 62-56 decision from Ashland at Harmon Field in a twilight meet Tuesday.

The event was an innovation for local scholastic cinder circles and attracted approximately 200 fans. It was in doubt until the final event, the broad jump, where a second place by John Ballenger clinched the outcome.

The Rossmen swept the shotput and the discus throw as the A's showed surprising strength in the dashes and relays.

Myron Robertson sent the Little Giants off into a lead by annexing the 120-yard high hurdles when George Davis of Ashland tripped over the fifth hurdle, was thrown off-stride and fell while taking the sixth jump while leading by five yards.

Davis was later disqualified in the 220-yard low hurdles, where he and Robertson fought a bitter stretch dual, for too many false starts.

Robertson Stars

Jesse Poorbaugh copped the 100 and 220-yard dashes for the visitors and anchored the 880-yard relay team to a scant foot victory. For the Rossmen, Robertson was the individual stand-out, winning, in addition to both hurdle events, the high jump and placing third in the broad jump.

Jim Purdy of Ashland copped the pole vault with a leap of 10' 7" after which he passed further tries as darkness descended over the Harmon Field layout. It was the best vault of the year by an opponent of the Little Giants.

George Dever annexed the mile run by a 30-yard margin from Bob Semer in 4:55 but finished second to Fred Stetzel in the 880-yard run when the latter uncorked a sprint, 150 yards from the tape to win easily.

Sam Sims walked off with the shotput with a heave of 41' 7" and Herb Wright won the discus with a throw of 123' 4 1/2".

The most thrilling race on the card was the 880-yard relay where Dick Ackerman gave the A's a huge first-leg lead against Johnny Auxter only to see Tex Frey and John Ballenger cut the distance while competing against Jim Kilcher and Dick Burns. Sampsel took the lead on the turn for home of the anchor leg but Poorbaugh unleashed a sprint while on the outside to gain a scant victory.

Tom Slingman won the 440-yard dash in easy fashion while Bob Drebus took the broad jump. The mile relay resulted in another easy win for the Orange and Black as Ackerman, Shannon, Talley, Burns and Slingman teamed for a 3:47.1 effort.

LITTLE GIANTS SCORE VICTORY IN TRACK MEET

Rossmen Sweep Three Events Against Fostorians

Scoring a clean sweep in three events and coping firsts in eight others, Les Binkley's Ross high tracksters walloped Fostoria 90 to 28 in a dual meet Wednesday afternoon at Harmon iFeld.

The meet was originally slated for Tuesday evening but was rained out. Threatening skies resulted in officials advancing the starting time from 6 to 4 p. m.

Times were exceedingly slow due to the water-soaked track at the home of the Little Giants.

In only the dashes and broad jump were the Fostorians able to break the strangle hold of the Little Giants on the first place awards. Carlos Jackson, dusky speedster, copped the century in the slow time of 10.8, while Pug Lowmaster took the 220 in 24.8. Jackson repeated in the broad jump with a leap of 19'3".

Fostoria was able to pick up other points in only the 440-yard dash, 220-yard low hurdles, high jump, mile run and discus.

Sweep Opener

Meanwhile, Myron Robertson sent the host Rossmen off to a flying start with a 16.9 triumph in the 120-yard high hurdles, with teammates Dick Mohler and Johnny Schaffer trailing in second and third places.

The Fremonters also swept the pole vault where Glenn Pocock and Don Sheely deadlocked for first place at 9'9" with Jim Shannon third, and the shotput where Sam Sims tossed the iron 41'1 1-2" with Carl Wolf and Ralph Grubbs trailing in that order.

Bob Sampsel finished second to Jackson in the 100-yard dash, while Johnny Auxter trailed Lowmaster in the 220, Bob Semer annexed the mile run in a slow 5:02 effort while Fred Stetzel's 2:13.3 was good for the 880-yard run. John Ballenger and Tex Frey teamed with Auxter and Sampsel to knock off the 880-yard relay, while Stetzel, Mohler, Dick Schell and Bob Kovaleski captured the mile relay.

Schell duplicated in the 440-yard run while Sampsel accounted for the 220-yard low hurdles. Robertson joined Jackson in the two-time winner's circle with a leap of 5'4" to take the high jump. Herb Wright's 127'4" heave in the discus concluded the scoring.

Rossmen Drop Harmon Field Track Meet To Bowling Green

Taking 12 of the 14 firsts and sweeping the 220-yard dash, Bowling Green's Buckeye league champion Bobcats copped a 76-42 victory over Ross high school's Little Giant trackmen in the final meeting of the home season at Harmon Field Tuesday evening.

It was the second twilight meet of the year for the locals whose lineup was dotted with underclassmen who had failed to make the squad for previous meets.

Highlight of the meet was the 220-yard dash where Bob Wood of Clyde (running a practice performance as a prep for the state meet May 30-31) and Don Harms of Bowling Green, engaged in a thrilling step-for-step dual through the straightaway with the finish so close that the judges did not try to separate the duo. Wood had earlier coasted to easy "victories" in the 100-yard dash and 220-yard low hurdles. His points, of course, did not count in the standings.

Myron Robertson was the lone bright spot in an otherwise dull picture for the Little Giants as he finished on top in the 120-yard high hurdles, which the Rossmen swept, and the 220-yard lows. Robertson had qualified for the state finals in both events.

Ross' remaining state qualifier, Don Sheely, finished in a tie with teammate Glenn Pocock in the pole vault after failing to clear 10' 1". In the district meet, Sheely vaulted 6 1-2 inches over that mark.

Don Harms was the leading point-maker for the Bobcats as he triumphed in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the broad jump in addition to anchoring the 880-yard relay team to victory.

ROSSMEN BOW TO SANDUSKY

Copping six firsts, three of them by Myron Robertson, Ross high school's Little Giants closed out their regularly scheduled 1947 track season Friday by dropping a 48½ to 68½ decision to Sandusky.

The Blue Streaks, paced by Bill Smith who established a new record of 2:02.6 in winning the 880-yard run, finished first or second in every event as Ernie Nimmons deadlocked Robertson for individual honors by annexing the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the broad jump.

Robertson sent the Little Giants off on top by winning the 120-yard high hurdles and then repeated a few moments later in the 220-yard lows. Meanwhile Nimmons copped the century; Bob Sprau took the shot put and Jack Williams finished on top in the mile run in 4:49 to give Sandusky a lead they never relinquished.

Dick Schell returned to his previous winning ways by taking the 440-yard dash for Les Binkley's Rossmen but the Blue Streaks raced back into a huge lead as their 880-yard relay team triumphed along with Bill Smith in the 880-yard run. The latter event marked the third successive defeat for Fremont's Fred Stetzel who was virtually unbeatable at the distance in early meets.

Robertson's leap of 5' 7" was good for the high jump and Walt Weinhardt heaved the discus 135' 4" to pace the field. A tie for first in the pole-vault between Don Sheely and Glenn Pocock, each of whom cleared 9' 10" concluded the Fremont scoring.

Lone remaining activity for the Rossmen is the state meet where Robertson has qualified in both hurdle events and Sheely in the pole vault.

Myron Robertson Is Surprise Winner Of Ross Track Tourney

One of Ross high school's most colorful post-season events was concluded at Harmon field Wednesday afternoon when the entire track squad competed in the annual "All-Events" tournament.

Myron Robertson, ace of the Little Giant hurlers, scored a surprise victory over Dick Mohler, winner of the event for the last two years, and Dick Schaeffer each of whom finished with 640 points out of a possible 1,200. Robertson had 645.

Patterned after the noted Decathlon events which the Olympiad brought into prominence, the tournament consisted of 12 phases of competition. These were the 100 and 220-yard dashes; 110-yard high and 220-yard low hurdles; 440-yard dash; 880-yard and mile runs; broad jump; high jump; pole vault; discus throw, and shot put.

The outcome of the championship and the miniature gold track shoe which went to the winner rested on the final event—the mile run—where Robertson had to better 5:35 to knock off the title. Strictly a sprinter, Robertson breezed around the four lap course in 5:33 and it was all over.

Trailing the leading trio were: John Ballenger (far to the rear in fourth place with 585 points); Fred Stetzel; Ed Nighswander; Dick Schell; LaMar Hoffman; John Auxter and Don Minier.
