Fremont Class AA Sectional Tournament Opens Friday

St. Joe Plays Tomorrow, Ross On Saturday

Fremont Class AA Sub-Sectional (part of the Roadford Sectional) opens Friday night in the Ross Senior high gym.

Upper bracket teams are Clay, Genoa high school, Fremont St. Joseph and Fremont Ross. Winner of the upper bracket will meet the winner of the Roadford Sub-Sectional upper bracket Friday, February 27 in the Roadford Sectional final with that winner proceeding to the Sandusky tournament.

Genoa and St. Joe meet at 7:30 p.m. Friday (tomorrow), with the winner tackling Ross at 7:30 Saturday. Genoa was the seed-

ed team in the upper bracket.

Lower bracket teams are top seeded Fostoria, Eastwood and Oak Harbor. Winner of the lower bracket will meet the winner of the Roadford Sub-Sectional lower bracket Saturday, February 28 in the Roadford Sectional final, with that winner proceeding to the Sandusky District.

Eastwood and Fostoria meet at 9 p.m. Friday (tomorrow) with the winner battling Oak Harbor at 9 p.m. Saturday.

Four hundred tickets, 200 student and 200 adult, were allotted each school for the night they play in the tournament.

St. Joe tickets for Friday night's game are on sale at the high school (for students and adults) and at S. and K. Drugs for adults only. Deadline for advance ticket sales is 1:30 p.m. Friday.

Ross tickets for Saturday night's game are on sale at the high school (for students and

adults) and at Tremper's for adults only.

Miesle led the Streak scoring during the regular season with 280 points, an average of 18.6 per game. Miesle, Hoffman, Miller and Daubel the main rebounders. Club had to rebound late in the season due to the loss of two regulars. Reserve performers

called up to the Varsity had a highly successful season. St. Joe finished last in the Sandusky Bay Conference with a 9-6 record.

Walter was the top scorer for the Little Giants netting 196 points for an average of 11.5 per game. Luazo, McCarthy, Pankratz and Cecil are best rebounders. Ross, minus any considerable height, depends on its defense to hold opponents. Scoring punch has been a main drawback.

Ross finished last in the Buckeye Conference with 1-9.

Record, best in the school's history, 16-2, all against AA foes. Fostoria successfully defended its Great Lakes League title, winning this year with 9-1. The Redmen were rated among the top 20 teams in Ohio in Class AA, Associated Press voting. Head coach is Fred Wilch; assistant Jim Atwood.

camp, 5-11 senior; Dwight Kimble, 5-9 junior; Larry Runion, 5-9 senior.

McDonald scored 321 points in the season, a 17.8 average per game. The Redmen possess tremendous height, team averaging 6-1. McDonald at 6-5, Mears at

6-3½ and Ramsey 6-1 provide the Redmen rugged rebounding.

The Eagles do not possess too much height in the starting lineup but are speedy and aggressive. Majlort is a potential 20-point performer but the team has no outstanding individual point maker, depending on balanced scoring.

Oak Harbor Rockets
Record 8-1 against AA foes; 15-2 overall. Head coach Paul Muen-

zer; assistant Bernard Lutz.

Main performers: Forwards, Bruce Lang, 5-11 senior; Dick Kreiger, 5-11 senior; John Sutter, 6-6 sophomore; Centers, Jim Farrow, 6-6 senior and Gary Noble, 5-11 senior; Guards, Phil Harden, 5-10 senior; Art Van Rensselaer, 5-10 senior; Bob Anderson, 5-7 junior.

Any of the first five of Lang, Kreiger, Farrow, Harden and Van Rensselaer could lead the scoring on any given night. Harden and Van Rensselaer are terrific scorers from outside. The Rockets with determination as evidenced by many of its victories this year scored by coming from behind in the second half.

Oak Harbor, champions of the Sandusky Bay Conference in 1957-58, finished second this year with a 5-1 record, only league loss to Mary.

St. Joe Beats Genoa, Meets Ross In Class AA Tourney Tonight

Fremont Teams Clash At 7:30; Fostoria Upset

Eastwood, Winner Over Redmen, Face Oak Harbor At 9

A gamble paid off for Coach Robert (Bob) Smith, head basketball mentor of the St. Joseph high Crimson Streaks, resulting in a 62-47 victory over Genoa's Comets in the first game of the Fremont Class AA Sub-Sectional tournament Friday in Ross Senior high gym.

Hit by some squad disciplinary problems late in the season, Coach Smith delved down into the Reserves team, a highly successful unit (won 13, lost 5), and brought up three promising sophomores. He had already called up Fred Beier, 5-10 sophomore to plug a weak guard position midway in the campaign.

Last night against Genoa, Smitty started his veteran, gritty 6-0 senior Dave Miesle at forward. He used 6-0 sophomore Joe Overmyer at the other forward, first Varsity start for Overmyer; 6-3 sophomore Ed Binsack at center, second Varsity start for Binsack; 5-11 Ron Rodenhauser at one guard, third Varsity start for Rodenhauser and Beier at the other guard.

The new unit was a little shaky during the second period but outplayed Genoa the rest of the game.

Asked if he would use the same starting combination against Fremont Ross when the Little Giants and Crimson Streaks meet at 7:30 tonight in the upper bracket Sub-Sectional final, Coach Smith answered, "Why not?"

"I gambled and won with them last night and see no reason to change my lineup against Ross," Smitty commented. "I had confidence in the youngsters and they came through. Also, the kids gained a lot of confidence with that victory Friday."

Second game last night was won in an upset by Eastwood's

Eagles, 49-43 over Fostoria's Redmen. Fostoria entered the tourney with a 16-2 record. Whereas Eastwood had a 14-4 mark.

Fans jammed the new Ross gym to more than capacity, extra seats set up on the stage floor. Crowd estimates ranged from 1,700 to 1,800.

Large Crowd Expected

There'll probably be at least 1,800 on hand tonight when Ross battles St. Joe at 7:30 and Eastwood takes on Oak Harbor at 9. St. Joe is 5-14, Ross 4-13, Eastwood now 15-4 and Oak Harbor 15-2. Genoa bowed out with a 7-10 mark.

Ross and St. Joe have not met on the basketball court since the 1947-48 season. In 51 meetings, Ross has won 39 times and St. Joe 12. Ross has won 18 straight basketball games over the Streaks since St. Joe won in the 1936-37 season two times over the Little Giants.

Coach Smith's comments on tonight's game with Ross: "They should be fresher since they didn't have to play last night. . . . It's their home floor too. . . . I think breaks will decide it."

Coach Leroy (Cot) Marquette of Ross: "It should be a close game. . . . We'll have to stop Miesle's scoring as much as possible and also stop St. Joe's running game."

Their zone press worked good last night so we'll have to find a way to solve it."

Both teams work a press on defense.

Coach Marquette will pick his starters from any of the following: Reuben Lozano, 6-1, Mike McCarthy, 6-1 senior, Charles Pankratz, 6-2 senior, Harry Walter, 5-11 junior, Roger Mann, 5-8 junior, Denny Stine, 5-11 sophomore, Steve Cecil, 6-0 junior, and Jim Ohms, 5-10 sophomore.

Hot First Quarter

Getting back to last night's action, St. Joe rolled to a 16-12 quarter margin with some "red hot" shooting. Miesle canned two baskets, Overmyer two, Rodenhauser two and 6-2 senior substitute Ed Miller one plus one by Beier, total of 8 out of 14 shots.

Coach Bob Kristenak's Comets got in close for shots, rebounded well, tallied on several foul line opportunities and took advantage of a loose St. Joe defense in the second period to move nine points ahead, 30-23. Lynn McCoil, 6-2 center, hit on a couple of jump shots from the circle and tapped in a rebound, Bob Baird, 5-9 guard, made four of four foul

shots, Dan Garey, 6-1 forward connected for two buckets, Wayne Fondessy, 6-1 forward for one and 6-0 guard Tom Digby dropped in two of two free throws. Rodenhauser's pair of free throws and a fast break layup by Paul Szakovits, 5-9 senior substitute guard, brought St. Joe to within five points of Genoa near the half. But a pair of charity flips by McCoil left Genoa on top 32-25 at intermission. McCoil scored nine of his total of 16 points in the first two periods.

The Streaks outscored Genoa 37 to 15 in the second half, the pressing defense of St. Joe both-ering the Comets considerably. Binsack, held scoreless in the first half, came up with nine points in the second and his rebound work was much improved the final two periods. Miesle scored consistently, making two baskets in each of the first three periods and four fielders and two free tosses in the fourth period for a game high of 22 points. Rodenhauser added 13, hitting for seven in the second half.

When Genoa lost starting forwards Fondessy and Garey on personal fouls midway in the third period, it collapsed completely. The Comets were leading 38-32 when the last of the two, Garey, departed with about three minutes to play in the third stanza.

Binsack's rebound and free throw, corner shot by Rodenhauser and turn around by Miesle put St. Joe on top 39-38. However, McCoil connected with a jump shot just before the whistle to give Genoa a one-point edge, 40-39, at the end of the period.

Ice Decision

Rodenhauser's basket and a fielder and pair of free throws by Miesle put St. Joe on top 45-42 before Genoa's Allen Bell hit on a jump shot. St. Joe really took off then, using a running game and the rebounding of Miesle and Binsack to pour in nine straight points to "ice" the decision.

"I'd say Binsack's board work and the fact the other boys didn't give up helped win us the game in the second half," Coach Smith pointed out.

St. Joe took 68 shots, made 25 for 36.8 per cent and Genoa meshed 16 of 51 attempts for 31.4 per cent.

Turning point in the Eastwood-Fostoria game came in the latter part of the second quarter when the Eagles, trailing 20-14, outscored Fostoria 13 to two

Bill Armstrong of Hume, who was District champion in the Fremont meet in the 175-pound division, won the state championship in his weight Saturday night.

Bridgeport took team honors in the twenty competition by garnering 60 points. Maple Heights finished second with 46. In third place, with 30, was Cleveland John Marshall.

Fremont Ross and Eastwood will be the Fremont Class AA Sub-Sectional representatives in the Rossford Class AA Sectional finals Friday and Saturday following their victories Saturday over Fremont St. Joseph and Oak Harbor in the Fremont tourney finals.

Ross topped St. Joe 34-29 and Eastwood edged Oak Harbor 35-33 in two low scoring contests before 1,800 fans in the Ross Senior high gym.

The Little Giants of Coach Leroy (Co) Marquette will tangle with Bowling Green at 8 p. m. Friday (one game scheduled) in the Rossford gym with the winner advancing to the Sandusky Class AA District tournament.

Eastwood Eagles, under veteran mentor Doyce (Frankie) Filmer, will meet Perryburg at 8 p. m. Saturday (one game scheduled) in the Rossford gym with the winner advancing to the Sandusky District.

Bowling Green defeated Maumee 63-39 and Perryburg whipped Sylvania 43-32 in the Rossford Sub-Sectional tourney Saturday.

Ross has a 5-13 record, Bowling Green 10-8, Eastwood 16-4 and Perryburg 9-2.

St. Joe bowed out with a 5-15 mark and Oak Harbor with 15-3.

The four teams playing in the Ross Senior high gym Saturday played cautious, tense basketball. Both St. Joe and Eastwood did not look as good as they did in recording Friday night wins over Green and Fremont respectively, possibly due to the effort in the semifinals taking quite a bit out of the boys.

The Crimson Streaks blew their chance early in the game against Ross. St. Joe missed 11 straight field attempts, including several "busts," and also seven foul shot opportunities. Instead of mounting a possible 10-point lead, the Streaks were barely able to stay even with Ross in the first quarter.

Held Miesle, Ross played a steady defensive game all the way, held high scoring Dave Miesle, 64 senior ace of St. Joe, to only seven points, got key baskets from Sophomore Denny Stine, Senior Mike McCarthy and Senior Benches Leano and rugged rebounding from Stine, McCarthy and Junior Steve Cecil.

Junior Roger Mann's floor play also was a factor in Ross high's success.

St. Joe's youngsters were off on shots from the floor and the foul line. Nine too many chances, had numerous turnovers and a little less defensive strength than Ross.

Leano led Ross high's scoring with 17 points. Stine added 9 and McCarthy 6. Miesle and Joe Overmyer, one of four sophomores in the starting lineup for Coach Bob Smith's Streaks, led for scoring honors for St. Joe with seven each.

Miesle, with two Ross players guarding him closely all the time, could manage only one field goal. Ross made 15 of 36 shots for 42 per cent and St. Joe only 4 of 42 for 10 per cent. From the foul line Ross hit 6 of 9 for 66 per cent and St. Joe 13 of 21 for 62 per cent. (Statistics by Jerry Gabel.)

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Bowling Green Rally Erases 7-Point Last Half Giant Lead

ROSSFORD—Basketball season ended for Fremont Ross here last night, Bowling Green's Bobcats coming on strong in the second half to oust the Little Giants 96-40 in the upper bracket final of the Class AA Rossford Sectional tournament.

Crowd was slim, a tourney official listing 600 fans in attendance. Tonight at Rossford, 8 p. m., Eastwood, 16-4, meets Perryburg, 16-2, in the lower bracket with the winner joining Bowling Green in next week's Sandusky Class AA District tourney. BG was awarded a Sectional championship trophy after the game last night by E. E. Andrews, tourney director. Winner tonight also will receive a trophy.

Ross blew a seven-point lead in the third quarter and trailed by from one to eight points the rest of the way.

Leading 21-14 early in the third period, Ross tried to play control ball but it backfired. The Bobcats, "cold" on field attempts through the first half, mainly on long distance shots, thwarted the Fremont "slow-down" with thefts. The thefts plus a full court press employed by BG in the third and fourth periods upset Coach Leroy (Cot) Marquette's Little Giants. BG Coach Chuck Mayers had his team trying for closer shots in the second half, as the result of pressing and running tactics, and they paid off with a Sectional triumph.

Leading culprit for the Bobcats

was 6-1 Forward Larry Stebleton, a rugged 195-pounder, who scored 14 points in the contest, 13 in the last half. BG was hamstrung on offensive rebounding in the first two periods as Ross high's Reuben Lozano, Denny Stine, Mike McCarthy and Steve Cecil swept the defensive board. It was a different story in the second half, Stebleton netting two of his four fielders on rebounds after a mate missed a shot and Burly Chapman, 6-3 BG forward, tipping in another miss by a mate. Stebleton and Chapman also were accurate with corner push shots in the third and fourth chapters. Chapman was second high for BG with 11 points.

Leaders of Press

Bobcat guards, 5-9 Bob Charlton, 5-11 Bob Chism and 5-10 Danny Cooke were the "thief" perpetrators in the second half and leaders of BG's effective all-court press. Charlton went in for two easy baskets and Cooke one at the end of the Bobcat fast breaks.

Harry Walter, 5-11 junior guard, paced the Ross attack with 12 points, sinking seven of eight free throw chances. Stine, 5-11 sophomore forward, added 10 points on five baskets and Roger Mann, 5-8 junior, nine points on three fielders and three of four free toss attempts.

Ross led 9-7 at the quarter and 15-9 with 6:05 remaining in the second period, working the ball for good shots and connecting with deadly accuracy. Of the Giants' first 11 field attempts, six found the mark. Ross also made three of four foul shots in the interval.

BG was off on its shots in the first half, sinking only four of 20 attempts, two by Chapman. Ross broke a 9-9 deadlock in the opening seconds of the second stanza as Stine found the range with a push shot and jump rebound and Mann on a driving layup. The Little Giants seemed on their way to a commanding lead employing a driving game, bottling up BG with a pressing defense and controlling the offensive board. Then the initial slowdown.

Miss Seven Straight

Ross went into its initial control phase during the remaining six minutes of the second quarter and failed to make a point, missing seven field tries. BG scored only three points in the time period but reduced the Ross halftime lead to two points, 15-13.

Fremont spurted to a 21-14 margin midway through the third chapter as Mann parted the nets with a short jump and long push shot and Cecil, 6-0 junior, meshed two of two foul shots. Ross then tried to work the ball in a ball control effort but BG's "dogging" tactics and steals negated the offensive maneuver. Charlton's tip in a fast break

fielder by Charlton, two free throws by Chism and a push shot by Charlton pushed the Bobcats into the lead, 22-21, with slightly more than two minutes remaining in the third. Ross finally broke its scoring drought as Cecil tied the game with a free throw. Chism's charity flip put BG a point ahead and the Bobcats spurted to a four-point margin on a three-point play by Stebleton on a successful rebound on which he was fouled, the rugged

forward sinking the foul shot.

BG ended the third quarter with a 30-25 lead (official scorer had it 29-25 after three quarters but a check after the game added one more point to the Bobcat total).

Narrow Lead

Ross came within a point of the lead with 6:11 remaining in the fourth period when Walter made two of two free throws. That sliced BG's lead to 32-31. But Stebleton meshed a jump shot, Cooke made a layup after a teammate stole the ball and "fed" him and Charlton also sank a "bunny" on a fast break attack. BG's ballhawking had a telling effect in the fourth period and kept Ross out of reach.

SHOOTING PERCENTAGES — Ross took only 35 shots in the game, 17 in the second half, made 12 goals for 34.3 per cent. BG, after hitting on only 4 of 30 shots in the first half, bounced back to sink 12 of 28 in the second half. In all, the Bobcats made 16 of 58 field tries for 27.8 per cent.

Ross bows out of the cage season with a 5-14 record. BG continues to Sandusky with an 11-8 mark.

Nagy, Welu Best In ABC Over Long Period

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Two members of the famed St. Louis Falcons have established themselves as the top American Bowling Congress tournament performers over the long haul.

Steve Nagy was proclaimed the ABC 10-year average leader Friday and teammate Bill Welu was named the top averager over the last 5 years.

Nagy mustered an 1804 all-events skein as his team competed Friday in the minor events of the tournament. This gave Nagy a mean of 2078 for the past decade, an all-time record for 10 years of ABC competition.

Welu went to the head of the 5-year category with a 212-41 average — another record. Al Faragall of Patterson, N. J., had 209-16 last year for the previous high mark.

Welu's 1878 nine-game total did not figure in the top ten standings of the all-events, but his final block of 686 earned him fourth place in the singles.
