TRACK TAKES STAGE IN STATE'S HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC CARNIVAL EVENTS

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COLUMBUS, May 28.—(INS)—With Columbus North crowned golf champion and the baseball tournament narrowed down to finalists, track took the stage today in the state's colorful high school athletic carnival with a great battle promised between Cleveland East Tech and Columbus Central.

Although sporting circles buzzed with talk about the no-hit no-run game hurled by Bill Hickle, Columbus South high school pitcher, in a class A game against Bridgeport yesterday, the attention today was nearly all directed toward the scrap for the track crown now held by Lakewood.

Lakewood was generally expected to be dethroned today. In the preliminaries yesterday it qualified only three men and its 880-yard relay team. Columbus Central qualified five and a relay team, and Cleveland East Tech and Cincinnati Withrow tied for runner-up, with four and a relay team.

Columbus South and Cincinnati Roger Bacon were to clash for the class A baseball title at 2 p. m. on another diamond at the same hour. Tiltonville was to play Dayton Fairmont for the class B championship.

Hundreds Attending

Hundreds of athletes and thousands of fans were here for the athletic spectacle. The setting for most of it was the Ohio State University stadium, scene of so many football games and track meets in the past.

Hitting at sensational performances today, visiting athletes broke two records in the qualifying rounds yesterday. Cleveland East Tech's 880-yard relay team slashed a tenth of a second off the 1930 record of Columbus Central, running the distance in 1:30.9. Wonsettler of Bryan broke the class B time in the 220-yard low hurdles in 26 seconds flat.

By qualifying nine men and a relay team compared to two each for Delta and Millersburg, Oberlin stepped out in front in the class B track scramble. Dayton Oakwood, class B champ last year, has since grown and gone into class A.

A young golfer from Dayton Oakwood, Bobby Servis, stole the lime-light from the four-man Columbus North team which won the championship. He turned in a low medal of 75, getting a sensational 35 on

th first nine.

Only three Bridgeport batters reached first base when young Hickle was doing his surprising bit of pitching for Columbus South. Hickle, a slender right-hander, did not yield anything that resembled a hit. The game went only seven innings and South won, 5 to 0.

Roger Bacon won the right to meet South by turning back Columbus West, 5 to 1, in the semi-finals.

Of the class B finalists, Tiltonville shut out Independence, 3 to 0, in the semi-finals, and Dayton Fairmont licked Johnsville, 9 to 2.

PLAYS SECOND ROUND IN RAIN

Virginia Van Wie of Chicago, Proves Herself Capable Player

SAUNTON, Devon, England, May 28.—(INS)—Miss Virginia Van Wie, of Chicago, proving herself a fine steady player under the most trying conditions, took a comfortable lead for low score honors in the qualifying rounds of the British women's open golf championship, playing her second round today in a driving rain with a total of only 81 strokes.

The 81, paired with her 77 of yesterday, gave the American star a total of 158 and a five-stroke lead over Mme. Rene Lacoste, her nearest rival.
