# Top-seeded Arrows quiver, fail to Giants

Ross advances on Steinberger's one-hitter

The Fremont Ross softball team already knew how to beat top-seeded Ashland coming into Tuesday's Division I sectional final.

The Little Giants swept the Arrows in a regular season doubleheader 10 days earlier.

But it certainly didn't hurt that Ross saved its best performance of the season for the most important game to date.

Miranda Steinberger tossed a one-hitter for the second day in a row, and Rachel Daugherty blasted a three-run double as the Little Giants cruised to a 6-0 victory over the Arrows and the sectional title at Alumni Field.

"We had dominating pitching, played good defense and had clutch hitting," Ross head coach Mike Gilbert said.

"Today we did it all. It's real nice to win this way."

Ross (18-0) earned its third straight sectional championship and advances to meet Great Lakes League rival Oregon City at 5 p.m. Tuesday in a district semifinal at Ross, Ore., which swept Ross in a pair of league meetings this season, is ranked fourth in the state.

Tuesday's game against Ashland was a rematch of the May 1 doubleheader, which Ross won by scores of 1-0 in eight innings and 5-2 in Little Giants pitchers Sara Hoffman and Stein-

berger did not give up an earned run in the two games.

Ashland head coach Kim Hackborn said the first meetings had little impact on Tuesday's game, but the Ross pitching was just as dominant.

"I don't think it really matters," Hackborn said. "Each day is a new day, anybody can beat anybody. I don't think anything that happened last Saturday has an effect on this game."

"We just weren't there confident. We

watched too many strikes go by. Then we got the hole, and it's hard to get out against a good pitcher."

Steinberger had a perfect game into the fifth inning after retiring the first 13 batters. For the game, she allowed just two basemen, one on a fifth-inning error and the other on Ashland's only hit by ninth-inning Tess Hamilton in the fifth inning.

Steinberger struck out 12 and walked none. "It was the best game she threw all year,"

Gilbert said of Steinberger, who declined comment after the game. "She was dominating. Once you get a 6-0 lead, you can start challenging."

The Ross offense began rolling in the third inning. Leadoff hitter Jaymelee Glaspy beat out an infield single to open the inning, stole second and came home on a two-out single by Paige Kingsborough.

The Little Giants came up with two more in the fifth. Erica Wolfe and Glaspy begin the inning with singles. Wolfe moved to third on Glaspy's single, and Glaspy stole second. Wolfe came home on an infield single by Shannon Hickey, and a Kingsborough bunt brought home Glaspy.

Daugherty's bases-clearing double removed all doubt in the sixth. Nicole Marroquin singles, Tara McAfee walked and Wolfe reached on a fielder's choice to load the bases.

With one out, Daugherty jumped on the first pitch from Ashland pitcher Kelly Clark, ripping the ball into the left-center field gap.

Everyone kept saying, "You can do it," Daugherty said. "I just went out there thinking it's a win-win. If I hit it, we'll score. I was nervous. I had someone tell me to swing at the first pitch because she was throwing strikes first, so that's what I did."

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Daugherty and Glaspy each went 2-for-4 to lead Ross's eight-hit attack.

Gilbert said the sectional title was an impressive accomplishment for a team that struggled to a .500 GLL mark.

"It's a tribute to them," Gilbert said. "We wanted to do better in the league, there's no question about it. But they didn't really get into records. I think they just like to play. I worry about that, but they don't really care."

# Steinberger shuts down Streaks

Fremont to face Ashland today

Earwarmers and hooded sweatshirts tried to shield the Fremont Ross softball players from the harsh elements.

But Ross settled down and fought back to claim a 5-1 come-from-behind triumph with two errors in the first inning.

The Little Giants (17-9) advance to play top-seeded Ashland at 5 p.m.

"I don't know if it was the weather or our lack of focus," Little Giants head coach Mike Gilbert said.

"These kids usually rebound, but we have an inning or two like that (with errors)."

"And Sandusky is a much-improved team and we can't let that happen."

The Little Giants, behind pitcher Miranda Steinberger, weren't letting the Streaks get any hits. Steinberger carried a no-hitter into the seventh inning until Ashley Evans legged out a bunt for Sandusky's

lone hit. Steinberger (12-6) allowed two unearned runs with two walks and seven strikeouts.

"The wind was a problem for us," Streaks head coach Tom Garrand said. "We couldn't seem to hit any balls out in the field. You have to tip your hat to their pitcher. It wasn't until the seventh that we broke up her no-hitter."

"Anytime you throw in bad weather, it's tough to hit. And she did a good job mixing things up to keep us off guard."

Quick errors put Sandusky (8-15) on the board first. Streak lead-off

hitter Tiffany Reed reached first on Ross fielding error and then stole second.

Reed reached the corner on a Lindsay Camella groundout and touched home plate when Victoria Gray's fly ball was dropped.

The Streaks later scored an unearned run in the third.

During the first at bat of the inning, Little Giants catcher Any Reiter went down after being hit by a Steinberger pitch. She was hit right on the collarbone and left the game.

On the next pitch, Reed smacked a short bunt that was thrown into right field, allowing Reed to reach third.

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She then scored on a Camella groundout.

After that, the Ross offense broke through the Streak defense, which made easy outs in the first three innings.

"That's the defense we'd like to play all the time, but it doesn't work out that way," Garrand said. "It's kind of like a fly ball thing. Sometimes we're on, sometimes we're off. But Ross is a good ball club."

Ross's ninth batter, Erica Wolfe, did things started in the top of the third with a double and scored on Jaymelee Glaspy's double on the next at bat. Glaspy then scored on a Kristin Hammer bunt.

Wolfe and Glaspy were 2-for-3 and 2-for-4, respectively. Teammate Tara McAfee went 2-for-4 with a double. Rachel Hammer and Kingsborough each added a hit.

Ross relied on bunts to advance runners who get aboard with a base hit. The strategy proved effective.

Said Gilbert, "We always try and play small ball because that's what's been successful for us in the past. To-

day we were able to get enough hits over their heads to get us into scoring position."

McAfee scored the go-ahead run in the top of the fifth inning. She led off with a double, moved to third on a Lydia Sandusky bunt and scored on a Wolfe's fielder's choice. Wolfe's bunt swing worked perfectly, drawing the Streaks' defense in and then she ripped a liner to the second baseman.

In the sixth, Shannon Hickey reached first on a fielder's choice, and Kingsborough's bunt pushed Hickey to second. Hickey reached third on Rachel Hammer's fielder's choice with Kingsborough, being tagged out at second. Hammer then stole second and Hickey scored on the pickoff attempt.

Little Giants' pinch-runner Stephanie Nagle replaced McAfee, who reached first on a single. Nagle moved to second on a passed ball and another Sandusky sacrifice bunt put her on third. Nagle laced on the final insurance run on a Wolfe single.

Meredith Barrman was the losing pitcher. She allows five runs on eight hits with a strikeout and a walk.
