Bowling Green Is First Foe; Five Dual Meets Slated Here.

Six Teams To Compete
In Invitational; Eight
Lettermen Returning

A dual match with Bowling Green as the opponent will open the 1949 season for the Ross high school track team, according to the schedule announced today by Coach Les Binkley.

The card calls for eight meets in addition to the inter-squad, district and state meets. Ross high will also engage in four other dual meets, all of them at Harmon field. Opponents will be Sandusky, Ashland, Bellevue and Fostoria.

The second annual Ross high invitational, to be held April 30, will include six teams this year. Competing with Ross will be Marion, Sandusky, Bellevue, Fostoria and Ashland. Sandusky won the invitational last year, with Ashland finishing second and Ross third.

Triangular At Findlay

A triangular meet is slated for Findlay's track May 5. The host school, Ross and Marion will compete.

The Buckeye league meet will be held at Bowling Green May 14.

Coach Binkley has eight lettermen returning from last year's squad that recorded victories over Lima, Toledo Woodward and Fostoria, in dual meets. The Little Giants lost to Sandusky and Ashland in dual engagements and finished behind Toledo DeVilbiss and Sandusky in a triangular engagement. DeVilbiss won the District meet last year.

Ross high's qualifiers for the state meet last season were Ed Nighswander, broad jumper; Glen Pocock, pole vaulter, and Dick Schaefer, high jumper.

ABC ENTERS FINAL WEEK

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 2.

—*AP*—The 46th annual American Bowling Congress tournament today enters the last week of its 57-day run.

With the exception of the five-man team event it has been a dozen or more years since titles were won with scores as low as the current figures.

Last year the Washington Shirts of Chicago won the team championship with a 3007 score. That is just 20-pins under the score of the Jimmie Smith's five, of South Bend, Ind., who lead for this year's crown.

Low Score In Doubles

Not in the last 11 years of ABC competition has a score as low as 1332 won the doubles title. Donald Van Boxel, Green Bay, Wis., and Gene Bernhardt, Sturgeon Bay, Wis., are present leaders for the two-man championship with the 1332. A 1321 by George Rudolph and George Ryan, Waukegan, Ill., won the championship in 1934.

Federal Judge Refuses To Lift 5-Year Suspension

NEW YORK, April 2.—*AP*—Federal Judge Edward A. Conger yesterday refused to order the major leagues to reinstate former Cardinal hurlers Max Lanier and Fred Martin. The pair was suspended for five years in 1946 for jumping to the Mexican league. They have damage suits for \$2,500,000 pending.

Judge Conger explained he ruled "no" to their request because "the situation is so dubious in numerous respects and . . . the jurisdiction of the court to entertain the matter is uncertain."

His action, the judge said, has no bearing on the merits of the damage suits by the two pitchers brought under the anti-trust laws.

M'KENZIE SETS SCORING PACE FOR WINNERS

Ross high school's track team lost a nip and tuck dual match to Bowling Green Thursday afternoon at Harmon Field, 61 2/3 to 56 1/3. It was the first start of the season for Ross.

The Bee Gee's star yesterday was Roger McKenzie, who scored 20 points by finishing first in the 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, broad jump and 220-yard dash. Five points were awarded for first place, three for second and one for third in individual events. The winner of the relays received five points.

Nighswander Faces Ross

Ed Nighswander set the pace for Ross by tallying 12 1/2 points. He won the 220-yard low hurdler, finished second in the 120-yard high hurdles and broad jump, and tied for second place in the high jump.

Dick Sherman was the Little Giants' second best scorer. He tallied 7 1/3 points by winning the high jump, tying for second in the pole vault and finishing third in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Ross got off to a bad start and trailed 34 to 16 after the results of the first six events were posted. The Giants showed power in the high jump, 220-yard low hurdles, pole vault and 880-yard run and were back in the running with three events to go, trailing by only two points at that stage. Bowling Green copped the first two places in the 220-yard dash, however, and then came back to grab first place in the discus throw.

Glover Shows Speed

Ross romped in an easy winner in the mile relay as Charlie Glover showed his speed in getting the Giants off to a big lead.

Sandusky Wallops Ross, Becomes Favorite In Invitational; Nighswander Scores 15 Points

Sandusky high school stamped itself as the favorite in the annual Ross Invitational here Saturday by romping off with an easy victory over the Little Giants in a dual track meet yesterday, 88-30. The meet was held on a rain-swept field at Sandusky.

Ed Nighswander was the whole show for Ross, as he took scoring honors with 15 points. Nighswander won the 120-yard high hurdles the 220-low hurdles and the broad jump.

Ross Coach Les Binkley said after the meet that he regards Sandusky as the class of the Invitational field, which includes Marion, Bellevue, Fostoria, Ashland, Sandusky and Ross.

Sandusky swept both relay events and copped all the points in the high jump. Seamon won the event with a leap of 5'6" and Brown and Spayd finished in a tie for second.

Nighswander took the broad jump with a leap of 19'11 1/2", three-quarters of an inch better than his effort against Bowling Green under ideal conditions here last week.

Ross Track Team Registers First Victory Of Season

HE DID IT BEFORE

Old Rockport Rated Olympia's Top Foe

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 5.—A lot of the "smart guys" were insisting today Old Rockport is the only horse with a chance to beat Olympia Saturday in the Kentucky Derby. They could be so right and for that matter, so wrong.

Old Rockport is the one horse other than Ocean Drive—a stablemate of Fred W. Hooper's Derby favorite—to hang it on Olympia this year. "Rocky" did it in the Santa Anita Derby February 19, coltaring the front-running Olympia about 50 yards from the finish to win by a length and a half. Ocean Drive beat Olympia in the Hibiscus Stakes at Hialeah a month earlier.

Could Do It Again

Sharing the opinion of several Derby veterans that if he did it once, Old Rockport could pour it on again was plain Ben Jones, the Calumet Farm trainer.

"I still believe Olympia is going to win," said Ben, "but Old Rockport appears to be the only horse with a chance to beat him. If we can take third (with Ponder) I'll be tickled to death."

John Gaver, trainer of the Green-tree Stable entry of Capot and Wine List, wouldn't come right out for Old Rockport, his own pair, or any other horse, including Olympia.

"He has been beaten, you know," the Princeton grad declared.

The others, in addition to Ponder, Old Rockport, Capot and Wine List, are J. A. Kinard Jr.'s Johnnie, W. E. McElroy's Hail, Isidor Biebel's Palestinian, Mrs. Ada L. Rice's Model Cadet, Lexington Stable's Lexington, J. H. Selye's Duplicator, and Afton Villa Farm's Jacks Town. The final decision on A. P. Cotter's Petey Cotter and J. A. Goodwin's Ky. Colonel is expected to be made today.

Phils (The Upstarts) Have Won 5 Straight

Phillies win five straight from Dodgers and Cardinals! That should rate a 21-gun salute and five-year contract for Manager Eddie Sawyer.

Hardly a man is still alive who remembers any such antics by the Phils. For years they were the doormats of the National League. Now instead of the futile, they're the fighting Phils.

When the Phils acquired Eddie Waitkus and Bill Nicholson last December, the word went around, Sawyer has uncovered a one-man staff in Ken Heintzelman.

Heintzelman Is Hot

Ever since he hit the majors at Pittsburgh in 1938, the slender lefty never has been over the .500 mark. Now he's 4-0 for the season.

The 33-year-old from Missouri has "arrived" with two victories over Brooklyn, one over Boston and a decision over the St. Louis Cards.

Ken needed help last night to get past St. Louis when two walks, an error and a double by Marty Marion put him in a hole in the ninth. Ken Trinkle finally put out the uprising after three runs scored, leaving the Phils with a 7-5 edge.

As a result of the second straight decision over the Cards, the Phils have moved from the cellar to a fourth-place tie only two games off the pace. They're even talking pennant around Shibe Park.

Sain Is Winner

Johnny Sain came through with another complete winning game to make the Boston Braves look more like the club that won the 1948 pennant.

Sain was superb until the seventh, when he lost control of his curve. Chicago scored two runs and another in the eighth, but the Braves' four-run first inning at-

tack on Dutch Leonard stood up for a final 4-3 edge.

Leo Durocher returned from his five-day suspension by Commissioner A. B. Chandler and things got back to normal at the Polo Grounds. Johnny Mize hit a home run. So did Sid Gordon and Bobby Thomson as the New York Giants wallop Pittsburgh, 11-4.

Brooklyn belted over its "cousins" from Cincinnati, 5-1, with Joe Hatten doing the honors. Catcher Roy Campanella, now leading the league in runs, 46, was belted in with two hits. He has hit safely in the last 10 Dodger games.

American league hitters gave the fences another workout, smashing 13 homers in four games. Comiskey Park again took the worst pasting.

The weak (?) Washington hitters hammered three homers to nipp the Chicago White Sox, 8-7. But not until Floyd Baker, the Sox third baseman, hit the first home run of his seven-year major league career.

It was 7-5 Chicago going into the ninth. Reliever Ernie Groth fed a home run ball to Ed Smith and another to 7-6 Eddie Robinson. Smith was hit by a pitched ball and then Mark Christman swatted his third homer in three games to give Walt Masterson his first '49 decision.

Vic Raschi and Virgil Trucks earned their fourth straight victories for New York and Detroit, respectively. Raschi breezed past St. Louis, 10-5, on a 15-hit Yankee attack led by Phil Rizzuto and Gerry Coleman. Trucks turned back Boston with three hits as Detroit clubbed Mickey Harris for a 5-1 edge.
