Ross netters hope to make noise in GLL

Craig Kachmarik wants his Fremont Ross High School tennis team to get its collective feet inside the door.

"This is out first year in the Great Lakes League," said Kachmarik, in his second year as the Little Giants' boys coach, "and several of the teams have lost all or most of their varsity players from last year, so this leaves the door wide open for any team to step up and take the championship."

After finishing 2-17 in 1991 — a year in which Kachmarik inherited little experience — the Ross coach is feeling good about the

makeup of this year's team.

"Last year, we had some good players, but they were playing at positions above their level," he said.

This season, the addition of promising freshman Adam Andrews will help put the Little Giants on an even keel, Kachmarik said.

Andrews will step into the first-court singles position.
"That will allow everyone to

"That will allow everyone to move down a position," Kachmarik said, "which will help them be more successful. We could win at one or two of the positions last year, but we always had difficulty getting three or more positions to win at the same match."

Winning three in a match is a 3-2 team victory.

Four lettermen return to Kachmarik's team — senior Brian Stein, junior Greg Byrnes, sophomores Matt Miller and Ryan Mitchell. Along with Andrews, another freshman, T.J. Wolfe, plus senior transfer Adam Wyse and sophomore Nate Sachs may figure into Kachmarik's lineup.

"All of the players have worked on their game in the offseason," Kachmarik said, "and have been playing regularly all year long. This really gives us a big jump over teams like Clay and Whitmer who have few or no all-year players."

Kachmarik said that off-season play has shown up in the improvement of Miller, Aleks Ripple and Mitchell

Ripple and Mitchell.

"They have come a long way since last season," Kachmarik said, "and the experience they gained last year will help them tremendously."

Behind Andrews, Byrnes and Stein may step into the firstcourt doubles slot.

The rest of the lineup is not set for the season opener Tuesday at Tiffin Columbian.

Points were awarded to individuals or doubles teams based on places one through six in the tournament. The rank after that scoring procedure determined the tournament finish and ultimately the GLL champion.

Ross had 16 points in tournament finishes, which earned it 12 tournament team points. The Little Giants had eight points entering the tournament based on four dual victories.

"We needed to win a couple other matches here and there," Kachmarik said.

Napoleon was second followed

by Oregon Clay, Ross, Northview, Bedford and Fostoria.

The top-seeded first-court doubles team Brian Stein and Greg Byrnes of Ross had a first-round bye then defeated a team from Bedford 6-1, 6-2 in the semifinals before losing to Whitmer's Axel Kimmich and Marc Schlachter 6-2, 7-6 (7-3) in the finals.

"I was very happy with Greg and Brian," Kachmarik said. "They were an excellent doubles team all year.

"Errors cost us against Whitmer. The inability to keep the ball in play. It wasn't their winners as much as our errors."

Aleks Ripple and T.J. Wolfe defeated a team from Fostoria 6-2, 6-1 in the first round then lost to Clay's top-seeded second doubles team of Fred Fick and Casey Slovak 3-6, 6-3, 6-4.

"We won the first set, and again errors started creeping back in," Kachmarik said. "They couldn't close the match."
