

The team had just completed four rigorous days at the training site along Lake Erie under auspices of the Ross high Boosters Club, then returned to Fremont yesterday afternoon for renewed workouts at Harmon field. This Saturday night the Little Giants meet the album in a preview at Harmon. Holland high and Norwalk St. Paul's are also on the slate.

## Little Giants Return From Camp And Gird For Preview, Lima Game

The returning vanguard of Ross mission that night will be 40 cents high school football candidates and 70 cents for their coaches arrived in Fremont Saturday.

More than 100 candidates completed four days of drills at Camp Yukita, where they trained in the annual outing program under sponsorship of the Ross high Boosters Club.

Monday night Coach Mal Mackey reported that all goals set for the four day encampment were met, with the exception of a fine spell that had knocked as many as 15 of 36 players in camp out of the final mass session. Mackey expressed satisfaction with the workouts and said the boys picked up the drills and plays in good order. He pointed out that the new players, including Vandyke and Gern Smith worked into the program very well and did a good job in their introduction to the football techniques.

Other coaches on hand were Bob Seale, Paul Raines, John Imat, Jack Decker and Al Vandyke.

In the main, Imat and Vandyke worked on ends. Seale, Zemke, Vandyke and Raines were with the guards, tackles and ends; and Decker operated in the backfield as quarterback during a good share of the scrimmage as the Little Giants were rounded into shape.

Mackey said that the boys are pointing to the coming games here when they arrive. Friday, September 16 for the kickoff of a 10 game slate of games.

### Saturday Preview

Before they leave the varsity will be pitted against the semi-pro rosters in a preview set for Friday. This is the "F" which begins at 8 p. m. The Little Giants will have 16 minutes to play the rosters.

## Alumni Prepared For Little Giants

Seventeen Ross high school alumni football players, dating from the 1946 Little Giant campaigns through the last year's crop of grididers are carried on the roster of players who will meet the current edition of the Little Giants in the no preview tonight at Harmon field.

According to Alf King, who insisted the Alumni have speed, skill and versatility, the squad has been working out for the past two weeks preliminary to the coming clash.

Ralph (Junior) Grubbs is handling the coaching assignment in rounding the team into game-time shape. King pointed out that it will be a short season for the Alumni, and the squad enters the game looking for an undefeated campaign. The Alumni's only game will be with the Varsity.

Running through the roster of graduates one finds George Rohleder, 220 pound end from the squad of 1946-48; Sam Sims, end, 192 pounds, campaigns of 1946-48.

Backfield includes Ted Houghtaling, 175 pounds, quarterback from 1950-53; Charlie Black, fullback, 50-53; Frank Lenhart, halfback, 165 pounds, 1951-54; Dennis Suter, halfback, 165 pounds, 1949-50; Rufus Lomax, 191 pounds, halfback, 1954; Glenn Waller, halfback, 140 pounds, 1954; and Bill Jones, 170 pounds, halfback, 1954-55.

Tom McCarthy, 178 pounds end is from the 1949-51 era; Guard Dick Burkett, 190 pounds, teammate of McCarthy along with Lowell Battie, 165 pound guard; Bill Taborn, guard, 195, 1951-52.

Robert Biggs, who is lined up for entrance into Purdue university, is a 230 tackle and a classmate of the 1949-51 players. Rounding up the complete roster is Bob Wetzel, 235 pound guard out of the seasons of 1953-54; Tom Cooper, center, 200 pounds, 1950-53; and Ken Shaffer, guard, 180; for the years 1952-54.

## Mackey Discloses Starting Lineups

Last minute changes in the Preview program tonight at Harmon field were disclosed Friday afternoon by Coach Mal Mackey, of Ross high, who stated that St. Paul's of Norwalk will not be here to meet Holland high as originally scheduled.

Instead, the reserve of the Little Giants' squad will face Holland in the first abbreviated ball game getting under way at 8 p. m. and in the finale the Little Giants' varsity faces the Alumni ranks coached by Ralph (Junior) Grubbs.

Out in the Harmon field practice area Friday afternoon Coach Mal Mackey released his first listing of offensive and defensive teams which work into action tonight.

### Squad On Offense

Slated for the offensive team meeting the alumni are Glen Haas or Mike Otermat, at right end; Dick Coleman, right tackle; John Colvin, right guard; Dave Wolschuck or Lee Wolf at center; Tom Longanbach or Jon Gilbertson at left guard; Jim Clark at left tackle and Horace Sewell or Jim Sall at left end.

Rounding out the backfield are Beebe Schneider listed at quarterback; Jim Halley or Pat Shanahan at right half; Larry Reed at left half; and Haldie Black in the full back spot.

First team defensive unit includes Black at the end; Clark, tackle; either Longanbach or Wolschuck at middle guards; Wes Glover or Wolf at tackle; Sale as an end; Coleman, Gilbertson or Colvin at line backer; Ken Stull and Reed at the halfbacks and Schneider in safety position.

Running through the roster of players for the first team reserves who go out against Holland, Mackey disclosed the following: Del Hoy or Gerry Neason at right end; Jack Parish at right tackle; Dan Wasserman or Ray Arndt at right guard; and Dave Kohr at center.

Line backers will include Wasserman and Woessner, with Distil and Johns at halfbacks; and Shawl out in safety position.

Bob Heileman, who is favoring an injured ankle these days, will not be suited up tonight. Jim Tiller, injured in an automobile accident, still is not ready to work on the injured foot which was badly cut near the ankle.

## Varsity Holds Alumni In 0-0 Tie; Reserves Do Likewise With Holland

Dampened by a tremendous downpour of rain Saturday night at Harmon Field, the scheduled Preview featuring Ross high school's Little Giants and the Purple and White Alumni ranks was cut short as the forces of Coach Mal Mackey and the graduates of Ralph (Junior) Grubbs put on a scoreless tie, exhibition in the eleven minutes of action.

Preliminary to the feature event, the reserves of Ross battled Holland high to a 0-0 scrimmage session of two eight minute quarters.

### Short Finale

The finale was slated for 16 minutes of action also until the rains came, the field lights began to pop and the timer's gun ended activities with three minutes gone in the second quarter.

In the opening session, Holland worked the ball down to the Ross Reserve 15 yard strip at one point, thus gaining the distinction of getting deepest into enemy territory in the action.

Holland had three first downs to one for the reserves, with Ross' Bob Johns, working at halfback, getting credit for the pickup.

Ron Shawl, Tom Woessner, Joe Distil and Johns figured in much of the Ross Reserve offensive work. Defensively the Little Giants spares held Holland, deeper in substitutes, and over the 16 minutes were not threatened too much with the invaders' bag of tricks. Woessner intercepted one Holland pass.

### Varsity - Alumni

Coming along in the second portion, The Alumni received the kickoff and carried for a series before the Varsity crew took charge and ran up two first downs with Haldie Black picking up one and Beebe Schneider rifling a pass for the other.

A pass interception in that first period of action by Alumni Tom Cooper put the ball back into graduate hands where they rolled up their only first down, picked up by Ron Whitcomb, who carried on a ground play from their own 20 to the 38 yard line.

When the Alumni took to the air Ken Stull intercepted bringing the Varsity in possession shortly before the rain began falling, lightly at first, but after several minutes the deluge ended the abbreviated Preview in a quicker finish than originally scheduled.

Captain for the evening on the varsity roster was Dick Coleman, Bob Biggs and Tom McCarthy captained the Reserves. Dick Burkett, Reserve lineman, was injured early in the game when a knee ailment, that Alf King said bothered him in high school days, gave him new trouble.

Bob Brownson, head football coach at Ashland College, addressed a rained-out, limited crowd at Booster Club activities held at Fremont Golf and Country club following the Preview.

Desire and the will to play football were the salient points of Brownson's talk as he addressed members of Ross football team, coaches, Booster members and guests.

Coach Mal Mackey introduced his squad and coaching staff. A light lunch was served to the group.

## A Running Game Needed At Purdue

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—If Purdue's Boilermakers can fashion a running game to back up Len Dawson's brilliant passing, this may make this the best of Coach Stu Holcomb's nine football seasons here.

As it is, Holcomb regards his squad the best he's had both in depth and ability.

"This could be our year, barring injuries," said Holcomb, "but we must get a better running game."

The Boilermakers are banking on their first good sized set of backs in several years—halbacks Jim Whitmer and Bill Jennings and fullback Bill Murakowski—to take the defensive pressure off Dawson's passing.

However, rivals can expect the hurling of Dawson, who pitched 15 touchdown passes last season as a sophomore to lead the nation, to be improved with his own added experience and that of two fine junior ends, 6 feet, 6 Lamar Lundy and 6-1 Bob Khoenle.

The 18 lettermen lost from last year's team which had a 5-3-1 include brilliant guard Tom Bettis; durable center John Allen; and end Johnny Kerr, who led the Big Ten in pass receiving.

But Holcomb sees among the 18 returning lettermen "the best tackle strength we've had." In fact, he has shifted regular right tackle Joe Krupa to right guard and inserted Ken Panfil, a 244-pounder back from military service, at right tackle.

The lone sophomore expected to start, center Neil Habig from Martin's Ferry, Ohio, is regarded the defensive peer of the graduated Allen.

Dick Murley, 230-pound senior, is at left tackle.

Holcomb sees Dawson as a better man than last season. "He mixes more with the boys than he did as a sophomore," said Holcomb. "He's a team leader now."

Holcomb thinks Purdue's Big Ten fortunes will hinge on the first three conference games, against Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa. Those come after a Sept. 24 opener here against College of Pacific.

"I think we're as good as the last four conference opponents," Stu added, referring to Illinois, Michigan State, Northwestern and Indiana. "We get a tremendous schedule break in not playing Michigan or Ohio State."

He made no reference to Notre Dame whom the Boilermakers face right in the middle of the season and who will be out to avenge a 27-14 defeat for sole Irish loss last fall.

However, Holcomb reiterated in no uncertain terms his determination to retaliate if any team used the so-called "suckershift" against the Boilermakers.

"We're using the wide shift in practice so our boys will be ready," he said. "And we got it, if we need it."

Not lacking in lettermen, nor in the full share of first game enthusiasm at the start of a 10 game slate of rugged competition, the Little Giants of Ross high school open the 1955 season Friday night at Harmon field as they meet the Spartans of Lima Senior high with kickoff slated for 8 p. m.

According to the possible starting lineup that Coach Mal Mackey reported for the offensive team, the Purple and White will be sporting enough lettermen which should lend the share of experience that will be needed against the highly regarded crew of Coach Frank Hanna.

Pre-season picks, which could have their share of changes before the season gets rolling along too rapidly, show that Lima is rated eighth in the state high school brackets of A Class teams, while Ross has a 13th place ranking.

Upsetting the Lima applecart by the Little Giants tomorrow could very readily start changing those pre-season prognostications to the favorable advantage of the Ross eleven.

Since the flu bug left the local ranks, things have been picking up along the line. Couple this with the return of Jim Tiller, who Mackey said after Wednesday's practice still isn't caught up to the time he lost out of practice, things are brightening for followers of the Ross squad.

Sporting their new yellow colored headgears with the protective bars across the front, the Little Giants will be in search of



Now hear this: Corso carried just 10 times for a sweet average of 18.1 yards per try.

This could go on, but reports from out of Sandusky tell that some top-flight backfield players operated behind an effective blocking system.

#### DeHaven's Exploits

Dick DeHaven, son of the head coach, has carved out a niche for himself in the forward passing department. He's to be watched, too. All the Sandusky punch isn't on the ground exclusively.

Statistics out of Sandusky after the Akron game show that the Blue Streaks didn't have to kick; Akron kicked only once. And in the first down department, both tallied 19 first downs. They know how to power over the yards and first downs, those Blue Streaks. They've got to be looked upon as the biggest hurdle.

Summing it up until Friday night at Harmon, that's about it for the advance story. Now, with plenty of good teamwork needed, things should be on the affirmative side when the 50th game in this series is written into the records . . . affirmative for the Little Giants, in the hopes of all Fremont fans.

Ross high school's Little Giants gained another notch in their efforts to even the scales in the annual Ross-Sandusky high football series as Coach Mal Mackey's squad out-circled their Fremont opponents and out-scored the Blue Streaks by a 26-6 score Friday night before approximately 8,000 fans jammed into Harmon Field.

It was a perfect night for football, field conditions were ideal, and the Little Giants picked up every advantage along the line to turn back the defending champions of the Buckeye Conference demonstrating topflight brand of football which brings credit to every Little Giant who saw action.

For Ross, the win was the 14th in the series. Sandusky has the lead with 29 wins. There are seven tie ball games.

Contributing to the scoring for the Fremonters was halfback Jim Tiller, who opened his drive with a 31 yard sprint over the right side of the line to the TD territory.

Just two and a half minutes re-

carrying for 167 yards in 20 carries for an average of 8.3 yards per try.

## Use Of Game Farm Mallards In Ohio Draws Secretary McKay's Warning

By W. JOYCE MACFARLANE  
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of the Interior McKay today warned duck hunters—particularly some in Ohio—about plans to restrict the taking of game farm mallards which have been released "into the wild."

Mackay's warning was coupled with another by John L. Farley, director of the fish and wildlife service, against possible use in Ohio of any such mallards as live decoys.

Both McKay and Farley also said hunters must conform to all elements of the federal waterfowl hunting regulations in shooting mallards.

A restocking program in northwestern Ohio, carried on primarily by hunting clubs, was reported to have resulted in release of about 5,500 mallard ducks this summer. These northwestern Ohio duck hunters, numbering some 10,000, contend federal enforcement of hunting regulations is too strict. They say the key question is: When does feeding ducks grain turn into baiting and hunting them into game play?

Grades, which began after the finding game, were announced by Coach Mal Mackay, who emphasized that the grading is only on the offensive play.

## Black Bags Three TDs, Tiller Gets One; Ross Wins Seventh Game Without Loss

LORAIN (Ore.)—Centering their offense, thrust around a ground assault Friday night at Lorain Recreation Stadium, the Little Giants of Lorain high school annexed their seventh straight win in as many starts in turning back the Steelers of Lorain school and thereby assured themselves of at least a tie for the championship in the Buckeye Conference. ## Marion's Prexies First Team To Score Twice Against Little Giants This Year

MARION, O.—Although the Little Giants of Ross high school cinched the Buckeye Conference championship with a thumping 30-12 victory over Marion Harding high school, and rolled up their eighth straight win in doing so Friday night, the Purple and White experienced something else new last night. They met a team that chased over two touchdowns against the Purple and White defense. And that's the first time an opponent was able to do that in 1955!

However, Coach Mal Mackey's forces returned with the greater glory in the continued win streak and the capturing of the conference flag. Thus the league laurels and crown now rest on the heads of the Little Giants, who won all five of their league meetings on the current schedule. Sandusky's Blue Streaks thus relinquish the crown to the Fremont forces.

### Fremont Scores

In the big win of last night it took two touchdowns each by Halfback Black, Ross fullback, and his running mate Beebe Schneider. For Schneider, the TDs were the

first he has scored this trip. Up to game time he had only 12 points netted, and all on point conversions with his kicking.

Fifth touchdown was gained Friday by Halfback Jim Tiller. Schneider's placement tries were off at Marion as he missed on all five tries. Last week he hit for four beauties in as many tries. That's football.

Schneider's effort in the backfield against the Prexies of Coach Gordon Larson indicate that he is moving up in stature which makes a "big three" in the backfield. Heretofore Black and Tiller dominated the touchdown scoring and also in the ground gaining department.

Last night, the Ross quarterback wasn't far off the ground gaining pace of Tiller and Black. Tiller gained 89 yards in running plays; Black hit for 83; and Schneider ran up a total of 62 yards, his best effort since last Friday's Lorain game when he hit for 31 yards.

### No First Period TDs

Following a scoreless first period, the Little Giants pumped over two touchdowns in the second period. Schneider carried on a one yard plunge for the first and Black wrapped up a seven yard carry into a neat touchdown package.

Ross widened the lead to 18-0 in the third period with five minutes gone and Schneider bulled over from one yard out.

With two minutes left in the third period Elih Green, Marion left halfback, punched over from the one foot line for a TD, erasing the Little Giants' shot at a second straight shutout win.

Schneider aided the two final Ross touchdowns when he aircarried a toss to Black with 47 seconds gone in the fourth period. Then, it was the Ross quarterback again on a pass to Tiller who went into the end zone for the score bringing Ross out front by a 30-6 margin.

### Marion Pass to TD

Mario Barrett's pass to Harold Jones with 3:05 minutes left in the final period annexed the final TD for Marion. The TD didn't place Ross in an precarious position insofar as the score was concerned, but it sure made grid history for

this fall. When Jones bolted into the end zone, it marked the first time that a Ross opponent in 1955 was able to chase over two touchdowns.

If it had to happen, it's a cinch that one of the less potent rivals in the league turning the trick was a fair enough deal.

**Next week Ross meets Toledo Scott, the week after it's Portsmouth.** Ross can't give these two teams that much leeway, or things could be lots worse off than the Marion victory.

By the way of last night's game review, however, one notes that Ross wielded the heavy attack for the evening. Mackey's crew collected 233 yards rushing to 97 for Marion; the Purple and White out-first-downed their hosts 15 to 12, and, didn't allow Marion one first down until 4:40 minutes of the third period were left. Then the Prexies utilized the gain to lead up to a touchdown.

### Quiet First Period

It was a quiet first period, as mentioned above; Tiller's 20 yard carry from his 45 to Marion's 33 brought the first first down. Next play, however, Black fumbled and Marion recovered on their own 12 to end the threat of any consequence for Ross.

Fremont started a first period drive on their own 34 which carried over into the second period and a TD in a sustained drive of 66 yards. Tiller's big gainer of 17 yards on fourth play of the second period to set up the scoring opportunity as Schneider came along two plays later and lunged for six points.

A Marion fumble, recovered by Ross' Dick Colemen, a 17 yard haul by Schneider and Tiller's 19 yard carry sparked the drive. Black capped the scoring with a seven yard carry for the TD. Ross lead 12-0.

Schneider raced 66 yards into Marion's end zone before the second period ended but the play was called back, the touchdown nullified, because there was holding in the Fremont lineup.

In the early moments of the third period, a Tiller carry of 47 yards was overruled, the touch down discounted, because of backfield in motion on the play. Ross took a five yard penalty instead.

Ross had to punt, a play wherein Tiller was jarred, taken from the game to return later. Marion handled once, fumbled and recovered. Once more a fumble followed for Marion and this time Glen Haas, Ross end, recovered and the Little Giants started on a new drive of 27 yards for the touchdown. Schneider carried into the end zone for the points. He then missed the third of his PAT attempts.

### Looping Aerial

Outstanding for Marion in the third period was the looping pass from Jones to Ted Firstenberger; this netted 32 yards to the Ross nine and set up the TD that Green made from one foot out three plays later. Firstenberger left the game on the second play of the final period when he received face cuts about the nose.

Joe Middleton also left the game when he suffered a back strain and was carried out on a stretcher.
