### VARSITY

#### WADSWORTH

A highly spirited Wadsworth team nipped the Fremont Ross Little Giants 14-12 on September 18 at Fremont.

Wadsworth led early in the game 6-0, but Jim Ohms knotted the score 6-6 at the half. In the second half Nighswander added six points, but Wadsworth got a touchdown and two extra points giving them the victory.

#### FOSTORIA

The Purple and White gained their first victory of the season 22-12 on October 2 at Fostoria.

In the first half the teams exchanged touchdowns for a 6-6 tie. Ohms started the rest of the game by adding two six pointers to the Ross total. This was enough for the victory.

#### FINDLAY

Victory was followed by defeat as the Little Giants bowed to the Findlay Trojans in their first Buckeye Conference test 29-6 on October 9 at the home field.

Only bright spot in the game for Ross was a 53 yard pass play from Stine to Nitschke followed by a touchdown.

#### WAITE

The Little Giants lost their second game of the season by less than one touchdown 24-20 on September 25 at Fremont.

First half Ross touchdowns were made by Gnepper and Stine, but were matched by Waite. In the second half Nighswander added six, but Gottfried got two TD's to put his team ahead to stay.

#### SANDUSKY

The traditional Fremont, Sandusky game went to Sandusky this year 34-24 on October 16 at the opponent's field.

Fremont made up for a dismal first half, which found the Blue Streaks ahead 26-8, by completely dominating the second half. Ross touchdowns were scored by Ohms, Both, and Gnepper with Stine adding six extra points.

### FOOTBALL

#### ELYRIA

The Fremont Ross Little Giants buried all their past defeats and gained their best victory in two seasons 36-8 on November 13 at Harmon Stadium.

Three of the Purple and White touchdowns were scored by Ohms and two by Both. The most spectacular play was 86 yard run from scrimmage by Ohms.

Ross was humiliated by Marion as they absorbed their seventh loss 76-6 on November 6 at Marion.

Fremont's only bright spot occurred in the third stanza when Lloyd Both scored after a long run by Gnepper. Pete Parietis of Marion scored eight touchdowns.

#### SCOTT

The end finally came to a dismal but hard fought season as Toledo nipped the Little Giants 12-8 at Harmon Field Stadium on November 20.

The lone eight points for Ross were scored by Denny Stine. The defeat gave Fremont a 2-8 mark for the season.

# Ross Question Mark Team

Ross high's Little Giants, in their first full week of football practice, put in a lengthy session last night in a grueling scrimmage on the Harmon Field practice turf.

Head Coach Mal Mackey's grid-ers are practicing from 8 to 10 a.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. daily. Friday Ross travels to Toledo to meet Macomber in a scrimmage starting about 1 p.m. on the Macomber field.

Fundamentals - blocking, tackling, ball carrying, etc. - have

been the main order the first few days of drills.

This year's team is a young one with only three senior letter-men back - Lloyd Both, fullback; Gene Nitschke, end; and McKinley Glover, tackles. There are only about a half dozen seniors in all on the squad.

Juniors and sophomores comprise the main bulk of the squad of about 60. Team is not too big although there are six tackles of about equal weight, all over 200 pounds.

Coach Mackey terms this year's team one of the most inexperi-

enced he has had in his tenure here which began in 1950. However, he expects the team to be one of the toughest competition-wise he has had since the juniors and sophomores will be battling one another for starting positions in most cases.

The backfield is young but not necessarily inexperienced. Main bulk in the backfield comes from the junior class but most were either starters or first line reserves last year. The backs are not big however.

The 1959 Ross football squad is a question mark club.

# Mackey Encouraged By Ross High's Performance

"We did pretty good," Head Coach Mal Mackey of Fremont Ross high said of his football team's performance in a scrimmage with Toledo Macomber there Friday.

Each team ran the ball in four series with a maximum of 15 plays in each series. Ross scored four times and Macomber once.

John Nighswander, junior halfback, scored two touchdowns via short runs, Lloyd Both, senior fullback tallied one on a short run and Jim Ohms, junior halfback scampered 30 yards for a TD after intercepting a pass.

Lee Waggoner, senior guard and linebacker on defense, intercepted

a Macomber pass and ran to the one-yard line before being hauled down.

Denny Stine, junior quarterback, completed five of 11 passes for 127 yards. The Little Giants gained 267 yards on the ground.

Mackey termed the Ross defense "very tough." Macomber was held to small yardage. Pass defense, one of the weak spots last year, was much improved. The Ross mentor said the team on offense and defense put on a good show and he didn't want to pick out any individual players since there was no outstanding single performer.

"We'll get more of a test next week against DeVilbiss," Mackey said. Ross scrimmages Toledo DeVilbiss Friday, September 4 on the new Ross high school grounds, time to be announced later. The Giants practiced this morning and then go back to 8 a. m. to 10 a.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. drills Monday.

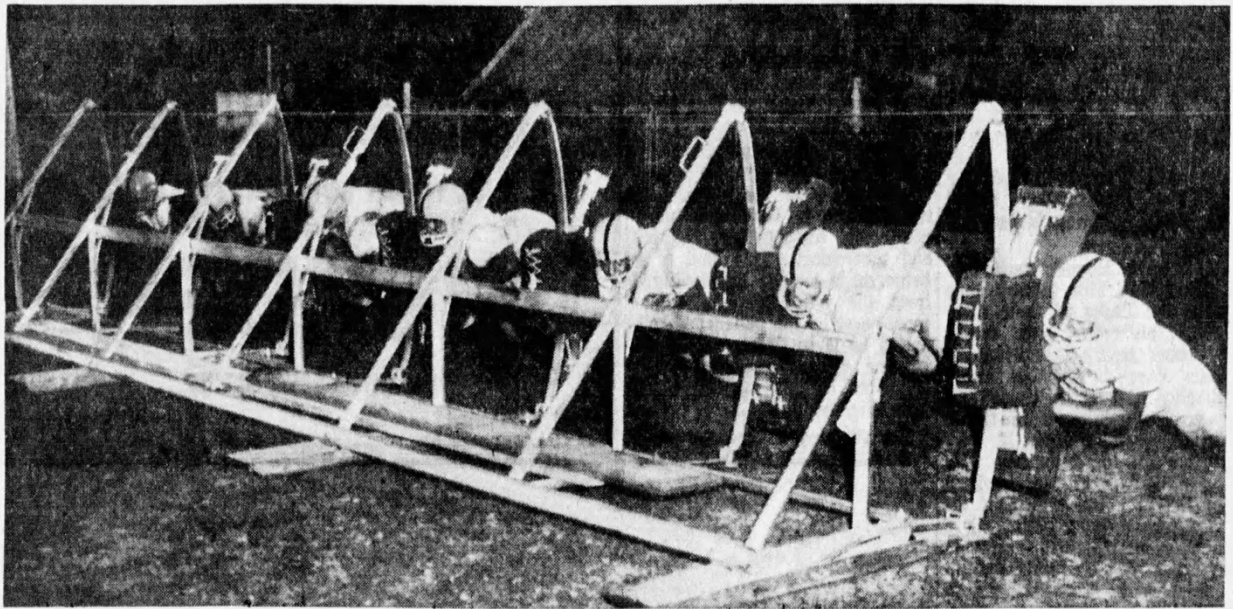

## DeVilbiss 3, Fremont Ross 2 In Scrimmage

Ross high and Toledo DeVilbiss, the former trying this season to rebound from a dismal 1958 showing and the latter striving to continue as the best of Toledo city schools in football, clashed on the Ross Senior high gridiron turf Friday in a scrimmage which drew a large audience.

After four series by each team of 15 plays per series, the Toledoans had scored three touch-

downs, all via passes, and Ross two, one on a pass and another on a short run set up by a pass play.

Ross first series—Didn't move much at all on offense. No score. DeVilbiss first series—Scored on a 60-yard pass-run play. Tigers were within the Ross five-yard line when 15th play was completed.

Ross second series—Lost five

yards in 15 plays. DeVilbiss second series—Scored on 30-yard pass play after a long run set it up.

Ross third series—Moved well on offense with Maury Gnepper and Jim Ohms doing major bulk of running and Denny Stine and Ohms tossing the pigskin with accuracy. Touchdown came on a pass from Ohms to End Jerry Brooks reaching the DeVilbiss

eight-yard line. Ohms went over on a pitchout to the left and left end sweep. DeVilbiss third series—Tossed a pass on No. 15 play and Jim Alberts of Ross caught the Tiger pass receiver from behind on the Ross five-yard line.

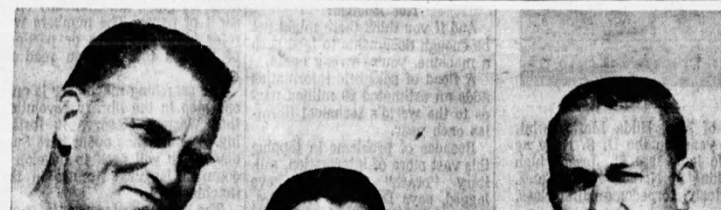
Ross fourth series—Tied the scrimmage 2-2 in touchdowns. Stine tossed a long aerial to End Dan Moran, then threw to Ohms for the touchdown. DeVilbiss, on its No. 15 play of its fourth series, scored on a high, looping pass into the end zone. Receiver jumped high to grasp the ball just before Ross Halfback John Nighswander was going to break up the play.

Bright spots for Ross—Defense against DeVilbiss running plays tough, especially in third and fourth series. Passing of Stine indicates that will be a potent

offensive weapon for Ross this season. Ohms, Gnepper and, at times, Eloyd Both ran with power. Pass receivers were doing good job.

Things to improve upon—The pass defense, a weak link last year, looks about the same. It just isn't there. DeVilbiss passer had "gill the time in the world to hunt receivers" as the Ross line failed to penetrate and the Ross secondary let receivers go right by them into the clear. Blocking must be improved on offense and tackling on defense could be surer. Backs are not finding holes fast enough on offense.

DeVilbiss was a tough foe, one of the favorites to grab the Toledo city title . . . a big and experienced club. (Hal Shanahan).

# Passes, Pass Interceptions Hurt Ross; Giants Lose To Massillon; Sophs Bow Too

MASSILLON—Playing even with Massillon's powerful Tigers the first half, Ross high's Little Giant were smothered with passes the second half to drop a 26-0 Preview game to the host team in Tiger Stadium Friday.

In the first contest Massillon's Tiger Cubs whipped the Ross Sophomores 20-6.

Some 4,000 fans were in the huge Tiger grid arena for the double bill Preview. Sophs played two 12-minute halves as did the Varsity eleven.

Near the end of the first half of the Varsity game Gary Beatty, Ross junior halfback, took a Joe Sparma kick on the Ross 37 and returned to midfield. John Nighswander, another junior half, gained a yard then went eight yards after following McKinley Glover and Dave Baylis, right guard and tackle respectively on the right side. Denny Stine, junior quarterback, sneaked to the Massillon 38 for a first down. Stine's long pass was slightly overthrown on a first down play.

## Pass Interception

On second and 10, Stine threw another aerial that was intercepted by Bob Oliver, fast Massillon defensive halfback, on the Massillon 20. He raced all the way to the Ross 14 before being brought down from behind. With only nine seconds to go in the first half, Sparma, rated one of Ohio high school's best passers, hit fast Bob Herring, right halfback, in the end zone for a TD. Bill Finney then ran for the two extra points and the Tigers led 8-0 with two seconds remaining in the first half.

Massillon almost scored early in the second half when Finney broke to the outside and raced 40 yards to the Ross 20 before fumbling. Ross recovering. The Giants picked up a first down on the running of Jim Ohms, junior halfback, and Stine. After Ohms ran twice for a gain of four yards, Stine, on the third play, tossed back to Ohms who tried a pass. Oliver intercepted and was tackled immediately on the Massillon 42. The Tigers, with fourth and three on their own 49, gambled successfully as Martin Gugov rammed for nine yards and a first down.

Sparma passed long up the middle to Oliver who was brought down on the Ross 11. Gugov, a substitute halfback, plowed five yards, then six for the six-pointer. Pass for points after was dropped. Massillon led 14-0 with five minutes left to play.

## Tigers Score

The Tigers scored shortly after when the speedy Herring returned Maury Gnepper's kick to the Ross 30, a 40-yard return. Sparma threw to Herring, wide open in the left Ross secondary, for the touchdown.

A fumble led to Massillon's fourth score. Stine was hit while running a "keeper" and Massillon recovered on the Ross 44. Sparma, on first down, threw for a 44-yard secondary to Oliver for a 44-yard pass play.

## Sophomore Game

Charley Brown, big Massillon sophomore fullback, wrecked the Ross Sophomore unit. He raced 51 yards for a second half touchdown behind beautiful downfield blocking and contributed con-

siderable yardage in the first half. Massillon scored twice in the first half on a 33-yard run by Jack Lasha and a pass play to Bob yards from Bob Baker to Bob Ivan.

Ross Sophomores tallied in the first half after a Guy Nuhfer kick wasf umbled by Massillon. Ken Smith recovering for Ross on the Massillon 33.

Steve Frantz went eight yards. Tom Pratt five, Larry Wilkins four and Frantz four to the Massillon 12 on plays inside tackle.

Pratt found a big hole over his own left guard to travel the 12-yard distance for the Ross Sophs lone TD. Run for points failed.

## Comments

Leo Strang, Massillon head coach—"Your Varsity defensive unit was the toughest we've met this year on running plays." Massillon has met Lorain and Marion Harding of the Buckeye Conference in earlier scrimmages. He added, "We are way ahead of last year's team in our offensive work . . . our passer (Sparma, 6-1, 185) is excellent and we plan to use a passing offense often."

Mal Mackey, Ross head coach—"I thought our boys did very good and I think we'll be tough this year. I admit we have a pass defense weakness but we'll work hard on that this week and maybe do some shifting in the defensive secondary."

Hal Shanahan, reporter—"Ross showed me another mugged line against running plays. The pass defense is still quite leaky and has hurt Ross as much in scrimmages this year as it did all last year in regular game. It must be improved on the Giants will have trouble again this year. Deep secondary doesn't cover the receivers well enough especially on the left side. If a change is made, as Coach Mal Mackey and Back field Coach Pete Michaels promise, as they both say, we just haven't found the right boy thus far but we'll continue to look for him."

Other comments—Gnepper, 160 pound junior playing an outside linebacker spot, was outstanding on defense for Ross. He made numerous tackles. Glover and

Gene Nitschke also performed well on defense.

For the Ross Sophs, Smith and Jay Mackey were in on many tackles and Harry Quackenbush, Nuhfer and Pratt ran well.

Jim Ohms and Nighswander ran well for the Ross Varsity. Stine was a little off on his passes but should improve.

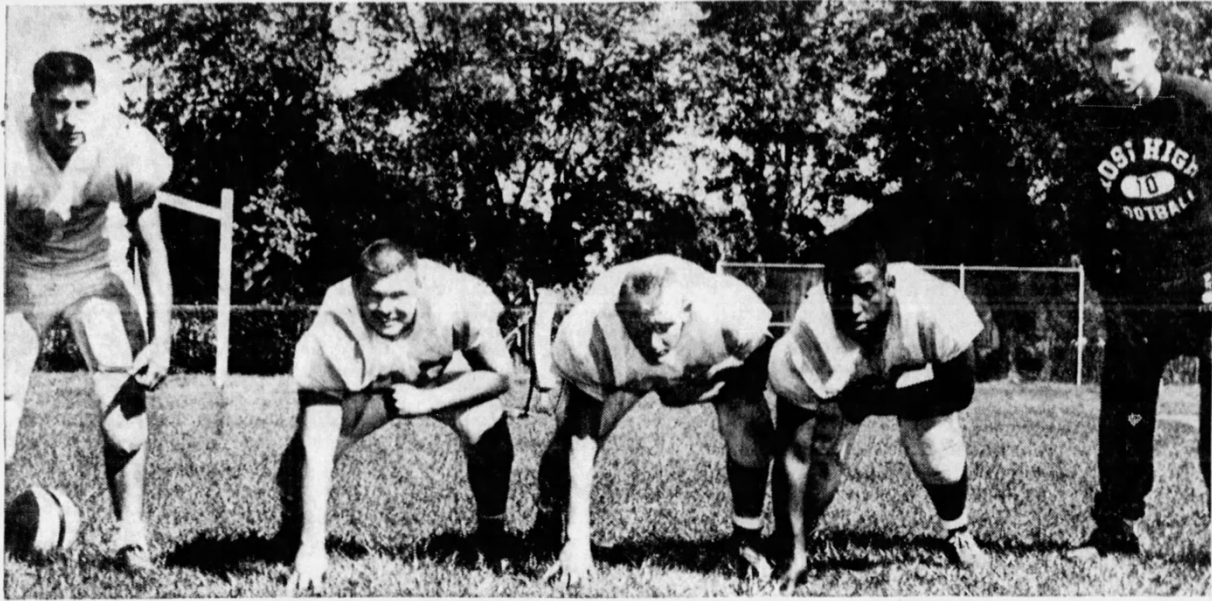

# Ross To Try Gnepper At Fullback Post In Waite Game Friday

Ross Little Giants, hungry for victory, hope that a Friday trip to Toledo provides an initial success in the young 1959 season.

Coach Mal Mackey's Purple and White gridders meet Coach Pete Fanning's Waite Indians at 7:30 Friday night in Waite Stadium.

Ross lost its opener to Wadsworth last week 14-12 while Waite chalked up a victory over Youngstown North 20-6 at Toledo. The Little Giants won only one game last year, a triumph over Fostoria in the third of a 10-game schedule. In its last eight games, Ross has lost six, tied two.

Waite beat Ross last year 32-14 mainly on the throwing arm of Quarterback Pete Stoner, a June graduate. The Waite team of 1958 doesn't figure to be as strong as the 1958 team but can't be regarded lightly as nine seniors are included in the starting offensive lineup.

## Waite Lineup

Against Youngstown, Waite lined up with Roger Vorraber, 160 pounds, a junior and Tom Hoskins, 160, senior at the ends; Al Pirelli, 180, senior and Dave Paul, 202, senior at tackles; Jerry Nellett, 160, senior and Dee Teensing, 185, senior at guards; and John Fernbaugh, 205, senior at center. Backs included Bill Bueschen, 175, senior at quarterback; Larry Skeldon, 170, senior at left half and Ralph Kimbers, 154, junior at right half; and Dick Gottfried, 165, senior at fullback.

Hoskins is a capable pass receiver, Skeldon a shifty runner, Gottfried a hard driver, Bueschen a fair passer and Pirolli and Paul rugged at tackle spots.

Actually a defensive halfback who appeared as a substitute on offense, John Hatfield, 140, senior scored two touchdowns against Youngstown, on 3 and 4-yard plunges. Skeldon scored the other Waite TD on a 21-yard run. Bueschen passed to Hoskins for a two-point extra try. Youngstown scored its lone six-pointer on a pass play.

Defensively, Gene Houston, 180, junior and Ed Langleis, 160, senior line up at ends; Paul and Pirolli at tackles with Paul especially tough; Ray Dauterman, 185, senior and Bob Johnson, 165, senior at guards; Skeldon and Gottfried at linebacker posts with Gottfried a rugged defender; Hatfield and N. A. Hamer, 160, senior at defensive halfbacks; and Kimbers at safety.

Ross worked primarily on defense Wednesday, operating against Waite's 'T' formation variations — "belly" series, slants, sweeps and passes.

## Changes Due

There probably will be some changes in the Ross defensive picture. For instance at middle guard it will either be regular Dave Baylis, 200-pound junior or Dick Dundore, 195, junior who has been confined to offense or Bill McCann, 200, junior who looked good against Wadsworth. Baylis sustained a broken nose

against Wadsworth but probably will be available for part time service. McKinley Glover, 230, junior and Ken Fry, 225, junior will be at tackles as usual with Gene Nitschke, 180, senior at one end. Either Tom Geer, 160, junior or Lloyd Both, 190, senior, apparently recovered from a shoulder separation, will be at the other flanker. Lee Waggoner, 165, senior will be at his regular linebacker spot with newcomer Phil Dellasantina, 170, junior on the other side.

Maury Gnepper, 160, junior who has looked especially sharp on tackles at a corner back this season will be in his usual position but the other corner slot is undecided with any one of four candidates available — John Nighswander, 170, Gary Beatty, 165, Jim Alberts, 160, all juniors or a newcomer, Sophomore Tom Pratt, 155. Jim Ohms, 170, junior and Dennis Stine, 175, junior will be in the deep spots.

Offensively, one major change will see Gnepper, last year's No. 1 quarterback, operating at fullback. Although light at 160 pounds, Gnepper is aggressive and a hard and capable runner. Stine will be the quarterback with Ohms and Nighswander at halfbacks. Both is slated for duty at offensive halfback and fullback.

Gordon Hart, 195, senior will be the snapper-back, George Deichert, 185, junior and Dundore at guard, Glover and Fry with possibly Bill McCann at tackles and Nitschke and Dan Moran, 165, junior at ends.

# Offense Shines As Little Giants, Host Indians Stage 'TD Parade'

TOLEDO (Waite Stadium)—Stopped twice this season by a total margin of six points, the slowly improving Little Giants of Ross high hope that a 24-20 setback here Friday to Toledo Waite marks the end of a seven-game losing streak.

In its last nine games including the final seven of 1958, Ross has dropped seven and tied two.

It was a "thundering" of a game at Toledo last night if you go for an offensive show (and most fans do—the 6,000 persons in Waite Stadium seemed to appreciate the barrage of touchdowns).

Ross scored first with 8:41 remaining in the initial period on a one-yard sneak by Dennis Stine, quarterback, after Maury Gnepper recovered a fumble on the Waite 33 (Stine's pass for points failed). Jim Ohms and John Nighswander picked up valuable yardage on the drive, Nighswander on a 16-yard end run and Ohms on another 16-yard run, aided by Gnepper's block, around the left side to the Waite one.

Waite came right back to score with 5:40 left on a 21-yard run by John Hatfield, halfback set up by 12-yard and 15-yard runs by Hatfield (Dick Gottfried's pass for points failed).

## Successful Wing

Ross took over to move 67 yards in 13 plays, payoff on the first play of the second period when Gnepper, off the highly successful wide wing "T" employed by Coach Mal Mackey, burst through the middle for five yards (Stine passed to Ohms for two extra points).

Ross high's 14-6 lead was quickly narrowed to 14-12 as Waite trailed with 7:17 left in the second quarter. Gottfried scored the first of his three touchdowns on a six-yard cross buck inside his own right tackle (Quarterback Bill Bueschen's pass was incomplete on extra points try). Larry Skeldon, hard driving 170-pound senior left halfback of Waite who was their best ground gainer, ripped off a 12-yard wide sweep run and two more runs of 12 and nine yards on the advance. Bueschen passed to Hatfield for 15 more yards, Hatfield making a nifty catch while falling on his knees. Gottfried, also a hard runner, went seven yards just before his TD buck.

Waite had another chance to score moments later when the Indians finally put a stop to the constant offensive warfare by holding Ross to eight yards in three plays. On fourth down Gnepper's kick was partially blocked and Dave Paul, Waite's tough tackle, recovered on the Waite 42. Ross stopped the Indians, though, End Gene Nitschke tossing Bueschen for a two yard loss on third down. After a Waite punt, Ross picked up a first down on the inside tackle running of Ohms and a wide sweep by Nighswander. However, Stine's pass was intercepted on the Waite 34 by substitute back Larry Bass who returned to the Ross 44. With about a minute remaining in the first half, Bueschen could connect on only one pass, a short three-yarder to Skeldon.

Ross led at halftime 14-12.

Ross missed a scoring opportunity early in the third period, then went into a defensive lapse costing two Waite touchdowns, the final one decisive, until mid-way in the final chapter.

The defensive lapse in the second half could be attributed somewhat to the absence of Gnepper at corner back and 225-pound junior tackle Ken Fry. Gnepper, a rugged defender against running plays, suffered a shoulder separation late in the second quarter and played only a short time on offense the second half and no defense. Fry, who was doing a crack job at defensive tackle, got lime in his eyes in the first half and missed the rest of the game. He was taken to a Toledo hospital and was to be taken to Fremont Memorial hospital Saturday for examination and treatment. That plus rugged defense back Gary Beatty being limited to only a couple of minutes play due to a

two-weeks long leg injury cost Ross three top defenders.

## Fumble Costly

Dick Dundore, guard, picked up a short Waite kickoff to open the second half and was downed on the Ross 47. Nighswander, Gnepper (on his last running play of the game before being sidelined), Ohms and Lloyd Both, Gnepper's replacement at fullback, went for a first down on the Waite 42. A Stine to Ohms pass was complete to the Waite 29. On second and 10, a handoff was fumbled. Waite recovering on the Waite 25 (recovery by halfback Frank Coughlin).

Waite dominated the game then until Ross came back late in the fourth period. The Indians went 75 yards in 10 plays to move ahead of Ross 18-14 on Gottfried's one-yard plunge (Gottfried's inside tackle bursts and Skeldon's hard running moved Waite into position to score).

Ross was stopped "cold" on its next turn with the ball, Gnepper kicking to start the fourth period, a 36-yard boot to the Waite 48 returned by Hatfield to the Ross 45. Hatfield zipped for 12 yards. An offside penalty against Ross and more power running by Skeldon and Gottfried put Waite on the Ross seven. Hatfield went for four yards and Gottfried for the final three with 8:30 to play in the game. Skeldon's kick for point was no good and Waite led 24-14.

Just as they did against Wadsworth last week, Ross bounced back to score. Nighswander zoomed for 16 yards, Ohms for nine, Stine on a beauty fake and "keeper" for 10 and Stine passed to Both on the Waite 10. Ohms gained five on a double reverse and Nighswander, on a hard run over right guard, the final five yards (fumble on extra point try led to no added points). Ross trailed 24-20 with less than four minutes to play.

Waite was forced to kick on fourth down, Ross taking over on its 20 with 1:15 to play. Two passes and two runs gained only eight yards and Waite took over for keeps.

## Added Notes

Ross was penalized 20 yards on offside infractions and Waite didn't draw a single penalty.

Ohms and Nighswander were the big gainers for Ross, Ohms with a net of 75 yards in 16 plays and Nighswander with 81 in 16. Nighswander also almost broke away on a kickoff, running hard up the middle for a 40-yard return in the second period. Skeldon of Waite also almost went the distance on a kickoff return.

Skeldon gained 80 yards in 11 carries. Hatfield 84 in 15 and Gottfried 82 in 16.

Mackey said the Giants are much improved and will get really tough from now on. The Giants play Fostoria high at Fostoria next Friday. Fostoria won last night 42-8 over Elmwood after dropping its opener to Bellevue last week.

Royal treatment is given press box personnel at Waite games, coffee, donuts, sandwiches being brought right to your seat during the game and at halftime. Also, statistical sheets are made available.

Ross and Waite bands put on halftime shows and, prior to the start of the game, massed for playing of the National Anthem.

Ross high's best on defense included Nitschke, Ohms, Gnepper and Lee Waggoner, inside line-backer.

Statistical chart shows the close-

Mackey said he was well pleased with his team's offensive play but that the defensive crew will be in for a rugged workout Monday at the practice site.

## Teams Meet For 38th Time At Fostoria Friday; Injuries May Plague The Little Giants

September 26, 1958 marks a significant date in the history of Fremont-Ross high football.

On that Friday a little more than a year ago, the Little Giants defeated the Fostoria Redmen 16-7 by erasing a halftime deficit of 7-0 at Harmon Stadium.

It was the only 1958 gridiron triumph for the Little Giants who did not lose a football game the three years previous—in 1955, 1956 and 1957.

Since winning over Fostoria last year, the Giants have played nine football games, victorious in none, loser of seven and playing to a tie in the other two.

Two of the seven reversals have come this year: a 14-12 opening loss to Wadsworth and a 24-20 defeat last week to Toledo Wade. Victory is uppermost in the minds of Ross coaches—Mal Mackey the head man, Bob Auble, Paul Raines, Pete Michaels and Jim Janock—Ross players, student body and fans.

Ross and Fostoria collide at 8 p. m. Friday in Memorial Stadium, Fostoria.

Fostoria will be no easy foe. The Redmen have eight lettermen in the starting offensive array—the Little Giants five. However, and for once, there is little difference in the senior element. Fostoria offers five lineup includes four 12th graders and seven 11th graders; the Ross lineup lists three 12th graders, eight 11th graders.

Art Burtin, head coach of the Redmen, seeks his first victory over Ross high since taking over the top job at Fostoria in 1956. The Fremont-Ross high graduate of 1941 has a record of 11 wins, 17 losses and one tie as head master at Fostoria including a loss to Bellevue and win over Elmwood this year.

Burtin's cry this week: "We're going all out to beat Fremont." Last year's Fostoria defeat by Fremont was the 25th handed the Redmen by the Little Giants since the early 1900s. This will be the 38th meeting between the schools. Last Fostoria victory over Fremont was in 1954 when the Redmen triumphed 6-0.

### Ross Comeback

Dwight Kimble, swift halfback, scored the lone TD for the Redmen last year and kicked the extra point to give Fostoria a 7-0 quarter edge. Margat was the same at halftime. However, Ross scored two touchdowns in the second half on short runs by Maury Gnepper and Jim Otermat. Jim Oms ran twice for four extra points.

Kimble is a senior this year but is ineligible due to age (he missed several years in grade school due to illness).

Otermat of Ross has graduated. Gnepper, quarterback against the Redmen last year, is only a junior but will miss the 1959 game due to a shoulder separation suffered in the Wade game last year. Oms, also a regular halfback in the game last year as a sophomore, will be in the starting lineup for Ross Friday night.

"We've cooked up some surprises for Fostoria," Coach Mackey promised.

### Two Giants Out

"We're hurting, however, due to injuries," the Ross head coach admitted. Gnepper has been terrific on defense and will miss Gary Beatty (junior letterman halfback) also a good defensive player. Bill McCann and Tom Geer last reported for practice last night after shaking off injuries.

Beatty, defensive halfback, has been bothered by a leg injury for three weeks. McCann, junior tackle used as a substitute, sustained a slight shoulder separation in the Reserves-Sophomore game last Saturday and Geer, a rugged defensive end, suffered a leg injury early this week in practice. Also missing will be Jerry Brown, an end, due to grades.

Renfro, speedy flanker, and Lahr, veteran defensive back, were on the sidelines Wednesday as the Browns drilled in the rain. Renfro is suffering from an aching arch which reduced him to a walk last week against Pittsburgh. Lahr still is slowed by a knee injury which kept him out of the 17-7 loss to the Steelers.

Quarterback Plum has a severely bruised chest, but did some throwing in the workout. He doesn't feel the injury hampers his passing but says the chest is quite sore and hampers him in certain movements.

Tiger, 30-year-old Nigerian, Wednesday night scored a unanimous 10-round decision over Giardello, ending his three-fight winning streak.

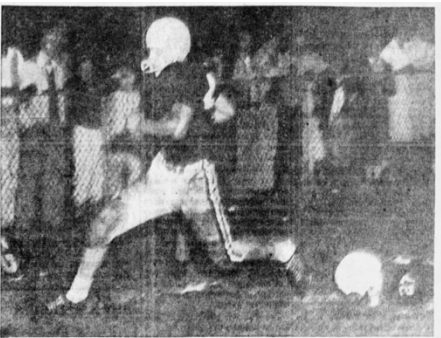

## Fremont Tops Fostoria 22-12 In Friendly Memorial Stadium

FOSTORIA—The friendly turf of Memorial Stadium, Fostoria was again a victory tonic for victory-starved Fremont Ross who topped the Redmen 22-12 Friday night.

Fremont has yet to meet defeat in Memorial Stadium, first unveiled in 1948. Alternating home and away dates, only loss suffered by Ross at the hands of Fostoria during that interval was a 6-0 setback in 1954. That game was played in Harmon Stadium.

Jim Ohms, 196-pound junior right halfback, was the brilliant offensive star for the Little Giants who last night ended a seven game losing streak extending back to the Fostoria game of a year ago when Fremont won 16-7. In seven more 1958 games, Ross lost five, tied two. Then came defeats to Wadsworth in the 1959 opener and a loss to Toledo Waite last week.

Ohms was a real workhorse for the Giants, carrying the pigskin 25 times, gaining 154 yards net for an average per try of 6.16. He rolled off runs of 15, 13, 28 and 21 yards, the 8-yarder a touchdown romp in the third quarter that broke a 6-6 halftime tie. Fremont never trailed in the game. Ohms scored another touchdown on a two-yard run in the final period, ran for two extra points and passed to Dennis Stine, junior quarterback, for two added points.

The Ross offensive star returned a Fostoria kick 33 yards to set up the first Fremont score, three passes, completing one for 11 yards, caught two passes for 34 yards, took care of the Ross punting and was tough on defense against Fostoria running plays.

He (Ohms) held the team together when things weren't going right. Head Coach Mel Mackey observed. "Jim was a tremendous back out there tonight."

Load fell on Ohms when John Nighwander, junior left halfback, was hurt while rambling 14 yards on an end sweep in Ross high initial scoring drive early in the first period. Nighwander limped through the rest of the first half but saw only momentary duty in the second half, his twisted ankle finally sidelining him early in the third period. Missing the game entirely due to injuries were veterans, letterman backs, Mury Guepper and Gary Beatty, both juniors.

Not Up To Par  
Despite the victory, Mackey thought the Giants did not play up to par. He felt Nighwander's injury, the many penalties called against Fremont and the oftentimes lousy defensive work of the Purple and White made the team appear "spoiled."

Ross scored the first time it got the ball when Ohms gathered in Grant Jackson's kick on the Fremont 38 and returned 23 yards to the Fostoria 39. After the first of many penalties against them moved the ball back to the Fostoria 44, Nighwander reeled off his 14-yard run to the Fostoria 30. Ohms picked up a first down on the Fostoria 29. Stine, who next play, couldn't connect on a pass. On third down, Stine found Gene Nitschke, senior end, in the clear down the middle. Nitschke made a fine catch and fell over the goal line for points. Fostoria led 6-0 with 9:05 left in the first quarter.

Fostoria bounced back to almost score after Ohms' kick late in the period hit the ground on the Fremont 65 and bounced in reverse to the Fremont 35. However, after making a first down on Fremont's 24, the Redmen were stalled and gave up the football on the 20.

Besides Nighwander with his twisted ankle, Sophomore End Jerry Brooks sustained a twisted knee late in the game. Brooks was incorrectly reported ineligible earlier this week.

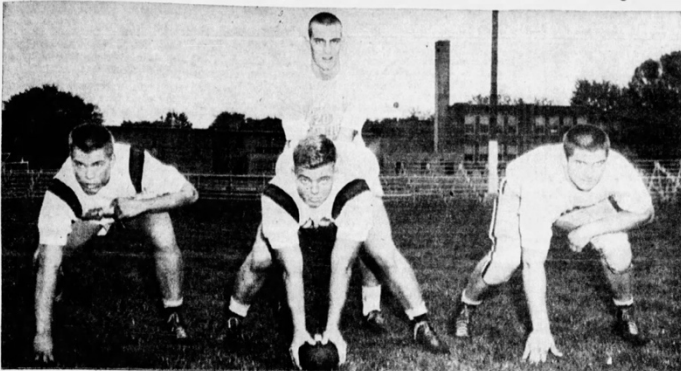

## Both, Alberts, Rendon Take On Key Roles In B.C. Opener

Ross high hopes to regain its previous success in the Buckeye Conference when the Little Giants open their 1959 league campaign against Findlay's experienced Trojans at 8 tonight on the Harmon Stadium gridiron.

Last year Ross lost to Findlay in its B. C. opener 14-12 after "blowing" a 12-0 halftime edge. That was the start of five straight conference reversals for Ross in 1958 to go with no victories.

In previous seasons in the Buckeye loop, Ross won three, lost one in 1954, first year of the conference, to take second place behind champion Sandusky. Ross was 5-0 in 1955, 1956 and 1957 in the conference, league champions all three seasons. Marion Harding was conference champ in the league's fifth season with a 3-0 mark.

### Big Edge For Fremont

Ross and Findlay have met 34 times dating back to the 1917 season with Fremont holding a wide victory edge, 22 to 10. Two games ended in a tie.

Findlay, until last year, hadn't topped Fremont since 1950 when the Trojans won 14-0.

Coach Neil Schmidt, in his fifth season at Findlay, has guided the Trojans to three straight non-conference victories against comparatively easy foes - 20-14 over Toledo Scott, 48-0 over Delphos St. John and 42-0 over Ashland. The Findlayites have tallied 110 points while allowing only 14.

Ross, under Coach Mal Mackey in his 10th season at Fremont, has tallied 54 points, allowed 36 while compiling a 1-2 non-league mark - a 14-12 loss to Wadsworth, 24-20 setback to Toledo Waite and 23-12 victory last week over Fostoria.

The Little Giants will have only four of a possible seven lettermen in the starting lineup against Findlay. Regular left halfback John Nighswander, 170-pound veteran junior, has a damaged ligament in the arch of one foot, regular defensive corner back and a halfback, fullback or quarterback on offense Maury Gnepper, 160-pound veteran junior, has been out of action two weeks with a shoulder separation. Gary Beatty, 165-junior letterman, a defensive specialist, has seen little action this year due to a leg injury sustained in the Massillon scrimmage. Nighswander was hurt in the Fostoria game; Gnepper the week before in the Waite contest. Mackey said none will see action tonight. Also unavailable due to injury is Jerry Brooks, junior end.

Key in Fremont success tonight is in the performance of Lloyd Both, 190-pound letterman senior, returned to his fullback post last week after being sidelined by a

shoulder separation; Jim Alberts, 170-pound junior, at halfback in the offensive array; and Ruben Rendon, 140-pound senior, at defensive corner back in place of Gnepper.

### Ross Starters

With Both and Alberts as probabilities in the starting backfield will be Jim Ohms, 170-pound junior letterman, at right halfback and Dennis Stine, 175-pound junior at quarterback. Ohms was a brilliant performer last week in carrying the ball 25 times for a gain of 154 yards.

Offensive line will include Gene Nitschke, 180-pound senior letterman and Dan Moran, 165-junior at ends; McKinley Glover, 230-junior letterman and Ken Fry, 225-junior at tackles; Dick Dundore, 195-junior and George Deichert, 185-junior at guards; and Gordon Hart, 195-junior at center.

Defensive starters include Nitschke and Tom Geer, 160-junior at ends; Glover and Dave Baylis, 190-junior at tackles; Fry at middle guard; Phil Dellasantina, 170-junior and Lee Waggoner, 165-junior linebackers; and Rendon, Both, Ohms and Stine, defensive halfbacks. Both is moving to safety with Stine and Ohms moving up from safety to corner back.

With the three injured Little Giants out, it means Ross will have to depend on only four lettermen against Findlay. The Trojans can count on 16 lettermen.

Outbounced, outfigured and thought and outscored 21-6 in a dismal first half, Fremont Ross went down in eventual defeat 28-6 at the hands of a scrappy Findlay team in Harmon Stadium Friday. More than 4,000 fans viewed the Buckeye Conference contest, first league game of the season for both schools.

Coach Neil Schmidt's Trojans won their fourth straight game without defeat while Coach Mal Mackey's Little Giants went down to their third reversal in four outings.

**Long Season**  
With four tough conference foes to face in the next four weeks starting with Sandusky here next Friday, season appears to be an other "long one" for Ross. Last year's team won only one of 10 games, losing seven and tying two. If last night's exhibition is any indication, this year's edition will fare little better.

A fumble early in the game started Ross on its downfall. After Ruben Rendon recovered a Findlay fumble on the Fremont 45, Jim Ohms gained 16 yards to the Findlay 39. Jim Alberts, playing in place of injured John Nighswander, swept left end and somehow lost control of the football. Tackle Jerry Sprouse recovered for Findlay and the visitors were on their way to success against a listless Little Giant eleven.

Steve Kuhlman, halfback, swept left end for 21 yards on a third down and 11 yards to go play. Jim McIntosh, wideback, fullback for the Trojans, ripped off 28 yards in four carries setting up a one-yard scoring plunge by Kuhlman. Jim Federici's PAT kick was blocked by Ross end Gene Nitschke.

Ohms, off the single wing, ran 28 yards to the Findlay 48. But the Ross drive stalled. Ohms forced to kick, Findlay drove to the Ross 38 where Bob Traul, quarterback, tossed a pass to Tom Williams for an apparent touchdown but a holding penalty nullified the TD. It was the first of two Trojan touchdowns called back by penalty.

Forced to kick, Findlay turned the ball over to Fremont. Early in the second period the Giants tried to pick up a first down on a fourth down situation but failed by a yard. Three plays later Traul tossed a pass to Kuhlman in the Ross secondary for the second Findlay TD. Play covered 36 yards. Federici passed to Adams for the PAT.

**Miss Opportunity**  
Ross had a chance to get back in the game when Dennis Stone, quarterback, fired a long pass to Nitschke, who had gotten beyond the Findlay secondary. But Nitschke wasn't looking for the pass, turned the wrong way and

it bounced off his shoulder. Ohms passed to Dan Moran for 27 yards to the Findlay 30 but four plays later found Ross one yard shy of a first down.

Phil Dellasantina, junior line-backer who played a fine defensive game for the Giants, recovered a Findlay fumble on the Fremont 40. Another Stone pass was dropped, and on the next play, off the spread, Stone threw a screen aerial.

Federici picking it off and returning from the Ross 40 to the 12. Four plays later McIntosh rammed into yardstick. Federici kicked the PAT and Findlay led 21-0.

Ross offensive blocking was practically nil the first half, defense allowed Findlay to beat it to the punch, passes were dropped and some passes were way off the mark. Main difference was that Findlay had desire and Ross did not.

**Credit veteran line coach Paul Raines** with Ross high school improved play in the second half. He gave the team as a whole and many individual players a "thorough chewing out" at halftime, main theme that you have to have courage to win football games.

Tongue-lashing paid off to the extent of Ross controlling the ball practically all of the third period. There was considerable more desire shown which led to harder running and improved blocking and tackling. However, scoring was nil as Ross moved within range three times but couldn't cross the Findlay goal.

Both gained 32 yards and Ohms 21 in consecutive carries but the initial third period drive stalled on the Findlay 19. Again Ross came bounding back but another drive ended on the Findlay 29. Tom Geer recovered a Findlay fumble on the Findlay 13 but Ross could gain only one yard in four plays.

**Fremont Scores**  
Fremont finally scored in the fourth period as Stone connected on a long pass to Nitschke, good for 53 yards to the Findlay six. Alberts swept right end for five yards and Maury Goepper, playing despite a shoulder injury, rammed over for the tally. Pass for points failed.

Findlay came right back to score again on a 28-yard pass from Traul to Federici. Federici then passed to Rex Ritter for two added points.

# Ross Loses But Rally Boosts Future Status

Lorain — gave up — lack of desire — lifeless — these words have been heard from the Ross high vocabulary as far as football games are concerned.

Down 18 points at halftime on the short end of a 28-0 count, the rejuvenated Little Giants of Coach Mal Mackey completely outplayed Sandusky high in the second half Friday in Harmon Stadium. It was too much of a hurdle to overcome, however, Sandusky winning the Buckeye Conference engagement over arch-rival Fremont 22 to 24.

Ross almost had a tie, actually going over for a touchdown in the final seconds of play when would have allowed a two-point play for a possible 12-12 draw. But an illegal lineup (only six players on the forward wall and one lineman a yard back) negated a Denny Stine pass to John Nighswander in the end zone. Pass interception of the next Stine pass by Ed Elmer of Sandusky killed Ross' high chances for a come-from-behind deadlock.

**Large Crowd Present**  
Crowd of well over 3,000 including a flock of Sanduskians on the opposite side of the permanent bleachers looked on as Sandusky continually beat Fremont to the punch in the first half tore holes in the Giant defense, rattled the Ross offensive and departed the

field at intermission with a seemingly insurmountable 18-point lead. Sandusky netted 242 yards rushing from scrimmage the first half to only 28 for Ross.

Halftime talk by the Ross high coaching staff plus a burning desire on the part of the Ross players must have been the ticket to a complete reversal of form by the Giants in the second half. Ross had a 114 to 33 net yards rushing edge in the final two quarters.

Crowd was buzzing about another Sandusky rout like last year's 46-0 "humiliation" of the Giants at Sandusky. But anything can happen in a Sandusky-Fremont football game and just about everything did happen in the 1958 affair.

Fremont fans, many unable to accept the defeats of the past season and a half, have been grumbling openly of late about the coaching staff, about the players, about the so-called disgraceful and distasteful defeats.

The grumbling changed to cheers, howls of delight, "gag" yells in the final two periods last night as the "kids" on the field did their "darnest" to win and almost accomplished the miraculous.

**Nothing But Pride**

As the Ross boys came off the field, an eight-point loser, there was nothing but pride voiced by the Ross high partisans. Ross players were openly crying and

unashamedly too. So were many Fremont fans.

It was a far cry from the Sandusky dressing room. The Blue Streak players had their heads down as if in defeat. They couldn't have. They won and they deserved the victory. SHS was completely the master in the first half and had enough in reserve, even though with "backs to the wall," to push over the "clinchers" in the final quarter.

Getting into the scoring plays, the Streaks pushed across three quick touchdowns early to assume a 20-0 edge. Sandusky forwards were opening huge holes in the Ross defensive line and the SHS backs came charging through.

Fullback Dave Scott, a powerful runner all night, pumped 50 yards for a first period score (run for points failed). Jon Jackson, who pulled a hamstring muscle in his left leg late in the second quarter and sat out the remainder of the game, went three yards for a second period TD (pass failed).

One of the major factors in Sandusky's victory came midway in the second stanza when Maury Gnepper of Ross tried a fourth down punt. Linebacker Dick Acierio "shot the gap" to block the punt. End Tim Ziemke picking up the loose ball inside the 10.

Linebacker Ben Wilson's Streaks back to the Ross 37. A running play gained only two yards bringing up a "crucial" fourth down and seven yards to go situation. Bal-

conci fired a low pass over the middle to Ziemke who made a brilliant leaping catch around his ankles for a Sandusky first down on the Ross 23. Ross defense again stiffened, fourth down

Both's rams, an offside penalty against Sandusky and Gnepper's drive carried Ross to the SHS 18. Stine, on a "boot-leg" play left, circled the Sandusky right end for a touchdown. Stine's run for points cut Sandusky's edge to 26-21 with 3:34 remaining in the third stanza.

Ross defense contained Sandusky but, on the Giant's drive, Ohms fumbled a handoff from Stine. Ron Krueger recovering for the Streaks on the Ross 37.

A holding penalty sent SHS back to its 47. But a second down over the middle pass from Balconi to Ziemke (first pass of the game for Sandusky) brought the Streaks back to the Ross 37.

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and one confronting Sandusky again on the Ross 14.

Instead of trying to crack the now rugged Ross middle, Balconi sent fleet Epsy around left end and Epsy never had a hand last on him. Pass for points failed, Sandusky leading 26-24 with 7:44 to play in the game.

Ross was stymied on its next series, Gnepper forced to punt. Balconi, in the secondary, had his back to the play, the ball hitting him on the back. Gordon Hart recovering for Fremont on the Sandusky 38.

Both, Ohms and Gnepper drove to the SHS 13. Both lost a yard but Ohms carried for seven and Stine for four to the Sandusky three. Both lost three yards, Ross calling a time out with 33 seconds remaining.

Stine was rushed on a pass try off the spread, threw away off with a surprised (and ineligible) Glover catching the pass. Play cost Ross five yards back to the SHS 11. Stine, off the spread, found Nighswander in the end zone. But Glover wasn't lined up properly with the other six forwards. TD negated.

Next Stine's pass was intercepted on the Sandusky 2 by Elmer who returned to the Sandusky 22. Balconi fell to the ground on the next play, finale of the contest.

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Ross, with Elyria the next foe here Friday, enters the second half of the season with a 1-4 record, 0-2 in the conference. Sandusky is 4-1, 1-1 in the league.

Coach Mackey looked like anything except a loser in the Ross dressing room. He commented "that if the boys played every game as well as they played the second half he would never cry about defeat." He also reminded that early in the season he had

opined that "this club is going to get real tough at mid-season. And mid-season is here now and it looks as if Ross has finally arrived."

Mackey also observed that injuries have hurt the Giants this far. Ruben Rendon, defensive back, was hurt on the first play of the game Friday and was sent to the hospital. Nighswander, regular left halfback, saw limited action due to a foot injury.

"Don't forget most of the boys who played last night are juniors and will be back next year," the mentor added. (Ross had 24 players in the lineup last night, only five of them seniors). "And, we have a fine bunch of sophomores coming up."

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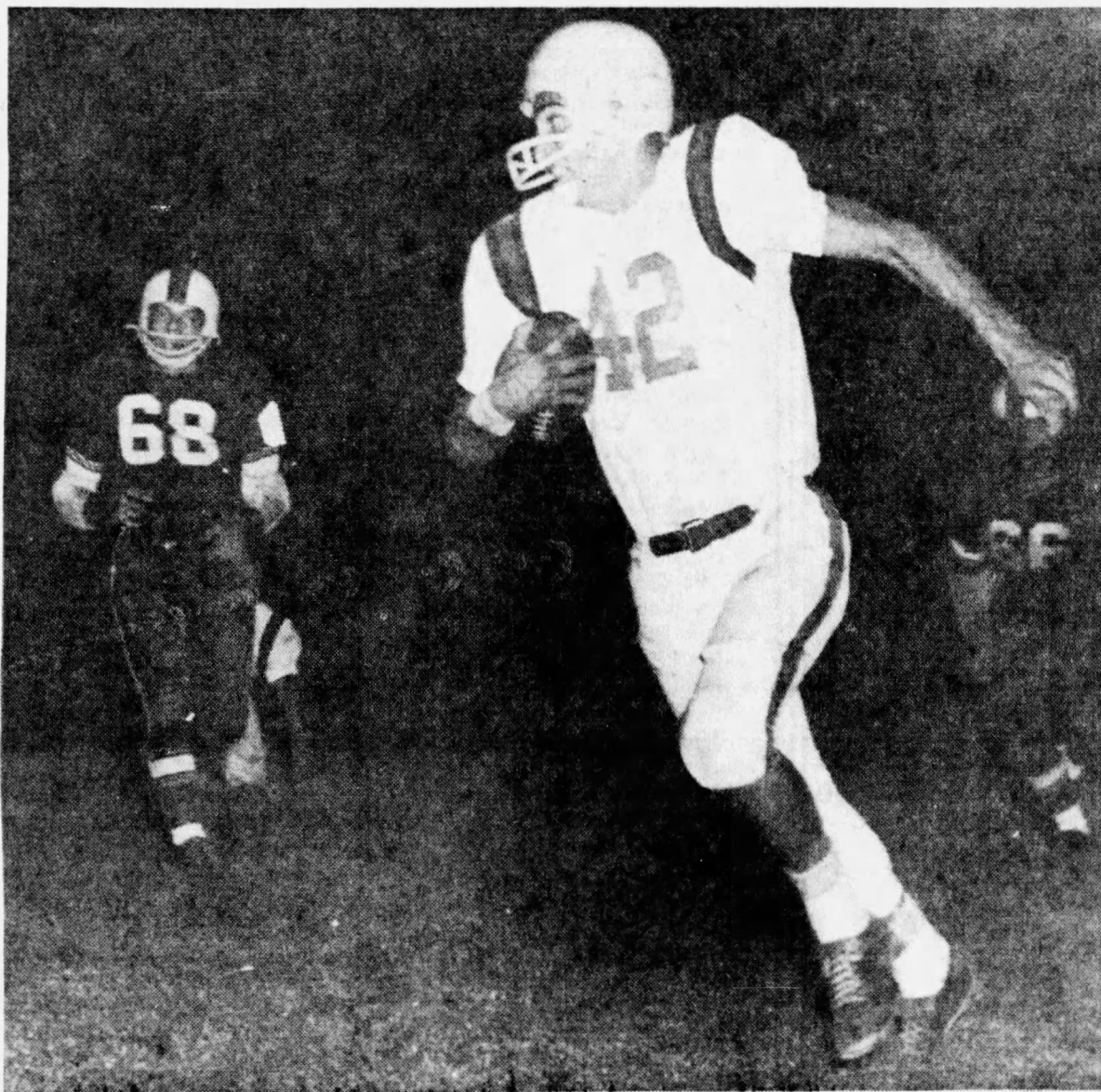

## Elyria Primarily Senior Eleven

Ross high runs into a rugged senior-laden Elyria high football team Friday, 8 p.m. in Harmon Stadium.

Goals for the little Giants—a first Buckeye Conference victory since the 1937 season; revenge for a 24-20 loss to the Pioneers last year after Ross held a 20-8 margin at the end of three periods; and a second season win in 1939.

### Elyria In Race

Elyria will be striving to keep its hopes alive in the Buckeye Conference race. The Pioneers are bracketed with Sandusky, defending champion Marion Harding and Findlay for second place, all with 1-1 records. Lorain is the pace-setter with 2-0 and Ross the cellar team with 0-2.

Coach Bill Barton's Elyrians were undefeated until last week when Marion whipped the Pioneers 32-16, fourth stanza Elyria fumble being a big turning point. Prior to the Marion loss, Elyria won over Cleveland West Tech 20-0, Sandusky in a B.C. game 26-14, Lakewood 14-12 and Cuyahoga Falls 20-6. The Pioneers have

tallied 98 points while allowing 64.

Ross lost to Wadsworth 14-12 and to Toledo Waite 24-20. Win over Fostoria by 22-12 followed. Then came defeats to Findlay, 29-6 and to Sandusky last week 32-24.

By comparative scores, Elyria is a 14-point winner over Sandusky and Ross and eight-point loser to Sandusky. Elyria should be 22 points better than Ross.

Ross is averaging about 17 points per game with 84 in five contests but is averaging a yield

of about 22 points per game with 111 by foes.

Elyria has the third highest scorer in league competition in fullback Mel Taylor. He and Jim Frederici of Findlay have tallied 18 points to trail leader Tom Prichard of Marion who has 26 points and Ben Espy of Sandusky with 22.

The Pioneers start 10 seniors and only one junior in their offensive lineup. Three juniors are in the defensive array, seven seniors and one sophomore.

Elyria runs from a tight-T. The Pioneers like to sweep the ends, using three and sometimes four-man interference. Offensive line is speedy and defensive unit tough.





# Ross In Role Of Spoiler; Must Stop Lorain's Martin

Role of "spoiler" has been assigned the Ross high Little Giants in their final two Buckeye Conference games against the Lorain Steelers Friday and Marion Harding the following Friday, both games away from home.

Fremont could put a dent in Lorain's hopes of clinching at least a title tie this week. The Steelers are 3-0 and need wins over Ross and Elyria for an undisputed championship which would be their first in the B. C.

Marion and Elyria are right on Lorain's heels with 2-1 marks.

Also at stake for Lorain is its lofty No. 3 state rating.

Ross, maturing rapidly with a predominantly junior outfit, almost upset Sandusky and then Elyria the past two weeks.

**Giants Underdog.**

The Little Giants will be about a three-touchdown underdog against Lorain when the teams collide at 8 p.m. Friday at George Daniel Field. Ross will enter the

game with a 0-3 conference showing and a 1-5 overall record. Lorain has won five, lost only once this season a two-point setback to Warren Harding.

**Attitude plus a tighter defense and a few breaks will play a big part in Ross high's attempt to upset the mighty Steelers. It will take an all-out effort by the Little Giants squad to sidetrack Lorain, a willingness to "put out" a little bit more and for four quarters, not two or three as in some past games.**

Coach Mal Mackey's crew is in pretty fair shape physically. Tackle Ken Fry, 225-pound junior, is still hampered by a knee injury suffered in the Elyria game. He may be limited in action against the Steelers. Lloyd Both, 190-pound senior fullback, missed Wednesday's practice due to a sore throat but is expected to be available by game time. John Nighswander, junior halfback troubled with an ankle ailment, seems to be running better in practice.

Ross will probably throw more of its multiple offense at Lorain including the spread, wing "T," regular "T" and single wing. Quarterback Dennis Stine looked much improved as a passer against Elyria and he will be a key performer against the Steelers. Jim Ohms, halfback was contained for the first time this year by Elyria but can be dangerous. Maury Gnepper is another capable offensive threat. Line will include Gene Nitschke and Dan Moran at ends; McKinley Glover and either Fry or Dave Baylis at tackles; Dick Dick Dundore and George Deichert at guards; Gordon Hart at center. Defensively, Gary Beatty, Lee Waggoner, Phil Dellasantine, Tom Geer and Jay Mackey will be inserted.

Ross will field a bigger team than the Steelers, at least on offense.

## Deceptive Back

Main threat for Lorain is Ray Martin, 185-pound speedy and deceptive senior halfback. He has had to carry more of a load due to the midseason injury that sidelined All-Ohio candidate Harold Jones.

Martin has tallied nine touchdowns and two extra points for a total of 56. He scored all three touchdowns in Lorain's 22-14 win over Sandusky last week.

Quarterback Bill Tippie, 158, junior is gaining experience as the season progresses. Frank Filisko, 180-pound senior fullback, is a power runner. Lorain came up with a capable substitute for Jones in Mike Urbanik, 185-pound sophomore halfback.

Lorain's offensive line is not big but is speedy and blocks well. Ends are Mike Mishak, 180, senior, a fine pass receiver and Jerry Zavada, 162, senior. Tackles are Jack West, 183, senior and Tom Bloom, 163, senior; guards Jim Turton, 160, senior and Bill Fashing, 162, senior; center Ken Gerhardt, 183, senior.

Defensively, Lorain inserts rugged Willie Rodgers, 204, senior at tackle. Also entering the lineup are Lance Erdy, 168, senior; Dale Warfield, 164, junior; and Calvin Bobrowski, 182, senior who also plays fullback on offense. Rodgers, Turton, Zavada and Warfield have been tough defensively for Lorain all year.

Lorain topped Ross in a close game at Fremont last year 22-12. In 25 meetings between the teams, Lorain has won 17, Ross seven and there has been one tie.

# Steelers Rout Giants, 53-12; Gain At Least B.C. Title Tie

LORAIN—There's no doubt about it. Lorain has a great football team! And Ross high's Little Giants made the Steelers look even better at George Daniel Stadium Friday where the host club massacred Fremont 53 to 12.

The Little Giants were cut down to mere midgets here last night by the state's No. 3 team (Associated Press vote).

For the Steelers, the re-credited win gave them a cinch of at least a title tie in the Buckeye Conference. A victory over Elyria two weeks hence will earn Lorain an undisputed championship, one well deserving of a championship-caliber club.

It is the first B. C. title for Lorain in football since the conference was organized in 1934. Sandusky won that year. Fremont, in better days, won in 1935, 1936 and 1937. Marion Harding won the B. C. grid title last year and still has a chance to tie for the crown in 1938.

Triumph was Lorain's 19th in its series with Fremont which has won seven times over the Steelers. There has been one tie game. An Lave, in his 11th season as head coach of Lorain and Mack Mackey, in his 10th campaign at Ross have been rivals 10 times on the gridiron. With last night's victory, Lave now owns three wins over Mackey while the Ross headmaster has beaten Lave coached teams six times and the teams played in a 64 deadlock in 1930, first season for Mackey at Fremont.

Mackey said after the game that Lorain is the best team Fremont has faced this season. This reporter agrees. Mackey also was high in praise of Ray Martin, 165-pound senior halfback of the Steelers. "He's a great back," Mackey commented, "and that fullback (Frank Finko) who also operated out of the halfback slot last night) can run well too."

Looking at the Fremont side of the ledger:

**Blocking Nil**  
There were 22 boys employed by Mackey in Friday's mess match. All but a handful should have been up in the stands with the spectators watching the game because that's what many did on the field—blocking, or rather the lack of blocking, was especially noticeable in the first half. Most of the Ross players made only token efforts to "take out their man" on any play. At times the backs were running at only about half speed. Tackling was terrible. Lorain backs bowling over many would-be Fremont tacklers.

Fundamentally, Ross high's showing last night was "lousy." "I lay the blame on the kids for our poor showing against Lorain," Mackey said. "They just don't seem to want to carry out our orders (the coaching staff's) or else they forget to carry them out," he added.

To comment further on Ross high's sad play would tend to cheapen Lorain's ability. That isn't intended. The Steelers deserve accolades. They are a sharply disciplined five ball squad—disciplined in the art of throwing a block, making a tackle, carrying the ball and taking care of any assignment.

Blocking of the entire Steeler team on every play was executed savagely and beautifully. Lorain backs ran fast and hard. Lorain defensive line and secondary was a "stingy crew" in yielding yardage. And, the Steelers were a smaller in weight club as compared to Ross. They did have the advantage of experience but more so of "heart."

The 33 points tallied by Lorain was the most ever scored against a Ross high team since Elyria topped Fremont 60 to 6 way back in 1922. The 46-0 Sandusky win over Fremont last year and in 1930 were the most lopsided losses since the 22 defeat by Elyria. Martin tripped Fremont 40 to 6 last season and Massillon whipped Ross 40 to 7 in 1933.

Going over the game quickly, Ross took the opening kickoff and promptly was snuffed by the officials for a clipping violation. Recovering to make one first down, attack began down as Lorain took charge completely then and for the rest of the game. Bud Brown, defensive end, rushed in to block Maury Gnepper's punt. Lorain taking over on the Ross 11. The speedy and hard driving Martin ripped for 18 yards and Quarterback Bill Tippe for the final yard and Lorain's first TD. Cal Bobrowski split the upper lip with a kick which he duplicated many more times in the game and Lorain had a 7-0 edge.

**Another Penalty**  
Fremont was called again on a clipping penalty on the ensuing kickoff. Four plays later Gnepper was back in the Ross end zone. He just barely got his punt away. Martin returning from the Ross 40 in the Ross four. Martin rammed for four yards, then for one to tally his first of four touchdowns. Bobrowski kicked the extra point.

Ross did little in its next series outside of line (them) showed run. Gnepper had to kick again, booting a 35-yarder out of bounds on the Lorain 14. The Steelers carried an 85-yard touchdown drive into the second period before saluting in a "sacred" Ross defense. Tippe passing to Earl Mike Moxak, all alone in Ross high's right secondary. Play covered 17 yards. Bobrowski's kick made the score read Lorain 21, Ross 6.

Martin tallied two more touchdowns in the second period on a run of three yards after Lorain recovered a Ross fumble on the

Ross five. Martin scored again on a beautiful pass play into the Ross middle secondary. Tippe firing to Martin on the Ross 45 and the fleet Lorain halfback galloping past Olms in the deep secondary the remainder of the distance.

## Ross Scores

Ross scored early in the third quarter and late in the final period. In the third quarter following the Ross kickoff, Lorain fumbled. Ross recovering on the middle 15 yards to the Lorain seven. John Nighswander were five yards and Dennis Sine, on a quarterback sneak, the final run. Late in the game Fremont recovered a fumble by the Lorain second stringers who played much of the second half. Off the spread, Sine tossed a pass to Gene Nischke who caught the ball on the Lorain 40 and romped the rest of the way.

In between the Ross TD's, Martin chalked up a short run snuffer for Lorain and substitute Dave Lima went over from the 19 and later the two.

## ADDED NOTES

Lorain gained 225 yards rushing, 110 passing for a total net yardage of 335 to Ross high's 80 rushing, 76 passing for a net of 145. Lorain had 21 first downs to only five for Fremont.

Martin carried 10 times for 77 yards for Lorain. John Nighswander ran well for Fremont in the second half to gain 66 yards in eight trips. Lima of Lorain netted 51 yards in eight carries and Filasio 41 in seven attempts.

Officiating was spotty. Serious fouls infractions not called many times on either team.

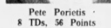

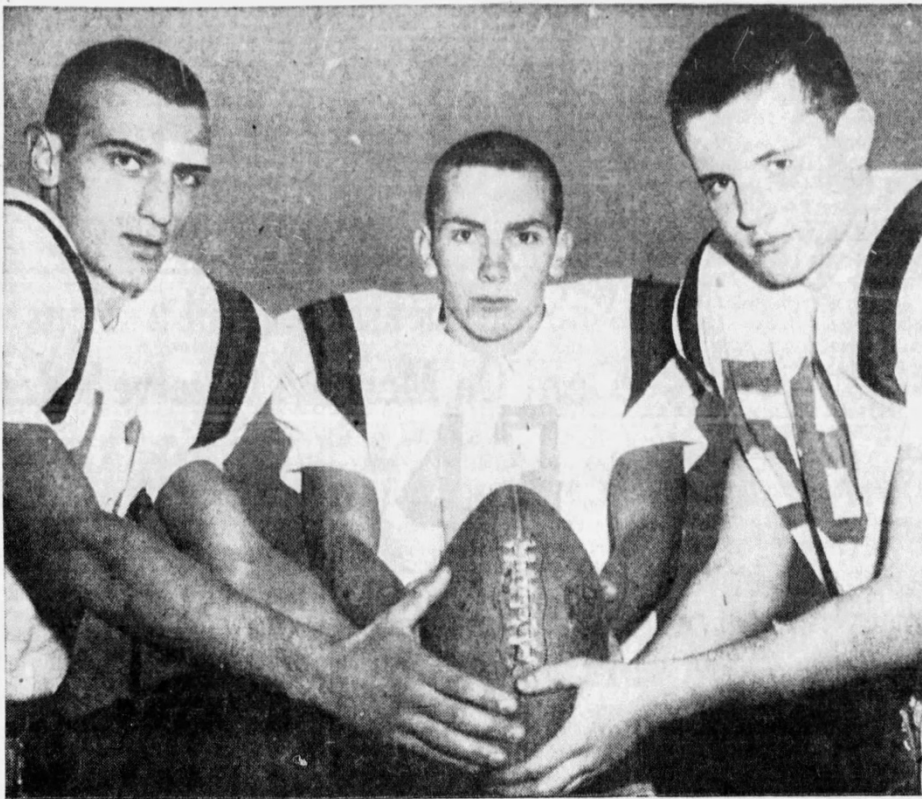

Smith has had four undisputed champs and two co-champions of the Sandusky Bay Conference. The 1932, 1933, 1935 and 1936 teams



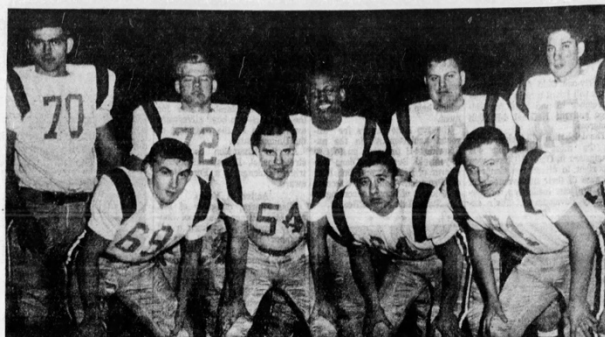

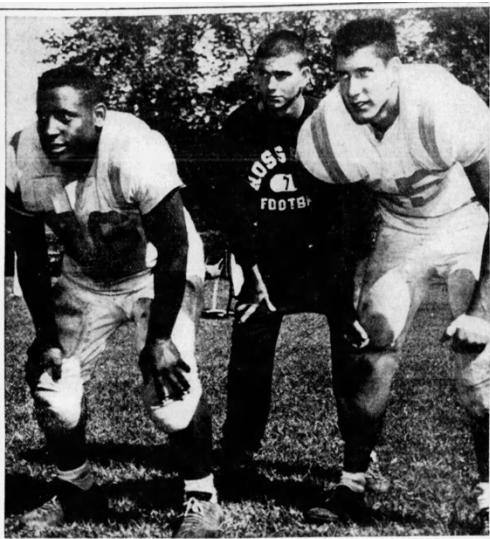
