Six vets on Ross diamond squad

The success of the Ross baseball fortunes for 1976 revolve around six veterans and a pitching staff hurt by injuries before the season gets under way.

Ed Platzer comes off a 13-9 season, his first as the head coach at Ross, and will be depending upon the six lettermen, three of them 300 hitters or better.

them .300 hitters or better.

With Roger Berge, a senior, and Jerry White, junior, serving as cocaptains, the Little Giants get the spring season kicked off Saturday with a pair of games at Admiral King. The opening two games are also the first contests in the West Division of the two-division Buckeye Conference.

"We have a veteran outfield,"
Platzer said, but quickly added,
"we lost three of our four infielders."

The outfield of Berger (.300-plus last season), Kim Stout, and John Kiser, the leading Little Giants hitter at .363 a year ago, is strong both defensively and at the bat.

Kiser, however, is also the Little

Giants' top pitcher. The do-it-all senior also will bat cleanup for Platzer and his assistant coach, Hank Miesle. When Kiser takes to the mound, his place in right field will be handled by Mark Matthews or Tony Ruiz, both juniors.

The only returnee in the infield is Pat Belch at shortstop who alternated with graduated Mark Lohrbach at the spot. Belch is also the number two pitcher for Platzer but a bothersome elbow may knock him from the mound this season.

At first for Platzer will be junior Ray Long with senior Mark Conley the backup. At second base will be either Joe Pena or Jed Davis, both rated as good fielders.

The hot corner will go to White, who batted .400 in 12 varsity appearances last season. White is also the backup catcher to veteran senior Mike McGilton. Bob Moore, a senior, will give depth to the third base spot.

Berger, in left field, could be spelled by junior Dan Joachim, who has shown promise with the bat in early practice.

Stout, a senior, figures to be the mainstay in center.

"We are strong up the middle with McGilton, Belch, Pena or Davis, and Stout," Plazer said.

"Our hitting was pretty good at the beginning of practice," the Ross coach said, "but lately in scrimmage games it has not been that good."

While Platzer and Miesle, his hitting coach, figure the hitting will get better, the Ross mentors cast a wishful eye to the mound

"There is no other way to say it, pitching is 80-90 per cent of the game. If our pitchers have control and throw strikes, it should be a good year. If they don't, well . . ." his voice tailed off after that.

Belch and Kiser are the lone senior pitchers while Dave Ballenger, Warren Stout, Ewe Straube, Long and Kevin Casey are all juniors. Casey is the lone lefthander on the staff.



CINCINNATI — The Colerain Cardinals proved to be too tough for the Ross baseball team Wednesday as the hosts made life miserable for the Giants on their southern trip with a doubleheader sweep, 10-1 and 10-0.

Colerain put the first game away with six runs in the second inning. Kim Stout provided Ross with its only run of the day with a home run in the third inning of the first game. Stout collected three hits in four times up to pace the Ross attack.

Bill Millecker paced Colerain in the opening game with three hits in three times up and two RBI's. Pitchers Todd Wright and John Kiser both went the distance. Wright didn't allow a walk and recorded 10 strikeouts while scattering eight Ross hits.

In the nightcap, Bill Burnios

tossed a three-hit shutout for Colerain, and like Wright, didn't walk a batter and struck out 10.

Colerain blasted Ross pitchers Uwe Stroube and Ray Long for 13 hits and scored five runs in the first inning and four in the sixth. The big blows were a pair of home runs by Dave Kraws. Kraws had a threerun homer in the first and a tworun blast in the sixth.

The closest Ross came to scoring off of Wright was in the third inning when Mike McGilton led off with a triple, but was stranded there when Wright struck out three straight batters.

Colerain raised its season record to 17-5 with the sweep while Ross is now 0-6. The Giants close their trip today with a doubleheader at Cincinnati LaSalle, a team which beat Colerain, according to Ross coach Ed Platzer.




Long stroked a three-run homer for Ross while White doubled and Stout tripled and singled twice.
