BEE-GEE TEAM RACKS UP 93 POINTS TO WIN

Robbins And Miller Pace Fremont, Each Winning Two Events

A powerful and well-balanced Bowling Green track team put an end to Fremont's dominance of the Buckeye League's cinder department Saturday when it scored a convincing victory in the loop's annual meet, held in Findlay.

The Bobcats dethroned the Little Giants as champions, a title they had held since 1941, by scoring 93 points to their 73. Findlay finished in third place with 49, with Tiffin and Fostoria trailing far in the rear with 8½ and five points, respectively.

The 20-point margin the Bobcats held at the end clearly indicated their superiority over the other four teams, but doesn't portray the closeness of the meet. Fremont still had a chance of winning after 11 events.

It was balance that won the championship for Coach Forrest Creamer's outfit. They won seven

firsts, but that was only two more than Fremont accounted for and was less than half the story.

Score Every Event
The winners backed up their first places with six seconds, five thirds, five fourths and two fifths. In only one event did they fail to place two men and in a pair of them Bobcat entries ran one-two giving them 10 valuable points in each.

The Little Giants did as well as Coach Whitley Althoff expected, according to a statement he made later. They won five firsts, five seconds, six thirds one fourth and one fifth and tied for a fourth and a fifth.

The Fremont team also had the only two-event winners in the entire meet in Bill Miller and Dick Robbins. The former won both the shot put and the discus and the latter took the 100 and 440 yard dashes. But firsts weren't enough to win Saturday.

The meet was run under adverse weather conditions. The track was soft and slow and a sprinkling of rain fell intermittently throughout the 14 events. As a result none of the performances were exceptionally brilliant. They were, on the whole, mediocre.

No Records Broken

No records were broken and only one was closely approached. Don Kring of Findlay won the high jump at five feet 9½ inches, only a quarter-inch under the league mark. Next closest effort was that of Joe Rockwood, Bowling Green, whose time in the 220 was two seconds off the record according to two watches which did not agree.

As had been expected, Fremont flashed the most strength in the weights with Miller and Bud Ioka placing first and third in both the shot and discus. Even this was not as good as expected, however, as Ioka had been counted on for second in each.

Robbins Is High

Robbins performed up to expectations in taking the 100 and 440 and finishing second in the 220, and was high point man of the meet and Jerry Larkins didn't fail in the mile. He didn't have enough left, however, to push the Bowling Green entries in the 800 and they surprised with a first and a second.

Bob Bowdrex did better than expected by placing second in the pole vault but the half-mile relay team of Krohenbrecher, Kallonge, Mohler and Sampsel, trailed a Bowling Green quartet that traveled the distance nearly two seconds slower than the Little Giant team did at Lima Central.

Findlay surprised with the number of points it scored but both Fostoria and Tiffin were distinct disappointments and their failure made the way easier for the ultimate winners. Results of the meet were as follows:

It was a big day in the circuit yesterday with every team seeing double duty for the first time since the season opened.

The Mud Hens won an 8 to 1 walkaway victory in the first, credit going to Toledo Pitcher John Whitehead. They came from behind in the fifth inning of the nightcap and eked out a narrow 3 to 2 win.

At Columbus, the Red Birds split a pair with the Milwaukee Brewers. The opener was scoreless until the 10th when the Brewers batted in three quick runs and held off Columbus in the second half. Columbus Manager-Pitcher Charley Root gave the Red Birds a 2 to 0 victory in the second game.

Indianapolis took two games from the St. Paul Saints, winning 2 to 3 in the opener and making it 5 to 0 in the second. Louisville and Minneapolis split their games. The Colonels lost the first game 11 to 4 but held Minneapolis to 9 hits in the second for an 8 to 4 victory.
