## New Ross Coach Knows Job Tough

"Fine!" That was the reaction of Malcolm Mackey, Ross high school's new football coach, when he was informed last night that he had been hired by the board of education to succeed Lester L. Binkley.

"You're stepping into a pretty tough job," he was informed. His reply was: "I know it, and I'll give it everything I have."

Mackey said he would be in Fremont next week. Among other things, he is interested in a house for himself and family, which consists of the wife, Ellen, sons, Malcolm Jay, 5, Robert Louis, 3, and Lew Gregory, 1, and their daughter, Barbara Ann, 9. Mackey asserted that he is a believer in lots of hard work in preparing for a football schedule.

"I will want to see the pictures of last season's games," he said, "and I am particularly anxious to meet the coaching staff, the school administration and the boys." He already has talked in person with Supt. U. E. Diener and several of the board members.

His last words before his good bye were: "If you hear of a house, I will appreciate knowing about it."

## Coach Of Indiana Champions Employed At Wage Of \$4,050

Malcolm Mackey, 32, winner of two state grid championships in Indiana, is Ross high school's new head football coach. The former Rensselaer and West Lafayette mentor was appointed last night at a special meeting of the board of education. He replaces Lester L. Binkley, who resigned on July 5 to become athletic director and head football coach at Toledo Waite.

He will teach geography and in addition to football, will be in charge of track and assist in basketball. His salary was affixed at \$4,050.

The selection came exactly 26 days after Binkley's departure was made public. Mackey was one of 27 candidates. He is the first new head coach, with the exception of an emergency during the war, since 1941, when Binkley replaced Fred McClintock. In 1944 and 1945, while Binkley was in the navy, the reins were handled by Sylvester Kohr.

A telephone call to Mackey's home in Rensselaer settled the issue.

Supt. of Schools U. E. Diener made the call to ask Mackey if he would accept a salary of \$4,050. His reply was "I believe I would." The superintendent had explained that the board was in session upstairs and that his answer would be a big factor in coming to the decision.

The board started with a two-hour executive session, barred to all except the board, the superintendent and Clerk-Treasurer Warren Curtis. In that meeting, the problems of hiring a new coach were given a thorough airing.

**Wayne Recommended**

The field was reduced to Mackey and Mark Wayne, of New Brighton, Pa., and when the regular session, witnessed by press and radio, was called to order, the superintendent recommended that Wayne be hired.

Board Member D. W. Findley moved that the superintendent's recommendation be accepted. There were about 10 seconds of silence, then W. E. Kirsch raised a question as to Wayne's record at New Brighton. The superintendent said that a newspaper article (News-Messenger on Friday) was slightly in error. The newspaper article stated that in Wayne's two-year career, he won a total of seven, lost 10 and tied two. Diener said Wayne had one losing season and a winning season, according to his information.

Questions were then asked concerning other candidates. In reply why Steve Brudzinski, a Ross graduate and a highly successful mentor at Circleville, was not in the picture, it was explained that the applicant was not certified to teach social science subjects. The teaching vacancy at Ross vacated by Binkley was in the social science department. Binkley taught geography classes. According to the board, Brudzinski is not accredited in that line, being eligible only in industrial arts.

Next question that was asked was why Mackey was eliminated. It was explained by Diener that in a telephone conversation Saturday, Mackey asked for \$4,300, of if a lesser figure was offered, he wanted his moving expenses paid.

It was then suggested that Mackey be made a definite offer. In its executive meeting, the board had arrived at a figure of \$4,000 for Wayne and \$4,050 for Mackey.

The superintendent went down stairs to his office and called the new coach. When Mackey indicated he would accept the salary offer, the board voted to hire him as head coach for Ross high.

Mackey had reached his maximum salary at Rensselaer, \$4,300. He may complete enough post-graduate work this summer to be eligible for half a master's degree, which will qualify him for \$290 more annual pay.

**Background Long One**

Ross high's new coach has an extensive football background. He is a native of New Albany, Indiana. He attended high school in Lafayette, site of Purdue University, and earned three letters as a member of the Purdue varsity squad.

He graduated from high school in 1937, and finished Purdue in 1942. He coached at West Lafayette three seasons, winning 27 games and losing four.

Then followed two seasons at Franklin Park, Illinois, where his clubs won 12 and lost six.

He brought Franklin Park from

eight in an eight-team league to fourth the first season and third the next.

Mackey went to Western Reserve University in 1947, as an assistant, but after a few games had been played was named co-coach of the Redcats. They won five of their next six games, the only loss being to Cincinnati university, 7-6.

In 1948, Mackey went to Rensselaer, where he promptly turned out an undefeated club. Last season, the record was 5-4. At both West Lafayette and Rensselaer, his teams were overmatched as far as the size of the schools were concerned.

Considered one of the best coaches in Indiana, his application carried many glittering recommendations. He was also praised for his work in track at West Lafayette, where, according to the superintendent of that school, he developed the program to the point of making West Lafayette one of the top track teams in that section of the state.

Mackey is taking over what many consider a "hot spot." Ross has won 26 of its last 30 games, losing three and tying one. Binkley had a powerful eleven in 1949. It was rated the fifth best high school football team in Ohio. Ranked ahead of the Giants were Massillon, Mansfield, Canton McKinley and Cincinnati Purcell.

Ross has never had an undefeated and untied season, in fact never has gone a season without a defeat.

The new Ross mentor was born May 28, 1918, in New Albany. He is married and the father of three sons and a daughter. Their ages are 9, 5, 3 and 1. He is a member of the Lion's club, and was secretary of the Indiana Coaches' Association.

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## *Ross Hi Gridders May Run From 'T' Part Of Time, New Mentor States*

Ross high school's football team may operate from the T formation part of the time in the 1950 season.

Malcolm Mackey, new mentor of the Giants, said today he plans to do some experimenting along the T line when he takes over on September 1.

The new coach said he realizes that it would be difficult to make a complete switch in time for the opening game, September 15. In all probab-

ity, he will introduce it in small doses.

Mackey plans to be in Fremont Sunday and Monday, arriving here about noon on Sunday. He wants to consult with the coaching staff and get as much background as possible on the squad personnel.

Mackey was hired Monday night by the board of education to succeed Lester L. Binkley as head football and track coach and assistant basketball mentor. He coached for the last two seasons at Rensselaer, Ind.

**AFTER VIEWING FILMS OF 1949 GAMES, ROSS** high's new football coach, Mal Mackey, arrived at the conclusion that the Giants had quite an aggregation, and he made no bones about it.

"You can see that the boys could really rock 'em and sock 'em," said the friendly Purdue University graduate. He added that he thought most of the opponents were also pretty rugged.

**HE HAS VIEWED** the pictures every night for a week, armed with programs of each game last year for identification purposes. He is pleased that he will have such back-field stalwarts as Charlie Glover, Bob Markley and John Lewis returning, and he said that it is too bad we don't have that 1949 line back intact.

Mackey had praise for the blocking and tackling of last year's team. "I heard Binkley is noted for his teaching of fundamentals, and from the movies I would say that his pupils performed well," he chuckled.

The new mentor hopes to get settled in his home on Franklin street a week before the first of September. If that is not possible, he will take a room here about the 27th of August because there are many things he must do preparatory to opening practice on Sept. 1.

Concerning the T formation, Mackey said he still plans to install it right off the bat, but he added that he will probably retain some of last year's single wing plays.

**IN THE MEANTIME**, followers of the Giants are marking time and anxiously awaiting the new season. Interest is high this year, and the fans are eager to get a glimpse of the Giants in their "new look." There has been a lot of speculation this past week as to whom the quarterback will be in the T setup. Everybody from the manager on up has been mentioned. Just two months ago, the St. Louis Cardinals gave up on big Jim. They sold him to the New York Giants for the lowly waiver price of \$10,000 after he failed to win a game. Today, it is doubtful if they could buy him back for ten times that amount.

Since joining the Giants July 14, Hearn has made six starts and New York has won five of them, including a 2-0 decision over the Philadelphia Phils yesterday.

The victory gave the Giants an even break in their four-game series with the pacemakers.

Despite the loss, the Phils remained five games in front of the second place Boston Braves, who took an 8-2 cuffing from the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Local gridiron activity will be stepped up Friday when the Ross high squad launches fall drills. Because of spring practice, under state rules the Giants are not permitted to practice before September 1.

# Ross High Ragged In Defiance 'Tilt'

## Anderson Hurt; Demmel Appears In OSU Camp

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 7.—**P**—The Ohio State University Buckeyes suffered their first casualty of the season yesterday when junior end Dick Anderson of Portsmouth went out with a separated right shoulder.

The six-foot end, a jayvee mainstay last year, took a tumble after going in extra hard for a pass in the Bucks' first scrimmage exercise.

Dr. Richard Patton, assistant team physician, said he did not know how long the injury would keep Anderson away from drills before the opening game with Southern Methodist Sept. 30.

The 61-member squad put in two snappy drills that caused Coach Wesley Fesler to comment that his charges are "coming along very well."

**Bob Demmel, Fremont, O., back who missed Tuesday's session with the photographers because of illness, showed up for the practice session.**

The day's activities began with individual instruction followed by calisthenics. Vic Janowicz, Jack Wagner, Bill Petersen and a few other Bucks did some punting during the early stages. But Fesler still was puzzled as to who will take over Curly Morrison's kicking duties.

Fesler also had the Bucks working with the spread punt formation. He is preparing an offensive kicking formation for the new rule that outlaws the fair catch.

### Pass Defense Stressed

In a rigorous passing panorama in the afternoon session, Fesler first had staff members pitching out the pigskin as part of a program to make all team members "pass conscious" on defense. Then he let the Bucks

The Giants made the 73-mile bus trip yesterday afternoon after the session was arranged Wednesday morning.

"Our blocking was terrible," he continued. "They stopped us at the line too many times before we could even get going. If it doesn't get better immediately, we'll have to do some experimenting."

The mentor said that downfield blocking was especially weak. Informed that Defiance would be no match for at least eight teams on the Ross schedule, he shook his head and commented sadly:

**"It looks bad, it looks bad."**

Then he started reading movies of last year's game with Norwalk and was still at it at 11 p. m.

On defense, Ross easily held its own, according to reports. However, Defiance was able to stop most of the Giants' running plays. The skirmish took place on a practice field, with each team taking turns running the ball at 20-minute intervals. Rick Lee tallied a couple of "touchdowns" for the Giants, and Charlie Glover scored another. Bob Boucher caught a pass that was in touchdown territory. Defiance "scored" late in the action.

Today at 1 p. m., Mackey was scheduled to meet with additional candidates. He hoped to be greeted by a large squad of freshmen and sophomores.



# Coach Admits Trojans Above Average; Peterson, Smith Set To Take Over Hill's Position

FINDLAY HIGH, WHICH IN 1949 DASHED ROSS' hopes for its first undefeated football season, appears ready to take over the undisputed championship of the Buckeye League this season.

Coach Howard Yawberg's puzzling attack that romped over eight of nine foes last fall has enough veteran material to make life miserable for the other four teams in the loop, Ross, Marion, Fostoria and Bowling Green. Tiffin Columbian is not participating in football for a three-year period because of its poor record.

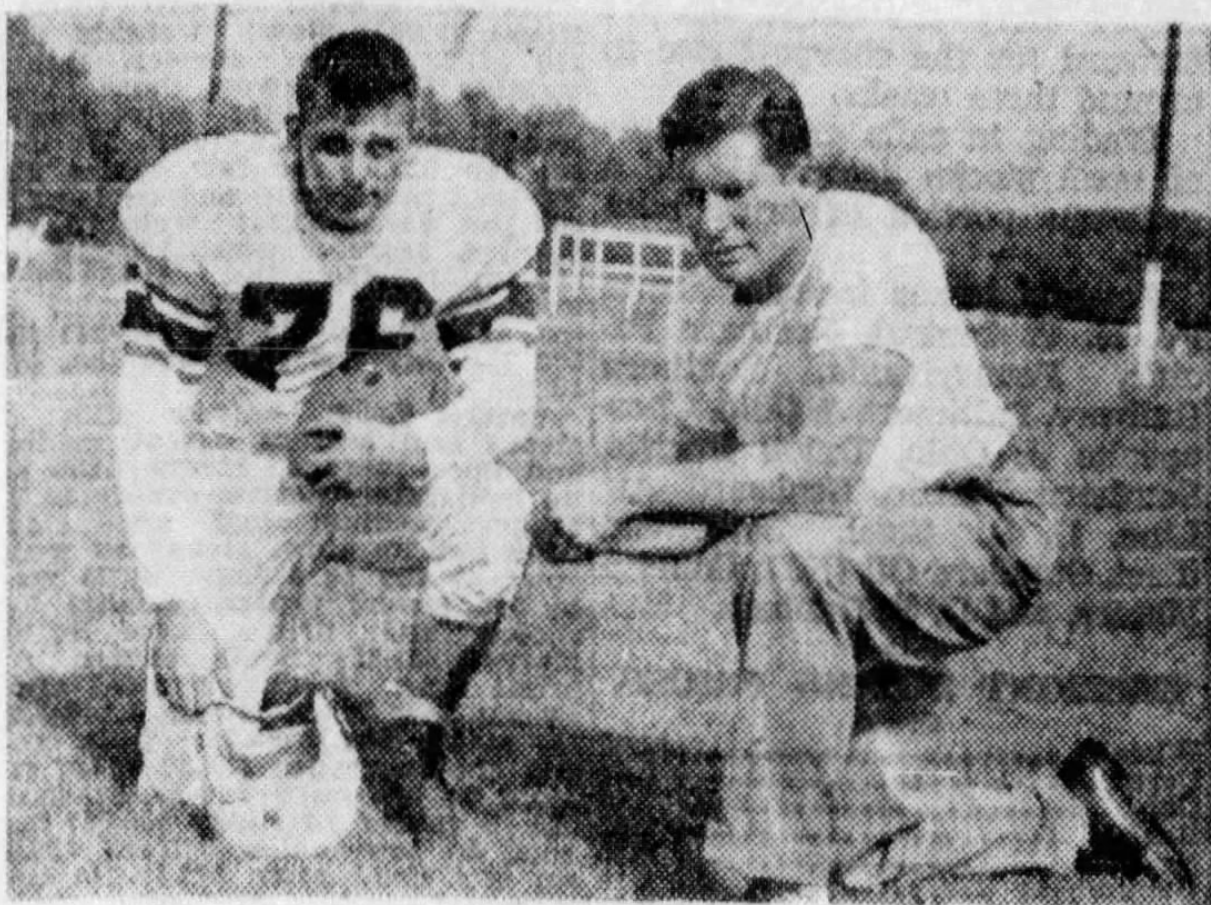

The game was three minutes old when end John Allen snatched a three-yard jump pass from quarterback Marlin Farver for a touchdown. The score was set up after Norwalk fumbled on its 25 yard line, with Chuck Hoerrig making the miscue on Norwalk's first play from scrimmage.

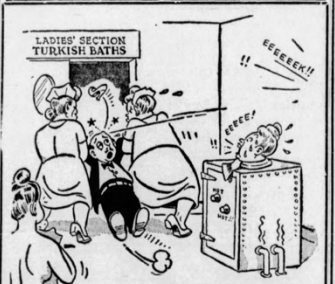

Coch Dick Small of the Redmen, who this season succeeded the veteran Tom Bender, said last night that his team "expects to make it quite a battle." He forecast a knock-down, drag-out battle, similar to the jarring 6-5 tie Ross played with Lorain one week ago.

Like Ross, the Redmen are making their debut with the T formation this season, and so far the offense has not been consistent. Defensively, Fostoria is big and tough.

## First Buckeye Game

Small's huskies opened the season by tying Shelby 7-7, with the Whippets scoring in the last two minutes on a pass. Then last Friday Marion took advantage of a Fostoria miscue in the third period and grabbed a 7-6 edge. Ross tripped a weak Norwalk team 51-7 in the opener before getting the Lorain standoff. Tonight will be Ross high's first Buckeye League contest.

Small was undecided on one starting position today, right halfback, Hubert Landers, 162 pound freshman, may get the nod over Jim Opperman, 170 a senior.

Aside from the starting lineup listed elsewhere on this page, Fostoria presents several weighty lads who see defensive action, exclusive of kickoffs. John Mackiro generally plays one of the tackle spots. He is an 180-pound junior. Seniors Terry Mills, 192 and Jim Crow, 178 take over the guards, adding poundage in that department. Gene Law, senior, 185, relieves Pug Zumpft, 195 senior center and place kicker.

Small, who went to Fostoria from Montpelier after graduating from Miami University, has built his running attack around Jim Johnson, fleet Negro sophomore halfback who earned a letter as a freshman. The 150-pounder is fast and elusive, always a threat to go all the way. He has scored both Fostoria touchdowns this season. In the air, junior quarterback Carl Peggs is the dangerous one. # Farver Hurt, May Miss Tilt With Findlay; Surratt Goes 80 Yard On Pass Interception

A GROUP OF HARD-RUNNING ROSS BACKS, moving behind improved blocking, turned a close football game into a second-half rout at Harmon Field last night as the Giants racked up their second victory of the season, 42-0, over Fostoria.

For the second straight week, 6,000 fans saw a hard-hitting football game, with several Ross players shaken up severely.

After an unimpressive first half which ended with Ross ahead 13-0, the Giants cashed in heavily despite the loss of regular quarterback Marlin Farver, who was injured midway in the second quarter.

RONNIE WHITCOMB, a 170-pound freshman, took charge of the team, directing it in admirable fashion. The way he handled the club was encouraging to Coach Mal Mackey, as Farver will miss next week's clash with Findlay. The Ross field general received a severe blow on the chest when he was tackled out of bounds.

## X-Rays Show No Fracture

X-rays taken at Memorial hospital showed no fractured ribs, but the severe bruise is almost certain to curtail his play for the next 10 days. Farver will be especially missed on defense. He plays guard when the opposition is on offense.

John Lewis, Charlie Glover, Bob Markley, freshman Earl Asperger and Jerome Surratt all crossed into pay dirt, with Surratt bringing the crowd to its feet with an 80-yard touchdown gallop after he intercepted a pass thrown by Carl Peggs late in the third quarter.

Surratt showed speed and a knack for threading his way in a broken field as he registered the score. It was the longest run of the game, although Jim Johnson, who appeared to be the most talented back on the field, had a run of 62 yards called back early in the second half.

Lewis, who gained 134 yards net, set up the first tally after nine minutes had elapsed. Glover skirted right end from the one yard line to end a march of 72 yards. Lewis made one gain of 13 yards after being trapped when he fumbled. That put the ball on the one. A 20-yard pass play, Farver to John Allen, was a big factor in the march.

MARKLEY hopped on a fumble by the Redmen on the first series following Glover's touchdown, the Giants taking over on the enemy's 36-yard line. Lewis was stopped for no gain, but a pass, Farver to end Dick Willey, picked up four. Farver then circled right end for five, being run out of bounds. He received his injury on the play.

## Lewis Dashes 25

Markley kept the drive alive with a first-down plunge of two yards over the middle and on the next play, Lewis took a pitch-out from Whitcomb and high-stepped his way 25 yards for six points around left end. He literally ran away from would-be tacklers. Whitcomb, who ran the first extra point, tried a pass for the second, but it was incomplete.

Johnson, a dazzling runner, injected a 34-yard dash into the game to give Fostoria hope soon after Ross high's second touchdown. The sprint put the ball on the Giant's eleven. Allen then stopped quarterback Carl Peggs for a

three-yard loss and Peggs passed to Clair Dible to the six. Another pass failed and on fourth down, Johnson was held to a two-yard gain.

ROSS MOVED into Fostoria territory before the half, but a couple of five yard penalties for the backfield being illegally in

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# Fumbles Set Up Both Scores; Peterson Stars On Offense; Record Crowd Sees Contest

A wide-awake defense plus a one-man offense in the person of Louis Peterson provided Findlay with a convincing 14-0 victory last night over an ambitious Ross eleven that failed to get revenge for its lone 1949 upset.

Approximately 7,000 fans jammed Findlay's Donnell Memorial Stadium, the largest throng ever to watch a game in the 23-year history of the field.

Howard Yawberg's Trojans turned Ross fumbles into touchdowns and a fast-charging line that refused to be outsmarted thwarted the Giants at almost every turn.

Peterson, a 190-pound junior halfback, was a ball of fire. He showed speed, power and shifty running in handing Ross its first defeat of the season. Friday's shutout marked the first time Ross was held scoreless since the 1948 tie with Springfield.

Ross had scored in 14 consecutive games until the Trojan encounter.

Peterson scored both Findlay touchdowns, the first on a one-yard plunge in the first quarter and the second on a terrific 14-yard cutback in the fourth.

**Runbacks Put Ross in Hole**  
Findlay played most of the game in Ross territory due to fumbles by the Fremonters and some very healthy punt runbacks by Ray Wink, the Findlay captain.

The Trojans scored less than three minutes after the game started. A handoff from quarterback Ronnie Whitcomb, a freshman playing in the place of the injured Marlin Farver, to John Lewis went astray and the oval was recovered by the Trojans on the Ross 34.

Delmar Phillips and Peterson punched out a first down on the Ross 16, and after Peterson made nine yards on the next play, he came back to garner another first down on the Ross 3. Wink made two yards before big Pete plunged over.

At Smith booted the extra point and Findlay led 7-0.

The Giants then mustered their main offensive threat, a drive that carried from their 29 to the Findlay 20. However, a backfield in motion penalty nullified the march.

**Penalty Stops March**  
Two plunges by fullback Bob Markley, of 14 and 16 yards, were the spark of the ill-fated advance. With fourth down and eight, Markley took a handoff and blasted his way to the Findlay 20 for a first down. On the next play, Markley made five more yards, but the gain was canceled and the Giants were penalized five to the 25 for being illegally in motion.

A pass from Jim Koehler to Norm Rooney started Findlay moving again, but Wink fumbled a forward lateral on the Giants' 36 in the second quarter. Ross couldn't move, and punted to the Ross 45. That drive fizzled on the Ross 29. The Trojans were on the Ross 36 when the half ended.

A fumble by Farver gave the Trojans possession on the Ross 27 early in the third quarter, but on this one, Ross escaped without being scored on when John Lewis intercepted a heave by Koehler and brought it back to the Ross 30.

Here Wink took in another punt and sprinted to the Ross 38 but again the Giants made a pass interception, this time by Glover.

Shortly before the period ended, End John Allen of Fremont got in behind the last Trojan defender and nearly snatched a pass from Whitcomb, but the ball trickled off the ends of his fingertips. Two plays later, Harold Yawberg, son of the coach, pounced on a fumble by Markley on the Ross 38.

Some fancy lateralizing and hard running by Peterson took the ball to the 14, and from there the husky Peterson tailed. Smith again recorded a perfect placement.

**Adams Intercepts**  
After being restricted to their own territory all of the third period, Ross invaded Findlay's zone after the second touchdown on two pass completions. Whitcomb to Allen, but Dave Adams, Findlay defensive center, caught one to end that threat. The Giants had advanced to the Findlay 43.

Later in the quarter, Phil Koelger blocked a punt by Peterson, and the Giants took over on the enemy's 41. Wink stopped that immediately by intercepting a Whitcomb pass.

Findlay was knocking at the door in the closing minutes, but a clipping penalty intervened to put the Trojans back after Peterson drove to the Ross four-yard line.

Peterson, who carried the ball 27 times, gained a total of 148 yards. He lost a total of 23, including one loss of 17, to give him a net of 125 more than the entire Ross team.

The Giants, who were outscored 14-0, gained 78 net from scrimmage. Charlie Glover had a plus of 34, and Bob Markley added 40. Only other Ross backs to figure in the scrimmage statistics were Lewis, who carried thrice for a total of four yards.

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# Blue Streaks Try To Protect Undefeated Record Tonight; Giants' Allen To Miss Game

## FORECAST

Ross 19 Sandusky 0

Ross high's somewhat deflated football team tries to get back on the victory trail tonight at Sandusky against a hepped-up Blue Streak eleven that still is undefeated.

Soundly whipped by Findlay last week, the Giants will go to Sandusky trying to emulate their startling 1949 performance against the Bay City crew. Last year Ross was dumped by Findlay, then bounced back to hand the then-unbeaten Sanduskians a 47-7 lacing. Sandusky fans still haven't got over that defeat.

Ross will be minus the services of 216-pound John Allen, senior end on offense and linebacker on defense.

According to an announcement last night by Coach Mal Mackey, Allen will be withheld from the game because of a case of polio in his family. A six-year old sister of the player is afflicted.

Allen has been the No. 1 pass catcher this season.

Jim White, 159-pound senior letterman, will start at Allen's post and play both offense and defense. Ken Wolf will shift from

offensive tackle to linebacker, filling Allen's shoes, when Ross is on defense. Wolf normally plays end on defense.

Mackey still hasn't arrived at a decision this morning as to his offensive quarterback. He has been impressed with the work of freshman Ronnie Whitcomb, 16-year old, 170 pounder, who took over in the second quarter of the Fostoria game when senior Marlin Farver was injured.

Farver and Whitcomb divided the chores in the Findlay game. Farver is the sharper passer of the two, but Whitcomb has a lot of running ability that Mackey may want to call on. It would not be surprising if Farver starts but Whitcomb sees more action. Farver will play a guard berth on defense being one of the toughest links in the forward wall.

## More Substitutions

Mackey said he plans to make more changes in his lineup as the game progresses than he has heretofore. One of the lads due to see more action on offense is Jerome Surratt, a promising halfback, who plays the safety role on defense. Surratt's punt runbacks in the first three games prompted Coach Howard Yaw-

berg of Findlay to kick away from Surratt, sacrificing yardage on punts rather than risk a long runback by the 164-pound junior.

Charlie Black, a freshman, who owns one 35-yard touchdown run this season, is another lad slated for some duty. Black has been handicapped by a bad leg but is now believed able to play varsity ball. If fullback Earl Asperger, 170-pound sophomore, has shaken off the effects of a pulled leg muscle, he may get in on defense as a linebacker.

Don Baker, 180-pound reserve center, has been groomed to relieve Bob Markley as a linebacker. Mackey may give Baker, a senior an opportunity tonight.

Sandusky has bowed over four foes, Akron West, 12-0, Elyria 20-6, Ashland 39-6 and Port Clinton 47-0. After a slow start, the Streaks' offense started to click against Ashland and Port Clinton.

## Theibert Paces Streaks

Jude Theibert, called a swivel-hipped sensation, scored three touchdowns against Port Clinton and passed for two others. Theibert has scored a total of five of the Streaks' 14 touchdowns this season. Another top running threat is 195-pound Ted Schwanger, who was a regular last year. Schwanger hits the line hard, much in the manner of Ross high's Markley. Both Theibert, a sophomore, and Schwanger, a junior will be back next season. In fact, the Streaks have a good crop of regulars returning for next season.

Lavon Ward, injured in the Port Clinton game, may not start. If he doesn't, his replacement will be Norm Burrows. Darrell Hurlburt is slated to team with Theibert at halfback.

# 8,500 Fans See Ross Errors Turned Into T.D.'s; Hurlburt, Theibert Star For Streaks

Two super-charged linebackers by the name of Darrell Hurlburt and Jude Theibert made mincemeat out of Ross high last night as the Blue Streaks rolled to their fifth straight football victory, 23-7, before a Sandusky crowd conservatively estimated at 8,500.

It was the largest turnout for a Sandusky game since Strobel Field was dedicated in 1936. Incidentally, Sandusky won that one, 13-7, over Elyria.

Theibert ran the Giants ragged in the first half and Hurlburt, reported earlier in the week as a possibility to miss the game because of an elbow injury, took over in the last two periods.

Fumbling and poor ball handling was responsible for most of the Sandusky opportunities. Sandusky grabbed its first chance when halfback Bob Markley fumbled on the 15 in the second period. Theibert, a sophomore, made 12 yards in one crack, placing the ball on the three.

The Giants held for three downs, but on fourth, fullback Ted Schwanger bucked over Chuck Acierio made the first of three perfect placements and Sandusky led 7-0.

**Lewis' Run Called Back**  
The touchdown came after John Lewis of Ross rambled 70 yards for naught in the first period. The play was called back and the Giants were penalized 15 yards for clipping on the Ross 40.

Touchdown No. 2 was set up when Charlie Glover fumbled on the Sandusky 18. With only about two minutes left in the half, the Streaks ran and passed their way to the one-yard line. Theibert went into the end zone on an end sweep, but the play was called back and a five-yard penalty for offside set Sandusky back to the 6.

**On the next play, Theibert whipped a pass to end Jim Holzmiller for the 13th point and Acierio's kick made the score 14-0.**

Two plays later the half ended, but if Ross followers had any hopes of victory they were dashed in the third period when Sandusky was handed another chance. Lewis faking a punt on fourth down, started to run to his left but slipped and fell on the Ross 12. On fourth down from the eight, Hurlburt, a junior skirled the left side of the line to go over unchallenged. Acierio added point No. 21.

Ross tried to get back in the game, and with the help of a pair of 15-yard penalties for unnecessary roughness, the Giants marched 70 yards to pay dirt. With Lewis doing the bulk of the work, Ross worked its way to the 20 and then a pair of 10-yard sprints paid off. Glover dashed to the 10 and Lewis took the ball over on the next play.

Freshman Ronnie Whitcomb booted the extra point and Ross trailed 21-7.

**Streaks Get Safety**  
A punt by Schwanger that went out of bounds on the Ross 2 provided Sandusky with an extra two points, for on the ensuing play from scrimmage Glover was trapped in his end zone for a safety. Four plays following the place kick from the Ross 20, Sandusky scored, with Theibert going the last eight yards after some fine running by both Hurlburt and Theibert. The pass from center on the extra point try was fumbled, and Sandusky had the game under lock and key with about eight minutes left, 29-7.

That was all the scoring, although Sandusky penetrated to the nine after a 27-yard pass play. However, a penalty nullified the gain and the Streaks were set back. Sandusky was in midfield when the game ended.

It was a thrilling victory for the Sandusky followers and Coach Jeff DeHaven and his squad. It was the first time since 1948 that Ross lost two games in a row and it was Sandusky's first triumph over Ross since 1905. Finally whipped Ross last week, 14-0. The Giants now have won two, lost two and tied one.

The spirited Sandusky players carried DeHaven off the field and most of the spectators on the west side of the field stood and applauded after the gun sounded.

**Sandusky Controls Ball**  
Ross never had a chance after Lewis' run was called back. The Streaks were in possession of the ball most of the time because of their ability to march for first downs and because Ross was over-generous in giving the ball away.

Ross had only 24 plays from scrimmage, compared to 60 for Sandusky. Therein lies the story. You can't score when you don't have the ball.

Sandusky found it easy to skirt the Ross ends and run up the middle. Most of Theibert's gains were through the center, while Hurlburt's speciality was end sweeps.

Ross plainly missed its 216 pound linebacker and offensive end, John Allen, who was not permitted to play because of a case of polio in his family. And again, the Ross tackling was poor, with only an alert secondary stopping Sandusky

# Santora Sparks Cardinals To Easy Victory As Giants Lose Third Straight Football Tilt

East Cleveland Shaw high school, sparked by a driving, twisting fullback, Gil Santora, handed a fighting Ross team, a 14-0 defeat last night before about 4,000 homecoming fans at Harmon Field.

The Cardinals, getting practically every break in the game, scored a safety in the first half then came back with a strong ground attack to push over one touchdown in each of the last two periods.

Santora scored both of the six pointers, getting the first on an 11-yard drive over the center of the line. The other was a fourth-down plunge from the one.

Ross only fumbled once last night, less than its usual number, but it doomed the Giants' chances of taking the lead in the first quarter. After Markley covered a Shaw fumble on the Cards' 31, the Rossmen marched to the three on runs of 12 and nine yards by Lewis and a seven-yard thrust by Charlie Glover.

With first down on the three, Lewis fumbled a handoff from quarterback Romie Whitcomb and end Joe Romain recovered for Shaw on the six.

Shaw Blocks Kick

The Cardinals then marched to the Ross 46, principally because of a 34-yard run by Santora, before Glover intercepted a pass on the Ross nine. Three plays netted only one yard and Lewis went back to kick. The pass from center was high and before the junior halfback could get the kick away, a host of Shaw linemen broke through to block it. Lewis saved Ross from worse damage by diving on it amid several Shaw players, making the play a safety, the visitors getting a 20 lead.

The first of two pass interference rulings of the evening was called, giving the Cardinals a first down on the 13-yard line. An interception by Charlie Black, freshman halfback, stopped proceedings shortly before the half ended.

**Santora Goes Over**  
Shaw took the kickoff to launch the second half and marched 72 yards into pay dirt. Santora climaxed the excursion with a touchdown from the 11. Bob Hawk's kick for the point hit an upright and bounced back toward the playing field.

A Shaw fumble, recovered by guard Ken Wolf, who played a good game for the Giants, presented Ross with an opportunity on the enemy 38 late in the third period, but Shaw took over on its 35.

**A 65-yard march, kept alive by an extremely questionable pass interference ruling on the Ross seven, resulted in the final tally. Santora went over on fourth down and again Hawk's kick was no good.**

# Surratt Provides Spark As Giants Capture 52-0 Victory

An aroused Ross high football team, led by Jerome Surratt, a newcomer to the ball-toting ranks, got back into the victory column by pounding out a 52-0 verdict over Bowling Green on the Bobcats' field last night.

The overwhelming margin came as a shock to the 2,500 spectators, who watched the Giants display vast improvement in all departments of play to hold the poverized Bobcats scoreless.

Surratt wasn't the whole show, but he was a big part of it. The 154-pound junior halfback, operating in the place of the injured John Lewis, scored three touchdowns on a carry to the 20 stopped the runs of 60, 52 and 38 yards. Bobcats and Ross received possession of the field after each play.

And that's not all. He intercepted two passes, both of which led to touchdowns, and recovered a fumble. His tackling was also up to par.

Charlie Glover, veteran halfback, and Bob Markley, fullback, likewise figured prominently as the Ross offense rolled up a net yardage of 401, surpassing its combined total of the last three games.

A huge factor in the rejuvenation of the Giants' attack was the play calling of Markley, running the team for the first time. Selecting the shots with the poise of a veteran, he mixed in the three minutes remaining, maneuvers to keep Bowling Green off balance all night.

George White, B. G. show Emmanuel George, the highly touted sophomore fullback, lived up to advance notices but he received little help from his mates. Including Joe Presti, another sophomore, Presti, a halfback, and George had collaborated to give Bowling Green the most dangerous running attack of any team in the Buckeye League this season. George gained 109 of the Bobcats' net of 147 yards from scrimmage. He carried the ball 21 times.

The entire Ross defense was superlative and hit hard. All the linemen showed the stuff that made the Giants once one of the most feared teams in Ohio. More than holding up his part was Jim White, defensive end, who played the best game of his career.

John Allen, backing up the line, was in on many plays, along with Martin Farver, guard, and Ken Wolf, and Phil Keller, tackles.

**T. D. in Five Plays**  
Ross required only five plays to chalk up its first touchdown, with Glover scurrying the last two yards to pay dirt. Ron Whitcomb galloped the kickoff back to the B. G. 40. The first running play brought a familiar penalty to Ross, for backfield in motion, but Glover got loose for a 26-yard run to the Bobcat 28, then came back with a six-yard advance. Surratt gained 20 yards in two attempts to place the ball on the two, from where Glover fumbled with only two minutes being played.

Bob Biggs, another improved B. G. lineman, covered a fumble by George on the B. G. 44 about two minutes later and Ross len. quickly capitalized on it. Surratt hit off left tackle for 12 and then Markley and Glover carried as the Giants moved to the five-yard line. A 15-yard holding penalty set Ross back to the 20, but Glover gained 12 yards. Surratt bucked to the five and Glover plunged over for the T. D.

Surratt made his 32-yard dash for the next touchdown after returning a punt 18 yards to the Bowling Green 48-yard line. The first three touchdowns came in the first quarter.

Ross high's next touchdown, which happened with 4:35 remaining in the half, came when Bowling Green's George Mueller, a tackle who handles the punting chores, kicked to Surratt on the B. G. 40. The fleet scoutback sprinted down the sidelines for 60 yards, with several key blocks making the play possible.

The half ended 25-0, with Whitcomb kicking the first extra point and raising the next three. Ross widened its margin early in the third period when Surratt intercepted a pass on the B. G. 39 and was downed on the 38. After a four-yard loss on the first play, Whitcomb crashed the scoring column with a startling 34-yard dash.

The Ross freshman quarterback cut over left guard, found a hole and outran the secondary. His try for the extra point from placement was blocked.

Bowling Green penetrated to the Ross 26-yard line after George ran a kickoff back to the Giants' 33. However, Ross held and then started a drive that wound up in a 50-yard scoring play.

**Willey Scores**  
With the ball on the midfield stripe, Whitcomb located Dick Willey, senior end, standing all alone on the Bobcats' 30-yard line. Showing speed, Willey shook off two tacklers and ran past another defender to hit pay dirt. Whitcomb's placement was good and Ross led 38-0.

A fumble on a punt gave B. G. a chance on the Ross 33, but Square Garden tonight. They drew in their first clash last a pass from George to Hal Whit-March 31.

From that point, Ross went 65 yards, with a 62-yard scoring sprint by Glover being nullified by a clipping penalty that set the ball on the Ross 40. Surratt covered the 60 yards in two plays, going 22 the first time and 38 the next. Whitcomb's kick was again true, making the score 45-0.

A couple of bull-like plunges by Markley was the spark of the game's final touchdown, which was scored on a five-yard pass from Whitcomb to Allen. Shortly before making the tally, Allen dropped a pass near the end zone. The match covered a total of 52 yards and was launched when Surratt intercepted a pass.

Surratt recovered a Bowling Green fumble on the B. G. 28 with three minutes remaining, but the Bobcats held. In the last 43 seconds, freshman Charlie Black made a 32-yard run to the opponents' 29-yard line but the game ended one play later.

**Elyria Comes Next**  
Ross resembled a smooth machine last night and gave promise of giving its fans something to cheer about before the season is over. With Surratt giving new life to the attack and Markley, Glover and Lewis in form, the Giants can still kick up quite a ruckus on the gridiron. Next Friday, Ross entertains Elyria. After that comes a big game in Toledo with Scott on November 10, before the season's finale at Harmon Field on November 17, against Marion.

Ross has now won three games, lost three and tied one.

# Surratt, Lewis Ramble Over Pioneers As Giants Gain 466 Yards On Muddy Gridiron

ROSS HIGHS OFFENSIVE POWER EXPLODED all over rain-soaked Harmon Field last night as the frustrated Giants finally hit their stride and blasted Elyria 46-13 before 2,000 hardy spectators.

With Jerome Surratt playing a sensational running game and John Lewis giving him timely support, Mal Mackey's T-formation attack kept up a steady crescendo as it smothered the Pioneers under the largest score Ross ever made in the 14-game series. Ross rolled up a net yard age of 466.

**SURRATT SCORED** four touchdowns, one on his specialty, returning a punt. Quarterback Ron Whitcomb passed to end John Allen for two more and Whitcomb added the other on a quarterback sneak of five yards.

**Pioneers Don't Complete Pass**  
Except for a couple of let-downs, early in the first quarter and late in the second, the Giants stymied the Elyria passing attack and they accomplished a feat that will require some reach to see when it was last duplicated. For the first time in many a moon, a Ross opponent failed to complete a pass.

The Pioneers tossed seven passes, never came close to completing one and they had one intercepted, a diving catch by Allen.

**THE BACKS WEREN'T** the only Rossmen to play outstanding ball. Tackle Ken Wolf and guards Bob Biggs and Martin Farver were line stalwarts, with Wolf, 160-pound senior, grabbing two Elyria fumbles and turning in several brilliant tackles. Both Biggs and Farver refused to be budged and piled up many line sorties tried by the Pioneers.

**Jones Boys Make Long Runs**  
The sophomore Elyria, Gold Dust twins, Doug and Don Jones, showed their heels to the Ross secondary twice in the first half to make it a close contest at the halfway mark, but the Giants turned the game into a rout in the last two quarters.

With the game eight minutes old, Doug Jones broke loose for a 62-yard scoring play to put Elyria ahead 6-0. Two minutes and 45 seconds later, the Giants stormed back to knot the count.

**ROSS MARCHED** 80 yards on eight plays, with runs of 24 yards by Surratt and 33 by Charlie Glover, slowed down by an ankle injury, being the highlights. Surratt covered the last eight yards, bowling over two would-be tacklers to get into the end zone. Whitcomb's kick for the extra point was blocked.

**Early in the second period,** Ross and Elyria traded fumbles, with Wolf losing a loose ball on the Elyria 29 to start Ross marching once more. Big factor was a false punt by Lewis. With fourth down and 11 to go on the Pioneers' 40, Big John rambled 31 yards to the enemy nine from kick formation. After Whitcomb fumbled and recovered for a yard loss, Surratt cut between left end and tackle and fought his way into the end zone. Whitcomb's placement made the score 13-6 with 5:39 remaining in the half.

Three plays later, Ross was in the scoring column once more. Wolf pounced on a fumble by Phil Webb on the Elyria 19. Surratt gained two yards, then Whitcomb flipped a pass to Allen for the T. D. Whitcomb made it 20-6 with a place kick.

**Don Jones Goes 84**  
Ross had another chance when Jamie Alexander, Elyria quarterback, fumbled the pass from center on fourth down, the Giants taking over on the Pioneers' 16-yard line. The Elyrians held, however, and with 1:04 remaining, Don Jones embarked on his 84-yard run. Phil Perkins cut the margin to 20-13 at halftime by booting the extra point.

At the outset of the second half, the Pioneers shook Doug Jones loose for a 37-yard run to the Ross 22-yard line but a clipping penalty nullified the gain and set them back to their 30. An eighty-yard return of Alexander's punt put Ross on the midfield stripe and from there the Giants went all the way.

**Whitcomb gained 25 yards** on a quarterback sneak to set up the tally, which came on fourth down when Allen made a sensational catch of Whitcomb's pass on the nine-yard line. The 215-pound senior eluded a tackler and went over. It was an 18-yard play, Whitcomb kicked the point, making the score 27-13 with 7:13 left in the third period.

**LEWIS, SHAKING OFF** several tacklers and aided by a couple of key blocks at the line of scrimmage, dashed 60 yards to set up the fifth touchdown. Lewis was downed on the four-yard line and Surratt bucked over. Whitcomb missed the try for the point and the scoreboard showed Ross ahead 33-13 with four minutes remaining in the quarter.

Elyria was unable to move after the kickoff and Alexander was forced to punt. Jerome Surratt took a line-drive kick on the Elyria 54-yard line, ran past a group of Elyria players and legged it to the goal line. Whitcomb's placement was wide of the mark.

But this blond of Lithuanian ancestry showed them all, even himself.

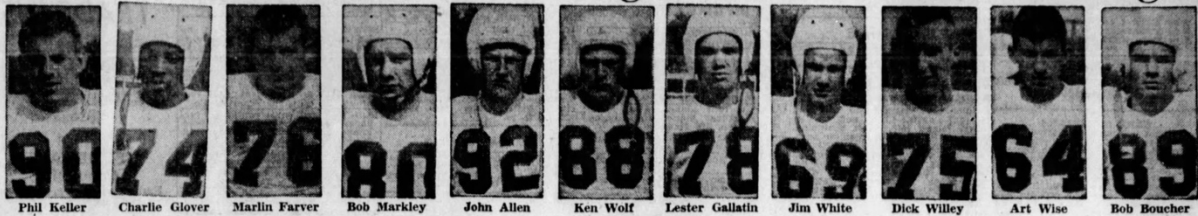

## Keller Given Honorable Mention; Massillon's Howe Leads Balloting

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 5.—AP—The decade's classiest crop of talent makes up the 1950 all-Ohio high school football team picked today by the state's sports writers, coaches and officials for the Associated Press.

The selections, recognized as official by the coaches association, were made up from some 20,000 boys playing on 578 teams.

Ten seniors and one junior make up the first team, and all but one of the "varsity" are six feet tall or over. It's a dream team, with offensive and defensive power, and loaded with kicking, passing and ball-toting ability.

Massillon's great fullback, Bob Howe, led the balloting and was awarded the first team captaincy. The six-foot one-inch 206-pounder caught the eye of practically all the voters.

Exactly 600 players were nominated for berths on the All-Ohio, and the fight was spirited for each spot. Only repeater from last year was Toledo Libbey's outstanding center, Dick Szymanski, who was a standout on offense and a great linebacker on defense.

The backfield has everything. At quarterback is Youngstown East's Don Buehl, the state's No. 1 T-formation wizard as well as a fine passer and placekicker.

The halfbacks are Doug Goodsell of Upper Arlington's unbeaten team, who led the Ohio scoring scrap with 199 points, and unbeaten Lakewood's Ray Perkins, who contributed 126 points, intercepted a dozen passes on defense and generally made him-

self obnoxious to the opposition. Howe at fullback rounds out the ball-toting corps which averages 189 pounds in weight and better than six feet in height.

The end positions are in the capable hands of Akron South's



John Allen and Phil Keller. Jerry Ford and Barberton's Bob Harris. Each towers over the six-foot mark. Ford a 10-second man in track, made five touchdowns on end around plays and 10 on passes as he led Akron's gridders with 90 points.

Harris, who runs the 100 yards in 10.4, is an excellent blocker and tackler, and intercepted 28 passes during the year from his defensive safety spot. He scored 74 points, and averaged 44 yards per punt.

235-Pound Tackle

The tackles are big and rugged stars on both offense and defense. Don Swartz of Newark packs 235 pounds on his six-foot frame, while Sam Palumbo, captain of the Cleveland Collinwood club, weighs 205 and stands six-one. Palumbo blocked four punts during the year and intercepted two passes, racing one back for a touchdown.

Jim Reichenbach, captain of Massillon's three-time state champions—and a regular all three years—pairs with Portsmouth's classy Jack Appel at the guards. Appel played 48 minutes of every game with the Trojans, while Reichenbach played mostly on offense for the Tigers.

Some fine talent was relegated to the second and third teams and the honorable mention list, because there were not enough spots to place all the outstanding kids, many of whom will be heard from on the collegiate fields in the next few years.

A total of 103 ends, 113 tackles, 99 guards, 51 centers, 59 quarterbacks, 109 halfbacks and 66 fullbacks were nominated for positions on the all-star squad by the voters who blanketed the state.

Only class A schools were considered in selecting the All-Ohio, but many outstanding players popped up on the class B clubs—some of which played against the larger foes.
