## Campy's Money First All Right

VERO BEACH, Fla. (P)—Catcher Roy Campanella, who plunged from the Most Valuable Player in the National League in 1953 to a meek 207 hitter last year, today proclaimed that his injured left hand is all right.

Twice last year he underwent surgery. Most Brooklyn Dodger officials thought Campanella's troubles cost them the pennant.

Yesterday, in the first day of spring training, he took nine practice swings and was completely satisfied with the result.

"My hand feels good," he enthused. "It doesn't hurt me a bit. I can swing that bat now, and that's all I want to know. All I've got to do now is time the ball."

He reported that all the numbness in his ring finger has disappeared and that the muscle between the thumb and the index finger is rebuilding, although it is not quite normal.

"I never felt right last season," he said seriously. "I couldn't grip the bat properly. Sure, I hit some long balls but I never had that feeling of having hit a good one outside."

"A right-handed hitter can't whip the bat around with his right hand. You do it with the left hand and I couldn't do it at all last year. I hit the 360-foot sign yesterday by whipping the bat around on an outside pitch."

"I even hit one off the fist. No, sir, it didn't hurt a bit."

He said he had been doing some catching too.

"And I've been receiving some pretty hard pitches already and don't even use a sponge in the glove. I want to get used to the pounding. It's great to be a whole ballplayer again."

## Akron's Delaney Led Climbs In Rating

NEW YORK (P)—Akron's Ronnie Delaney has vaulted into the national ring ratings announced today by Ring Magazine.

A recent win over welterweight champ Johnny Saxton jumped Delaney into the No. 6 spot among middleweights.

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Ross high's cagers took their first step toward the District Class A title Tuesday night in Sandusky's Junior high gym, turning back a hard-fighting and capable Sandusky St. Mary's quintet. The score was 69-63.

Just before the third quarter ended the score was 43-43.

Then tall Larry Miller took over.

The Ross senior pumped in two quick field goals, then added two free throws to give the Little

This game was unusually clean only 11 personals being called on Willard and nine on Norwalk.

Some spectators thought the officiating in the Norwalk-Willard game much better than that of the Ross-Sandusky St. Mary's scrap, which at times got almost out of hand.

Larry Miller counted 29 points for Coach Al Ziemke's team, on 11 buckets and seven out of eight charity tosses. Rog Chambers counted only once from the field but added 10 free throws out of 13 tries.

Tom Noblet was the St. Mary's scoring leader with 22, nine buckets from the field.

Ziemke did some lineup juggling early in the game to get his crew rolling. He put Glendale Haas into a guard spot in the second quarter, and he went the whole way until his fifth personal foul caught up with him late in the game. Haas was tough off the defensive board. Lane Becker, who also spelled some of the starters, did some neat ball handling and added eight points to the total. Beebe Schneider and Henry Tiller played their usual bang-up games, both being slowed only slightly by early personals. Jim Houghtaling started at a guard in place of Larry Harris who is at Fort Sheridan, Ill., undergoing West Point tests.

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# Little Giants Eliminated From Tourney, 61-48, By Blue Streaks; Truckers Victors In Thriller

Ross high school's basketball season came to an end abruptly, convincingly and definitely Thursday night on Sandusky Junior high's court, 61 to 48, the Sandusky Blue Streaks, holding a definite advantage from the first two minutes of play, turning the trick.

Sandusky will tangle in the finals Saturday night with Norwalk, the game being booked at 8:15.

The Truckers turned back a surprisingly potent Tiffin Calvert 70 to 68 in a thriller that had the crowd standing through most of the final period.

Ross just didn't have it last night.

The Little Giants matched Sandusky in field goals—18 all—but had a decided disadvantage at the free throw line, getting 12 points via that route on 22 tries, while the Streaks hit for 25 charity

tosses, missing 12. Sandusky shot from the free line 14 times more than did Ross.

## Plenty Rough

The game was a rough one, bodily contact being a feature. Many scrambles for the ball, with players all over the floor developed. Jeff Johnson, tall Sandusky cager, was kayoed for a brief spell in the third period when he was hit by Henry Tiller while in the air shooting. No foul was called because Johnson had been noted traveling.

Ross supporters did some yelping about "traveling" on the part of Sandusky, particularly the two out-in-front cagers who started the plays.

But regardless, Sandusky was by far the best cage team Thursday night.

Ross wasn't able to maneuver away from the man to man defense Coach Whitney Regan set up, the taller Streaks being even more agile than the Little Giants.

Sandusky started off with a 13-9 edge at the quarter and fell even farther behind in the second quarter, the half ending 20-17.

The game might as well have ended there, because Sandusky held the 13-point edge the rest of the way. The third quarter closed 48-35.

## Record For Miller

Coach Al Ziemke pointed out that Larry Miller set an all-time Ross high scoring record with the 14 points he tallied last night added to his total of 29 in the Sandusky St. Mary's game.

Miller hit 385 for the season, Dick Garcia having 367 in the 1953 season and Dean Doren 365 last year.

Ross finished the season with a 13-7 record.

Gene Miller, who played Larry Miller last night, hit for 16 points to pace the winners, Henry Tiller's 15 total being one more than Larry Miller's.

Ross played without Larry Harris, who had not yet returned from Fort Sheridan, Ill., where he took the West Point physical. Ziemke said Harris might have made a difference because his height would have prevented some of the Sandusky shooting. Ross defeated Sandusky 66-51 in season's play.

Norwalk, handicapped by four quick personal fouls against Johnny Schaechterle which benched him most of the game, trailed Tiffin Calvert most of the way, but came through just before the final buzzer.

The boys of Grant Walls had tied it up with 25 seconds to play. Then Jim Rolsten broke loose, and scored on a drive-in shot to send the total to 70-68. Rolsten was fouled and missed, but Norwalk grabbed the rebound and passed the ball the remainder of the time left.

Calvert, with a poor season's record, was ahead about all the way, holding a 19-15 quarter edge, and a 36-30 margin at halftime. Then Norwalk turned loose with 26 points against 18 for the Seneca countians, to hold a 56-34 lead at the start of the last period.

Calvert's Joe Miglioni got hot in the last period, bagging three buckets to give his team a lead again, but Norwalk came back and won.

Captain Dave Hunter was Norwalk's big gun, getting 24 points and starring on both backboards. Guard Jim Witter gave the crowd a third period thrill by connecting with six consecutive shots from back of the foul circle.

Phil Falter and Dan Moran were top scorers for Calvert with 18 and 17, respectively. Miglioni added 15.
