Farrell and Steinert will solidify the doubles teams, though LaFountain plans on keeping the two on separate teams.

Weaknesses: The doubles combinations are yet unknown.

Outlook: LaFountain expects two new faces (senior John Overberg and freshman Pete Scranton) to make an impact this year, giving the second-year coach admirable depth. Farrell has already impressed early in the preseason. "No matter who we have playing first with Jay we'll have an outstanding first doubles team," LaFountain said. The Little Giants also welcome new assistant coach and Ross alumnus Alecks Ripple. "I think the kids respect him as an adult and as a coach. I think he'll do a great job for us," LaFountain said.

Fremont Ross won its second Great Lakes League match in as many tries, beating Bedford 4-1 at


Rodger Young Park.

It was more than just the resilience of youth.

"They accept someone who is better than them.'

It's a balancing act being struck on more than one sports team this spring, as coaches try to integrate young talent with veteran experience. It could be a recipe for jealousy, but coaches report much more positive potential than problems.

"I don't have a lot of rules. But I do not allow any initiations, no picking on (fresh-man)," said Old Fort coach Phil Miller, who starts freshman Aaron Burks at second base. "The seniors may get on the younger guys when they are cleaning up (making the freshmen do more work). ... But the better he does, the more he's accepted."

Other standouts from the Class of 2000 include softball players Erin Raubenolt of Fremont St. Joe, Tiffany Nitschke of Ross, Jenny Siegley and Heather Webb of Old Fort, and track team members Breanna Busold of St. Joe and Amanda Roadarmel of Woodmore.

And Scranton is not alone on his tennis team.

LaFountain, a history teacher at Fremont Junior High School, has been selling the idea of "ten-nis for a lifetime" to many of his students to build up the team. He believes freshmen Austin Miller, Mike Moxley and Buck Young will compete for varsity roster spots by the end of the
