Clyde stepped over with a dandy pair of forwards in the Misses Terris and Edy and a center, Miss Evans, who was a busy body during the evening. They also presented a trio of guards, Misses Taylor, Leibongood and Heyman, who rode herd on Fremont shooters until it was nobody's business. Captain Althoff and a newcomer, Miss Benner, playing her first game in select company, outgrew their early game nervousness as the combating progressed and hurled in ample points to edge out the lassies from the neighboring community. They had a hard chore in doing it, however. Fielders by Althoff and Benner and a donation heave by Mooney put Fremont out in the van 5 to 0 before Clyde rolled into action. The Edy girl and Terris and Evans got the range in hot scrimmage and piled away the nettag until they led 8 to 6 at the quarter.

It was a ding dong battle in the second quarter with Fremont coming along from a rear guard position after Edy and Evans had piled it up 11 to 6. Althoff, Demmel and Benner reigned supreme in the fag moments and the returns were 13 to 11, favoring Fremont at the half. The tide of battle shifted with all the gals out there like folks scurrying about when a mouse shows up at a quilting bee. They displayed skill at passing, too and eased in plenty of collar and elbow work. Clyde had the edge 18 to 17 at the third quarter and the outcome was a swell gamble for the 50-50 bettors.

A free toss by Captain Althoff who had previously missed enough shots to win the Battle of Bunker Hill, tied the count 18 to 18 in the early fourth quarter. Althoff, hooked a long pass from Benner and sank a fielder and then, getting the target on her sights, sank a free heave, putting it 23 to 18.

This was the break in the game Benner and Althoff shot it up to 27 and then, this Miss Evans came close to winning the game all by her lonesome.

She tagged three neat fielders in a row, starting her eleventh hour flurry when the count was 27 to 18 against her. Her work had the crowd in an uproar but she fell shy three points when the gun stopped the interesting floor sketch.

Interesting Game Won by

It took considerable floor gallop-  
ing on the part of the Fremont  
high school lassies to elbow the  
gals from Port Clinton high out of  
the picture in a give and take cage  
romp at Ross gym Saturday night.  
Althoff, Mooney, Benner and  
Delp made the points that piled up  
the winning total, but never miss  
the thought that it was the swell  
work of Rimelspach, Magsig and  
Empecke on the guard line that  
made it possible for the purple and  
whiters to take the nod when the  
visitors were making a strenuous  
and determined bid for the honors  
in the last three seconds of play.

The purple and white, Althoff,  
Benner and Mooney alternating in  
the tossing, raced along with a  
comfortable lead during the first  
phases of the game, but a tall girl  
named Lutz was a real threat all  
the way and she popped in a two-  
pointer every now and then to  
keep her team in the going. The  
count at the half was 20 to 15, fav-  
oring Fremont and at the counting  
in the third frame, the locals had a  
28 to 20 lead which looked perfect-  
ly all right for an easy victory.

Something occurred in the final  
round, however, to spur the gals  
from the lake shore into more vio-  
lent action and their bid for the  
game was one of the interesting  
spots of the current cage season.

Miss Lay, and she failed to mis-  
lay naught during the final round,  
came to the able aid of the Misses  
Lutz and Lenke, two of the able  
Port Clinton fingers, and stirred  
up plenty of industry while the red  
and white guards blanketed the  
Fremont scoring section for the  
time being. Lenke made it 28 to

heaved one at the hoop that raced  
all around the rim and dropped off  
—on the wrong side for Port Clin-  
ton, but all proper for Fremont.  
The Fremont guards went into a  
huddle with the Lutz and Lay com-  
bination and hung on like a stamp  
to a dun letter until the gun shiv-  
ered the tense czone and Fremont  
had won by a margin so slender  
that you couldn't drive settle be-  
tween victory and defeat with a 10-  
pound sledge.

Benner, with seven dandy and  
timely fielders, led the Fremont  
range finders. Althoff, usually the  
star heaver, made but three field-  
ers but she buried four from the  
bread line. Mooney hit the hoop  
thrice and Delp bagged the other  
fielder.

Lutz, Lay and Lenke starred for  
Port Clinton, as did their guards,  
St. Clair, Larsen and Johnson.

The Fremont girls have won  
eight out of nine games played and  
their only defeat this season was at  
the hands of the Rhineville team  
and by a narrow margin.

In defeating Port Clinton they  
look another fine crew into camp  
but, when the credit for the victory  
is being eased about in conversa-  
tion, don't forget Empecke, Magsig  
and Rimelspach, guards, who never  
get into the scoring limelight but  
are just the brilliant if as obscured  
as that all important cog in base-  
ball—the catcher behind the bat.

# ALTHOFF PUTS GAME ON ICE FOR FREMONT

## Accurate Shooting Gives Lassies Victory in Final Game

Fremont 26, North Baltimore 23.

The Fremont High Lassies closed a very successful basket campaign last night at Ross gym, when they took a crew of buxom gals from North Baltimore into the heavy membership lodge of defeat without much trouble. The visitors, at one stage of the first half were trailing 19 to 0 and Captain Althoff, of the purple and white team was playing solitaire, slinging in single counters and two pointers from all angles of the arena.

The game had drawn into the center section of the second quarter, before Miss Jackson, center and star of the visiting Amazons got into the game and ushered the ball into the knitting for her team's first counter. After that this Miss Jackson was considerable in the game. The count at the half was 25 to 5, favoring Fremont.

Jackson from Baltimore collected nine of her team's 10 points in the third period and was going great guns until Miss Empecke, Fremont guard who had been sidelined owing to illness, was sent back into the fray by Coach Eleanor Tennerstedt. Empecke rode herd on the Jackson party to such an extent that she got out of the heaving habit and the road being blocked, the purple and whiter sailed on to an easy win.

Althoff shot seven fielders and six free tosses for a neat total of 21 points, just about her best effort of the season. Miss Jackson bent the ball over the iron hoop for seven fielders and two charity hoists, total of 16, not bad either.

Rimelspach played another whale of a game at guard for Fremont and it was a fairly interesting combat and might fast with some good passing, when the visitors got a bit used to the big floor and started to shower the bucket a la Jackson.

It was the sixth victory for Fremont out of seven scheduled starts, the only defeat being experienced at Bloomville where they lost by a single point. This is one of the best records for girls teams in these parts and the showing places the purple and white lassies as queens of the courts in this section.
