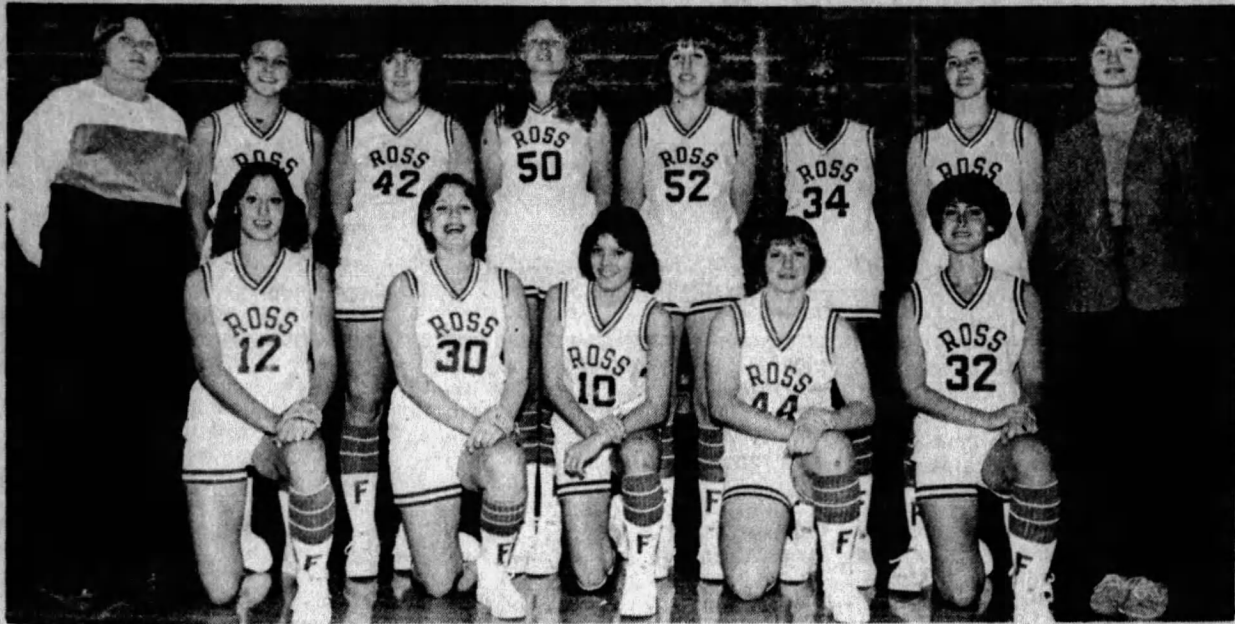

Ross girls open Saturday

Sue Wolf has only three letter winners back but she admits that she is "feeling pretty good" about her fifth edition of the Ross girls basketball team.

Rebounding from a 3-15 season, Wolf has liked what she has witnessed during her team's preseason scrimmages.

"We do not have a lot of experience but I do not have to start a sophomore this season," she pointed out.

One of the sophomores that did start last season for Wolf will not be in the starting lineup Saturday when the Little Giants host Huron in the season opener (1 p.m.). Rhea Paulson, 5-7, injured her right leg during a practice and will miss the first two to three weeks of the season.

Judy Shetzer and Margaet Van Gilder, both seniors are the other two returning letter winners. Shetzer will operate out of the guard slot with Van Gilder, 5-9, in one of the front line spots.

With Paulson sidelined, the other starters Saturday are expected to be Amy Lindstrom, 6-0 junior, along with Shetzer and Van Gilder. Shetzer will be at a guard with either Tammy Haas or Diane Borys, both juniors, operating opposite the senior. Lisa Pfeiffer, also a junior, is another guard possible.

Laurie Smith and Della Hall are in the battle for remaining forward slot. Smith saw considerable action last season and, at 5-9, has a two-inch advantage on Hall. Also in the

forward battle but not likely to start is junior Cindy Gilson, 5-6.

The third senior on the team, Kelly Shoemaker, 5-4, is out for basketball for the first time and must work herself up to playing time for Wolf.

"There has been a lot of competition for positions this year," the Ross coach pointed out, saying that she feels that is a plus for her team.

"Right now," she continued, "I figure that 10 players will see action with eight playing quite a lot. I am hoping there is a lot of depth.

"I used one five in a scrimmage and when I put another five in, there was very little difference," Wolf explained.

Van Gilder paces Ross Girls

Margaret Van Gilder scored 22 points and Ross canned 15 of 26 free throws to knock off Huron 45-41 in the opening high school girls basketball game for both schools Saturday afternoon at Ross High School.

The Little Giants survived a slow start and 30 turnovers to pull off the win. Coach Sue Wolf's first reaction was to point out the inside play of Van Gilder, Amy Lindstrom and Laurie Smith.

"Lindstrom did a nice job on Watt (Kris) in the second half and when she was out, Laurie (Smith) came in and helped out," Wolf said, while savoring the victory.

Watt, an all-Class AA district selection as a sophomore last season, scored 25 points, 12 coming in the first half.

Ross, plagued by 10 first period turnovers, trailed Huron 10-4 at the first stop

but bounced back to knot the score at the half despite hitting only three of 18 from the field. The Little Giants girls dropped in eight of 15 charity tosses in the quarter while the Tigers answered with four of 14 from the field.

In the third period, Van Gilder turned it on with some smooth inside moves that resulted in easy buckets and the Ross quintet pulled out to a 35-29 lead. The 5-9 Ross senior dropped in 10 points in the quarter and along with Lindstrom and Smith, dominated both ends of the floor.

"The thing that has helped Margaret more this year," Wolf pointed out, "is her defense has helped her offensively. She is really hustling out there now."

Ross led throughout most of the final period but with Watt scoring six points, the Tigers pulled even at 41 with 1:52 to play. Watt, a six-footer, canned

a jumper from the free throw line to knot the score.

Smith hit the front end of a bonus with 53 seconds to play and it provided Ross with all the points it needed. Judy Shetzer, Ross's pint-sized senior guard, iced the game with three straight free throws.

Ross canned only 15 of 53 shots with the winning margin coming at the charity stripe. Huron sank 19 of 62 shots but only three of 11 from the free throw line.

Ross's next game will be Saturday at Bellevue.

The Little Giants also won the junior varsity game 27-16 as Sue Buehler and Julie Ritchart scored eight points apiece.

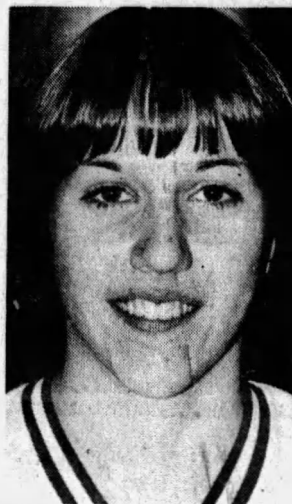

Little Giant girls stop Bellevue for second win

BELLEVUE — Margaret Van Gilder scored 30 points and Ross hit 42 percent of its shots to trip Bellevue 47-40 in a high school girls basketball game Saturday.

Van Gilder's effort comes on the heels of a 22-point performance in Ross's season opening win against Huron a week ago. In the final period, the 5-9 senior canned 12 points as Ross played evenly with the Redmen.

The Little Giants' offense was cold in the third period but Bellevue was colder. Van Gilder scored all of the Little Giants' six points in the frame but Bellevue could answer only with a single free throw from Lori LaFollette.

"Judy Shetzer and Margaret Van Gilder played great team offense," Ross Coach Sue Wolf explained after the team's second win in as many games. "Shetzer had seven assists."

Ross dominated the boards with Amy Lindstrom, despite scoring no points, grabbing nine

rebounds to lead the Little Giants.

Lauri Smith was credited by Wolf with playing a key role with holding Bellevue to the one-point third period.

LaFollette had 19 points for the Redmen with Chris Hahn adding 15. Only three Redmen hit the scoring column.

Shetzer ended up with nine points as only a quartet of Ross girls were able to score.

Ross will host Bowling Green Thursday. The junior varsity game begins at 6:30 p.m.

BG girls face unbeaten Giants

Bowling Green is tough, Ross Coach Sue Wolf is well aware of that, but she has a contented smile on her face these days.

Wolf's smile is about a 5-9 scoring machine that has emerged from the ranks of the unbeaten Little Giants this season: Margaret Van Gilder.

"They (Bowling Green) have three of their five starters back," Wolf hastened to point out about the task facing her 2-0 Little Giants. "One of them scored 18 against us last year and another had 12."

The Bobcats will be in town tonight. The junior varsity game begins at 6:30 and that game kicks off a full weekend of sports activities for Ross teams.

While the Ross girls are handling the court duties, Ross wrestling Coach Al Voggenthaler will take his team to Lorain to face the always powerful Southview squad. Wrestling gets started at 7 p.m. in Lorain. The Little Giant matmen are 1-0 this season.

Friday, the Little Giants boys basketball team, 2-1, will get the Buckeye Conference season rolling, hosting Mansfield, 2-0.

On Saturday, Ross swim Coach Art Bucci and his squad will be in Upper Arlington for the Upper Arlington Invitational.

"Size-wise," Wolf continued to talk about her team's opponent, "we are going to match up pretty good."

"Bowling Green has been competitive every year. We have never beaten them," she added.

Ross, however, wiped out a "never beaten them" jinx last Saturday, handing Bellevue a 47-40 setback. That was the first time Ross had beaten the Redmen.

Van Gilder, a bit of a surprise with her scoring outbursts in the first two Ross games, will likely meet up with a defense geared to stopping her. She has canned 22 and 30 points in the Little Giants' first two games.

Biz Paeth's boys team will face a Tyger squad that he describes as "more disciplined and well-coached" this season. Joe Pratts is in his first year as the coach of the Tygers.

"We feel that we have to do a good job on the boards," Paeth said. "We especially have to keep Givand (David) and Holmes (Russell) off the boards and we have to stop the penetration of Murphy (Tom)."

The players Paeth mentioned are the big three of the Tygers he felt.

Holmes, in the opening game of the season for the Tygers, scored 28 points and had 20 rebounds. The 6-2 junior canned 12 of 14 shots, most of them coming off rebounds or off feeds from Murphy.

Givand is a 6-3 senior who can score from both the outside and inside. Paeth pointed out that Givand gets many of his points off passes from Murphy especially when Murphy drives the lane and dumps off passes to Givand.

Murphy, a 5-11 junior, is the team's playmaker.

"Murphy does not score a lot," Paeth said, "but he handles the ball well and penetrates very well."

Paeth said he will start Gregg Hedden and Tom Woleslagel at the guards with Mike Held and Gary Harms at the forwards. Rob Bollenbacher will draw his first start at center after popping in 21 points against Toledo Woodward last Saturday night.

The Little Giants have four players averaging in double figures. Held leads with a 13.7 with Bollenbacher at 12.7. Randy Bury, the Little Giants' sixth man, has a 12-point average and Hedden has produced 10 points per game so far.

The Ross JV game begins at 6:30 p.m. Friday.

2nd half surge lifts Ross girls past BG

Ross snapped out of its first half doldrums to unleash a sizzling attack in the second half to storm past Bowling Green 49-42.

The victory was the third against no losses for the Ross girls while the Bobcats dropped to 1-1.

Margaret Van Gilder tossed in 26 points and combined with Amy Lindstrom, Della Hall and Judy Shetzer to lead the final period attack that wiped out the Bobcats.

The Little Giants, after hitting only six of 30 shots in the first 16 minutes, set the nets on fire with 14 of 24 from the field in wiping out a 10-point third period Bowling Green lead.

"We were lazy in that first half," Coach Sue Wolf chuckled out about Ross's first half play. "I gave'em some stern advice at the half because we did not look like we were up for the game in the first half."

Trailing 24-16 at the half, the Little Giants quickly fell behind 26-16 before Van Gilder's hand turned red hot. The Little Giants ran off 12 straight points as Van Gilder and Shetzer tossed in the three buckets apiece.

Van Gilder's bucket with 3:25 to play in the third period gave Ross its first lead (28-26) since the first period.

The third session ended at 30-30.

In the final eight minutes, the margin between the teams was never more than two points until the final three minutes when Ross opened up.

With the score deadlocked at 38, Hall rolled in a layup with 3:11 to play and the Little Giants never trailed from that point. Van Gilder's 15-foot jumper from the left side gave Ross a four-point lead with 2:50 to play.

The Little Giants, however, did not break away until 1:25 remained. After a Ross timeout, Hall hit the back end of a two-shot foul for a 45-42 Ross lead.

The Little Giants' clincher came on Lindstrom's soft one-hander from the foul line with 48 seconds to play. Two Lindstrom charity tosses 32 seconds later gave Ross its biggest margin of the night which turned out to be the final score.

"Three points is not a big lead in girls basketball," Wolf insisted after the game when asked about the clinching shot taken by Lindstrom, a 6-0 junior. "We were looking for a good shot and she took a good shot."

Van Gilder's big point night upped her three-game average to 26 points. Shetzer ended up with nine points and seven assists. She could have had more assists had it not been for some dropped passes.

Tari Vannett tossed in 20 points for

Bowling Green and Kathy Hinesman added 10.

Tuesday, Ross will entertain Perkins.

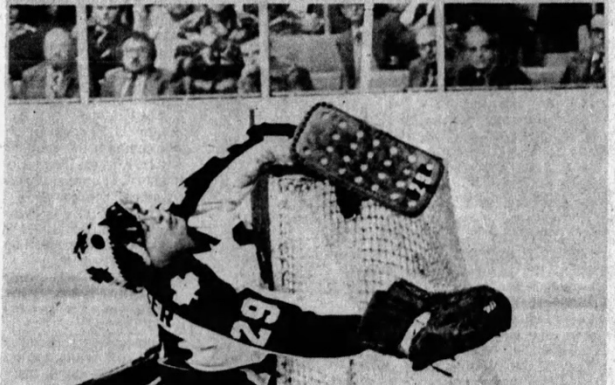

Little Giant girls crush Perkins

The Fremont Ross Little Giant girl's basketball team dominated every phase of the game against Perkins Tuesday night at the Ross High gym to pick up their fourth consecutive win and remain undefeated.

The lady Little Giants outran, outrebounded and outscored their opponent 56-23 to earn the easy victory.

The only scare Ross received was in the third quarter when their leading scorer, Margaret Van Gilder, injured her right leg. She let out a piercing scream as she fell to the floor and rolled in pain for about half a minute. But she got up and walked away.

"I think she'll be o.k.," head coach Sue Wolf said after the game. "I think she just turned her foot over."

Van Gilder once again paced the Little Giant attack with 21 points and 11 rebounds. Her eight points in the first quarter helped Ross jump to a 12-5 lead. The Little Giants upped that to a 21-7 advantage at the half and were never really threatened the rest of the way.

Van Gilder's eight points in the third quarter sparked Ross to a 36-19 lead after three periods and the Little Giants poured it on in the final quarter, outscoring the Pirates 20-4, to make the final score 56-23.

"We were a little sloppy, but I'm happy we won," Wolf said. "Margaret, Amy (Lindstrom) and Laurie (Smith) did a real nice job on the boards. They were clearing them out."

The Little Giants hauled down 49 rebounds while Perkins could grab only 25. The biggest advantage for Ross, however, came on the shooting. The Little Giants canned 24 of 49 shots for 49 percent but the Pirates hit only nine of 43 for a mere 20 percent.

Judy Shetzer, a scrappy little senior guard who scored 12 points, had six steals and ignited a Little Giant defense that forced 24 Pirate turnovers. Ross had 23.

Tania Deal, a 5-6 junior, was the main gun for Perkins. She connected on seven of her 24 shots and added two free throws to lead the Pirates with 16 points. Three other Pirates had two points and one had one point.

Ross puts its unbeaten string on the line again Thursday with a game against Whitmer. The contest is at Ross and the JV tip-off is slated for 6:30 p.m.

Tough weekend for Ross

There will be nothing easy tonight and this weekend for Ross's two basketball teams and the wrestling squad.

The lady Little Giants will put a 4-0 mark on the line against Whitmer without the services of its top scorer while the boys will hit the road for the first time this season.

"We may not have Margaret (Van Gilder) for Thursday," Ross girls coach Sue Wolf admitted Wednesday moments before practice. "She's at the hospital now getting it looked at."

"It" for the 5-9 Van Gilder, averaging nearly 25 points a game, is a bad knee. She was injured in a collision Tuesday night in Ross's victory over Perkins.

"Whitmer is big," Wolf said as she described tonight's foe. "They have 12 seniors. We will match-up well with them at guard and if we have Margaret, we would be pretty well matched inside, but she will most likely not play."

Wolf pointed out that with Van Gilder out, others on the Little Giants will have to pick up the slack. She feels that her squad is capable of that and got that feeling in the win Tuesday.

"Somehow," she grinned, "it is hard to replace 25 points in the lineup but I think we can come close. I think Tuesday, the other kids were looking for the shot more and we do have a couple of kids capable of doing it."

Whitmer, 2-0, is the first of three straight unbeaten teams Ross will play. Tuesday, Sylvania Northview will be in town and next Thursday, the Little Giants will play Findlay, 5-0, in the Buckeye Conference opener, also at Ross.

statements he made last week about the Mansfield game.

"That's the big difference for us this year . . . rebounding. We are rebounding well . . . we have outrebounded our opponents every game this year."

Paeth said that Harding's big three — Ralph Hill, Fred Ross and Greg Klepsig — are the players his Little Giants must stop.

Hill, 6-3, scored 18 points in the first half against Malabar but ran into foul trouble and did not score in the second half.

"These three guys took all but 15 shots for them Tuesday," Paeth said.

Talking about his team, the Ross coach said that being on the winning side of the ledger makes it much easier for his team to practice this year. "We have that good feeling. The kids are excited but we have told the kids that to keep that good feeling, they have to work at it."

The Little Giants wrestlers will be in Toledo this weekend as one of 19 teams in the Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament.

"It's one of the toughest in the state," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler described the big, two-day meet.

Ross streak skids to a halt

Sue Wolf could still smile despite watching her Ross girls basketball team's unbeaten record come to an uncerimonious end.

Whitmer crushed the Little Giants, now 4-1, on the floor 61-37 but Wolf had a "pick me up" feeling after the game.

"Hey," she smiled, "you cannot ask much more of these kids."

"They hustled more tonight than any other night this season," she exclaimed.

Whitmer, 4-0, controlled the inside game and ran off an 18-1 spurt opening the game to put the lady Little Giants on the skids early. Playing without high scoring Margaret Van Gilder (25 per game), Ross was left with a big piece of its inside game on the bench.

Van Gilder injured her knee in a collision during a game against Perkins Tuesday. Her status for the Tuesday game against Sylvania Northview is still doubtful.

Wolf went along with the unproven fact that the game "would have been closer" if the 5-9 senior had played, but she turned the focus back to the spirited play of her team.

"There wasn't a kid out there tonight," she began, "who did not play hard. What more can you say about Shetzer (Judy)?"

"You can't ask for any more," she repeated.

Citing the play of Laurie Smith and Amy Lindstrom and a handful more of the Little Giants, Wolf had to single out Shetzer, a senior, who is listed at five feet, one inch, played bigger than that.

Faced with picking up a big piece of the Ross scoring with Van Gilder out, Shetzer responded with 13 points and a floor game that seemed to have her everywhere at one time.

Whitmer's experience and overall balance, however, was too much to handle for Ross.

The lady Little Giants did not ripple the nets from the field until 50 seconds remained in the first period. Lisa Pfeiffer's shot from in close was the first field goal of the game for Ross.

It was 22-3 after the first eight minutes and 34-13 at the half. In the second half, the Ross girls were outscored by only a 27-24 count.

Whitmer's lead, however, sank lower

than 19 points in the final half.

Karen Werdehoff led Whitmer with 16 points. Diane Cessna added 14 and Linda Janicki 10 for the Panthers. Eight Whitmer players scored.

Shetzer was the only Ross player in double figures but Pfeiffer ended up with eight.

Ross was 17 of 53 from the field and Whitmer 28 of 61. Ross had 32 rebounds, the same as the Panthers.

Ross girls stopped by Northview

Sylvania Northview took advantage of a porous Ross defense to roll to a 65-38 victory over the Little Giants girls Tuesday.

The loss was the second in a row for the Lady Little Giants after opening with four straight wins. Ross was playing again without the services of Margaret Van Gilder and her 25 points per game average.

Coach Sue Wolf said that Van Gilder will be out indefinitely with an injury to a knee. She will miss Thursday's Buckeye Conference opener against unbeaten, 5-0, Findlay at Ross.

"We just did not play good defense," Wolf said succinctly about the Northview loss.

While dissatisfied with the defense, Wolf took stock in the return to action of junior

Rhea Paulson. The Ross veteran missed the first five games of the season with a bad knee but in approximately one and a half quarters of play against Northview, Paulson grabbed nine rebounds and scored seven points.

Northview moved out to a 14-11 lead and held a 36-24 advantage at the half. A 14-4 outburst in the third period put the skids under Ross.

Chest cold possible cause of Bruce's chest pains

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Earle Bruce, the head coach of top-ranked Ohio State's football team, likely will be discharged from the hospital Thursday.

"We expect him to resume coaching duties Thursday, but no later than Friday, if all of his tests are normal," Dr. Robert J. Murphy, the Buckeyes' team physician, told a press conference Tuesday.

Murphy ordered the 46-year-old Bruce into Riverside Methodist Hospital after the coach complained of chest pains early Tuesday. Murphy, however, thinks the pains were linked to a heavy chest cold Bruce has been battling.

"He's had no pains since he went into the hospital. His first electrocardiogram was normal. His first blood test was normal, plus he had a very normal day," said Murphy, who also serves as the coach's personal physician.

Murphy contends Bruce is in excellent physical condition and said he easily passed a complete physical

exam at University Hospitals in June this year.

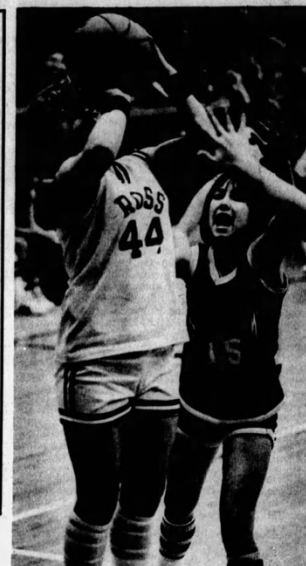
"His spirits are good," said Murphy, "but he wasn't very happy about being in the hospital. It's the first practice he's missed in his whole coaching career."

The Buckeyes, Big Ten Conference champions and 11-0-0 overall, are in the midst of preparations for a Rose Bowl showdown with third-ranked Southern California on New Year's Day.

In Bruce's absence, Glenn Mason took charge of the offense while Denny Fryzel continued to handle his duties as defensive coordinator.

Murphy said the hospitalization of Bruce was a precautionary measure. "I've got to know for sure before we get into the pressure of the next two weeks. We just thought anybody with chest pains in his age group needs to be evaluated," he said.

Murphy emphasized there was no trace of heart disease for the man who replaced the fired Woody Hayes in January after coaching Iowa State University for six seasons.

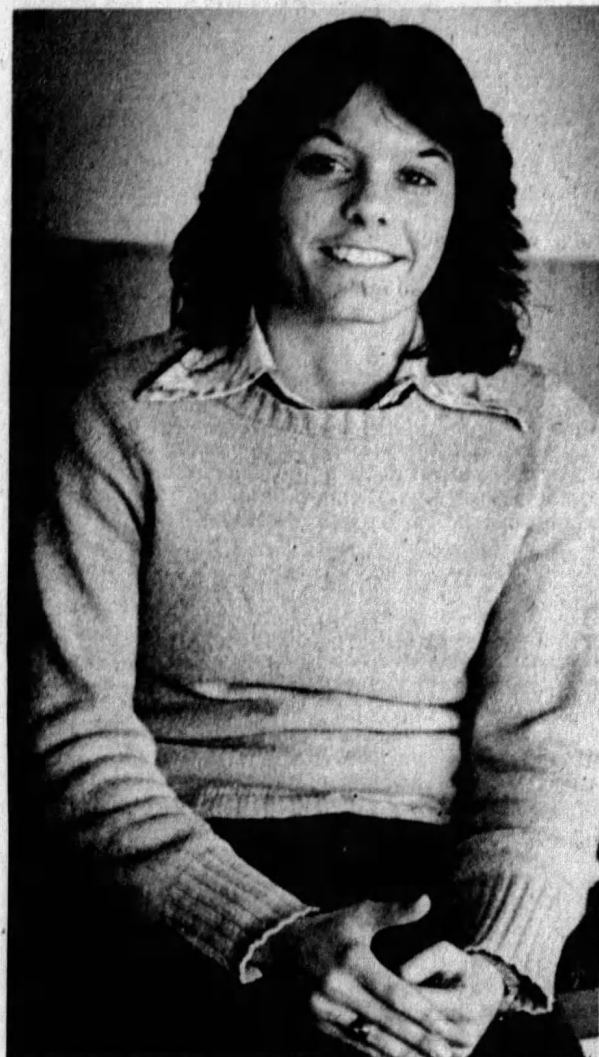
