

Ross, St. Joe girls set for sectionals

The Ross and St. Joe Central Catholic girls basketball teams will try to avenge earlier season losses as they battle top-seeded teams in sectional tournament action this week.

St. Joe appears to have the toughest task as it goes against Danbury-Lakeside at 6:30 p.m. today in the Class A Sectional at Seneca East High School. Lakeside, 18-0 for the season, is the top-ranked team in the state for Class A in the United Press International (UPI) poll.

Ross (8-7) battles Bowling Green (10-5) at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Class AAA Sectional at Findlay College.

The St. Joe girls are currently 2-13 and haven't won since Jan. 3, but Streak Coach Jill Durnwald is hopeful her team can put up a good fight tonight against the Lakers.

"We are not going there with a no-win attitude, or we'll look silly," she said. "We have to play the best we have all year," she admitted.

Lakeside beat St. Joe 50-42 on Jan. 16, but the score is misleading as the Lakers rolled to a big halftime lead and ran into foul trouble with second string players in during the second half.

Lakeside is paced by 6-1 center Denette Kolbe, but Durnwald said a

team can't concentrate solely on her.

"You can't really 'box and one' her," Durnwald said. She said the Lakers' 5-9 Vanessa Sowards is a brilliant outside shooter, who can also go inside as well as Kolbe.

Durnwald is not helped by the absence of Sue Barbour, the team's leading scorer and rebounder, and forward, Connie Meyer. Both are on a school trip in Washington, D.C.

The Bowling Green girls are on a three-game losing streak, but Ross Coach Sue Wolf pointed that two of the losses came against stiff competition. Bowling Green lost to Sylvania Northview, the six-ranked team in the Class AAA UPI Poll and Perrysburg, ranked seventh in Class AA.

The Bobcats are led by Melissa Chase and Allison Young, who scored 29 and 18 points respectively against Ross in a 60-43 win on Dec. 19.

"We are going to try to cheat on them (Chase and Young)," Wolf explained.

"I feel that we have improved a lot since we played them" the Ross coach continued. "From watching our game film with them, I was still looking for a starting combination in that game. Now I feel that we have improved where we can beat them."

BG helps Ross slide off tournament trail

FINDLAY — It's not hard, as you try to cross the Findlay College campus here, to slip and fall on the heavy layers of ice that cover the walks.

The Ross Little Giant girls basketball squad slipped and fell there Tuesday night, but it wasn't on the sidewalks. It was on the basketball court as it dropped a close sectional game to Bowling Green, 48-44.

Although the score was close, after the first quarter, Bowling Green had things pretty much its own way and dictated the tempo. Poor ball handling by the Giants didn't help their cause.

Four times in the last few minutes of the contest, Ross took the ball away from the Bobcats, only to turn the ball back over.

"We didn't play well tonight," said Sue Wolfe, the Ross coach. "Our timing on our passes was so far off . . ."

But it wasn't just passing that hurt Ross.

"They beat us at the foul line," said Wolfe. Ross hit only six of 13 from the line while BG cashed in 12

of 19. Ross had 19 field goals to 18 for BG.

And the Bobcats' chief offensive weapon, Melissa Chase, a 5-9 junior, had a tremendous shooting night scoring 25 points to lead all scorers.

In the first quarter, Ross showed signs of snapping the hex BG seems to hold over the Little Giants. Both clubs started sluggishly, but Ross finished on top 9-8 after eight minutes. Opening the second quarter, the lead changed hands five times in a row as BG's 5-4 senior Alyson Young took on the entire Ross team connecting for six points — she finished with 15 — to keep the Bobcats in the race.

Then, with 4:57 left to halftime, Chase hit a jumper from the middle to give Bowling Green a lead it never relinquished. Ross took a couple of runs at the Bobcats, but could never make it all the way back.

Bowling Green stretched its lead to as much as nine points, 38-29 opening the final quarter, but most of the time the lead hovered at about five

points. A late game comeback brought Ross to within two, 46-44, with 50 seconds left, but the Giants could get no closer.

And Ross's big guns were unusually silent. Barb Bliss, a 5-6 senior who has been averaging 13 points, and Lori Lawrence, a 5-4 junior who had been scoring in double figures late in the season, did not shoot up to par. Bliss finished with eight and Lawrence with only four.

Normally, Wolfe counts on Lawrence's outside shooting to open up an opponent's zone, but Lawrence was well covered most of the night.

On the other hand, 5-7 junior Debbie Link had a good game scoring 13 points and hauling in eight of Ross's 29 rebounds, to lead the Giants. Margaret VanGilder, a 5-9 sophomore, played well in a reserve role, scoring 10 points.

Ross had lost to the Bobcats earlier in the season when Wolfe was trying to get a lineup set. Wolfe felt Ross could have won if the club had played more consistently.

But she noted, "At one point, I had an all underclass lineup in there. Maybe things are looking good for next year."

One thing she noted that the Ross players lack, however, is off-season practice.

"They (Bowling Green) play all summer — they go to basketball camps," she said. "I'm surprised we're as competitive as we are. Our team doesn't pick up a basketball until the season starts."

"I don't think their whole life should be basketball, but I wish they'd practice more in the off season. I've got to get them to do that."
