# Ross rolls over Perrysburg

FREMONT — Coming into the 2008 season, Fremont Ross coach Derek Kidwell wanted to kickstart the Little Giants' rushing attack.

On Friday night at Don Paul Stadium, sophomore Tyler Trautwein ran for four touchdowns and junior James Spencer added another TD on the ground as Ross defeated Perrysburg 52-25 in the season-opening football game for both schools.

"Minus the score, I thought our kids were in shape," Kidwell said. "They didn't get real tired or were wearing down. That is attributed to our conditioning that we started in June and the price these kids paid in the weight room all winter, spring and summer."

Spencer added an 83-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the third quarter.

The results of the conditioning were felt in an overall Ross attack that generated more yards rushing than passing.

Ross generated 468 yards of total offense with 279 yards rushing and 189 yards passing. In comparison, Perrysburg netted 341 total yards with 210 yards rushing and 131 yards passing.

Trautwein was excited to be a part of the Ross rushing attack. He credited offensive lineman Nate Halbeisen with opening up running lanes for the Little Giants.

"It was awesome," said Trautwein, who ran for touchdowns of 2, 77, 9 and 1 yards. The Little Giants' sophomore gained a game-high 135 yards on 18 carries.

The Little Giants, known for their spread offense, used quick-strike passing to take control before switching to a run-based attack that wore Perrysburg down.

"It was exciting to get the running game going, because we have a phenomenal quarterback and a lot of potential with the wideouts that we have."

"We knew that (Perrysburg) had a sophomore quarterback (Matt Slocum) and we wanted to," Kidwell said.

Mistakes plagued Perrysburg throughout the first half. Slocum threw two of his four interceptions and Taylor Dimmerling fumbled away the ball to Ross defenders. The Little Giants turned all of those miscues into points.

Ross quarterback Cody Foos hit Greg Brown with a 66-yard

touchdown strike with 8:51 left in the first quarter after Dimmerling's fumble.

After Rueben Saldivar picked off Slocum's first interception on Perrysburg's next play from scrimmage, the Little Giants only needed five plays to score.

Foos hooked up with senior wideout Terence Davis for a 40-yard TD-scoring play as Ross took a 12-0 lead. The Little Giants' passer finished the game 10-of-19 for 189 yards.

Dimmerling scored on a 1-yard run in the second quarter after the Yellow Jackets gained possession after a fumble by Spencer. But the 12-7 deficit was the closest Perrysburg came in challenging Ross.

The Little Giants cashed in on a Perrysburg penalty for running over the center on fourth-and-11 from their own 30 by getting a new set

of downs at the Ross 45. Trautwein carried the ball for much of the rest of the way before scoring on a 2-yard run with 4:57 left in the first half.

After Slocum was intercepted for the second time about 2 minutes later by Ross defensive back Justin Hines, Trautwein ran 77 yards on the ensuing play from scrimmage.

"We were playing good defense, getting to the ball real fast and making plays," said Hines.

"I think the defense played a big part in setting up our offense, because if we don't score, we're not going to win," Hines said. "We had the momentum going on our side all night."

Tyler Boone hit 27-yard FG to pull Perrysburg within 27-10 with 1:09 left in the first half, but Spencer ran back the ensuing kickoff.

Slocum needed only 52 seconds to drive the Yellow Jackets into scoring position. He connected with Hayden Pryka on a 7-yard TD pass with 3 seconds to go before halftime. Slocum's two-point conversion pass to Rudy Wittmer cut the Little Giants' lead to 32-18 at halftime.

Trautwein and Spencer capped a pair of Ross drives in third-quarter with TDs. Trautwein rumbled in from 9 yards out and Spencer crossed the goal line after a 7-yard run as the Little Giants led 45-18.

In the fourth quarter, Brandon Butler's 5-yard run gave Perrysburg its final score before Trautwein walked into the end zone from 1 yard away with 3:50 left.

# Ross confident entering Week 2

## Little Giants preparing for multiple Whitmer weapons

FREMONT — When Fremont Ross meets Toledo Whitmer on Friday in Week 2 of the OHSAA football season, the Little Giants have to expect the unexpected.

That's because two key starting Panthers — running back Julian Nash and quarterback Joe Missler — were injured during the first half of Whitmer's 28-20 loss at Tiffin Columbian on Friday.

Neither Nash or Missler played during the second half, when the Tornadoes overcame a 20-7 half-time deficit to claim a Week 1 victory. Their status is uncertain for Friday's battle at Don Paul Stadium. Kickoff for the contest is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

"We feel pretty confident that if we play the game we're capable of playing on Friday that we will be pretty tough to beat when Whitmer comes to town," Ross coach Derek Kidwell said. "We don't want to beat ourselves. If a team is going to beat us, they better be better than us, if we don't have any turnovers or penalties."

Kidwell was pleased with the way the Little Giants played during their 52-25 victory against Perrysburg in a 2014 game at Don Paul Stadium on Friday.

"In the first week of the season, sometimes a team can play sloppily, and we didn't. It was nice to see," Kidwell said. "We had very few penalties and only one turnover. We'll take that every week. Every team gets better from Week 1 to Week 2, and I expect our team to get better too."

Sophomore running back Tylor Trautwein introduced himself to Ross fans in a huge way. He ran 18 times for 135 yards and scored four touchdowns as the Little Giants kickstarted a rushing attack that generated 279 yards.

Junior running back James Spencer added 81 yards on 11 carries and broke free during an 83-yard kickoff return for a second-quarter touchdown.

The ability of Trautwein and Spencer to run the ball took pressure off quarterback Cody Foos, who was 10-of-19 for 189 yards with TD passes to wideouts Greg

Brown (66 yards) and Terence Brown (40 yards).

"We saw Perrysburg in a scrimmage and on film," Kidwell said. "I thought they had a pretty good defense inside the box. They have some nice linebackers and they were physical. I was surprised that we had as much running yardage as we did against them. I think we were able to get it because our kids are in such great shape. We didn't wear down, we kept a lineman on them and kept our legs moving."

Kidwell said he wants to put the Little Giants in the mindset of running the ball first.

"There were a lot of opportunities that we could have taken through the air," Kidwell said. "But there are some things that I still want us to work on that's going to make us better and more balanced down the road. And it was nice to reward our offensive line with the smash-mouth type of game that we had."

On the defensive side, Kidwell said allowing 25 points was too much for the Little Giants to give

up. "Our defense needs to stick together as a unit," Kidwell said. "They're going to give a little as long as they don't break too often. And when there is an opportunity to make a big play, seize that moment and make a big play. We don't want to give up 25 points on a weekly basis because we're not going to score 52 points every week."

Justin Hines and Rueben Saldivar were among four Ross defenders who intercepted Perrysburg quarterback Matt Slocum.

The kicking game remains a concern for Ross, but Kidwell said his confidence is growing in a pair of first-year varsity players.

"Our PAT team left some point on the field, but that was with a junior long-snapper who had never played before and a kicker who had never kicked before," Kidwell said. "We came back to practice this week and we've gotten better in the special teams."

### Toledo Whitmer

Nash and Missler were pivotal

in giving the Panthers early leads against Columbian. Nash scored on a 12-yard touchdown run in the first quarter for a 7-0 Whitmer lead before Missler threw a 5-yard TD pass to Mike Pfaff in the second quarter to put the Panthers ahead 14-7.

When Missler was injured in the second quarter, backup Dalton Robinette replaced him en route to handing Whitmer a 20-7 lead on a 1-yard TD run before halftime.

But that was the last time the Panthers would score. And Robinette's third-quarter interception set up Columbian's final touchdown as the Tornadoes clung to a 21-20 second-half lead. Whitmer's backup QB led the Panthers on a 99-yard drive during the final minute of the game, but his 28-yard pass attempt to Tevin Boykin fell incomplete in the end zone as time expired.

Whitmer coach Joe Palka was not available for comment.

## Little Giants roll over Panthers

FREMONT — During a 34-14 non-conference win against Toledo Whitmer, Fremont Ross proved it can run for extra yards in the second half.

The Little Giants improved to 2-0 overall Friday night at Don

Paul Stadium

"We came out flat in the first half. So, we wanted to step it up in the second half, and that allowed me to get into the end zone," said James Spencer, who rushed for TDs of 8 and 1 yards and caught a 17-yard pass from Cody Foos for a first-quarter

touchdown.

Spencer finished the game with 151 yards on 18 carries, while Foos, who passed for three TDs, was 7-of-18 for 171 yards.

Behind an offensive line featuring Nate Halbeisen, Trevor Trimble, Nate Chudzinski, John Paxson and Andy Nichelson, the

Little Giants rushing attack gained 230 yards and had 401 total yards.

In comparison, the Ross defense allowed Whitmer to generate 340 yards in total offense and 194 yards passing, but pitched a

first-half shutout and only allowed a pair of second-half TDs.

"In the first half, we didn't do too well," Halbeisen said. "At halftime, we made some adjustments by going to a three-point stance. That allowed us to get lower (as offensive linemen), which help us to get better blocks and throw our opponents off their blocks."

Leading 6-0 at halftime, the Little Giants used a 37-yard TD-scoring pass from Foos to Greg Brown after taking the second-half kickoff and marching 69 yards to the end zone.

After forcing the Panthers to punt on Whitmer's first drive of the third quarter, Foos connected with Jordan Jones for a 34-yard gain that set up Spencer's 8-yard TD run at the 5:38 mark. Ken Hamilton's PAT gave Ross a 21-0 lead.

The Panthers, who were able to move the ball during the first half, had to wait until the 1:54 mark of the third quarter to find the end zone.

Quarterback Joe Missler, who rushed for 106 yards on 20 carries and added 194 yards through the air on 15-of-22 passing, guided a Whitmer drive that lasted 51 yards and was capped by his 25-yard TD pass to Jordan Brown, who made 10 receptions for 152 yards.

"We moved the ball at times, and I was happy with the way our defense was able to play in the first half," Palka said. "We still have a long way to go after turning the ball over a couple of times, but give Fremont Ross credit for having great athletes."

But overall, it was a much improved effort on defense by Ross.

"We played a lot better defensively," linebacker Brad Wolesslagel said. "We did a lot better job of reading our keys this week, and that was a big problem against Perrysburg and why we gave up 25 points. We just read our keys and everybody contributed by flying to the ball."

Boston Beckley helped the Ross defenders by posting three sacks and Tyler Hull was one of two Little Giants to recover a fumble.

Spencer capped an 11-play, 62-yard drive by the Little Giants with 10 minutes left by scoring on a 1-yard run.

When Missler fumbled inside the red zone at the Panthers' 6 with 8:57 left, the

Ross offense all but sealed the game with a 94-yard drive that chewed up more than 5 minutes and ended with Foos hitting wideout Terence Davis with 39-yard TD pass. Hamilton's PAT lifted the Little Giants to a 34-7 lead as 3:34 remained.

Missler rallied Whitmer with 45 seconds left by scoring a TD on 4-yard run.

With less than 30 seconds left in the first quarter, Whitmer had Ross stopped on fourth-and-8 at the Little Giants' 22, but personal foul for roughing the kicker sent Fremont's offense back on the field.

In the opening moments of the second quarter, Ross overcame a holding penalty on second-and-18 when Trautwein ran for 17 and 4 yards on consecutive plays.

But it was Trautwein's fumble that gave the ball back to the Panthers. Corey Compton gobbled up the ball after it fell to the turf.

The Little Giants forced Whitmer to punt after three plays, including a personal foul on Nash for face masking as he ran the ball and after Wolesslagel sacked Missler.

Foos and Ross running game came alive with about 8 minutes left in the first half. The Little Giants' quarterback ran for 27 yards and a pair of first downs on consecutive plays before Spencer tacked on 14 more rushing yards to the Panthers' 29.

Along the way, the Little Giants were aided by two Whitmer penalties for encroachment. The Panthers had eight penalties for 70 yards in the first half.

When Foos tried to throw the ball to Brett Mierke, Whitmer defensive back Addison Powell shoved the Ross receiver and was flagged for pass interference.

The penalty set up the Little Giants with a first down at the Whitmer 11, where Foos hit Spencer with a screen pass that covered the rest of the distance to the end to the end zone. Ross took a 6-0 lead with 5:23 left in the first half.

Missler moved Whitmer into scoring position before halftime after hitting Jordan Brown for a 23-yard gain to the Ross 14 on fourth-and-8. But two straight incomplete passes on third and fourth downs ended the Whitmer threat.

## Kagy could be best QB Ross sees this season

FREMONT — On Friday night, the Fremont Ross football team is focused upon stopping Tiffin Columbian at the root of the Tornadoes' offense.

Ethan Kagy, a 6-foot, 185-pound senior quarterback, is a multi-dimensional player who guides Columbian's attack as a thrower and as a runner. He is also the Tornadoes'

starter at strong safety and returns punts and kicks on special teams.

"I told our kids that they will be facing one of the top two football players they will see all season," Fremont Ross coach Derek Kidwell said of Kagy. "He's their quarterback who is also their strong safety. Defensively, he's our focal point. We have to take him out of the game because he throws the ball very well

and he runs it very well too."

This season, Kagy has tossed five touchdowns on 14-of-22 passing for 288 yards with one interception. He's rushed for two TDs on 33 carries for 207 yards. Of the nine touchdowns scored by Columbian, Kagy has played a role in seven of them.

The Tornadoes come into Friday night's game at 2-0 overall after a 28-20 come-from-behind win against Toledo Whitmer in Week 1 and a 35-7 victory over

Mansfield Madison in Week 2. Ross, also 2-0 overall, has defeated Perryburg (52-25) in Week 1 and Toledo Whitmer (34-14) in Week 2. Phil Chavez, a 5-7, 185-

yarder per ground attempt. Of the 720 yards gained by the Tornadoes' total offense, Kagy and Chavez account for 669 yards (93 percent).

Derek Kneeskern, a 6-3, 195-pound junior wide receiver, has caught nine passes for 228 yards, including three TD receptions from Kagy. Senior wide receivers Luke Shafer (5-11, 160) and Tony Hoover (5-9, 165) have hauled in one touchdown catch apiece.

Special teams have also played a part in the series.

“Steve Gilbert has been a great special teams coach, and they’ve beaten a couple years in that area,” Kidwell said. “Our coverage teams are going to have to stay disciplined, stay in their keys and make tackles.”

Kidwell would like to see the Little Giants stretch the field before attacking the Tornadoes with Ross’s twin tandem at running back — junior James Spencer and sophomore Tylor Trautwein.

“Hopefully, our quarterback can come out early and be on his game,” Kidwell said. “If that is the case, we’ll be able to throw first to set up our rushing attack later in the game.”

Gilbert said the Little Giants have the ability to strike first.

“(Ross is) impressive on film because they have established control in both games, especially against Perrysburg,” Gilbert said. “They have a lot of weapons to set the tempo early on offense. On defense, they run to the ball very well.”

Quarterback Cody Foos has thrown for 359 yards and five touchdowns and no interceptions on 17-of-37 passing. The Ross signal-caller has spread the ball around six different receivers, including wide-outs Terence Davis (five catches, 117


yards, two TDs), Greg Brown (four catches, 118 yards, two TDs), Jordan Jones (four catches, 73 yards) and Spencer (two catches, 32 yards, one TD).

On the ground, Trautwein burst onto the scene in Week 1 by scoring four touchdowns against Perrysburg. He has 21 carries for 156 yards this season. While Trautwein filled in for an injured Wyatt Harvey at outside linebacker in Week 2, Spencer took care of most of the rushing chores, scoring three TDs. He has 30 carries for 234 yards this season.

“Tylor played so well (at linebacker) that he’s going to stay there,” Kidwell said. “He had 11 first-contact hits. Because he’s a natural athlete, I think he’s going to succeed wherever we put him. But we’re still going to need him on the offensive side because he brings a different dimension of running the ball.”

Kickoff for the non-conference game at Columbian High School is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

**Notes:** A key matchup is the speed Little Giants’ receivers against the Tornadoes’ corps of linebackers ... According to Gilbert, Columbian’s players this season are some of the most highly-conditioned players he’s coached. A battle of stamina could ensue between the Tornadoes and a high-conditioned Ross squad, which has worn down both of its 2008 opponents.

## Ross rolls over Tornadoes

TIFFIN — It was a rainy night as Fremont Ross and Tiffin Columbian met in a game that was expected to be an offensive slugfest.

However, it was not the case, as the Little Giants defeated the Tornadoes 28-6.

"Our defense was amazing tonight," said Ross coach Derek Kidwell. "I am very proud of this defense, we seem to be getting better every week."

Tornadoes (2-1) senior quarterback Ethan Kagy was intercepted on the first play from scrimmage by Tylor Trautwein, who returned the ball 10 yards, setting up the Ross offense with good

field position on the Tornadoes' 26-yard line.

The Little Giants (3-0) scored on the very next play, when Cody Foos connected with Jordan Jones for a touchdown pass.

Penalties and mistakes plagued both teams, as the Tornadoes started their next drive with a two-yard loss when Kagy slipped on the wet turf. Tiffin Columbian quickly gave up the ball to the Little Giants, who decided to use their running attack, led by James Spencer, who busted a 22-yard run for a touchdown, but was called back on a penalty.

The Tornadoes would force a punt by the Little Giants, and offsetting penalties of running into the kicker and interfering with the catch kept the ball in

Columbian's hands.

The two teams would continue a back-and-forth, but Foos and Spencer would continue to lead the Ross offense. Foos hit Jones in the end zone once again, putting the Little Giants up 14-0, which was the score at the end of the half.

The Tornadoes appeared determined in the second half, though. The Little Giants received the kickoff and returned it 26 yards. Senior Jordan Bishopp sacked Foos for a four-yard loss, followed by Mark Van Horn — who was all over the field Friday — forcing the Little Giants to punt.

Senior Phil Chavez blocked the punt, setting up the Tornadoes with great field position at the Ross 20-yard line. Big rushes by

Kagy and Chavez set the Tornadoes up in the endzone for the first time, but would miss the extra point making it a 14-6 game.

The Tornadoes would have another good defensive series, forcing a turnover on downs, but the Tornadoes could not pull together another scoring drive and were forced to punt.

As the fourth quarter began, the Little Giants would find the offensive ruse they were looking for as a reverse to Terence Davis on a fourth and five play, find themselves in the endzone putting the Little Giants up 21-6.

The Tornadoes would come on the field, but would soon be off as Kagy was intercepted by Greg

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Brown who would return it 32 yards all the way down to the Ross 20-yard line. Foos would then take over the game, as he ran and passed his offense down the field, finishing the drive himself with an 11-yard touchdown scramble putting the Little Giants up 28-6.

The Little Giants then surprised everyone in the stadium as they came out on the next kickoff and performed an on-side kick, recovering the ball and sealing the game.

Spencer would take his 24th rush of the night for a touchdown, but once

again mental mistakes called it back. At this point in the game without the penalties, Spencer would have 185 yards rushing, and four touchdowns.

The Tornadoes would get the ball back for a chance to try to take it in, but a fumble by Derek Kneeskern would be recovered by Brett Mierke and would all but end the game for the Tornadoes. Foos would then take a knee to run out the clock and end the game.

Coach Derek Kidwell could not be more proud of his still undefeated team.

"This was a hard-fought game," said Kidwell. "Our offensive line controlled the game tonight. We felt that on film we could control them, and we did."

# Benedictine's Urbania back to torment Ross

FREMONT — Running back Anthony Urbania will make his return to the Cleveland Benedictine line-up when the Bengals meet Fremont Ross at Don Paul Stadium at 7:30 p.m. on Friday.

Urbania, who was one of 11 Cleveland-area football players selected this season to participate in *The Plain Dealer's* Gridiron Hero contest, has remained alive in the voting despite suffering an ankle injury after playing less than 12 minutes in 2008.

The Gridiron Hero with the least amount of votes is eliminated each week.

"His ankle is all healed and he'll be ready to go," Benedictine coach Art Bortnick said. "He's only played one quarter of football this

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season. The ankle sprain occurred near the end of the first quarter of our first game (versus Chardon Notre Dame-Cathedral Latin)."

Ross coach Derek Kidwell has prepared the Little Giants to defend the runs of either Urbania or his backup Romel Dismuke. Urbania, a senior, has run for 2,555 yards and 28 touchdowns in the last two seasons. In his absence, Dismuke rushed for 190 yards and five touchdowns on 26 carries Friday

during the Bengals' 42-28 home win against Parma Heights Holy Name. Nick St. John is another option in the Benedictine backfield.

"We have to tackle their tailback, whoever it turns out to be," Kidwell said. "They have two very good tailbacks that our outside linebackers have to contain by funneling them in. Our defense knows that the pressure is on them. And when we play well, defensively, against Benedictine, we have a chance to win."

Quarterback John Hromulak attempted 10 passes with six completions for 112 yards and one TD versus Holy Name. His wide receivers included Steven Ball, Josh Lewis and Marty Sweeney.

Benedictine (2-1 overall) has preserved a 35-14 victory over Chardon Notre Dame-Cathedral Latin and suffered a 38-21 loss at Mentor Lake Catholic.

At 3-0 overall, Ross owns

wins over Perrysburg (52-25), Toledo Whitmer (34-14) and Tiffin Columbian (28-6). On Friday, the Little Giants will again put their undefeated

record on the line.

The Bengals hold a 12-2 advantage in the all-time series against the Little Giants, including two shutout wins in the past three years in Fremont. Ross's victories over Benedictine came in 1993 and 2006 — and the Little Giants made the playoffs both years.

Kidwell said ball control is a key for a Ross victory.

"We want to control the clock and the line of scrim-

mage," Kidwell said. "Essentially, we want to play keep-away and with the baton in time of possession. Sometimes, your best defense is your offense because having your offense on the field gives your defense a rest."

Quarterback Cody Foos (30-of-56 passing, 538 yards, 7 TDs, 0 INTs) will have the chance to guide a quick-strike Ross offense that would like to build an early lead before turning to its running game. Jordan Jones (9 catches, 139 yards), Terence Davis (8 catches, 159 yards) and Greg Brown (6 catches, 151 yards) each have made two touchdown receptions this season.

James Spencer leads a rejuvenated Ross rushing attack with 327 yards and three TDs on 54 carries.

Foos has 136 yards and one TD on 42 rushing attempts, while Tyler Trautwein has 177 yards and four TDs on 27 carries.

"Fremont is difficult to defend because of the style of its offense," Bortnick said. "They can throw the ball and score a lot of points. The skill-level and speed of their receivers is very good, and they have balanced their offense with some quality running backs. We have our work cut out for us."

# Bengals blank Little Giants

FREMONT - With Cleveland Benedictine clinging to a 6-0 lead with less than seven minutes left, Bengals defensive back Bob Conroy dealt Fremont Ross a crushing blow.

On second-and-9 at the Bengals 19, Conroy burst into the Little Giants' backfield and stole the ball away from wideout Terrence Davis and ran 75 yards for a momentum-changing touchdown.

It was the deciding play in a non-conference football game that resulted in a 12-0 Benedictine win over Ross on Friday night at Don Paul Stadium.

"We got a lucky break," said Benedictine coach Art Bortnick of Conroy's return. "It helped that we were able to get into their backfield because there were

times during their drives when they threw the ball that we able to get pressure and get to the quarterback.

"But we got a lucky break, and we were fortunate it turned out the way it did."

On the flip side, Ross coach Derek Kidwell praised the Little Giants' defense, blamed himself for the loss.

"I thought our defense played outstanding," Kidwell said. "To hold Benedictine to six (offensive) points and to give us a chance to win at the end of the ballgame is outstanding. If we get that effort for the rest of the season, we're going to be pretty good."

"I'll take credit for this loss because I didn't have our offense prepared and I made some bad calls down the stretch," Kidwell

said. "I'm not going to fault any of our kids because I thought we got a great effort for everybody."

After a scoreless first half, the Bengals used a 14-play, 80-yard drive that was capped by Anthony Urbania's 20-yard touchdown run at the 7:47 mark of the third quarter.

Urbania, who played less than 12 minutes this season after spraining an ankle in Week 1, returned to the Benedictine lineup to carry the ball 21 times for 136 yards.

The Little Giants countered Urbania with the running of tailback James Spencer, who gained 114 yards on 26 carries.

After Urbania put the Bengals ahead 6-0, Ross rallied behind Spencer and quarterback Cody Foos in the fourth quarter.

The Little Giants took over at

their own 20 and were stalled after running a trio of plays. But on fourth-and-12 from the Ross 18, Brad Wolesslagel stepped in front of a snap intended for punter Mike Showman. With Jordan Jones running down the near sideline, Wolesslagel stunned everyone in the stadium when he lofted a 26-yard pass that Jones hauled down.

Spencer and Greg Brown ran to get Ross across midfield before a penalty for a personal foul against the Bengals gave the Little Giants a first down at the Benedictine 20.

Two plays later, Foos pitched the ball to Davis on a reverse before Conroy stepped in and swiped the ball away from the

Ross wideout.

"(Against Ross), we had to defend so many different weapons," Bortnick said. "Spencer and Foos were very good this evening. We had no answer to stopping Ross's running game, and they moved the ball up-and-down the field against us. When they got into the red zone, we were able to defend them a little better and keep them out (of the end zone)."

Foos, who added 42 yards on 14 carries, was 13-of-27 passing for 132 yards and no interceptions.

Benedictine, which improved to 3-1 overall, held a 213-160 edge in yards rushing, while Ross outgained the Bengals 321-245 in total yards.

After Ross (3-1 overall) began the 2008 season with three straight wins with an offense that averaged 38 points-per-game, a shutout in Week 4 — the second year in a row the Little Giants were blanked by the Bengals — was tough to swallow.

"(Our offense) didn't take advantage of what was there," Kidwell said. "Our playmakers have to make plays and we have to make good decisions. There were a lot of things out there for us, and

we didn't capitalize on them."

The first half was a scoreless battle.

Of Benedictine's first four drives, the Bengals' deepest penetration came at the Ross 20. On third-and-11 from the Little Giants' 39, Urbania ran for 19 yards to put Benedictine on the edge of the red zone with about six minutes left in the first half.

But that's where Benedictine's offense stalled, partially because of penalties. After Romel Dismuke ran for a 1-yard loss, quarterback John Hromulak completed a pass to Marty Sweeney at the Ross 15, but the play was nullified by a holding penalty eight yards behind the line of scrimmage.

When game officials sorted it all out, Benedictine had a third-and-29 at the Little Giants' 39. During the first half, the Bengals were flagged seven times for 40 yards.

Ross responded with a 10-play, 48 yard drive that began at its own 20 and found itself at the Benedictine 22 before Foos was sacked on third-and-8 for a loss of seven. On fourth down, Foos' pass attempt to Davis in the left corner of the end zone was broken up by Dismuke.

Davis (13 catches, 234 yards, 2 TDs), Jones (11 catches, 189 yards, 2 TDs) and Brown (9 catches, 170 yards, 2 TDs) have hauled in 33 of Foos' 42 completions and six of

his seven TD passes.

# Ross-Lima Senior matchup of friendly rivals

FREMONT — On Friday night at Don Paul Stadium, some friendly rivals will match wits as the Greater Buckeye Conference football season begins.

Fremont Ross coach Derek Kidwell and Lima Senior coach Darnell Collins were members of the same coaching staff for the Spartans in the late 1990s.

"(Darnell) was the freshman coach when I was on the varsity staff. I know him a little bit," Kidwell said. "(Lima Senior's) former quarterback (Nick Morris) is now the quarterbacks coach and helps call the offense. He played for me and we still keep in touch through e-mail. This is one

game that is tough for me because Lima holds a special place for me because they gave me my start."

Collins agreed.

"It's competitive, but it's also a lot of fun," Collins said. "We coached together for a few years down here. So, we know what type of coach (Derek) is ... he's a quarterback guy and he's going to put the ball in the air. It makes the game fun, even if the games are long with all the passing that's going on."

The Little Giants (4-1) are the only team above .500 in the conference as league play begins. Ross responded Friday with a 41-7 victory over Lorain Southview after suffering its only loss in Week 4, a 12-0 decision to Cleve-

land Benedictine.

The Spartans are 2-3 overall with wins at Celina (14-10, Week 1) and at Dayton Meadowdale (30-0, Week 4) and homes losses to Middletown (69-21, Week 3) and Warren G. Harding (35-0, Friday). Lima Senior's other defeat was a 35-7 loss at Division I Week 2.

"Everybody in the league talks about Findlay's non-conference schedule, but ours is pretty tough too," Collins said. "We've played some games that we let get away

from us. Dublin Coffman is a state power that we played a 14-7 game against for three quarters. On Friday, Harding had a 14-0 lead on us at halftime before we just couldn't get anything going in the second half."

After allowing 25 points in Week 1 to Perryburg, Ross's scoring defense has improved. During the last four weeks, the Little Giants have allowed 39 points for an average of less than 10 points per game.

"We have had guys step into our defensive lineup that have made an impact, such as (defensive linemen) Boston Beckley and Tyler Hull," Kidwell said. "Coming into the season, we had to switch their positions. They had never put their hand on the

ground before. But (because of their play), their a big reason why our defense is playing so well."

"Tyler was our running back who scored a key touchdown at Sandusky last year," Kidwell said. "I felt that we had a lot good, quality running backs, and I told Tyler that his best chance to play would be to go to defensive line. He never batted an eye, stayed in the weight room to gain some extra weight so that he could take the pounding."

The Little Giants are yielding around 150 yards rushing a game, which ranks first in the GBC. One of the Spartans' top offensive

weapons is running back Chaz Foster, who is third in the league rushing race with 604 yards on 101 carries. As the second-best rushing defense in the GBC, Lima Senior, with an average of 200 yards rushing allowed, is looking to stop Ross running back James Spencer, who has gained 470 yards on 85 carries.

After a 269-yard, four-touchdown performance, Little Giants' quarterback Cody Foos (54-of-86, 952 yards, 11 TDs, one interception) matches up against a Spartans defense that is last in the league (147 yards a game).

"The thing I like as the head coach and offensive coordinator is that (Cody) has thrown only one interception," Kidwell said. "It was a bad read, and he saw it right away. We're getting yardage and he's given us good reads all season long. As long as he keeps us out of turnover situations, we'll be fine."

Foos went without an interception during the first four games this season.

Terence Davis leads Ross receivers with 18 catches and 346 yards. Greg Brown and Jordan Jones have also made an impact catching the ball for the Little Giants this season.

## Balanced attack wins for Ross

FREMONT — For Fremont Ross, every good thing came in threes Friday night at Don Paul Stadium.

Quarterback Cody Foos threw three touchdown passes and James Spencer ran for three touchdowns as the Little Giants defeated Lima Senior 42-14 to open the Greater Buckeye Conference slate.

"We've tried all year to be balanced, keep being unpredictable and I thought we did that tonight," Ross coach Derek Kidwell said. "Our completion percentage wasn't real high, and I'd like to get that up a little bit. But I thought we ran the ball phenomenal."

Foos was 6-of-12 passing for 134 yards and Spencer added a game-high 219 yards on 22 carries. They

accounted for 353 of Ross's 495 yards.

On defense, the Little Giants allowed Lima Senior (2-4, 0-1 GBC) to gain 153 yards, of which 108 yards came on the ground.

Ross (5-1, 1-0) didn't need much time to score in the first half. Its quick-strike offense figured into three of the first four Little Giants' touchdowns.

After stopping Lima Senior's initial drive after three plays, the Little Giants took over at the Spartans' 33.

On Ross's first play from scrimmage, Foos hit wideout Greg Brown in stride for a 67-yard touchdown for a 7-0 Little Giants' lead less than 2 minutes into the game.

"We've big playmakers and we just try and get them the ball," Foos said. "(Coming into the game) we felt like we could run by (Lima Senior's) DBs. There is

no one that can guard our receivers one-on-one. You have to double-team one of them, and that opens up someone else."

When the Little Giants attempted to kick the ball back to the Spartans, chaos ensued. Cortey Edwards took Ken Hamilton's boot, but fumbled the ball on the 20-yard-line.

As the ball scooted ahead five yards, Chaz Walker picked up the loose pigskin and ran back the fumble 75 yards for a touchdown that tied the game at 7 just 12 seconds after the Little Giants gained their initial lead.

Ross responded near the end of the first quarter. Spencer carried the load, gaining 57 yards on five carries from the Little Giants' 34 to the Lima Senior 9.

On the next play, Foos connected with Brad Woelslagel on the left side of the end zone as Ross had a 14-7 lead at the 2:01 mark.

The Little Giants went up by a pair of touchdowns after forcing the Spartans to punt three times in the first quarter. Ross defensive lineman Boston Beckley and linebacker Cody Evans forced Lima Senior to punt at the end of the first quarter, when they combined to sack Spartans' quarterback Jason Ward.

Then, on the first play from scrimmage in the second quarter, Spencer ran 63 yards for a touchdown and a 21-7 Ross lead with 11:40 left before halftime.

"We gave up some big plays, and we knew we couldn't allow that," Lima Senior coach Darnell Collins said. "They kind of took it to us up front, and Ross's tailback is a nice runner. He sees the cutback lane really well. That's what he did in the first half to gain 160

# Little Giants face test Friday at Findlay

FREMONT — The Fremont Ross Little Giants have an interesting test Friday night at Donnell Stadium in Findlay.

Ross (5-1, 1-0 Greater Buckeye Conference) comes into the football game as the league leader in total offense (388.8 yards) and total defense (252.8 yards). Although Findlay (2-4, 1-0) is second in total offense (377.5 yards), the Trojans are dead last in total defense (380.0 yards).

The interesting part is that Ross and Findlay have scored the same amount of

points (197) through six games, even though the Little Giants have three more wins than the Trojans. Findlay has defeated Marion Harding (45-0) and Toledo St. Francis (45-8) and lost to Toledo St. John's (47-34), Upper Arlington (41-34), Cincinnati Moeller (45-32) and Columbus St. Francis DeSales (38-7).

"The points that we have scored have not been at the end of games when the other team has its reserves in," said Findlay coach Mark Ritzler. "The points we've scored have been against the first units of our opponents."

Ross coach Derek Kid-



well would like to see the Little Giants shut down Findlay's rushing attack. "Our first goal is to stop the run, take it away and make them one-dimensional. I think our defense will do that with our defensive tackles and inside linebackers," Kidwell said. "We want to make them have to throw the football. If we do that, we feel it's to our advantage."

One way the Little Giants expect to employ their strategy is bring a lot of pressure into the Findlay backfield.

"We can put in some more blitz packages and be real aggressive against (Trojans' quarterback Eric) Gilbert," Kidwell said. "I don't know how healthy he is because he's been nursing a bad throwing shoulder. He didn't play last week against Marion Harding. We want to get some hats on him and try to rattle him."

In Gilbert's absence, Matt Spragg was 18-of-33 passing for 159 yards with two touchdowns and no in-

terceptions during a 45-0 home victory against Harding on Friday. Gilbert has guided the Trojans with 78-of-125 passing for 1,241 yards with 12 touchdowns and seven interceptions. Findlay's passing attack ranks first in the GBC at 234.2 yards.

Ritzler said Gilbert could be a game-time decision.

"He was out with a shoulder injury last week to his throwing arm. It's obviously not 100 percent and we'll have to wait-and-see on Friday. If it feels like it will be safe for him to play, he'll go," Ritzler said.

Quarterback Cody Foos

guides the Ross aerial attack on 61-of-114 passing for 1,088 yards with 14 touchdowns and one interception. Kidwell said Friday's game will be a good opportunity for Foos to be an effective manager of the Little Giants' offense.

Gilbert and Foos rank Nos. 1 and 2, respectively, in the GBC. Although, Foos has a better efficiency rating than Gilbert (172.45-166.28). Spragg's rating is 115.02.

One area of difference between the Little Giants and Trojans is in the receiving ranks.

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Ross has thrown the ball to 11 different targets with Terence Davis (18 catches, 384 yards, 4 TDs), Jordan Jones (15 catches, 254 yards, 3 TDs) and Greg Brown (12 catches, 246 yards, 3 TDs) leading the way. Findlay has employed six different wideouts with Brandon Crawford (36 catches, 429 yards, 3 TDs), Mandela Shaeffer (26 catches, 468 yards, 4 TDs), Ryan Wolfe (22 catches, 381 yards, 5 TDs) and Wade Arredondo (11 catches, 115 yards, 1 TDs) as its primary weapons.

The Little Giants should have an advantage in running the ball. James Spencer is Ross's tailback who ranks second in the GBC rushing race with 105 carries for 687 yards and six touchdowns. Arredondo is fifth in the GBC with 88 carries for 382 yards and two touchdowns. Foos (215) and Tylor Trautwein (266) have more rushing yards than any of the rest Findlay's running backs.

Ritzler said he would like to present

a balanced offensive attack and realizes the Little Giants can attack the Trojans with many different weapons.

Kidwell knows Findlay's defense has yielded a lot of points (179 in six games) and yards, but still will present a tough test because of the person running it.

"Their defensive coordinator (Brad Burrows) knows me pretty well. He's a good friend of mine and he was the defensive coordinator here for my first two years. He runs a similar defense to what my dad (Dick Kidwell) is running here," Kidwell said.

"I don't know how he's going to defend us because there's some different things he could do — like trying to protect his secondary or he could be aggressive. We've prepared for a couple of different looks, we just don't know what he's going to do. We'll have to see what he's going to do during the first couple of series during the game and make adjustments from that," he added.

# Little Giants fall to Trojans

FINDLAY - The playoff chances of the Fremont Ross Little Giants may have been severely damaged after a 37-34 loss at Findlay on Friday night.

Skyler Roberts hit a 21-yard field goal with 1:33 left to hand the Trojans (3-4 overall, 1-1 Greater Buckeye Conference) a vital league win.

Coming into the game, Ross (5-2 overall, 1-1 GBC) was ranked sixth in the Division I, Region 2 standings. But the loss to Findlay will drop the Little Giants on the playoff ladder.

The top eight teams in each of four Division I regions make the playoffs.

Leading 26-21 at the start of the third quarter, Mandela Sheaffer

returned the second-half kickoff 84 yards to help the Trojans take a 28-26 advantage.

"The difference in this game was special teams," Ross coach Derek Kidwell said. "We totally had meltdowns tonight in our special teams. Our kickers choked, our coverage wasn't good on the kickoff to the second half. And we didn't win the defensive battle, ei-

The Little Giants were trailing 21-14 with 8:55 left in the first half, when Ross embarked on a 12-play, 80-yard drive that was aided by the running of Ross rusher James Spencer and a Findlay penalty for roughing the passer, which put the ball at the Trojans' 17-yard line.

Ross quarterback Cody Foos thought he had a 17-yard TD run

on the next play, but the attempt was nullified by a holding penalty. Two plays later, Foos rolled out to the right side and found Brett Mierke wide open in the middle of the end zone as the Little Giants pulled within one point of Findlay's 21-20 lead.

Ross failed to tie the game when Ken Hamilton's PAT attempt went wide left with 3:52 remaining before halftime.

But Ross would get another chance before the break.

As the Trojans were driving in the final seconds of the first half, Brown intercepted Gilbert and ran 87 yards to the end zone. Ross had a 26-21 lead after Foos's conversion run failed as no time remained.

That was erased by Sheaffer at the start of the second half.

The Little Giants rallied with 2 minutes left in the third quarter after completing a 12-play, 64-yard drive that was capped by Foos on a 15-yard TD run. When Spencer ran for a 2-point conversion, Ross built a 34-28 lead.

Findlay tied the game in the fourth quarter as 6:49 remained on Wade Arredondo's second TD run - this one of 4 yards - in the game. He finished with 155 yards

But when the Trojans attempted to take the lead on Roberts' PAT try, Little Giants defensive back Justin Hines blocked the kick.

Findlay stopped Ross on its next possession, and after punter Michael Showman delivered a 16-

yard punt on fourth-and-10 from the Little Giants' 20, the Trojans took over with 5:24 left and drove to set up Roberts' game-sealing field goal.

The Little Giants had one last chance to either tie the game with a field goal or win it with a touchdown with 1:23 left. Spencer, who rushed 28 times for 152 yards with one TD, returned a Findlay kickoff 41 yards to the Trojans' 47-yard line.

Foos, who was 12-of-26 for 155 yards with two TDs and two interceptions, picked up a first down on a 15-yard toss to Mierke. And Spencer added a first down with a 3-yard run on third-and-1 from the Trojans' 43. But after an incomplete pass, Foos was picked off for the second time by Sheaffer.

As the Ross sideline screamed for a penalty for roughing the passer to be called against Findlay, Kidwell approached the referee at midfield to voice his opinion and was promptly flagged from the game as 32.1 seconds remained.

"We gave up a lot of yards and a lot of points, and offensively, I think we tied that battle," Kidwell said. "But if you're going to win (the defensive and special teams battles), you're not going to win a big football game."

Findlay held a 383-345 edge in total yards.

"We did not play great and we made a lot of mistakes," Findlay coach Mark Ritzler said. "But we overcame everything. We did enough against a great offense to make enough plays. And we got some plays on special teams as well. It was back-and-forth."

Ross capitalized on a huge Findlay mistake to take a 7-0 first-quarter lead. After the Trojans stopped the Little Giants' initial drive, Ryan Wolfe fumbled away Showman's punt at the Findlay 36-yard line.

Four plays later, Foos' pass to Ter-

ence Davis was complete for a 17-yard touchdown after the Little Giants' wideout made the grab on a dive into the left corner of the end zone at the 8:51 mark.

But the Trojans responded right away. Less than 2 minutes later, Eric Gilbert's pass to Sheaffer on first-and-10 from the Findlay 44 became a 56-yard touchdown after Little Giants' defensive back Hines fell down on the play.

Ross clung to a 7-6 lead with 7:07 left in the first quarter after Roberts' missed his PAT attempt.

As time wound down in the first quarter, Spencer established himself on a 14-play, 80-yard TD drive that ended with the Ross running back scoring on a 3-yard run to the end zone. Spencer carried the ball for 52 yards on the Little Giants' possession and set up his touchdown run by catching a 13-yard screen pass from Foos that put Ross at the Findlay 3.

Hamilton's PAT kick handed the Little Giants a 14-6 lead at the 1:18 mark of the first quarter.

But Findlay struck quickly again.

The Trojans drove to the Ross 25, where Gilbert heaved a pass to Wolfe, who was wide open in the end zone. But after the Findlay wideout dropped the potential TD-strike, the Trojans turned to the running of Arredondo, broke multiple tackles as he tip-toed down the right sideline for 25-yard touchdown.

Gilbert's 2-point conversion pass to Sheaffer tied the game at 14 as 11:45 remained before halftime. He finished the game with 4-of-9 passing for 140 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

Findlay grabbed its first lead of the game after converting a Foos interception into a touchdown after a 3-play, 80-yard drive. Gilbert's pass split the Ross defense in half to Wolfe who ran the final 48 yards to the end zone.

# Little Giants hanging on to eighth playoff spot

FREMONT — Despite a tough 37-34 loss at Findlay on Friday, the Fremont Ross Little Giants are still in the thick of the football playoff race.

With 12,6928 points in Division I, Region 2, Ross dropped in the computer rankings from sixth to eighth, where the Little Giants are holding on to a postseason spot by 0.0571 points in front of ninth-place Akron Garfield. The top eight teams in each region advance to the playoffs.

But in order to make the playoffs, Ross will have to win its final three games, and might even need help from some of the teams it beat this year.

On Friday, the Little Giants will meet Greater

Buckeye Conference opponent Marion Harding at Don Paul Stadium.

"It's been fine," Fremont Ross coach Derek Kidwell said about the mood of the Little Giants during practice this week. "Obviously, we were disappointed Friday and Saturday. But, I told them to watch the game film on Saturday and to critique themselves and their mistakes.

"We can't worry about the past, but we can learn from it," he said. "I think we're going find out what kind of leadership and character we have on this team during the next three weeks."

On paper the Ross-Harding battle is a mismatch.

The Little Giants (5-2 overall, 1-1 GBC) have scored 231 points and allowed 118 with, statistically,

the best offense and defense in the league. The Presidents (0-7, 0-2), who have scored 57 points and allowed 254, are fifth in total offense and fourth in total defense in the conference this season. Harding has gone 2-15 since the start of the 2007 campaign.

However, football games are played on fields and not on paper.

"The kids are doing the right things and showing good effort," Marion Harding coach Heath Hinton said. "We are expressing to them to strive to be the best team on the field that night. We want our players to continue striving to do the little things right and things may bounce our way. As coaches we are being as positive as possible with our players."

Of late, an area of con-

cern for Ross has been stopping the run. The Little Giants allowed Findlay to gain 243 yards rushing in Week 6. Harding's ground game is second in the GBC with a 170.7-yard average and is led by Mason Lindsey with 642 and five touchdowns on 92 carries.

"(Harding) is a power-running team that has only completed 27 passes this season," Kidwell said. "They're going to run inside the tackles. Our defense is going to have a challenge because we couldn't off the field last week, especially on third down. We need to have stops on third down."

Ross's run defense still

leads the league at 145.7 yards a game.

The Little Giants counter Lindsey with tailback James Spencer (133 carries, 833 yards, seven TDs).

The Presidents have a pair of quarterbacks — Asher Rumple and Corey White — who have combined to throw 10 interceptions and one touchdown this season. White has passed for 189 yards and Rumple has tossed for 112 yards. Cody Foos (73-of-140, 1,243 yards, 16 TDs, 3 INTs) guides Ross's offense in the air.

"Fremont Ross will be a tough task. They are very athletic offensively and defensively," Hinton said.

"Their offense has a big threat potential. They will find your weaknesses and pick you apart."

Foos has completed a pass to 11 different receivers in 2008 with Terence Davis (21 catches, 444 yards, 5 TDs), Jordan Jones (16 catches, 277 yards, 3 TDs) and Greg Brown (15 catches, 268 yards, 3 TDs) leading the way. Eric Gilmore (10 catches, 93 yards, 1 TD) is the only Harding wideout with double-digit receptions.

Kidwell said the Little Giants' special teams units are making improvements after some changes in personnel.

## Little Giants hammer Presidents

FREMONT — Jordan Jones was a game-changer Friday night for the Fremont Ross Little Giants.

With the third quarter winding down, Jones picked off Marion Harding quarterback Asher Rumble, allowing Ross to re-establish itself during the second half of a 38-21 Greater Buckeye Conference victory over Harding on Friday at Don Paul Stadium.

"As a team, we had great pressure on (Rumble) from the defensive line and the linebackers," Jones said. "He just threw (the ball) up for grabs and I just went to go get it."

When the Little Giants took

over at their own 48, quarterback Cody Foos got to the end zone in four plays, which allowed Ross to take a 17-point cushion on running back James Spencer's third TD of the game.

"We're playing like we should have been playing in the first half," Spencer said. "At halftime, we came in (to the locker room), had a talk and we said we wanted to be more aggressive on the (offensive) line."

Spencer finished with 134 yards on 17 carries. He scored on runs of 5, 12 and 3 yards, respectively. His second and third TDs came in the third quarter after Ross had built a 17-7 lead at halftime.

Mason Lindsey had touchdown runs of 4 and 8 yards and helped

Harding control most of the first half with an effective ground game.

When Lindsey scored after a 4-yard run with 4:46 left in the third quarter, the Presidents kept themselves in the game by trailing the Little Giants 23-14. He had 109 yards on 20 carries.

"It was our game plan coming into the week to take (Ross's) quick, fast guys who like to spin a lot and just run the ball right at them," Harding coach Heath Hinton said. "We knew we were bigger than them up front, but they did a good job of adjusting to it after halftime and taking some plays away from us."

But Jones shifted the momentum in the favor of Ross.

"We challenged our team because I felt we came out flat in the first half," Fremont Ross coach Derek Kidwell said. "I don't know if we re-established ourselves because you have to give Harding a lot of credit for playing as hard as they did after having the season they've had. It says a lot about Coach Hinton, his coaching staff and the character of Marion's kids."

"They busted us in the mouth in the first half and we really didn't have an answer for it. The only difference was that we have playmakers at skill positions that made plays for us."

# Ross seeks victory No. 600 against Napoleon

FREMONT — A lot rides on Friday night's Greater Buckeye Conference football clash between Fremont Ross and Napoleon.

Not only are both teams battling for a league championship, but the Little Giants (6-2 overall, 2-1 GBC) and Wildcats (5-3, 3-0) are also vying for playoff spots in their respective divisions and regions.

Kickoff for this game is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday in Napoleon.

"We know that Napoleon has had our number three out of the four years I've been here," Ross coach Derek Kid-

well said. The Wildcats have won five of the last six meetings with Ross since the formation of the GBC in 2002. "We have to keep our kids focused on intensity."

The Little Giants come into Week 9 rated as the No. 10 team in the Division I, Region 2 standings. With a 14.0210-point average, Ross trails Wadsworth (eighth, 14.8625) and Massillon Washington (ninth, 14.4895). Napoleon, which sits 12th in Division III, Region 10, has a 9.8250-point average and still has an outside shot at the postseason, if the Wildcats win their two remaining games.

"They have a new head

coach (Tory Strock), but they're still running a 3-5 defense and, on offense, they look very similar to what they had when Coach (John) Snoad was there," Kidwell said. "We're going to have our hands full because it's the same basic fundamentals."

In addition, Ross will be seeking its 600th all-time on-field victory. Currently, the Little Giants' football program has 601 wins since 1895, but 599 of them have come on the gridiron. Two victories (one

against Sandusky in 1915 and one against Elyria in 1923) were awarded to Ross as 1-0 forfeits after those opponents were discovered to have used ineligible players to attain on-field wins against the Little Giants.

Strock has a high impression of the Little Giants, especially on offense.

"Fremont Ross is the most balanced team that we will have faced this season," Strock said. "Sandusky and Lima Senior had

average quarterbacks. Ross not only has a super quarterback, but they also have a super running back. And we haven't seen a team like that this season."

Little Giants quarterback Cody Foos (87-of-160, 1,487 yards, 18 TDs, 3 INTs) has an advantage to sustain drives over Napoleon quarterback Andrew Keller (66-of-133, 946 yards, 5 TDs, 5 INTs).

Ross running back James Spencer has a shot to eclipse the 1,000-yard rushing mark Friday night. On 150 carries, he's gained 977 yards and scored 10 touchdowns. Foos adds 94 carries with 269 yards and two touchdowns, while Ty-

lor Trautwein has 51 carries with 267 yards and six touchdowns.

Spencer (13 TDs overall, 1 two-point conversion, 80 points) and Napoleon running back Jason Brown (12 TDs overall, 72 points) are the top two scorers in the GBC.

Kidwell said he was impressed by Brown, who has carried the ball 83 times for 569 yards and scored nine touchdowns. John Weaver (88 carries, 387 yards, 6 TDs) and Brandon Hammer (52 carries, 228 yards, 2 TDs) are other options in the Wildcats' offensive backfield.

"I think our best defense has to be a good offense. Ball control is essential," Strock said. "The key will be possessing the ball and finishing off drives. I can't overstate how important time of possession is going to be. We do hope to make it a little difficult when Ross gets the ball."

The top receiving targets of Foos include Terence Davis (24 catches, 497 yards, 6 TDs) and Greg Brown (17 catches, 292 yards, 3 TDs). In addition, Brett Mierke (14 catches, 228 yards, 3 TDs) has emerged in recent weeks as a solid possession receiver.

Napoleon counters with Brown, Clint Detmer and Cody Bloom in the receiving corps. Brown has 18 catches for 183 yards and two touchdowns out of the backfield, while Detmer (16 catches, 374 yards, 2 TDs) is a wideout and Bloom

(14 catches, 176 yards, 0 TDs) is a tight end.

On special teams, it will be a battle of the Browns. Napoleon's Jason has returned 10 kickoffs for 313 yards and a touchdown. Ross's Greg has attempted six kickoff returns for 120 yards. Both of them will handle punt return duties as well.

Kidwell said, "I think we're extremely confident in what we're doing. On offense, we're extremely confident in staying balanced. On defense, we have to win the turnover battle, even though we've had a few hiccups along the way. But sometimes, you just have to trust kids, and I trust them to go out and play well. On special teams, we've replaced non-starters with starters. We're finally healthy again, have everybody back and we're going over to (Napoleon) with a full squad."

## Little Giants beat Wildcats to keep GBC hopes alive

NAPOLEON — For the 600th time in Fremont Ross history, the Little Giants have won on the gridiron.

And to secure the milestone 19-13 on-field victory, the Ross defense came to play Friday night at Charles Buckenmeyer Stadium in Napoleon.

Ross safety Brett Mierke's interception of Napoleon quarterback Andrew Keller redeemed Little Giants run-

ning back James Spencer, whose fumble gave the Wildcats one last shot at midfield with 2:36 remaining.

"I read the defense and I saw (Keller) looking right at

me," Mierke said. "I was excited because I wanted that pick to put this game away."

Defensive tackle Boston Beckley agreed.

"I knew that we had to step it up because the last two games we haven't been playing so good," Beckley said. "I have to give the credit to Mierke on that defensive last play, but Tyler (Hull) and I put the pressure on the throw."

Mierke expressed elation for helping the Little Giants

capture the milestone victory as his teammates chanted his name inside the locker room.

"Oh my God, this feels great," Mierke said. "I'm going to be remembered forever. I'm just excited we won, we still have a shot at the playoffs and we're ready to go."

The Ross held Napoleon in check in key situations. The Wildcats were 1-of-4 in-

side the red zone Friday night. The Little Giants clung to a 19-7 lead in the fourth quarter before Napoleon strung together a 9-play, 73-yard drive that ended with Keller's 13-yard touchdown run with 6:32 left.

It was the only time the Wildcats scored from inside the red zone. But Clint Detmer's extra point attempt failed as Ross led 19-13.

When the Little Giants got the ball back, they tried to run time off the clock. But Spencer, who carried the ball 21 times for 111 yards and scored on a 9-yard second-quarter TD run, fumbled a high pitch from quarterback Cody Foos at the Ross 49-yard line.

The Ross defense had to answer the call one more time.

"I'm really proud of these kids because our defense was on the field an awful lot tonight," Little Giants coach Derek Kidwell said. "Hats off to my dad (Ross defensive coordinator Dick Kickwell) and the defensive coaching staff because I think they came up with a great game plan."

The Wildcats ran 65 offensive plays against the Little Giants, who had 46 of their own. Napoleon won the battle of total yards 319-241.

Kidwell pointed to a key tackle made by Ross defensive back Greg Brown on Napoleon's last drive that kept Wildcats running back Jason Brown in bounds as the time ticked off the clock before Mierke's interception.

"We had so many opportunities in that game and we didn't capitalize on a lot of them. Part of that was because of Fre-

mont's team speed and another part was breakdowns in penalties against us," Wildcats coach Tory Strock said. "It was a great battle because I thought our defense did a great job of containing their athletes."

Napoleon opened the game with a 15-play drive that wiped 6 1/2 minutes off the clock, but was stalled by a holding penalty near midfield. Ross got the ball at its own 19 after forcing the Wildcats to punt.

The Little Giants took a 7-0 lead with 11:47 left in the first half, when Foos hooked up with Terence Davis on a 24-yard TD pass during which the Ross wideout burned defensive back Nick Rettig in single-coverage

in a race to the end zone.

When Beckley recovered Keller's fumble 15 seconds later, the Ross offense reached the end zone in 20 yards in five plays on the legs of Spencer.

After Greg Brown ran back the second-half kickoff 41 yards, Foos (6-of-12, 104 yards, 2 TDs, 1 INT) was picked off on the Little Giants' first play from scrimmage after the ball went in-and-out of the hands of Davis.

Brandon Hummer, who was got the majority of the Napoleon carries after Jason Brown walked off the field in the second quarter after sustaining an injury, used his legs to cap a 9-play, 67-yard drive that ended with Hummer's 3-

yard TD run as 7:11 remained in the third quarter.

Detmer's PAT trimmed the Ross lead to 13-7.

But the Ross wideout wanted to atone for the drop. As soon as Ross got the ball back, Foos threw a 53-yard TD strike to Davis, who beat the Napoleon defense to the end zone on a post pattern over the middle.

"It was pretty big to catch that first touchdown pass because it gave us a lead," Davis said. "But I was kind of down after I should have caught that other pass. It went through my hands. I had to redeem myself for that."

# 113 years and still going strong

**FREMONT** — For 113 years, Fremont high school football has displayed a consistent commitment to gridiron excellence.

In 2008, the Little Giants secured their 600th victory for a program that has a tradition matched by only a handful of other teams.

The Little Giants rank 16th among Ohio high school football teams on the state's all-time wins list.

"It's pretty special to all of us because we're going to be able to remember this for the rest of our lives that we're the team that brought No. 600 home," Ross quarterback Cody Foos said.

Foos, and the entire Little Giants football family, are extremely proud of the accomplishments of the program.

Year after year, great coaches made great players who were the heart and soul of great teams.

On the occasion of the Little Giants' 600th on-field victory, let's take a look back at some key moments in the history of the Ross program.

## GREATEST COACHES

The following coaches were selected on the basis of having coached 50 games or more.

Mal Mackey is considered the dean of all Little Giants' coaches. From 1950-1966, his record was 104-59-8, which are Ross coaching highs for wins, losses and ties. He coached in 171 games, also a Little Giants' record.

Mackey won eight of Ross's 34 league championships. He coached the Little Giants to four of their six undefeated seasons (1951, 1955, 1956, 1957), which included the longest string of consecutive wins in

school history (29 from 1955-1957).

Rex Radeloff (71-41-0, 1986-1996) is the only Ross coach to guide two different teams (1989 and 1994) into the playoffs.

Wayne "Pete" Moore (70-28-4, 1976-1985) is the only Little Giants' coach to win a playoff game — a 7-0 victory over Sandusky in 1983.

Lester "Legs" Binkley (47-18-2, 1941-1943 and 1946-1949) has the highest winning percentage (.716) in Ross history. His 1949 Little Giants scored the most points (384) of any Ross team in a single season.

Robert "Bob" Oldfather (51-23-6, 1929-1936) succeeded William "Bunk" Ross in 1929 as coach of Fremont High School. In 1930, the school was renamed Fremont Ross High School.

## GREATEST PLAYERS

The list is very long.

Charles Woodson, who won the 1997 Heisman Trophy while playing for Michigan and has gone on to a Pro Bowl NFL career with Oakland and Green Bay, holds five Ross football records.

Those include single-game rushing (335 yards, Oct. 21, 1994, vs. Oregon Clay), season scoring (230 points in 1994), season rushing (2,028 in 1994), career scoring (466 points from 1992-1994) and career rushing (3,861 yards from 1992-1994).

The Little Giants 14 players selected to the All-Ohio First Team. They include Woodson (halfback, 1993 and 1994), Derek Isaman (linebacker, 1984), Tony Gant (defensive back, 1981), Bob Brudzinski (end, 1972), Rob Lytle (halfback, 1972), Ted Kreilick (tackle, 1971), Wes Glover (tackle, 1956), Jim Tiller (halfback, 1956), Tom Cooper (guard, 1953), Bob Biggs (guard, 1951), John "Big Thunder" Lewis (halfback, 1951), Hosea Sims (end, 1949), Bob Heid (center, 1947)

and Bob Demmel (halfback, 1944).

Aaron Opelt is the holder of the Ross record for completions (148) in a season (2005), while Ryan Ottney has thrown for the most yards in a season 2,187 (2006). From 2003-2005, Opelt threw for 4,511 yards, the Little Giants' career leader.

Tom Brudzinski's 699 yards receiving (1978) stands as the single-season record.

## GREATEST TEAMS

The greatest era in Ross football has to be from 1955-1957, when the Little Giants won 29 consecutive games under Mackey.

Three other Ross teams (1983, 1997 and 2006) share the school record of 10 victories in a season. All three of them went to the playoffs. In 1997 under Dan Pallante and 2006 under Derek Kidwell, the Little Giants were ousted in the first round after completing a 10-0 regular season campaigns.

The 1951 Little Giants, who went 9-0-1, were the first undefeated Ross team in the modern football era.

The early 1970s were another great era for the Little Giants, who went 9-1 in 1971, 9-1 in 1972, 9-1 in 1973 under Chuck Shuff and 9-0-1 in 1974 under Tom Hollman.

Moore and Radeloff coached Ross to 9-1 marks in 1980 and 1993, respectively. Other 9-1 years included 1919, 1947 and 1953.

### Largest win

On Oct. 12, 1929, Fremont High erupted for 81 points as J.W. Miller set a school record by scoring 44 points as the Little Giants routed Bellevue 81-0.

The program's all-time record stands at 602-384-48.

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# Kidwell current caretaker for Ross tradition

Little Giants head coach Derek Kidwell takes it to heart.

Ross won the 600th game in program history on Kidwell's watch last week. In five years at the helm Kidwell has led the Little Giants to the playoffs once, had them on the cusp last year and an appearance this season will come down to this weekend.

"It's more for the kids," Kidwell said. "It's something these seniors can always keep with them, along with the rest of the team. It says a lot about the tradition that's been at Fremont Ross for years. I don't look at it as a personal feather in my cap but as a tradition of great athletes with pride in football for years."

Charles Woodson, Rob Lytle, Aaron Opelt ...

"Shawn McCarthy came back and was kind of an honorary coach for the Marion game," Kidwell said. "He kept thanking me and I kept thanking him. It was awesome for him to come back and give back. Our kids know of the history of the kids who have moved on. We talk about it quite often, but we have to motivate them to play their best football each week."

"We talk about it to a point but we have to be realistic — we won't have that

(Woodson) every year."

But they will have that Kidwell.

"I couldn't be any happier," Kidwell said of taking the job. "It was a great opportunity for me.

People thought it was a tough decision to leave Hopewell with what we'd built

there and what they went on to do. When I got the call that February, I've never had one minute of doubt or you want to be."

"Plus, we have some great athletes walking the streets and it's been our job to get them motivated and wanting to play football. For years on they'll see a strong program. There's not another job in the state I could see myself being at for a long time. It's a great place to raise a family."

Kidwell has a wife, Beth, and three daughters — Mackenzie, 7, Camryn, 5, and Kendyl, 3. But he could just as well have been talking about his football family.

Painted on the wall of the Little Giants' locker room is a reminder to put 'Family First.'

"We're all here for one another at any given time," Kidwell said. "It's not just a three- or four-month slogan. We're not just here to care about victories, we want to mold kids into the best members of society we can and help get them through tough times in high school."

Trust and communication

within a team can lead to cooperation, self-discipline and dedication. Kidwell prefers accountability and reliability.

"We want 100 percent for four months of the season and 6.5 months in the weight room," he said. "I have to be accountable and dependable to them so if they have a problem there's an outlet. Once you're in the family you're in it for as long as you want to be."

Kidwell understands adversity well as an intervention specialist at the high school. He also saw firsthand the love, enthusiasm and commitment apparent with his father's program at Fostoria.

"He's a positive role model," Ross athletic director Art Bucci said. "He treats all the kids with respect. No matter if you're the best player on the team or a kid trying to work your way in, it's amazing how the kids really like him. They look up to him."

"He fair. He's got rules and the kids know there are consequences. He makes sure kids hit the books. Kids today look for discipline. The kids are on time, they study when they get home and they stay out of trouble."

All that certainly helps a coach protect tradition.

"They've always put a great product on the field," Kidwell said. "When they play Fremont Ross they know we'll be physical and play hard for four quarters. However many coaches have been through, the best statement is the team played hard for four quarters because that's the way you've asked them to play and that's been the case through 600-plus victories and I don't see that changing."



# No need to motivate players as Sandusky game looms

FREMONT — The Little Giants don't need a reason to be excited.

With a trip to the OHSAA Division I playoffs on the line and archival Sandusky standing in the way, Ross coach Derek Kidwell and his players are intensely focused on Friday night's game at Don Paul Stadium. "Luckily, for us, it's not that hard (to focus) this week because it is Sandusky," Kidwell said. "We've played them for more than 100 years, and our kids get really focused on that."

"We're worried about Week 10, and not anything else because that other stuff is out of our hands.

The only thing we can do is execute our game plan against Sandusky and get a win a Friday night."

In a series that dates back to Nov. 2, 1895, the Little Giants and Blue Streaks have met 102 times on the gridiron with Sandusky holding a 51-43-8 lead over Ross.

But Friday night is a must win for the Little Giants (7-2 overall, 3-1

Greater Buckeye Conference), who are seeking to qualify for the Division I playoffs. Ross, currently eighth in the Region 2 computer points standings, will also need help from its defeated opponents (Perrysburg, Toledo Whitmer, Tiffin Columbian, Lorain Southview, Lima Senior, Marion Harding and Napoleon) to qualify for the postseason.

"The mood (in practice) has been up-tempo because it's Sandusky Week," said linebacker Brad Woleslagel, who ranks second among Ross tacklers with 87. "It's a big game, but we're trying to stay focused and stick to what we have to do."

Defensive back Brett Mierke is the Little Giants' top defender with 90 tackles. Sandusky (4-5 overall, 2-2 GBC) is playing better, winning two of its last three games (vs. Lima Senior 21-14 in OT and Marion Harding 22-19 on Friday) after struggling through a three-game losing streak.

The Blue Streaks have relied primarily on the running of Eric Jordan (212 carries, 1,241 yards, 7 TDs), who is the leading rusher in the GBC. Quarterback Willie Irby adds 207 yards and 2 TDs on 67 ground attempts. The rest of Sandusky backfield features 10 different ballcarriers who have gained 112 yards and scored 7 TDs.

Sandusky, the third-best rushing offense in the conference, has run for 1,560 yards and thrown for 579 yards. Ross has the more balanced offensive team, with 1,693 yards rushing and 1,593 yards passing. On defense, the Little Giants rank first in the GBC by yielding a league-low 2,465 yards, while the Blue Streaks are third with 2,645 yards.

Irby, a senior, leads the Sandusky aerial attack on 29-of-69 passing for 342 yards and 1 TD and 0 INTs. Junior Zach Esposito has spent time in the Blue Streaks' lineup, completing 17-of-53 passes for 216 yards, 2 TDs and 5 INTs. The Sandusky passers have the second-worst comple-

tion percentage (37.5 percent) in the GBC.

Despite having 13 different receivers who have caught at least one pass, the top two Blue Streaks' wideouts (Antron Lane with nine and Dominic Will with eight) have combined for 17 receptions and 216 yards.

On special teams, Esposito has the second-most yards punting (1,111) in the league.

Ross's three-pronged attack of running back James Spencer, quarterback Cody Foos and wideout Terence Davis stand respectively, second, second and third in the GBC in each category.

On 171 rushing attempts, Spencer has gained 1,085 yards and scored 11 TDs. His 14 overall TDs and 86 points scored are also league highs. Foos adds 287 yards and 2 TDs on 104 carries and Taylor Trautwein has 270 yards and six TDs on 53 carries.

Foos has guided the Little Giants' passing game, throwing for 1,593 yards

and 20 TDs on 93-of-173 attempts. He has kept his interceptions to a minimal four in 2008.

Davis, now fourth in the GBC in scoring with 58 points, has made 27 catches for 584 yards and 8 TDs. In addition, Foos' other top targets include Greg Brown (18 catches, 304 yards, 3 TDs) and Brett Mierke (14 catches, 228 yards, 3 TDs).

# Ross wins in wild finish

FREMONT — The Little Giants football team will wait to hear if they earned an OHSAA Division I playoff spot, but they needed an amazing second-half comeback to do it.

Ross (8-2 overall, 4-1 Greater Buckeye Conference) overcame arch-rival Sandusky (4-6, 2-3) on Friday night at Don Paul Stadium 26-20. But the Little Giants had to successfully do two things — find a way to shut down league

leading rusher Eric Jordan and generate an offensive attack — before posting the thrilling rally.

The game was sealed for the second straight week by Ross defensive back Brett Mierke, whose interception of Sandusky quarterback Zach Esposito at the Little Giants' 5-yard line ended the Blue Streaks' final threat.

Jordan ran 41 times for a game-high 326 yards, but was held out of the end zone. In the second half, Little Giants' running back James Spencer came

to life, scoring three TDs on carries of 55, 32 and 1 yards as Ross overcame a 10-0 halftime deficit to tie the contest at 20 on his 2-point conversion run with 6:18 left.

Spencer finished with 241 yards on 25 carries.

The Little Giants, who trailed 20-12 with 7:48 left after Blue Streaks' second quarterback Willie Irbe pushed his way into the end zone on a 1-yard run, drove 90 yards in 7 plays, capped by Spencer's 1-yard TD plunge 90

seconds later.

But when Ross went to kick the ball back to Sandusky, it surprised the Blue Streaks by using a short, high-arching boot that was fumbled away by Sandusky and recovered by the Little Giants' Greg Brown.

On Ross's ensuing play, Brown took an option-pitch from Little Giants quarterback Cody Foos to the end zone on a 37-yard run with 6:08 left.

In the span of 1:40, Ross turned an 8-point deficit (20-12) into a 6-point lead (26-20).

But the Little Giants' defense was forced to hold on. After forcing Sandusky to punt after a three-and-out, Spencer tried to run down the clock by picking up a Ross first down.

However, Phil Henderson recovered Spencer's second fumble of the game at the Blue Streaks' 42, where Jordan ran twice to get the Ross 24 before a penalty led to Esposito's interception.

Ross won the battle of total yards 395-349 in the game, but were outgained 335-287 on the ground.

Behind Sandusky linemen Donovan Cole, Alex Jones, Jeremy Strohm, DaQuez Davis and Eddie Wimbley, Jordan and the Blue Streaks' offense dominated the first half.

Sandusky outgained Ross 154-73 in total yards during the first 24 minutes. With Jordan, Blue Streaks ran the ball 32 times of their 35 plays from scrimmage before halftime. He accounted for 137 first-half yards on 24 carries.

Jordan helped Sandusky take time off the clock with an opening drive that ate up nearly 5 minutes on 12 plays. The Blue Streaks moved the ball from their own 31 to the Ross 41, where a pair of penalties and the Little Giants' defense

forced Sandusky to punt.

But the Ross offense couldn't generate any momentum. The Little Giants went three-and out on their first drive and turned the ball over to Sandusky after Spencer fumbled at the Blue Streaks' 14 after Ross drove 28 yards on seven plays.

Sandusky took a 7-0 lead with 24 seconds left in the first quarter after forcing Ross to punt on its first possession. Jordan ran eight times as the Blue Streaks used 11 plays to find the end zone on a 14-yard pass from Esposito to Rayshawn Daniels.

Foos (6-of-14, 112 yards, 1 INT) and the Ross offense was plagued by five dropped passes by Little Giants' receivers. The Little Giants had only three first-quarter plays.

It became 10-0 Sandusky after Ross's second of the first half. The Blue Streaks took over at the Little Giants' 40, where Jordan ran five straight times to the Ross 15. Eric Hille drilled a 32-yard field goal with 4 seconds left in the first half.

It became a 4-point game early in the second half, when Spencer ran 55 yards on the fourth play from scrimmage. After Adam Loucks missed the extra-point try, Sandusky clung to a 10-6 lead.
