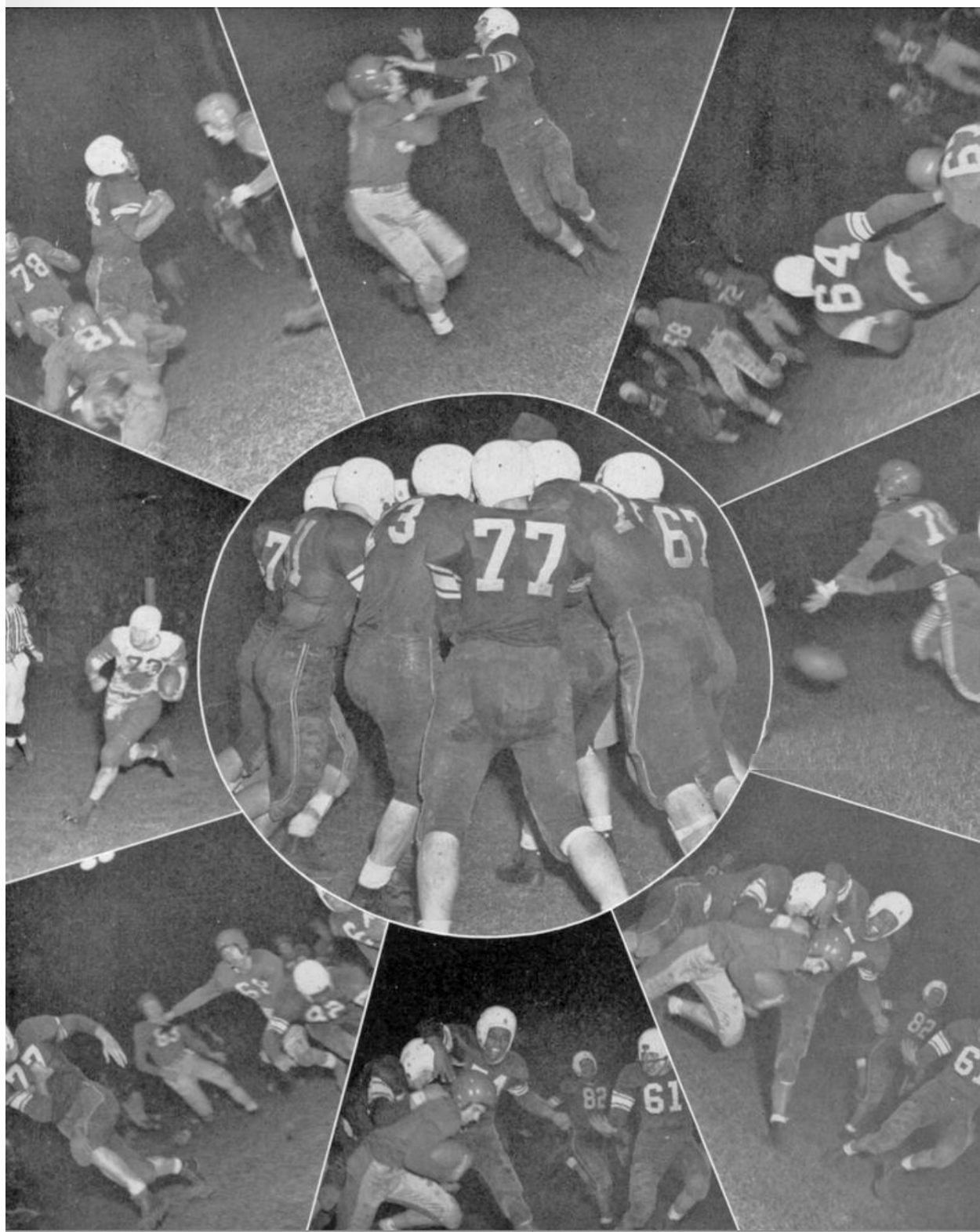
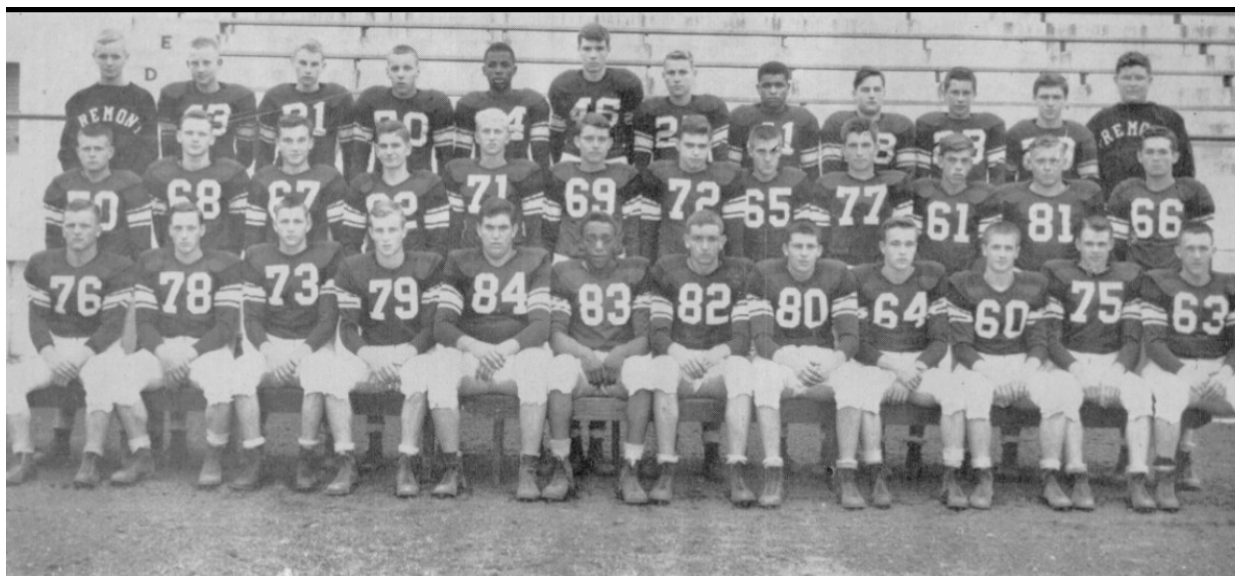

VARSIY FOOTBALL

On September 12th the Little Giant football team opened their season with Dover, a new foe. Walt Weinhardt returned the opening kick off 95 yards for the first score and Ross went on to win 33-13.

The Rossmen invaded Ashland for their next triumph downing the A's 20-6. For the first league game Fremont traveled to Fostoria where they met a stubborn Redmen crew but after a battle came out on top 19-0.

Findlay was the next victim to fall before the attack of the Purple-clad Little Giants. In this game Tex Frey pleased the Home-coming crowd by scoring 18 of Fremont's 45 points.

The winless Sandusky Blue Streaks then came to Harmon Field for their traditional battle. After the battle dust had cleared the scoreboard read 13 for the Little Giants and a big zero for Sandusky. In this game John Auxter sparked the team on with a nice run for the first score.

Tiffin and Bowling Green were the next two teams to face the Rossmen and they also fell under a barrage of touchdowns. Tiffin was routed 53-0 and the score would have been higher if the reserve team hadn't played almost three quarters of the game. The Bowling Green Bobcats went home with a 45-0 drubbing and left Fremont with the Buckeye League Banner.

The next game was rated the game of the week by sports-writers all over Ohio. The Little Giants invaded Elyria in hopes of their eighth straight victory but the Rossmen came home on the short end of a 39-7 score, after playing before 10,000 spectators.

Toledo Scott then met Fremont on the rebound and the Bulldogs were upset 27-0. In the last game Fremont journeyed to Marion Harding where they came to life in the fourth quarter and turned back the foe 13-7.

The Little Giants closed the season with nine wins and one defeat, making it one of the best seasons in Ross High Football. Lester Binkley was head coach with Bob Seele, Harold Schahet, Al Ziemke, Gordon Hart, and John Titsworth as assistants. Bob Heid, Sam Simms, Tex Frey, and Bill Farver received state recognition.

ROSS GRIDDER'S SHOW PROMISE

Coach Les Binkley and a number of other Fremonters had their first look at the 1948 version of the Ross high football team in action yesterday against Toledo DeVilbiss in a scrimmage.

Teams worked their first string against each other for some 30 minutes and their second teams for about some 10 minutes. Each team scored a pair of touchdowns and although Ross looked far from a club that would easily equal its record of a year ago, neither did it look like any pushover for the coming year.

DeVilbiss boasted a very big line which proved quite troublesome for Ross. Bob Beck, George Batie, Charley Glover and Tommy Lee saw considerable action in the backfield for Ross but it was Dick Sherman who threw a pass to Hosea Simms to score the second Ross touchdown.

Club gave signs it could use plenty of additional work. Team shows a great deal of promise but with only four lettermen around the premises will have to work hard to gain the necessary experience.

Considering Ross has been in practice for only a week or so and DeVilbiss has been going since Aug. 20 and had been touted strongly, the locals gave hint that in time they will be plenty rough.

LITTLE GIANTS MEET UP WITH SPEEDY RIVAL

Local Lineup To Be Different On Offense, Defense

Ross high's Little Giants hit the road today in their first test of the 1948 grid campaign meeting Dover high at Dover at 7 tonight Fremont time.

Coach Les Binkley's club had a tough pair of brogans to fill in those of the 1947 aggregation and in Dover were scheduled to meet a speedy but light club that is supposed to be able to throw the ball.

This Dover team which went down to a 33 to 13 shellacking a year ago should remember Ross quite well. Ten of the 11 starters are lettermen and four started a year ago. Two of the returned starters are backfield men Paul Yackey and Friday Livingston. The returning linemen are Socrates Space, a guard, and Ron Cassella, another guard. Three underclassmen will be in the lineup, Carl Barlock, a sophomore, at center; Dick Lauber, a junior, at tackle; and Livingston, Junior.

For Ross the only starter from a year ago is Bob Beck at fullback. Bob Beeker, an end; Tommy Lee, converted from center to quarterback; and Bill Johnson, a tackle, are the other returning lettermen.

The rest will be new faces and it is on the unknown quality of these players in actual game conditions that the balance of the team hangs.

Beck Did Well

Last night Coach Binkley put his boys through their final workout under the lights at Harmon field. The club worked on kicking and passing. In both points Bob Beck was the key man. If Beck can perform the way he did last night Ross should convert any extra points that it attempts. In the passing Beck again was the chief thrower with Dick Sherman also a few.

The club left for Dover at eight this morning. They were to stop at Wooster for lunch and then continue on into Dover arriving early in the afternoon. The team will stay overnight at New Philadelphia following the game.

Ross' starting lineup was subject to change according to who kicked off and who received. If Ross kicked Dean Kellogg would start at right guard and Dick Sherman at right halfback. If the Little Giants received, Marlin Farver will hold down the guard position and George Batie would take over the right half spot.

In the weight department Dover will boast a line averaging about 157 and a line going about 168. Ross will field a backfield averaging around 166 while the line will go around 178 which gives the locals a definite edge in the heft department.

Since no one should make Glover or Batie look bad on speed the Ross backs should more than hold their own there but in the line Dover will have the speed advantage.

The Dover bunch will be a nice crew to hurdle but one capable of being tripped up by.

Little Giants Surprise With Easy Win In Inaugural Effort

Ross high's Little Giants, as green as grass as varsity football teams go, but as willing as the day is long to battle for every inch of ground on a gridiron, pulled a cold surprise Friday night at Dover by whipping the Crimson Tornado by a 33-7 score.

The final result compares favorably with last year's 33-13 advantage for the crack Ross team of that season. Dover was reported up this year, the team's followers being amazed last night at the ease with which the Little Giants ran the Tornado's ends and broke up through the middle. The ramping ability of Coach Leo Hinkley's boys is proven by the yardage gained from rushing—a 433 total. Another 21 yards came from passing, a scoring toss by Bob Beck to Dick Sherman on the goal line.

Dover's rushing gain was 169, but you take 27 yards from that for losses caused when Ross linemen broke through to smother plays before they were started.

The crowd was estimated at 4,000 but most of the cash customers present were Doverites, not too many Fremonters wishing to make the better than 100-mile journey to the Tuscarawas county city, then driving back home the same night. Many localites stayed away, too, fearing that the Fremont crew, filled by graduation after a splendid 1947 season, would not come close to winning.

But the idea of losing apparently didn't occur to the Little Giant team.

One two-down came in the first period, two in the second and two more in the fourth. Dick Sherman and George Batte scored two each, and Bud Nord getting one. Extra points, three of them, were made by Charlie Glover. Bob Beck and Dick Willey, Dover's wide team with only three around it, took Paul Yackey, Dover's captain, leading a pass into the flat to Phil Livingston, senior, halfback, who ran over the goal as time ran out. The play covered 49 yards. Yackey's placement was good.

No One Hurt

All the Ross players came out of the game in good shape, except for the usual bumps and bruises. The squad stayed overnight in the Hotel Reeves at New Philadelphia, being due home about noon today.

Dover returned to start the half game, Livingston tying Beck's

kickoff back to the 41. Dover ran two plays, putting up five and 13

yards, but on the second play Nat Carl Scarborough, 1947 champion, Richards, fumbled and the alert and

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LITTLE GIANTS FAVORED OVER VISITING TEAM

Binkley's Squad Seeks Win No. 2 Of Infant Season

An overflow crowd of over 5,000 Fremonters is expected to greet Ross high's 1948 gridiron team tonight in their home debut against Ashland high at Harmon field at 8.

The Little Giants will be out to make the Taylor Tots dead duck No. 2 on their schedule. And after whipping Dover by a 33 to 7 score last week while Ashland was being tripped 7 to 6 by Willard, the locals will have to be made a definite favorite in the game.

On paper the two teams are pretty much in the same boat in both weight and experience, or rather lack of experience. The visitors will have just two lettermen from last year's squad in the game tonight. One is Dick Scott, an end who might cause some trouble for Ross' powerful attack around the ends. The other, yet is Raymond Bates who has been converted into a fullback from a end position that he held down a year ago.

For Coach Les Binkley's squad, it will be the same lineup, with one possible exception, as took to the field last Friday away from home in Dover. Dan Miller, 190 pound Junior tackle, is slated to get the starting nod over Phil Keller. The latter was a little too over-anxious last week and in a close game the penalties called because of his being offside would hurt.

Boys In Shape

Some of the boys picked up an assortment of bruises last week and one or two others complained of slight colds. But otherwise the team was in tip top shape.

That is considerably more than can be said of Ashland. The opposition tonight has lost four players through injuries, two through broken legs, another by a broken ankle and another with a broken collarbone.

The last who will be missed the most for the Ashland squad is Howard Fackler who is out with the ankle injury. The latter was the speed merchant in the backfield for the team and was counted on to be the sparkplug on offense.

Ashland, incidentally, is a club that runs from the T formation strictly, while Coach Les Binkley at Ross, of course, relies on the single wing for a power laden ground attack.

The most unusual part of the Ashland offense is a boy named Art Griffith who is reported to be an exceptional place kicking artist. However in the Willard game he failed on three attempts although one was from as far out as the 40 yard line.

The big part about the Ross team in its game last week was the fact that it didn't fumble the ball. That was something which in early practices appeared to be an unfailing weakness on the squad.

Ground Attack Strong

Ross ran up the amazing yardage of 433 yards on the ground. When you can eat up that much territory without fumbling the ball then you are bound to hit pay dirt often. The club attempted only two passes, completing one. You can expect the Ashland line to be playing its secondary very close tonight.

Ashland will be out to bounce back from its initial defeat. Inexperience reportedly cost them their first game. The big question tonight will be whether Ross can overcome its own greenness to the surprising degree that it did a week ago.

While Ross battles Ashland, the other Buckeye league schools also will be getting in their last game preparatory to league competition. Bowling Green will play host to Whitmer, Fostoria greets Marion and Findlay journeys to Lima South.

ROSS RUNNING GAME IS TOO MUCH FOR Foe

Beck, Batie And Glover All Score Against Visitors

The raw ability of Ross' high school football team again overshadowed its obvious lack of experience as the Little Giant gridders romped to an easy 28 to 7 victory over Ashland before an estimated crowd of over 5,000 people at Harmon field last night.

Coach Les Binkley's squad was simply too powerful and fast for the weak Taylor Tots of Ashland. The locals were often ragged in performance but the Ashland team could do nothing to convert the opportunities handed it.

Ross scored its initial touchdown just prior to the end of the first quarter. The drive started on the 30 yard line when Bob Beck intercepted an Ashland pass.

A 15 yard penalty set the club back to the Ashland 45. But George Batie exploded around his left end and dashed all the way to the 10 yard line. Speedy Charley Glover tried the right side of the line and cracked through to the five yard stripe. Batie next moved all the way to the one yard marker and Bob Beck ploughed into the end zone for the first score.

Charley Glover swept around right end untouched for the extra point.

The home team had shown its running power even earlier in the game but a pass interception halted the drive. After Ashland had received the kickoff and gone nowhere fast, Ross took over the ball on its own 39. The Binkley men drove all the way to the Ashland 25 before the drive petered out as George Glasser intercepted the first pass thrown by Bob Beck.

Back Move
Ashland again found itself going nowhere upon receiving the kickoff after Ross' first touchdown. Shortly following the start of the second quarter, the visitors punted to Ross. Glover grabbed the ball on his own 24 and scooted back to the Ross 42. Another 15 yard penalty set them back but Glover and Beck alternated to push the ball to the Ashland 33. George Batie broke wide around his left end to go all the way for a score. An offside penalty nullified that run.

But after Glover had picked up three yards, Batie again got loose and sped to the Ashland 20. Glover then scurried through the grasp of three men who had clean shots at him, to put the ball on the 8 yard line. Batie again went wide around left end and there was no penalty to stop the score.

Beck passed to Bob Becker for extra point.

Ashland opened up its aerial game after the second score. Glasser intercepted a pass from Beck intended for Becker on the Ross 48. Glasser faded back and hit Captain Dick Scott of the visitors on the 33 yard line and he scooted all the way to the five yard line.

Ashland tried to run, failed and then Glasser tried to pass again and Glover leaped up to intercept the ball. Two plays later the half ended.

Ross showed no letup in its ground attack at the start of the second half of play. Bob Beck took the kick on his 10 yard line—the start of a 90 yard drive to pay dirt and returned the ball to the 38 yard line. Glover, Beck and Batie alternated to bring the ball to the Ashland 24. Then Dick Sherman tried his hand and went off tackle all the way to the 12 yard line. Beck crashed through the middle to the one yard line and then on the next play went over for the score.

Batie burst over the left side of the line for the extra point.

Defense Sags
The most noticeable weakness on the Ross team, pass defense, reared its ugly head early in the final quarter as Ashland scored its lone tally. One of the Ross defensemen lost his man as Scott for Ashland got a good 15 yards into the clear and Glasser hit him with a looping over the shoulder toss. The play covered 45 yards as Scott dashed over to score.

Art Griffith booted the extra point.

Ross, however, wasted no time in building up its margin again. Glover took the kickoff after the Ashland score and ran the ball all the way from the five to Ross 37 yard line. Beck brought the pigskin up to the 43 yard line. Glover fairly flew over tackle to the Ashland 38. Bud Nord took a hand in things and added to the 27. Glover on two tries brought the ball to the 10 yard marker. Beck moved to the six and then Glover carried into the end zone.

Nord ran over for the extra point.

Time ran out as Ashland made one last try to get its offense moving.

American League Three Way Tie

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(U.P.)—After a slight delay of five months the American league pennant race got under way today with the Boston Red Sox, Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees in a triple tie for first place—just as if they hadn't been playing ball virtually every day since last April.

It was the closest race in 40 years in the American league and it promised to stay that way right down until the final day of the season—a week from Sunday.

"It looks like we're right back where we started from," said Buckey Harris, Yankee manager, after his boys defeated the Red Sox, 9 to 6, to go into a tie for the lead. The Yankees hadn't touched the top level, even on a sharing basis, since opening day when they were there after a win over Washington.

The triple tie was accomplished with the Yankee victory over Boston and the Detroit Tigers' 4 to 3

PENALTIES HIT ROSSMEN HARD

Statistics are normally dull things but those ground rushing figures are the perfect explanation of the Ross grid success. The locals had absolutely no difficulty with Ashland's line, gaining 303 yards. That's a total of over 260 yards in two games. The Little Giants' line pushed the Ashland forward well around almost at will on offense. And although the visitors opened some pretty good holes of their own on offense, their backs had neither the speed nor drive to take advantage of the openings.

Incredibly enough Ross again did not fumble against Ashland which is amazing, considering the inexperience of the team. One play which left the spectators some what dumfounded was when George Batie stopped dead in his tracks once after getting into the clear. George seemed to look around to see where he was. It didn't do Ashland any good as Batie still ran away from them. However, a penalty nullified his run.

Penalties, primarily the fault of inexperience, again hounded the team. With 70 yards more added last night, the club may well have the dubious honor of setting a new record for the school this year.

Bob Beck had to get off just one kick and it was a beauty that traveled 53 yards. Hosea Sims showed he knew how to get down under the punt, too, by nailing Phil Lersch with a vicious tackle after the Ashland gridders grabbed the ball.

Loren Tibbals, sports editor of the Ashland paper, commented that Ross looked better this year than a year ago at least in the backfield. In addition to a broadcast locally by Station WPRO, WATG in Ashland also covered the game. Ross was wearing its white uniforms while Ashland was in orange. The Ross band also made its local debut of the year, giving a fine performance.

Dick Sherman who covered an important fumble by Dover early in that game, turned the trick again against Ashland, grabbing a bubble when Lersch lost the ball on the Ross nine-yard line in the third quarter.

In attempting to nail who recovered a fumble, one of the officials wound up on the bottom of a pile loaded with players from both sides. Dean Kellogg of Ross should have lost at least a good 20 pounds running in and out of the game. The other team must have lost weight when he was in the game.

LITTLE GIANTS HAVE TO HALT SPEEDY RIVAL

Capacity Crowd
Is Expected To
Take In Battle

All roads lead to Harmon field tonight as an expected capacity crowd will sit or jam its way in to view Ross high's initial defense of the Buckeye league football crown.

The foe, Fostoria high, poses as the most serious challenger in the league for the championship. On paper and off their season's record to date, they are rated superior to the remainder of the Buckeye schools which Ross will face.

For the Little Giants it will be their first big test of the year. After disposing of two inferior opponents with little or no trouble, the locals go up against a team that is listed as a very potent aggregation.

The task tonight will be to manhandle Carlos Jackson, the lightning fast halfback, who has run and passed Fostoria to two victories this year. And who a year ago ran wild against most every opponent save Ross high.

Besides Jackson, Fostoria boasts strong ends in Al Cotter and Ray Pastorious, but Pastorious is said to be in poor physical condition and the rest of the Fostoria line is just as inexperienced as is Ross high's.

For the locals there will probably be one change in the starting lineup. Dean (Humphrey) Kellogg will be in to start at a guard post instead of Dick White. The latter has had a severe cold and is not expected to see much action, if any.

Drills Toughies

Through the week Ross has been put through a series of almost savage intersquad drills in preparation for the game. It has been pointed out that a week ago when rain cut into the practice sessions, the team was not nearly as effective against its rival Ashland as it was in the opening game against Dover. This week, the only fear could be that the team might go stale from overwork.

All reserved seats for the game have been sold and Fostoria's allotment of 800 tickets were almost sold. All that remained were a good number of general admission seats and with good weather, a huge crowd could be expected.

Fostoria, or rather Jackson, presents a challenge to the Ross grid-ers. A year ago with Sim Sims, now at Ohio State, the big gun, Jackson was stopped cold and spent most of his time going backwards. Last week when Fostoria upset Marion Harding, 26 to 6, Jackson ran to three touchdowns and passed to another. It is Ross' problem to stop such a performance this week.

On the other hand Fostoria will be bucking one of the strongest attacks in the area which features a heavy, yet inexperienced, line and a pair of the fastest halfbacks in the state.

Ross will average over a 10 pound weight advantage per man over Fostoria. Fostoria's line goes at about 172 while Ross high's nears the 186 mark. In the starting backfield, Fostoria goes at about 155 while Ross goes at around 166.

Defenses Differ

Through the week Coach Binkley has used several of the Fostoria plays in practice and also shown that he will employ different defenses to stop Fostoria. Other than the normal six man line with the three backers playing close used by Ross, the club also has been practicing with a diamond type defense.

It's a big game. Ross knows it, the fans know it, and no one is taking chances on not being prepared for it.

Ross Running Attack Simply Overpowers Latest Opponent

A new scorecard was all that was needed. That's how Fostoria fans felt after taking their second straight 19 to 0 shellacking in two years at the hands of Ross high's Little Giants. It was the third win in a row for the locals this season.

A new and inexperienced line, Fostoria were told of Ross. They could see no difference. A new and inexperienced backfield, the visitors were informed. They could see a difference of only added speed.

It all added up to one thing. For a collection of inexperienced help, Ross had an awfully good team. The greenness may yet blow up in their faces, but until it does, this year's opposition can sit tight and keep worrying.

Last night before a jam packed capacity crowd of over 6,000, Ross pounded out a savage three touchdown victory. The Ross line out-weighted, out-charged and outplayed Fostoria's. It gave the highly touted Carlos Jackson another extremely difficult time. He didn't spend as much time going backwards as last year but neither did he advance to any stage of progression this season.

No Danger
Ross was never in danger until late in the fourth quarter while it knocked on Fostoria's door all night. The visitors hung lamely on through most of the first half but finally with little more than 20 seconds left in the first half Bob Beck ploughed over from one yard out to climax a 52 yard march. Charley Glover swept over tackle for the extra point.

Fostoria still stayed within striking distance of Ross until the first part of the fourth quarter. Then behind the most beautiful blocking of the season Glover swept wide around his own right end, outraced the Fostoria secondary and went 64 yards for a touchdown. Beck failed to go over on a plunge for the extra point.

Later in the fourth period Ross recovered a Fostoria fumble on its own 47 yard line. The team started another sustained march and finally Beck again went over from one yard out. Dick Sherman failed on a plunge for the extra point.

This was a team victory. You couldn't point out one man as an individual star. The line made the holes and the backs got through them no matter how small or brief some were.

Ross relied strictly on its ground attack. Bob Beck faded back once in the first quarter as if to pass but was smeared before he could get the ball away.

Fostoria only threw two passes until the fourth quarter and then in desperation heaved 11 in the final quarter. Thanks to four pass interference calls, they completed six losses.

The visitors toward the end of the game got the ball as far as the five yard line with a first down but Ross held and took the ball over on downs. After punting out of danger Fostoria began to move again but on the final play of the game Bob Beck intercepted a Jackson pass on the Ross 25 and scooted all the way back to the Fostoria 46 before being brought down by Jackson.

With the exception of Glover's run, Beck's return of the interception and the runback of a punt for about 30 yards, the greater part of the Ross total ground yardage of 279 yards was picked up in two and three yard chunks. Beck was the key man as he battled time and time again through the center of the line. He carried the ball the first four tries for Ross.

The locals threatened early in the first quarter when they drove from their own 38 to the Fostoria 27 only to lose the ball when Glover fumbled. Sherman's punt return from his own 33 to Fostoria's 37 seemingly put the club on the march again.

The Rossmen drove down to the 20 but were halted there as Jackson nailed Batie from behind coming around from the other side on a fourth down.

Ross got the ball again on its own 37 and moved to the Fostoria 46 where it lost the ball on downs as Batie was halted just shy of picking up the last necessary yard on fourth down. Fostoria then fumbled, however, and Marlin Farver recovered on the Fostoria 48. That's where Ross began its first real TD drive. Sherman, Beck, Batie and Glover did the carrying with Tom Lee doing some fine blocking in the quarterback post before Beck finally went over.

Quick Kick
Ross received to start the second half and after moving from its own 21 to 37 then Bob Beck got off his second quick kick of the year and the ball rolled dead on the Fostoria 13 yard line.

Fostoria went to kick out and the ball was blocked on third down by the right side of the Ross line.

Jackson recovered, however, for Fostoria and then the club booted again. Ross started on another drive but a fumble on fourth down with a few yards to go halted the bid.

After Fostoria had gotten nowhere, Ross took over and Glover electrified the crowd as at the very start of the final period he found daylight and outraced the Fostoria team for the record score.

As Fostoria was rated No. 1 contender beneath Champion Ross for the Buckeye league crown, the locals seemed destined to retain the title at least another year.

But for Fostoria, the worst part was the thought that almost the whole Ross team will be around next year while Jackson will be gone.

Kellogg Lost

Even without Dean (Humphrey) Kellogg, Ross will retain a considerable advantage over its hosts. With Kellogg out and Dick White in his place, that knocks about 160 pounds of extra beef out of the lineup and sends the line average plummeting from 186 to 173 pounds. Findlay averages around 160 pounds which is even lighter than Fostoria was. The biggest man on their starting line goes about 185.

Reports on Findlay say that the club goes in for a considerable bit of razzle dazzle. It does boast of speed in the backfield with four or five backs who can reportedly carry the mail but quickly. The Trojans have in past games done a good bit of lateraling, and used wide sweeps.

In Captain Bob File the team is also supposed to have the best passer that Ross has yet encountered. However the Findlay line has not been said to look strong. The tackles are said to be weak and that is supposed to be the strong point on any line. The guards are very light, both men going around 145 but supposedly quite fast.

During the practices this week Kellogg wasn't the only boy to be banged up. Both Phil Keller and Marlin Farver were kicked in the head during scrimmages but both are reported in good shape.

Surprises Due

One thing that may be in promise for tonight is that Coach Les Binkley may spring a few surprises offensively himself. During the week Coach Binkley had his boys working on a number of plays that have not been seen in games to date.

With the exception that White will be in most all of the game for Kellogg tonight instead of alternating with him as was the case in the past, the Ross lineup will be the same as in the early games.

Before trimming Bowling Green, Findlay lost a tough 18 to 12 game to Lima South and whipped Dayton Dunbar 14 to 6. While Bowling Green visits Tiffin Columbian in the other Buckeye league game, Fostoria tests Port Clinton in an independent contest.

The Ross players were to leave for Findlay at about five after eating here. They were to return immediately after the game.

Rossmen Add Fourth Victory Of Season In Wild Contest

Ross high's Little Giants were still unbeaten today but only after one of the more fantastic and bitter football games in the history of the school. Ross scored its fourth straight victory at Russell stadium in a 7 over Findlay last night. However the score in no way indicates the closeness of the game.

The game was fantastic in that Bob Beck was ejected from the contest for unnecessary roughness—in simpler words fighting—when the official who did the banning was possibly the only one to note him strike any alleged blow.

It was fantastic that Ross lost the ball after being allowed apparently only three downs while deep in their own territory in the third quarter.

It was fantastic in that the out-weighted Findlay team outsmarted Ross with a brand of razzle-dazzle football that refused to be subdued despite a very slippery turf.

It was fantastic in that Findlay almost reached pay dirt on one play where what appeared to most everyone to be a very definite forward lateral was ruled a fumble and allowed to pass.

It was fantastic too that this bit of the fighting Findlay team almost came from behind a 13 to 0 deficit to upend Ross.

It was not such a state until lanky Bob Becker picked off a Findlay pass and raced 60 yards to score the final touchdown and save the day for Ross.

Three Stand Out

Defeat might have easily come to Ross last night. But along with Becker, two more boys, found to great heights. They were two who didn't shape up much in pre-season operations. One was Dick Sherman who after replacing Beck, scored two touchdowns, played brilliantly on defense and stopped one Findlay march with a pass interception. The other was Gene Gehb who appeared to be making two out of every three tackles backing up the Ross line.

If there was any question that Findlay didn't battle Ross with its own pass offense, the figures tell their own story. The crowd gained some 149 yards rushing and another 131 yards passing. The Rossmen on the other hand picked up 185 yards on the ground and but 14 through the air. Findlay also made 12 first downs to eight for Ross.

The game even started on an odd note as Ross received for the first time this year. But the club went nowhere and Beck punted to Findlay. The Trojans immediately started to drive. Moving from their own 40, the club drove all the way to the Ross 18 where Sherman made his most important pass interception.

Bob File was the key man in the drive for Findlay as he was all night. He passed overhand and underhand and started runs that ended in pitcheouts to a man going outside. All night the entire Ross team invariably chased the man with the ball disregarding and allowing the flanker to go wide and eventually grab a lateral.

Neither Findlay nor Ross could go anywhere on the next exchange of punts. Ross was stopped to a great extent by three offside penalties called at vital times.

But on the exchange of punts Ross got the better of it. For Beck got off a quick kick that carried all the way to the Findlay 15, the key play to setting up the first score.

Findlay was pushed back to its four-yard line and punted out to its own 35. Charley Glover zipped over tackle to the 21-yard mark. It was also there that Beck was ejected from the contest.

Beck had given the ball off on a handoff and Guard Fred Wilch dropped on Beck. From the stands the consensus of opinion was that Wilch was apparently jolting Beck, but the official turned to only see two players on the ground and immediately banished both.

Beck denied he ever struck a blow. But Beck's absence could not halt the Ross drive. Batte moved to the 18 and Sherman to the 11. On the next play Sherman cut over tackle for the remaining distance and a TD. Becker tried to make a beautiful catch of Sherman's pass but could not quite hold onto the ball for the extra point.

Sherman Goes Over
Findlay drove all the way to the 15 and then punted to Ross on its 26-yard line. It was there that the game was almost given away to Findlay. The Little Giants ran two running plays but on the second a 15-yard penalty was called. This would normally nullify the play and Ross thought just that. Sherman then threw to Becker and connected on a pass. Three or four more yards were needed for a first down and Ross, believing it was third down tried a run and was stopped. But the official ruled it was fourth down and gave the ball to Findlay. The official explained that the ball had been dead when the penalty was called and so the second running play was not nullified.

The Trojans drove to the 11-yard line but were halted just at the turn of the quarter. Ross got a tremendous break when a Findlay receiver dropped a ball in the clear on last down with two blockers in front of him. Ross moved to its own 39 and then punted to the Findlay 31 and Findlay again started to move. It was here that Findlay once seemed stopped but File of Findlay, the best passer encountered all year by C. Ross slipped to Wise who was trapped and appeared to try to lateral to Saltzman and connected. It was similar to plays pulled by Findlay all night except that the ball was definitely sent forward, but the officials ruled it a fumble that Findlay recovered in mid-air and was allowed to advance.

Here Comes Becker

Findlay moved all the way to the 36 and with only three minutes remaining in the game again seemed knocking on the door. But then Bob Becker doped out a File pass, flinched back and poked it off. He was almost tackled as he caught the ball but squirmed away and went 60 yards for the score. He had five of the Ross players, costing him the greater part of the way. That was the ball game. Glover ran over for the extra point.

The Fremont section of the 4,000 hardy souls who braved the damp and cold weather to view the contest slumped back. They had seen first-hand how much trouble this green Ross crew could head into against as smart and fast a club as Findlay. They could think too that it was only the unbridled performances by a number of the less renowned members of the squad, Sherman, Gehb and Becker, who kept the club from going down to defeat.

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ROSSMEN SEEK FIFTH VICTORY IN SUCCESSION

Local Team Again Holds Big Weight Margin Over Rival

The biggest game of this year or any other year as far as Fremont and Sandusky football fans are concerned comes off tonight at eight when the Little Giants of Ross invade Strobel field to meet the Sandusky Blue Streaks.

Ross with the much superior record and a much heavier team should rate a definite favorite over the Sandusky team. But the word from the latter town is that the fans and players there are all up in the air over the contest and just laying for the Ross gridgers.

Good Spirit

One notion has definitely been brought back here by people up to Sandusky. That is the fact that the team has more spirit than it has had in a number of years and that the dissension which was reportedly evident the last couple of years is definitely gone.

However, as far as weight goes, Ross again has the big advantage over its opponent. The Sandusky line only averages around 166 pounds and the backfield goes at 148 pounds.

Ron Lauber, the one returning letterman in the backfield for Sandusky, is only 150 pounds, but reportedly had a great deal of drive. The team is said to have a considerable bit of speed in its backfield with a boy named Elwood Clemens, the speed merchant.

The club has had little success with its passing so far but scouting reports have hinted that is because they have gone up against strong pass defenses.

Plenty of tickets were reported still available for the game and there are no reserved seats sold at Strobel field, Sandusky.

Bob Beck Sparks Gridders To Conquest Of Traditional Foe

Ross high's Little Giants led by Bonmin' Bobby Beck powered their way to their fifth straight victory of the season 20 to 7 over a light Sandusky team last night before some 1,500 spectators at Strobel field, Sandusky.

Ross tallied in the first, third and fourth quarters while the Blue Streaks reached pay dirt for their one score late in the fourth period. For possibly the first time all season, one man stood out above the rest. And that was Beck, the senior fullback, who was found unstoppable by the Sandusky club.

The Little Giants drove for the initial touchdown the very first time they received the ball. Beck returned the kickoff from his own 15 to 38, but a clipping penalty from the 43-yard line set the ball back on the 27. In three tries Beck powered his way back up to the 43-yard mark. Charley Glover moved to the 49 and Dick Sherman romped to the Sandusky 41. Then it was Glover racing to Blue Streaks' 31-yard line. Glover moved to the 29 and then Beck in two more attempts ploughed to the 18 and Glover romped to the nine. There Beck took over again. He banged through to the two and then went over for the score. Then Beck turned to be a very rough add to his work he romped through for the extra point.

The two clubs then battled on fairly even terms until midway through the second quarter. A 45-yard quick kick by Beck put a 15-kick. Neither case was described as serious and the manner in which Glover for one outdistanced the Sandusky secondary when he saw daylight on those two long runs seemed to indicate he was in all the way to the Ross 44 yard line before being bounced out of bounds.

Sandusky couldn't go anywhere from there and the teams went through an exchange of punts which saw the Blue Streaks again take over on the Ross 48. Elwood Clemens sidestepped his way to the 38 and Kreimes tipped to the 31. Clemens then went all the way to the 16 but a 15-yard penalty nullified the run and put the ball back on the 42.

Pass Backfires
The Blue Streaks finally had to punt and Ross took over on the 20. The club moved up to the 34 but then Ross tried its first pass and it backfired badly. Beck's toss was intercepted by Tom McGory 12 who raced from the 20 yard line all the way back to the 17 yard line.

The Ross forward wall then proceeded to stop Sandusky cold. On fourth down McGory sent a pass to Clemens. The latter got behind the Ross defense, and also wound up out of the end zone when he tried to catch the ball but dropped it.

It was the end of the half a few plays later and Ross clung to a slim 7 to 0 lead.

Ross kicked off to Sandusky to start the second half. Again the Blue Streaks couldn't advance and punted to Ross. Taking the ball on the 49 the Little Giants went the distance for a score. Glover on three tries moved all the way to the Sandusky 42. Beck went back to work and in three attempts wound up with the ball on the Sandusky 21. Glover moved to the 14.

Beck then lugged the pigskin to the six yard line, to the three yard marker, and finally went over for the second score. He plunged for the extra point to make it 14 to 0.

Later in the third quarter Ross again hit pay dirt but the score was nullified by a penalty. Charley Glover on a beautiful run sprinted 49 yards into the end zone, but a clipping penalty against Beck ruled out the score.

Ross capitalized on a break in the fourth quarter for its final tally. Beck quick kicked and the ball bounced off a Sandusky player and alert Dick Sherman covered it on the Sandusky 40. Glover romped to the 36 and then it was Beck in two tries placing the ball on the 25.

In a moment Ross had six more points as Glover, like a bolt of lightning dashed over tackle, cut to his left and sprinted 25 yards to score. Sherman tried to kick the extra point, but the attempt was low.

With just five minutes left in the contest the Sandusky score was set up when Ross fumbled on its own 32 yard line. The Blue Streaks could move only to the 30 on three plays. But on fourth down Dan Coffey attempted to pass. The ball was batted up in the air by a Ross defenseman and came down in the hands of Lavern Ward of Sandusky who romped the remaining 20 yards for the score. Kreimes booted the extra point.

Handed Opportunity
The Sanduskians were handed another scoring opportunity when on the kick following the score the Ross backfield just let the pigskin roll around until Sandusky fell on the free ball and took possession on the 30. However time ran out as the Sanduskians could move only to the 20 yard line.

Besides playing a brilliant game on offense Beck also was a tower of strength backing up the line. Big Bill Johnson who received a couple of hard smacks on the nose which caused it to bleed profusely for a spell was the big man on the line with Howe Sims also playing a standout game.

Varsity Sees Limited Action As Little Giants Win Sixth

Ross high griders chalked up victory No. 6 last night at Harmon field over a hapless Tiffin Columbian team, 34 to 0, and the score could just as easily have been 80 to 0.

Coach Les Binkley cleared the bench, 36 players seeing action. The varsity wasn't in the game more than one quarter adding together the first and third period time the first stringers saw service.

Two touchdowns crossed the goal in the first period, two more in the third and one in the fourth. At the start of the last period, Coach Binkley waved every varsity lad into the dressing room and when the game ended only the boys just who were on the field remained outside the shower room.

As Coach Bill Krauss of Columbian put it: "We had no more license on the football field against Ross high than we would have against the Chicago Bears."

And he meant it. His lads, fighting until the last gun sounded, took a physical beating, the Little Giants blocking and tackling for keeps.

Back Injured

One Columbian lad, hard-working Jerry Van Camp, the quarterback, was taken to Mercy hospital at Tiffin for an X-ray to determine whether his left shoulder is broken.

Only Little Giant banged up at all was Marlin Farver, sophomore guard, who has a hip bruise.

Ross scored the first time it had the ball, Bob Beck crashing over for three yards. Ross had received Beck totting the leather back to Tiffin's 49, and in 10 plays had a TD. To provide an innovation, Dick Sherman, place-kicker the extra point. Bill Titsworth holding the ball. It was the first placement point scored all year by the Little Giants. Sherman repeated on the next three touchdowns, missing only the fifth one.

Second score came the next time the Ross lads had the ball. Sherman taking Chuck Warren's punt from his 29 to the 38. Beck picked up six and Charlie Glover broke around right end for 37 yards to the 19. Sherman sprinted around left end for the touchdown.

That was all the scoring until the third period, a fumble halting a second team drive.

In the third session, Hosea Sims booted a low kickoff. Van Camp fumbled it on the 25 and the same Sims fell on it. On the first play, Ross tried another signal for the first time this year, Beck tossing a spot pass across the line of scrimmage to Sherman, who ran 10 yards then lateraled to Glover who went the rest of the way. The play was good for the full 25.

A partially blocked Tiffin kick set up the next TD. Columbian received, but couldn't gain from the 10. Warren's return kick going out on the 21. Ross was penalized 15 for holding, picked up 10 on two plays, then Beck fired an aerial to Sherman. Harger, Tiffin center, touched the ball, but Sherman grabbed it on the 15 and ran across.

Nord Moves

The final score was one of the prettiest of the evening. Ross put the ball in play on its own 33, moved to the 19 on two plays with Bud Nord scooting 33 yards only to have the ball called back for a holding violation. The youngsters were not to be stopped, though, Nord, Bill Titsworth and Dick Winnes alternating to move it to the 29 on first down where Nord broke around left end, stiff armed two tacklers and outran a couple of more for the score.

Ross fans got to look at many boys who have not performed this year, many of them with possibilities, making things look pretty good for the next few years. Among the new performers were Bob Markley, who spelled Beck at full; Jerome Surratt, a diminutive speed boy who was so excited in his first game his true speed was not shown; Dick Winnes, who also hit hard at the fullback spot; husky John Allen at center, and several others.

Despite the fact that there is little comparison between the two records of the school, Bowling Green people are almost cocky about the outcome of the game. Bowling Green has walloped three extremely weak football teams in past weeks and the prestige of the Bobcats has soared at least in Bowling Green.

Bowling Green observers even go as far as to point out that B. G. whipped Tiffin Columbian worse than Ross did. Apparently no one told them Ross could have doubled its score with little difficulty if the varsity had been left in.

Actually Bowling Green and Ross have played two common rivals so far, hapless Columbian and Findlay. Bowling Green whipped Columbian 46 to 0 while Ross turned the trick 34 to 0. Bowling Green lost to Findlay 7 to 0 while Ross bumped the Trojans 20 to 7.

Bobcats In Shape

If Bowling Green was to have any edge on Ross, it would be in the injury department. The Bowling Green team is in tip top shape. Ross on the other hand has had three boys missing from practice at least one day this week in Marlin Farver, Bob Beck and Dick Sherman. Farver is not expected to see any action. However, Beck and Sherman who have had touches of the flu are expected to be ready to go. Also back in the lineup for Ross will be Dean Kellogg at guard.

Bowling Green is described as big and fast. The line is supposed to be as big as Ross high's. The club lists six lettermen back and the offense is built around Roger McKenzie, a fullback shifted to left half.

ROSS WHIPS

Beck Scores Twice As Little Giants Stop Bobcats 13 To 7

Ross high's Little Giants were the undisputed champions of the Buckeye league for the second straight year today. And they were still unbeaten after winning their seventh straight victory, 13 to 7, over Bowling Green high school last night on the Bobcats' home field before a jam-packed crowd of over 5,000 spectators.

But the championship, the victory was secondary. The Little Giants, the inexperienced crew who have learned as they went along, knew something else today. The Ross griders knew they could win the hard way, that they could play in the clutch. They proved it by whipping a good but definitely hopped-up ball team. The game had the word "Upset" written all over it. But Ross showed it had what all good ball games must have, the ability to come through in the clutch even when having a generally off night.

It was a ball game that had numerous key plays that spelled the difference between victory and defeat. There was that pass interception by Gene Geb, that halted a Bobcat march and started Ross off on the winning drive.

There was George Batie, the chunky speedster who had shown such promise at the start of the campaign but had slipped strangely into the background, who came off the bench in the third quarter to spark the winning touchdown drive.

But most of all what showed that the Little Giants had it was the stand on their own five yard line. With one yard to go on fourth down, the Ross forward wall slammed the ball carrier so hard that he not only failed to make the necessary yardage, but also fumbled the ball.

That was the payoff play. The game had started in true Ross style, just as most of the others. Ross took the opening kickoff and drove immediately for a touchdown. The Little Giants after Tommy Lee returned the kickoff to the 27 yard line marched the whole distance.

Beck Booms
It was Booming Bobby Beck through the middle, and Charley Glover off the tackles and around the ends. They alternated down the field until Beck, finally rammed over from the one yard line. He then tailed the extra point by plunging over. The only diversion from straight running, a play throughout the drive was one eight yard pass from Beck to Bob Beck.

There were just three minutes left in the first quarter after that sustained march. It looked like Ross was going to be too powerful for its foe just as it had been all season. But Bowling Green proved it wasn't so.

It was all Bowling Green through the second period. After taking the kick following the touchdown to the B. G. 40 yard line, the Bobcats drove on the ground to the Ross 38. Then Quarterback Barney Firden hit Dave Witte, a wee bit of a fellow at six feet four inches, with a pass but the end fumbled the ball on the Ross 30 yard line and Gene Geb recovered it.

Ross could go nowhere on two downs and Beck came up with his specialty, a 35 yard quick kick, that put Bowling Green back on its heels on the B. G. 20 yard line. Then came the fun where Ross found out the pass was quicker than the eye. On the ground Bowling Green drove up to its own 48 yard line. Firden chucked to Witte to put the ball on the Ross 40.

Immediately following, Firden faked back and flipped a pass to Bob Johnston, who had gotten out behind the Ross secondary and who hit daylight. He was in the clear and on his way to a touchdown when Dick Sherman belted him out of bounds with a desperation tackle on the one yard line.

Ross held for one down on the one yard marker, but then Sam Adams, a tackle converted into a fullback, plunged over for a touchdown. Guard Paul Sautter kicked the extra point and it was a brand new ball game.

The Little Giants came back as if they were going to go right back into the lead. After returning the kick to the 35, Beck connected on an 11 yard pass to Becker, and with Beck and Glover doing the carrying, the club went all the way to the B. G. 19 yard line before losing the ball on downs.

Bowling Green then went to work again. A pass from Johnston to Norm Mooney out of a kick formation put the ball on the Ross 47. Another pass from Firden to Roger McKenzie put the ball on the 15. Bowling Green moved to the 15 yard line but then time ran out in the half.

B. G. Moves
Came the third quarter and Bowling Green started on the move again. The team took the ball on the opening kickoff and marched all the way to the Ross 31 yard line. The Ross forward wall lightened and hit Bowling Green for a nine yard loss, but both teams were ruled offside and the play was nullified.

Then came one of those key plays. Firden went back and chucked another pass. But this time Gene Geb plucked the pigskin out of the air on the 25 yard line and Ross was on its way. Beck plunged up to the 32 yard line on two attempts. Into the game came George Batie and he immediately ripped 10 yards around left and to the 42 yard line. Batie moved next to the 44 and then burst around end again to the Bowling Green 42.

Beck on three tries drove to the 31, and Batie followed with the big ground gainer, a 26 yard scamper to the five yard line. On three tries, Beck again plunged over for the touchdown. He tried to drive over for the extra point but was stopped.

The third quarter ended there. Bowling Green could go nowhere on offense after it got the ball again and punted to Ross on the Little Giant 19 yard marker. Ross in turn was forced to punt and Beck got off a 37 yard boot. Bowling Green returned the punt to the Ross 40 but a 15 yard penalty slapped Ross back to its 26 yard line. Bowling Green took full advantage of the break and once again started to move. Sticking strictly to the ground, the Bobcats drove

to the Ross five yard line with a fourth down coming up. Adams went into the line, was hit solidly, fumbled, recovered, but short of the necessary yardage for the first down.

Ross had stood its ground when it had to and that was the ball game.

Quick Kick

There was five minutes left then in the game. Ross drove up to the 26 and then Beck gave the Bobcats the specialty again getting off a 31 yard quick kick to the Bowling Green 31 yard line.

Bowling Green took to the air but was halted. On fourth down, Bowling Green had a man open with a blocker in front of him but the toss was bad and didn't reach the mark. Ross took over and Beck bucked to the 26 yard line. Then on the final play of the game, Charley Glover raced around right end to the 10 yard line, but that was the end of the contest.

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ROSS GRIDDER SEEK REVENGE OVER PIONEERS

Opponent Was Last Team To Win Over Ross

The Little Giants of Ross high take to Harmon field tonight at 8 with a dual purpose in mind. The Rossmen will be out to hang up their eighth straight victory of the campaign and to gain revenge for the one defeat suffered over the last two seasons.

Elyria high presents the opposition. And the Pioneers are remembered as the one team to defeat Ross last season, the only defeat in the last 17 games. A year ago Elyria was claiming the state football title or at least fighting for the honor with Barberton.

This year the Pioneers bring to town a football team that has one but one game, tied one and lost five. The team scored its one victory over Sandusky, 25 to 0. It gained a 13 to 13 tie with Cleveland Heights, and lost tot Shaker Heights, Lakewood, Youngstown South, Shaw and Toledo DeVilbiss. Where at this time last year, the team was in first place in the very rugged Lake Erie league, this year it occupies the basement.

Same Picture

Ross, of course, looks to be much the same as it was last year. The team is unbeaten and has won its league title. The one difference is that the scores have been much closer for the Ross team this season. A year ago Ross went to Elyria after trimming Bowling Green 45 to 0. This year it plays host to the Pioneers after just having eked out a 13 to 7 win over the B. G. squad.

The Elyria line will average about 172 pounds on offense which is just about even with the Ross line. On defense, the entry of a pair of 200 pound tackles into the game sends the line averaging to about 185, which is also about the same as the Ross line when Dean Kellogg is in on defense.

The Elyria backfield only goes at about 154 which is considerably lighter than the 165 sported by the Little Giant backfield.

The Pioneer offense is built primarily around Tony Curcillo, the 188-pound fullback who does the running, passing and kicking, and is co-captain of the team along with Tackle Jim Lear. The principal offensive threat of the Elyria team is the passing combination of Curcillo to End Andy Arvay, a 150-pounder who has plenty of speed.

Parents Honored

Curcillo Steals Show Scoring Two Touchdowns For Pioneers

The Pioneers of Elyria high rudely shattered any dreams of an unbeaten season for Ross high last night at Harmon field by scoring a 13 to 7 victory over the Little Giants before an estimated 2,500 spectators.

No one told Tony Curcillo and company that it was a good night for ducks, period. For Elyria played through the driving rain that turned the field into a quagmire as though it was just a nice evening and an easy place to hold one's footing.

Curcillo, the Elyria fullback who took over the spotlight that shone a year ago on Vic Janowicz, was the whole show. He ran, he passed, he kicked, and did a beautiful job of backing up the line. Three or four times it appeared as though Bob Beck was going to burst through the middle and go and forth to each other. Ross made all the way only to have Curcillo stop him at the last possible moment.

The game started out in typical Ross fashion. The Little Giants kicked off and Elyria went nowhere its first time on offense. Ross on the other hand drove all the way from the Ross 27 to the Elyria 29 the first time it got its hands on the ball.

The initial Little Giant drive stalled on the 29 but near the end of the first quarter Ross again took possession of the pigskin on the Elyria 45 yard line and drove all the way for a touchdown.

Beck drove to the 42 and then all the way to the 17. Charley Glover sped to the eight yard line, and then Beck burst through a tremendous hole for the score. Glover skirted his own right end for the extra point.

Curcillo Is Off

Ross kicked off to Elyria and the Pioneers returned to the 45 yard line. The quarter ended there and then Ross got its first taste of Curcillo's running.

On the very first play of the second quarter, Curcillo started wide around his own right end. It looked as though he was going to be hit for a loss but he got around the potential tackler. He seemed boxed in as he neared the side lines and was surrounded by a host of Ross players. But he stopped dead in his tracks, saw one small piece of daylight, and cut back through the hole. He was gone in to the secondary then and proceeded to run away from the whole Ross team to go 55 yards for the score.

Curcillo passed to End Andy Arway for the extra point to tie the score.

Ross drove all the way to the Elyria 37 yard line after receiving the kickoff but the Little Giants were halted there. Then Ross got a taste of Curcillo as a passer.

Curcillo first flipped a pass to Halfback Tom Ristas for a first down on the 50. Then he flipped to Halfback Phil Hahn all the way to the 37 yard line, and then to End Andy Arway to the 29 and then again to Arway to the seven yard line.

Curcillo bucked to the two yard line and then went over for the score. Ross defenders were never in a position to cover the Elyria receivers. Curcillo's passes would have been considered very fine on a dry night, but with the weather what it was, the performance was just magnificent.

Elyria missed the extra point as Curcillo was stopped on a plunge. And that second Elyria touchdown was the end of the scoring for the evening, although both teams threatened during the second half.

Elyria again received the kickoff to start the second period and moved all the way to the Ross 30 yard line before losing the ball on a fumble.

Ross couldn't advance the ball and was pushed back to the 18 yard line when Beck tried to quick kick on third down and the pass from center was high and the Ross back lost the handle on the ball. However Beck came back to get off a beautiful kick to the Elyria 44 to get Ross out of a potential hole.

Elyria advanced to the 48 and then Curcillo went back to pass but couldn't find a receiver. So he neatly wove his way through the Ross defense to go all the way to the Ross 34 but a 15 yard clipping penalty pushed Elyria back and it had to punt out to the Ross 16.

Ross Makes Bid

Here late in the third quarter Ross made its bid. Beck boomed to the 26 and then to the 38. Glover lost back to the 35 but Beck went to the 48 and then Sherman went to the 49. Beck on three more tries drove to the Elyria 38.

However the drive was stopped on the 34 just at the turn into the fourth quarter and that was the ball game. Elyria, in turn, moved all the way to the Ross 20 yard line but a fumble there again halted the Pioneers.

Local Squad Out To Start Another Winning Streak

Over 8,000 football fans are expected to turn out at Evans stadium, Springfield, tonight when Ross high tangles with the Springfield Wildcats. The Little Giants from Ross will be attempting to start out on another winning streak and also try to regain some of the prestige lost by Northwest Ohio grid teams in previous battles with teams from other districts.

The Little Giants, who have won seven and lost one game this season, will be meeting in Springfield a team that has won only two out of eight games on its schedule. However there is all the difference in the world between the schedules of the two teams. Springfield plays one of the toughest schedules in the entire state and the same cannot be said of Ross. The game again shapes up as another battle to prove just how much difference there is in the caliber of play in the various districts in the state.

Teams Are Even

As far as size and experience goes the two teams stand about even. Springfield is big, perhaps even a little more so than the Ross team. For instance the Wildcat starting line goes at 182 pounds. The big man is Tackle Jack Grant at 228. The club also boasts of a pretty big pair of ends in Don DeJong and Al Sanders. DeJong is 6'3" in height and weighs 180. Sanders is an even six feet and weighs 182.

In the backfield the starting foursome will at 172 and the two boys who do most of the carrying, Fred Pearl and Clive Rush are the big boys. Pearl, the main cog on offense who is a good runner and passer, stands 6'2" and weighs in at 185. Rush, the fullback, stands 6'1" and weighs 181.

Springfield also shapes up as having just as many underclassmen in the lineup as does Ross. The backfield goes the same as Ross. The only senior is Rush, the fullback. The others are all juniors. On the line five juniors and two seniors are listed. The latter two are the left guard, Thomas and the center, Downey.

Two Formations

The club runs from both the T formation and the single wing offense with Pearl and Rush the chief ground gainers. The game will be the first in history with Springfield and there is only a one year contract for the contest.

Closest comparison of records may be made through the fact that Toledo Libbey whacked Springfield 24 to 6 in the opening game of the year. Libbey is the only team out of the Northwest district to have played Springfield. Other than Libbey, Portsmouth, Middletown, Mansfield, Hamilton, and Lima Central have trimmed the Wildcats. The team has scored victories over Piqua and Youngstown Campbell Memorial. Some comparison might be made out of the fact Mansfield just beat Springfield by one touch-

Little Giants Wage Scoreless Battle In Rain With Wildcats

Ross high's Little Giants and the Wildcats of Springfield, two normally high scoring football teams, battled to a 0 to 0 deadlock through a constant downpour of rain at Evans stadium, Springfield, last night before an estimated 4,000 people.

The Little Giants, who definitely are poor mudders, found their attack sputtering on and off at crucial times and although leading statistically in every department could never punch over for a score. Springfield never really threatened seriously to reach pay dirt. The Ross line led by Bill Johnson and Dean Kellogg along with some great backing up by Bob Beck and Tom Lee was just too much for the Wildcats.

It was the second straight week that Ross had been forced to play on a muddy turf and through a downpour. There was one difference in the game this week from the affair the week previous. Springfield was just as handicapped as was Ross by the weather. The Wildcats had no one who threw the ball with any proficiency which wasn't the case last week with Elyria. But still the rain and the big Springfield line was equal to the occasion of being the first team to hold Ross scoreless.

False Start

The game in no way started out as what shaped up to be a scoreless battle. Ross kicked off but Springfield could go nowhere. The Wildcats punted and Dick Sherman, who was brilliant on punt returns all night, brought the ball all the way back from the 15 to the 38 yard line.

Then on the very first play Bob Beck burst through a huge hole in the line, got away from a pair of would be tacklers in the secondary and went all the way to the Springfield 18 yard line before being brought down from behind. But a clipping penalty was called on the 25 and the ball was pushed back to the 40.

Ross attack was stopped there and the two teams waged a punting duel into the second quarter. Early in the second quarter Beck went from his own 27 to the 41 but then an offside penalty sent the team back to the 35. A fumble pushed the team back to the 33 and then Beck proceeded to get off a booming quick kick from the 32 that went all the way to the Springfield 32 yard line.

Into the Springfield lineup came John Dilliam, a half back who had been out since early season with a head injury, who almost broke the game open. He got clear around his right end and was heading for daylight all the way up to the Springfield 38 when he fell over a blocker in front of him. But an offside penalty nullified the play and pushed the ball back to the 15. Bob Sheets of Springfield then cracked all the way up to the Springfield 32 and Clive Rush went to the 41.

Ross held there and Rush kicked with Sherman returning the ball from the 35 to the 58. Glover slipped to the 44. Beck cracked to the 36 and then to the Springfield 25. Beck again carried and went to the 58. Glover tried next and on some very pretty twisting moved all the way to the 18.

Beck cracked to the 8. Another fumble recovered by Ross pushed the team to the 11. Battle went to the 10 and then Beck to the 8 but there Ross lost the ball on downs and one play later time ran out in the half.

Ross received the kick to start the second half and Tom Lee brought the ball all the way back from the five to the 42 yard line. Sherman plunged to the 46 and Beck went to the 50. Beck cracked to the 48 for what would have been a first down but instead another offside penalty pushed Ross back to its own 45. Glover went to the Springfield 48. And on fourth down with a yard to go Ross gambled. Beck tried to go for the yard and the first down but there was no hole and he was stopped cold.

Springfield tried hard to take

advantage of the Ross gamble that failed. Fred Pearl moved to the 46 and Sheets went to the 48. Then Pearl faded back to chuck a pass but Charley Glover intercepted for Ross on the 24 yard line.

Ross could go nowhere and Beck tried another quick kick. The punt was almost blocked but Beck got away to the Springfield 40.

The Little Giants were handed one of their infrequent breaks a few plays later. After being stopped for three downs Springfield went back to punt but Rush fumbled the ball and recovered on his own 40. However it was fourth down and Ross took possession at that point.

More Offsides

Another offside penalty, however, stopped Ross and Springfield again took over on its own 36. Sheets of Springfield moved up to the Ross 42 and then Pearl connected to Don DeLong on a pass to the Ross 34. Pearl went to the 30, but then a 15-yard penalty for illegal formation pushed the ball back to the 45.

Ross held for downs and finally the Springfield booted into the end zone for a touchback and Ross took over on the 20. Here Ross made its final bid. Beck on three tries went to the 31 and then Glover to the 34. Sherman on a pretty piece of running moved all the way to the Springfield 46. Beck went to the 41 and then Glover swept to the 29.

Here yet another offside pushed Ross back to the 34. Glover went to the 36 and Beck to the 24. Sherman dashed to the 19 but another offside pushed the team back to the 24. Sherman finally cracked to the 36 and finally on fourth down Beck tried to plunge for the first down but was stopped short on the 10. That was the half game.

Little Giants Close Out Grid Season In Driving Rain Storm

The Little Giants of Ross high wrote the finishing chapter on one of their greatest football seasons in history last night at Harmon field scoring a 13 to 6 victory over Marion Harding high.

The Little Giants simply outclassed the opposition as they recorded their eighth victory of the season. Only one of the worst rain storms imaginable stopped Ross from running up a much larger score. The entire second half of the game was played through a driving rain and wind that not only made good football impossible but wound up having the game played in half darkness as a great number of the lights were blown out.

It required just eight times for Ross to carry the ball in order to produce the initial touchdown. Marion kicked off and the Little Giants drove straight down the field for a TD. Bob Beck returned the opening kickoff from the 20 to the 31-yard line.

Beck picked up two yards on the first play. Then Charley Glover sprinted off tackle to go all the way to the Marion 46-yard line. Beck drove down to the Marion 27-yard marker and Glover moved to the 12. Beck powered to the nine-yard line.

George Batie was given the ball and skirted wide around his own left end and went all the way for the touchdown. Beck tried to buck over for the extra point but was stopped.

30-Yard March

That opening drive covered 30 yards and although the Ross backs did some beautiful running on the slippery turf, it was the play of the line that was opening huge holes through the Marion forward wall that indicated Ross was headed for little trouble.

Marion made a first down the first time it got its hands on the ball, thanks to the aid of an off-side penalty on fourth down as the visitors kicked. That gave Marion the ball on its own 38, but two plays later the Presidents found themselves parked back on their own 30-yard line.

Ross, which has used the quick kick to perfection all year, got a taste of its own medicine for a change when Fullback Clarence Smith of Marion booted a 55-yard beauty to the Ross 15-yard line. However Dick Sherman picked the ball up on the 15 and raced all the way back to the 27-yard line.

Here the Little Giants were off and running again as the team showed the most diversified attack of any time through the season. Instead of just relying on Beck's power plunges, everybody in the backfield tried his hand and it worked perfectly.

Glover started off by ripping to the Marion 44-yard line. Dick Sherman moved to the 35. Beck went to the 31 but Sherman lost back to the 33. Then Glover came through again to the 20. At this point Marion had spread out its defense to stop the sweeps of Glover and Sherman.

Perfect Setup

It was a perfect setup for Beck and he burst through the middle and ran over one would-be tackler to go 20 yards for the second touchdown. Beck plunged right over center through a tremendous hole for the extra point to make it 13 to 0. The dash for the touchdown came on the very first play of the second quarter.

The teams exchanged punts through the second quarter until Ross finally wound up with possession on its own 16. Here the Little Giants started another drive. Glover dashed all the way to the 34. Sherman moved to the 41. Beck went to the 46 and Glover to the 50. Beck plowed to the Marion 43 and Batie who kept alternating with Sherman, moved to the 40.

Time was running out in the half and at this point Beck connected with the first pass of the night to End Bob Beeker down to the 27-yard line.

With just a few seconds left to play in the half, Beck hit Glover with a screen pass but Glover was stopped on the 16-yard line as the gun went off.

The rains came just at the end of the intermission and with its coming went any resemblance of football. Through the second half the two teams just waddled around in the mire and muck although Marion came within four yards of a touchdown.

Ross kicked off to Marion to start the second half but the receiver fumbled and Gene Gelb recovered on the Marion 41. Ross moved as far as the 33 but there lost the ball on downs. Marion was forced to punt after going nowhere on three plays and Ross took over on the Marion 45. Sherman squirmed his way to the Marion 25. Beck went to the 23, Sherman to the 18 and Glover to the 13. Here Ross was finally stopped by a combination of the Marion line and the mud.

Visitors Drive

After an exchange of punts Marion finally wound up with the ball on its own 38. The visitors drove all the way to the eight-yard line where they had a first down. But here the Ross line rose to the occasion and Marion could go no further than to the four-yard marker on four plays.

Ross took over and drove all the way back to its own 47 before time ran out quickly to end the contest and the season for Ross.

That was it for the year. A great season that saw Ross win eight games, tie one and lose one, was finished. Six boys, Bob Beck, Bob Beeker, Bill Johnson, Gene Gelb, Dick Pratt and Bob Graham dressed in Ross uniforms for the last time.

The seniors who played their final game last night played great games. So did the kids who will be back next year. It was the greatest team effort put forth by any team all season especially in the backfield where for a change everybody had a hand in things.
