13 LETTERMEN BACK

Ross Cindermen Aiming Toward April 9 Opener

Thirteen lettermen are back to bolster the Fremont Ross track squad which opens its dual meet season at Harmon Field April 9 against Genoa.

Coach Rod Lash greeted some 60 candidates when the squad began limited indoor drills in mid-February. Since then the team has been working out regularly, even getting outdoors on the few days the weather has permitted.

Lash indicated the squad is well behind some of the metropolitan schools and Buckeye Conference clubs such as Elyria and Mansfield, both of which have indoor facilities.

In his first year as head coach, Lash concedes the team could be improved over last year but said the sprints and quarter mile distances will be the keys.

He added however, that several boys are available in both and the overall team depth looks good.

Senior lettermen back are Jack Goodwin, Bob Mitchell, Gene Yeager, Don Yohe, Dick Thiessen, Ron Roberts and Mike Terry. Junior monogram winners are Tim Arnold, Doug Davis, Ken Meyer, Don Roberts, Dennis VanNess and Wally Pankratz.

Expected to run in the sprints are Thiessen, Yeager, Arnold, Meyer and junior Bob Patterson. Yeager, Ron Roberts, Thiessen, VanNess, Arnold, Jerry Cross, Craig Swartz and Dave Longanbach are counted on to run in the 330.

Don Roberts and Don Yohe have looked good indoors in the pole vault and Lash expects

them to improve once the team is able to get outside. Yohe has cleared 10-9 inside and Roberts 10-6.

The 880-yard relay team which just missed making a trip to the state last spring is back. VanNess, Arnold, Thiessen and Yeager are expected to give Ross strength in that event.

Mitchell, Terry and Yohe are good distance runners while other possible candidates are Dick Henderson, Roy Crayton, Ken Hughes, Phil Keiser, and Jay Shafer. In the weights, Jim Buehler and Russ Coleman are slated for duty along with Pankratz, sophomores Bob Frey and Ron Grimm, John Burkin and Mike Hetrick.

Additional relay help could come from Bill Druckenmiller, while the hurdles will be handled by Goodwin, Davis, Tom Coe, Nathan Inks, and Gary Snyder.

Don Roberts Sets Mark In Pole Vault

OAK HARBOR — Fremont Ross finally got its track season under way Tuesday afternoon and made the occasion an auspicious one by thumping host Oak Harbor, 79-39, with a strong display of strength in the track events.

Coach Rod Lash's cindermen swept four events and picked up first places in every event except the broad jump, shot put, discus and high jump.

Junior Don Roberts was the lone record-breaker at the competition in setting a new school record of 12-3 in winning the pole vault. Ross' only triumph in the five field events. The old mark was 12-0.

Roberts, who will be ineligible next spring because he will

be overage, just missed upping the record to 13 feet when he knocked the bar off on his way down on his first attempt at that height.

He was the meet's individual standout in accounting for 14 of Fremont's 79 points. Roberts added a first place finish in the 120 - yard low hurdles in 15.0, notched a second in the high jump and was third in the broad jump.

Ross swept the 120-yard high hurdles, 100 - yard dash, 440, 120-yard low hurdles and the 220 - yard dash.

Dick Sievert tossed the shot put 43-1 to win that event. Bill Druckenmiller leaped 18-4½ to take the broad jump. Ed Butzin sailed the discus 124-9½ and John Talbert took the high jump on fewer misses at 5-7 to account for the Rockets' first places.

Fremont won both relays with the team of Tim Arnold, Dick Thiessen, Gene Yeager and Dennis Van Ness taking the 880 relay in 1:38.9 and the mile relay squad of Ron Roberts, Tim Arndt, Dick Henderson and Bill Hoffert winning in 3:48.

Close races marked the track competition as Gary Snyder won the high hurdles, run at 120 yards because the Rockets' track wouldn't accommodate a 180-yard race, in 17.0 seconds. Tim Arnold led a Ross sweep of the 100 in 10.5 with Van Ness at 10.6 and Thiessen at 10.8.

Don Yohe captured the mile run in 5:02.9 while Bob Mitchell was at 5:03 and Bill Kodak of Oak Harbor at 5:04.9. In the 440, Hoffert did 56.4 to edge Ron Roberts, Don's brother, who did 56.5, and Arndt, who was clocked in 57.2.

Snyder was right behind Don Roberts in the low hurdles in 15.05 while Ben Chambers of Ross was clocked in 57.2. Mike Terry nailed the 880 win in 2:13.6, with Tom Martin of the host team at 2:13.7 and Jay Shaffer of Ross just behind.

Van Ness was just a step ahead of Arnold in the 220, with the winner finishing in 24.5. Arnold in 24.7 and Thiessen in 24.9.

Ross hosts Genoa and strong Fostoria in a triangular meet at Harmon Field starting at 3:30 p.m. Thursday.


Gump Worsley has earned a free pass to the National Hockey League playoff finals after a 12-year vigil but Punch Imlach will have to pay his way this time.

Worsley was toiling for the second-division New York Rangers when the Canadiens last gained the championship round — and won the Cup for an unprecedented fifth straight year. Two years later, the Gumper made his last post-season appearance prior to this one and the Rangers lost out in the semis to Imlach's Maple Leafs, who were on their way to the first of three consecutive playoff titles.

But, as the colorful Toronto pilot put it, "Lady Luck finally left us," and the Canadiens now will meet the survivor of the Detroit-Chicago series for the big money.

Cindermen Take Two Firsts, Finish Third

Fremont Ross' track team picked up just two first places Thursday afternoon at Harmon Field as the Little Giants finished third in a field of three in the triangular meet with Fostoria and Genoa.

Fostoria won with 65 points, Genoa had 46 and Ross 37.

Don Roberts was Fremont's only solo winner, soaring 11-6 to capture the pole vault easily. Roberts didn't even get in the competition until the bar was at 11 feet and took first place when the other vaulters couldn't get over 11-6. Don Yoho finished third in the event.

Ross' other first was grabbed by the 880 - yard relay team of Tim Arnold, Gene Yeager, Dick Thiessen and Dennis Van Ness in a time of 1:36.5, three seconds better than their time against Oak Harbor.

Bill Stroshine of Genoa and Ed Markoff of Fostoria were the meet's double winners. Stroshine took the broad jump with a leap of 19-3/4 and the 440 run in 54.4. Markoff was the 100-yard dash winner in 10.7 and took the 180-yard low hurdles in 22.5. Gary Snyder of Ross was right in the battle for first in the low hurdles but hit the third to last barrier and fell to the track to finish out of the money.

Jim Baker of Fostoria had no trouble running away from the field in the mile run. He broke out front early and by the second lap was at least 100 yards ahead of the pack. He toured the oval in a good 4:40, seven seconds off the track record. Bob Mitchell got in for a fourth place in that event.

Wally Pankratz scored for Fremont with a third place in the discus with a heave of 119-11. Windischman of Genoa won with a 138-2 toss. Don and Ron Roberts tied for third at 18-7 in the broad jump and Don Roberts got in second in the high jump at 5-6, the same height winner Tom Kramer of Fostoria cleared. Roberts had more practice jumps however and that cost him a tie.

Snyder picked up a third place in the 120-yard high hurdles while Arnold was just a step in back of winner Markoff in the 100-yard dash.

Fremont's other points were garnered by Ron Roberts' fourth in the 440, Don Roberts third in the low hurdles, Mike Terry's third in the 880, Van Ness' second in the 220 and the mile relay team's second in that event. The squad of Ron Roberts, Tim Arndt, Dick Henderson and Bill Hoffert did 3:43.5 while Fostoria was covering the distance in 3:40.7.

Don Roberts came up as Coach Rod Lash's only double winner, again taking the pole vault with a vault of 12 feet and winning the 180-yard low hurdles with a time of 22.7.

Bowling Green piled up 27 points in sweeping the shot put, discus and 880-yard run. Ross' only points in the field events were gained on Roberts' win in the pole vault, his second place in the board

Fate wasn't with the Ross high school track team Tuesday as they fell to Findlay, 60-58. Clincher of the meet could well have been the 880 - yard relay won by the visitors.

Ross' relay team ran its fastest 880 time of the year, but lost for the first time. Their 1:35.4 time wasn't good enough to cross the line ahead of Findlay's 1:34.9.

In running to victory Findlay won seven events. Ross domination of the field events nearly salvaged victory. The Little Giants won four of five field events. They took a total of seven firsts.

Don Roberts was the keyman in the Ross showing with three first places. Roberts leaped 19-8½ in the broad jump, 11-6 in pole vault and raced over the 180-yard low hurdles in :22.5. Roberts was the only winner of more than one event in the meet.

Coach Rod Lash found some bright spots in the showing. The meet opened the final week before the busiest weekend of the track season for Ross. Friday they will be in the Fostoria night relays and Saturday is the Buckeye Conference meet at Mansfield. Lash noted that all of his runners have shown improvement. "Their times are dropping, they improve every meet," noted the coach.

Clincher of the meet was the final event when Findlay completed a relay event sweep. Matching the earlier accomplishment in the 880 - relay the Findlay runners came through with a must win by running the mile relay in 3:37.

Ross displayed improved running in winning both relays, the 220, 440, 880 and 180-yard low hurdles. In two running events won by Redmen, 120-yard high hurdles and 100-yard dash, Ross nearly equalized the five points for first by taking four points with both second and third.

Even in one field event where Ross took a beating there were signs of improvement. Dave Mielke of Ross finished third, one foot behind the winner, but still put the shot 47-3½, best of the season for a Ross putter.

Coach Lash will be keeping a close eye on his ace vaulter, Don Roberts, after a freak accident. Roberts was struck on the head by a vaulting pole. He was catching the pole for a fellow Ross vaulter and apparently had his attention distracted. The blow caused a cut to his forehead.

Despite the injury, Roberts went on to win, but did not try to jump for a record after winning at 11-4.

Ore.; Dallas; Los Angeles; Den.; \$3,175 for a share of second place in the Memphis Open.

The leader, and the best round, in the day's 10 places was 67-69 — 105 by 23-year-old Kermit Zarley Jr. of Yankton, Wash., over the par 70 course.
