Ross will depend on youth this year

Ross will open the high school wrestling season Friday with a decided emphasis on youth.

"The sophomores that we will use in the lineup will make or break us this season," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler, now in his 13th season as the Little Giants mat boss, said. "I won't hesitate to say that some of our returning lettermen will not be in the lineup this season."

"Of course, after being oh and seven last season and you have good sophomores coming up, you go with them," Voggenthaler said.

Voggenthaler clicked off the names of three sophomores and added a freshman he feels certain will be in the opening lineup. The freshman is 98-pounder Matt Marinis, winner of several state and area AAU championships while competing for the Fremont Wrestling Club.

"I am sure about him," the Ross coach admitted, "there is no doubt about it."

The sophomores that Voggenthaler is confident will be in the lineup are 126-pounder Gerald Palomo, Shawn Ramirez at 155 and Jerrid Potter at 132. Palomo and Ramirez, like Marinis are winners of several state and area AAU championships.

The Ross coach rates the lighter weights as being the strength of his teams.

"And if we get everyone in the right weights, the upper weights will be tough, too," Voggenthaler projected.

There are seven returning lettermen for the Little Giants, led by returning Buckeye

Conference champions Mike Mezinger (112) and Matt Smith (185). Mezinger, who had a 22-6 record as a junior, will be at 119 this season while Smith, 20-7 a year ago, will probably be at heavyweight his senior season. Mezinger was the team's most valuable wrestler in the 1983-84 season.

Todd Beatty (175), Dave Middleton (138) and Mezinger are two-year lettermen. Other lettermen include Charles Hicks (112), John Lozano (145), Chris Vaffis (112), George Weissinger (167) and Smith. Hicks, Lozano, Vaffis and Weissinger are juniors.

With Marinis at 98,

Voggenthaler is faced with possibly having to call up another freshman to fill the 105-pound slot.

Three wrestlers are shooting for the 112 division. Vaffis and Hicks are being challenged by non-letterman junior Todd Scherer. Mezinger will go at 119 while at 126, Palomo gets the nod.

Potter will be at 132 with Middleton at 138. Lozano is the 145-pounder with Ramirez at 155. Weissinger is expected to be at 167 with Beatty at 175 and Jim Carroll, another sophomore Voggenthaler is counting on, at 185.

Carroll and Smith could change weights but the Ross coach said Smith would most likely be the


heavyweight.

"What I want to do now is get a lineup stabilized and go with it," Voggenthaler said.

His goal this season is simple, he laughed, "After last year, all I want to do is win a meet or something."

The Purple-White intrasquad meet serves as the debut for Ross wrestling. The meet will begin at 7 p.m., Friday in the Ross gym. Voggenthaler said their will be a mini-clinic before the wrestling.

The Ross coach also asked that former wrestlers in the Ross program, dating back to 1953 when the program was started by Mal Mackey, come to the Friday meet.

Ross will host Oregon Clay at 1 this afternoon in the opening high school wrestling match of the season.


Both the varsity and junior varsity teams will be in action.

'Kiddie Korps' sparks Giants

Ross's Kiddie Korps knocked the monkey off Coach Al Voggenthaler's back Saturday.

The Korps, made up of freshmen and sophomores, helped make Voggenthaler's one presesason wish 'to win anything' become a reality when the youthful Little Giants knocked off the Oregon Clay Eagles 41-28 in a high school dual wrestling meet in the Ross High School gym.

A freshman and three sophomores racked up impressive wins to go with clutch victories by some Ross veterans to end Ross's drought in dual meets. Last season, Voggenthaler's team suffered through an 0-7 dual meet record.

"The Kiddie Korps did a good job," Voggenthaler reflected on the season opening match. "Even Carroll (Jim) did a good job, but we got beat."

Freshman Matt Marinis, up a weight class to 108, pinned Mike Martin of Clay in 5:49 to get the Little Giants started. Both teams had forfeited at 98, the spot where Marinis was to make his varsity debut.

"I wanted him to wrestle," Voggenthaler said about Marinis, "when they did not have a 98-pounder, I moved him up to go against their senior."

When freshman Greg Abdoo, was to have been at 108 but Voggenthaler delayed his varsity debut. Abdoo has wrestled in one junior high tournament and a junior high dual meet and would have been facing varsity competition for the first

time. Marinis has been "up" with the Ross varsity throughout the presesason.

Clay won at 112 and 119 to tie the match at 12-12 but a Clay forfeit at 126 to sophomore Jerry Palomo was the first of a three-bout Ross winning streak. Sophomore Jerrid Potter of Ross defeated LeRoy Schull 12-7 in the 132-pound bout and senior Dave Middleton of Ross pinned Jeff O'Haver of Clay in 54 seconds of the 138-pound clash.

At 145, Ross junior John Lozano scored on a reversal late in the final period to get a 4-4 draw with Clay veteran Dean Walendzak. Shawn Ramirez, another Ross sophomore, pinned Adam Herrera in 2:26 of the 155-pound bout to highlight the matches for the Ross Kiddie Korps.

Ross senior Todd Beatty defeated Paul Cox of Clay 12-3 in the 175-pound bout before Carroll was pinned by highly regarded Spence Millimen of Clay in 1:19 of the 185-pound clash.

At heavyweight, Matt Smith of Ross, 185 a season ago, fought to a 4-4 draw against Gene Krupa. The Clay heavy got the tying point when Smith was penalized a point for "locking hands" 30 seconds from the end of the match.

"I think the matches went pretty much as we expected," the Ross coach described. "George Weissinger (167) was pinned in the first period but he just slipped and got caught after pretty much controlling the match."

Ross wrestlers shine in tough Rogers mat

TOLEDO — Fremont Ross finished a surprising third in the 20-team Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament over the weekend.

"At the beginning of the season," Ross wrestling Coach Al Voggenthaler said, "I figured that if we finished in the top half of the tournament, we would be doing well.

"Then, I figured it in the top five and when we finished third, that was super."

The Little Giants led the tournament for most of the consolation rounds Saturday afternoon, but Bedford, Mich., passed them late in the round while picking up momentum on its way to the tournament title.

The Mules finished with 218½ points to easily outdistance runnerup Rogers at 167½ and Ross with 152. Maumee was fourth at 117 and Macomber rounded out the top five with 110½.

"Bedford just had too many in the finals," Voggenthaler said.

Mike Mezinger was the top finisher for Ross, taking second in the 119-pound division. In the

championship finals, the Ross senior lost 7-1 to Greg Bish of Tiffin Columbian.

Mezinger, in his first competition since suffering a knee injury two weeks ago in practice, was the top-seeded wrestler in the division while Bish was seeded number three.

Mezinger won three consecutive decisions to reach the finals.

Other Little Giants' finishes were fourths by Matt Marinis (98), Jim Carroll (185) and Matt Smith (heavyweight). Taking sixths for Ross were Jerrid Potter (132), Shawn Ramirez (155) and Todd Beatty (175).

Marinis is a freshman, Carroll, Potter and Ramirez sophomores, and Beatty and Smith are seniors.

"Everyone of the kids we took up there had at least one win," Voggenthaler pointed out. "In a tournament of this caliber that's pretty good."

Last year, Ross finished 11th of 15 teams.

Ross will be back in action Saturday, Jan. 5, when it hosts the Mal Mackey Memorial Tournament at Ross High School.

Ross captures Mal Mackey crown

If Al Voggenthaler and his Ross High School wrestling team had been awarded the runnerup trophy, they would have turned it down.

"We decided before the finals that we did not want to wrestle for second," Voggenthaler said after Saturday night's Mal Mackey Memorial Varsity Wrestling Tournament finals at Ross High School.

It turned out Voggenthaler and his team never had the choice of turning down the second place award; instead, the Little Giants walked away with the title after the finals followed a script that could not have been written any better according to the Ross coach.

The Little Giants, third heading into the finals, pulled out the title as three of four Little Giants in the championship finals won and three others in the consolation finals won. That piled up to 133½ points and a three-point win over Rossford, the pre-tourney favorite.

Rossford had led the tourney through the semifinal round but had to settle for the trophy the Little Giants did not want. Toledo St. John finished third with 127 points while a fast-closing Huron was fourth with 120.

Rounding out the finishes in the seven-team tourney were Vermilion with 106½, Toledo St. Francis with 65 and Sylvania Southview with 58.

It was Ross's night after the afternoon's semifinals.

Mike Mezinger, Ross's 119-pound champion, was named the tournament's outstanding wrestler after surviving the tough division.

Added to that, Little Giant heavyweight Matt Smith sealed the Ross win with a pin in the finals and at the same time won the trophy for the most pins in the least amount of time.

"For us to win it," Voggenthaler explained, "we had to go for everything we could get. As it turned out, I could not have written a better script."


Mezinger, with his 18-6 romp over Tom Brady of St. John's in the finals, added kindling to the Ross fire that was started by freshman Matt Marinis.

Marinis, 98, went up against National AAU champ Mark Tinney of Rossford in the finals and came out on top 3-2, escaping from Tinney in the final point with three seconds remaining in the match.

"We kind of thought that Marinis had to win," Voggenthaler said. "That kid (Tinney) had never been beaten and for a freshman, he is very physical."

The Ross coach said that he never doubted the Marinis had escaped in the final second even though the call was protested hotly by Rossford Coach Jim McCumber.

"I don't think there was any doubt about it. The kid had Marinis' head, but he did not have control and Matt was facing him

when they went out of bounds."

Tinney lost a team point after the match for unsportsmanlike conduct when he slapped Marinis' hand on the mandatory post-match handshake.

"That win definitely got the spark going," Voggenthaler said. "And Mezinger built the fire."

Following that, Dave Middleton, 138, took a third with a consolation final 5-3 win over Dave Hook of Vermilion.

Ross 145-pounder John Lozano lost to Darin Hook of Vermilion 17-7 but the Ross junior's efforts in getting to the finals was enough to keep the fires burning.


Todd Beatty, 175, added more fuel to the Ross fire with a lightning-quick pin in the championship finals. Bob Nagucki of St. John had the Ross senior in trouble when he lifted him from the mat but instead of taking Beatty down, the Little Giant caught Nagucki coming down, flipped him on his back and pinned him in 37 seconds.

That set the stage for the final two matches, both involving Ross wrestlers in the consolation finals.

"It came down to those two matches," Voggenthaler said. "If we won them, we had the tournament."

Voggenthaler's unwritten script was reaching the climax. Jim Carroll, Ross sophomore 185-pounder, responded with a 9-8 win over Matt Solberg of Huron. That set the stage for Smith.

Smith was up against Pat McNea of Huron, a wrestler he

had pinned in 1:15 earlier in the day. This time, it took a little longer...a minute and one second longer before Smith clinched the title for the Little Giants.

Other finishes in the top four for

the Little Giants including the third by Middleton, Carroll and Smith were fourths by freshman Greg Abdoo at 105, junior Todd Scherer at 112 and sophomore Jerrid Potter at 138.

Little Giant matmen at Cincy

Fremont Ross will hit the long road south this weekend to compete in the 14-team St. Xavier Invitational Wrestling Tournament in Cincinnati.

Wrestling begins at 4:30 p.m., Friday, with wrestling through the semifinal round. The second session will be from noon Saturday to 4 p.m. while a third session for consolation finals runs from 6:30-7:30 p.m. The championship finals begin at 7:45 p.m. Saturday.

"I would say this is like a mini-state tournament," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler said. "We have North Canton Hoover, Cleveland St. Joe and Cleveland St. Ignatius in the tourney and they were second through fourth in the state tournament last season."

In addition to those teams and Ross will be host St. Xavier, Colerain, West Chester Lakota, Sycamore, West Carrollton, Xenia, Lancaster Fisher Catholic and Columbus St. Charles.

"It will be a real meat grinder," Voggenthaler said, "but I feel that we are mentally prepared for it. The only bad thing is that we will be getting down there late because we cannot leave before 11 a.m., Friday, because of exams.

"That may be OK because the kids won't have much time to think about an opponent," the Ross coach explained. "This way, they will get out of the van, put on the uniform and hit the mats."

Ross will have four seeded wrestlers in the tournament: Matt Marinis, fourth seeded at 98, third seeded Mike Mezinger at 119, Todd Beatty, fourth at 175 and 185-pound Jim Carroll, seeded third.

To get to St. Xavier High School, take I-75 south to Cincinnati. Take the Paddock Road exit west off I-75 to North Bend Road. Turn left on North Bend and St. Xavier is approximatley 1 1/2 miles west on North Bend Road. Paddock Road is approximately five miles south of the 275 belt-way and immediately follows the Galbraith Road exit.

CINCINNATI — Four Fremont Ross High School wrestlers will be competing in today's championship semifinal round in the St. Xavier Invitational Wrestling Tournament at St. Xavier High School.

The Little Giants are eighth with 38 in the 13-team tournament after receiving a number byes in first round. Hoover and Xenia are ties for lead with 61.

"Yeah, those byes hurt us in the scoring but it helped them to advance so it may pay off in the long run," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler said.

Matt Marinis, 98, Mike Mezinger, 119, Jim Carroll, 185, and heavyweight Matt Smith were first round winners for Ross.

Marinis defeated Sean Boyden of Lancaster Fisher Catholic 5-1 in his match and will face top seeded Chris Kurmin of Cleveland St. Ignatius in the semis. Mezinger will face second-seeded Stacy Green of North Canton. Hoover in the semis after defeating Chris Hall of West Chester Lakota 17-7 in the first round.

Carroll, third-seeded, defeated Tony Johnson of Cleveland St. Joe 17-7 and will face Bill Wood of West Chester Lakota in the semis. Smith pinnes fourth-seeded Bob Bouchard of St. Xavier in one minute and faces second-seeded Rod Stewart of Xenia in his first match today.

Little Giants eighth in St. X tournament

CINCINNATI — Fremont Ross finished eighth in the St. Xavier Invitational Wrestling Tournament Friday and Saturday.

Xenia won the tournament with North Canton Hoover, the pre-tourney favorite second, Cleveland St. Joseph third and Cleveland St. Ignatius fourth.

Mike Mezenger, 119, was third in that division, pinning Frank Gron of Cleveland St. Joseph in 4:56 of the consolation finals. The Ross senior had been knocked into the consolation rounds when he lost a 5-4 decision to Stacy Green of North Canton Hoover in the championship semifinals round.

Matt Marinis and Matt Smith brought home fourths for the Little Giants.

Marinis, 98, lost his championship semifinal match to top-seeded Chris Kurman of St. Ignatius 11-2 before coming back to reach the consolation championships. In the match for third, Marinis lost in overtime to Miek Elsass of North Canton Hoover via criteria after the overtime session had ended in a scoreless tie. The regulation match had ended 2-2 but Elsass was awarded the match because he had the match's only takedown.

Smith, a senior heavyweight, came close to knocking off the tournament's top seed and eventual champion, Rod Stewart of Xenia in the semifinals. He was leading 10-9 after scoring on a takedown, a reversal and a pair of three-point nearfalls in the first two periods but Stewart scored on a reversal and a three-point nearfall in the final two minutes to pull off the victory.

In the consolation finals, Smith was pinned by Brian Reid of St. Joseph in 2:16 and settled for fourth.

"It was a good tournament for us," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler said. "Just about everyone of the kids did a nice job."

The Little Giants will be in action again at 1 p.m., Saturday, Jan. 19, at Findlay in a triangular with the host Trojans and Lima Shawnee.

FINDLAY — The Ross wrestling team picked up one lopsided victory and one close triumph in triangular meet action here Saturday.

Carroll seals Ross mat win

Jim Carroll was as surprised as Todd Beatty was mad when Sandusky wrestling coach Ken Colatruglio shifted gears in the middle of a high school wrestling match Tuesday.

While it was a surprise move, Carroll helped Ross survive with a clutch pin as the Little Giants defeated the Blue Streaks 37-25 in the Ross High School gym.

The Sandusky coach's sudden move pushed sophomore Cliff Jolly up a weight class to 185. In the original lineup, Jolly was to go against Beatty at 175 and Carroll was to receive a forfeit at 185.

"I was at the Ross tournament," Colatruglio disclosed, "and I figured if we were to beat Ross, we could take them at 185."

Sandusky held a 25-19 lead when Colatruglio pulled the switch. The forfeit at 175 deadlocked the match at 25-25.

"That ticked me off," Beatty said after the match, "I was ready to wrestle."

Carroll, however, was not quite ready although his performance did not show it.

"I was not expecting to wrestle," he said. "I had only loosened up with the team before the match so I was not too loose."

But, as Carroll pointed out is his style, the Ross sophomore started quickly, got a takedown for a 2-0 lead, but a Jolly reversal knotted it at 2-2 at the end of the first period.

A two-point nearfall by Carroll and a reversal by Jolly made it 4-4 midway through the second period before Carroll escaped, got the takedown and quickly flopped Jolly onto his back for the fall at the 3:27 mark.

"He's just a sophomore," Colatruglio pointed out about Jolly after his move backfired, "and he made a mistake."

All that was left after Carroll's clutch performance was Ross heavyweight Matt Smith's 90-second pin of Sandusky's Bob Hirt.

Colatruglio's move caught Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler by surprise.

"I did not think he would do something like that," Voggenthaler said, "but Carroll responded very well. He got himself going."

Continuing, the Ross coach said, "Obviously, we were not too sharp. We have had only one actual practice in the past eight days.

"Our lightweights were sluggish and unfortunately, that is where they are strong," Voggenthaler said.


"This match was good for us because it may have showed us that we are not super men when we walk out on the mat," Voggenthaler added.

Ross won only five of the 11 matches actually wrestled but benefitted from Sandusky forfeits at 138 and 175. Matt Marinis, 98, had the only other fall for the Little Giants, pinning Jason Howland in 1:29.

Another Ross win went to Mike Mezinger, 119, 4-2 over Leon Cooley. The Ross senior trailed 2-1 after one period and did not take the lead until midway through the final period.


Shawn Ramirez, 155, had the other Ross victory, defeating Charlie McGowan 12-4.
