Blame Bus Rides For Lack Of Hits After Losing Another

FORT MYERS, Fla., March 26.—P—If training in Fort Myers has helped throw the whammie on the Cleveland Indians' once-potent bats, the spell is about to end. For the Indians wind up their local schedule by taking on the Detroit Tigers today.

The departure from Fort Myers may be permanent, for club officials have been looking over other locations. Fort Myers is somewhat isolated from Florida major league training camps, leading to difficulties in arranging exhibitions and raising objections to the long bus rides to games.

Trans Did Same

Most observers agree, however, that the bus rides are not entirely responsible for the Indians' light-hitting habits. The team obtained only four hits from three St. Louis Cardinal rookies yesterday and the National leaguers, who made only three themselves, won 3 to 1.

The Tribe also wasn't hitting throughout the 1940 campaign, and the only rides then were on trains.

Inept Cleveland fielding and two of the Cards' hits, bunched off Joe Krakauskas in the eighth inning, accounted for the three St. Louis runs.

Lefty Al Smith pitched three hitless innings for the Indians and Nate Andrews followed by allowing only one safe blow in three frames. Krakauskas hurled the next two and Mike Naymick pitched a hitless ninth.

Althoff Must Depend On Ten Vets In Squad Of 44

Biggest Problem Is To Find Capable Replacements For Bob Shaw In Shot And Discus; Indications Team May Be Weak In Field Events

Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff, facing a 10-meet schedule which includes several important relay events, was anxiously awaiting Spring weather today so that he could take his Little Giant track squad of 44 hopefuls out into the fresh air and onto the Harmon field cinders.

The squad has been working out in the gym corridors for the past week or two and undoubtedly will be increased now that basketball has terminated again.

Included on the squad are 10 lettermen, all but two of whom are seniors, around whom he will build his 1941 team.

Missing, however, and leaving an exceptionally big gap to plug, is big Bob Shaw, who won the state title in both the shot and discus last year and whose heave of the leaden ball, 53 feet 4 1/4 inches, set a new record. Shaw was also fourth in the high hurdles at the schoolboy carnival.

Three other lettermen are also missing, Bill Clark, sprints and relays, who is no longer eligible because of age; Richard Schneider, relays and 440, now with Co. B in army service, and Delbert Little, pole vault, who graduated last June.

These Remain

Althoff is depending heavily on the returning ten. He will have Clarence Chestnutwood, who gave much promise last year, for the short sprints and relays; Jack Carroll for the pole vault; Snooks Jenkins, high and broad jumps and the hurdles; Carl Erchenbrecher, relays and broad jump; Paul Huddle, relays; Chuck Robertson, hurdles and both jumps; Carl Hufford, relays and 440; Henry Sewell, the mile and 880; Dick Frantz in the weights and Jim Wisbon for the sprints and relays.

Of course, the chief task is to find capable replacements for Shaw in the events in which he was usually a sure first. Chestnutwood was plenty fast last year and should be even better this Spring, while Jenkins did a good job in the high jump and Sewell was one of the best distance men in this district.

Apparently, the relay teams will be fast enough to show their heels to most competitors this year.

Cop Slim 60 To 58 Victory After Trailing Most Of Way

Erchenbrecher And Robinson Come Through In
Final Event With Needed Points;
Chestnutwood Sweeps Sprints

The Little Giants pried the lid off their current track season with a victory over in Bellevue Tuesday afternoon, but the margin was so narrow that Coach Whitey Althoff and his cohorts are still shivering in their spikes.

The final count was Fremont 60, Bellevue 58, and if that doesn't give you an idea of how close the Rossmen came to dropping a meet that was scheduled merely as a warm-up, maybe this will—the Fremonters went into the last event needing both a first and a second to win.

They collected both those places and the meet, but all it meant to Coach Althoff was that there remained plenty of work to be done before the team goes really big time and tackles Toledo Woodward here next Wednesday.

Take Eight Firsts

For all the closeness of the meet the Little Giants snared eight first places in the 14 events, their weakness coming in the supporting spots where every good team is strong.

Capt. Clarence Chestnutwood set the pace with three firsts and 15 points, but even then there was little to really cheer about. Unless it was the way that Carl Erchenbrecher and Chuck Robinson came through in the broad jump when the chips were down.

This was the last event and Erchenbrecher rallied round with the longest leap any of Althoff's proteges have yet uncorked—20 feet and four inches. Robinson was second with 19 feet three inches, which wasn't bad, either.

Coach Althoff entered the meet with the idea of using as many men as possible, principally those he wasn't sure about. But when the score stood 44 to 24 against the Little Giants, he changed his mind and started to shoot the works.

Relay Disappoints

Chestnutwood came in first in all the dashes, 100, 220 and 440, to be individual high point winner, and Jack Carroll and Robinson gave a pleasing performance in tying for first in the high jump with leaps of five feet 10 inches. Carroll also looked good in the pole vault as he took second with a 10 foot six inch effort, one inch better than his last year's best.

Perhaps the biggest disappointments to the Ross mentor were the half-mile relay team of Erchenbrecher, Bonnell, Huddle and Wisbon, which finished second, and Henry Sewell, who was forced to be content with second in the mile and third in the half.

Of course, the season is young and the weather was still chilly enough to leave Coach Althoff with a stiff neck—and the resolve that the Buckeye league champions were in for plenty more work.

HOCKEY PLAYOFFS ARE DEADLOCKED

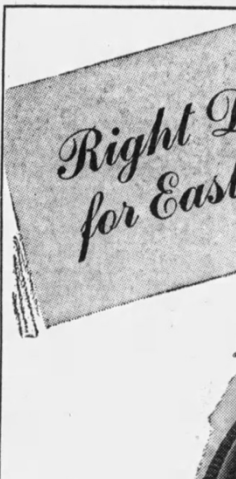
HERSHEY, Pa., April 9.—P—The Cleveland Barons probably are thankful to be back in their home town today on the shores of Lake Erie.

ROSS LEADING WHEN IT RAINS

Win First Four Events From Woodward Be- fore Meet Is Called

Coaches Whitey Althoff and Bill Fetter waited more than half an hour, during which time the rain didn't, and then called off a scheduled track meet between the Little Giants and Toledo Woodward Wednesday afternoon.

The Little Giants were leading by a 30 to 6 score at the end of four events when Jupe Pluvius stepped in and took the verdict for himself.

The Purple scanty-clads had swept all four events, taking seconds in three of them as well, and were headed for a one-sided victory and a peek at what may be expected of them in the Mansfield Relays.

Coach Althoff said that an effort would be made to re-stage the meet Friday afternoon, but Coach Fetter of the Polar Bears was a bit doubtful if his school would permit because of finances.

Had Started Fast

It won't go down in the records, but Clarence Chestnutwood won the 100-yard dash in 10.8 seconds with about a six-foot lead over teammate Jim Wisbon, with Galemowski of Woodward, third.

In the 120-yard high hurdles, Chuck Robertson broke the tape ahead of Wilson of Toledo, in 17.1 seconds, but only because the latter, away to a slow start, caught his toe on the last timber. Jenkins of Fremont, was third.

The mile went to Hank Sewell in the surprisingly good time of 5:09.1, and he had about a 75 foot lead on Davisson, who was well in front of Greiger of Toledo. The race was finished in a heavy downpour.

The shot went to Nickel of Fremont, on a heave of 41 feet 10 inches with Carl Hufford second and Duhart, of the visitors, third.

ROSSMEN FAIL AT MANSFIELD

Carroll And Jenkins Only Ones To Crack Scoring Column

The Little Giant scanty-clads found the going a bit too fast in Mansfield Saturday as track teams from 98 schools competed in the annual Relays and 21 entries scored less than a point, but at that, they acquitted themselves well considering the competition.

Jack Carroll and Snooks Jenkins were the only Fremonters to crack the scoring column. The former tied with four others for fourth in the pole vault, clearing 11 feet, and the latter was knotted with six others for fifth in the high jump, clearing 5 feet 10½ inches, close to the school record here.

The pole vault went to Sundmark of Erie, Pa., Strong-Vincent, and Scally of East Palestine, who both cleared 12 feet. The high jump was also won by Scally who got over the bar at six feet three inches.

Erchenbrecher Close

Just for the record, the meet was won for the third time in a row by Cleveland East Tech with 33 points, less than half as many points as they scored last year, with Cleveland Heights and Cleveland East following in that order. Thirty-six teams scored one or more points with Sandusky getting two.

To be brief the Little Giant performers accounted for themselves as follows:

Carl Erchenbrecher missed qualifying for the finals in the broad jump by just one-half inch with a leap of 19 feet 10½ inches.

Nickel pushed out the shot put 45 feet nine inches, a nice heave, and missed fifth place by eight inches.

Chuck Robertson was fourth in his preliminary heat in the high hurdles, but didn't qualify. He was also fourth in the low hurdle prelims.

Stull Limping

Capt. Clarence Chestnutwood, still bothered with a bad ankle, wasn't entered in the 100 and 440, but Coach Whitey Althoff put him in the 220 and he was fourth in his heat.

The medley relay team was fourth in its heat and the two-mile relay team with seventh. The Junior high relay team was sixth and the shuttle relay team didn't run.

Jack Hufford finished seventh in his heat of the 440 and Schlea, a freshman, was 12th in the 880.

The 880 relay team of Erchenbrecher, Huddle, Wisbon and Chestnutwood was second in a preliminary heat and just missed placing.

Although the Little Giants came back with little material to show for their trip, the competition against the best of the Ohio and Pennsylvania schoolboys should stand them in good stead in succeeding meets.

ENTERS SQUAD IN RELAY MEET

Althoff Will Take 21 Little Giants To Ohio Wesleyan

A squad of 21 Little Giant trackmen, as yet really untested in a tough meet, will shove off early Saturday for Delaware and the Ohio Wesleyan Relays, where they will compete against the stiffest opposition they will be called upon to face this year.

More than 900 schoolboys have been entered in the big carnival which has both a class A and class B division, and more than 60 schools will be competing.

Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff hasn't any high expectations, but figures the team may cut in for a few points if everything goes right. The field events are figured on a team basis, with three entries in each event. For instance, the distances that each of his three shotputters heave the pellet, will be totaled and that distance compared with the other entries.

ROSS IS 10TH IN RELAY MEET

Score In Three Events At Ohio Wesleyan Carnival Saturday

Fremont Ross finished in 10th place in the Ohio Wesleyan Relays Saturday, just half-way down the list of 20 Class A schools that broke into the scoring column. The Little Giants accounted for 5½ points to place them above such strong district contenders as Elyria (3½ points), Sandusky (3 points) and Mansfield (one point).

The upper bracket title was won by Springfield which had 43 boys entered and scored 33 points. Akron East, Columbus North and Toledo Scott, a three-time winner, were tied for second with 20½ points. Other teams that finished above the Fremonters were Youngstown, Lakewood, Cleveland John Marshall, Columbus Central and Akron Kenmore. The latter had six points.

How They Scored

Fremont's points were scored in the shot put where the team of LaVern Nickels, Carl Hufford and Dick Frantz had a combined heave of 125 feet and two inches, good for second; in the broad jump where Erchenbrecher, Robertson and Hufford leaped 56 feet 9½ inches for fifth and one point; and in the high jump, where Jenkins, Robertson and Carroll had a combined 15 foot 10 inch leap for a tie for fifth and one-half point.

In the shot Nickels was first among the Fremonters with 43 feet and 9 inches, below his last week's mark of over 45 feet; Hufford had 41 feet 11 inches and Frantz had 39 feet 6 inches. The event was won by Springfield with a team toss of 130 feet 9 inches.

In the broad jump, Carl Erchenbrecher was best for the Purple, sailing 19 feet 6½ inches, followed by Chuck Robertson's 19 feet 3 inches and Hufford's even 18 feet. The winning team jump was made by Columbus North, 59 feet one-half inch.

Jumpers Disappoint

The high jumpers were a bit of a disappointment to Coach Whitey Althoff with Jenkins clearing but five feet six inches and Robertson and Carroll tied at five feet two inches. The individual best jump was five feet eight inches.

As in every big meet where preliminaries are necessary, some team suffers as a result. Saturday it was Fremont, as far as the 440-yard relay was concerned. The team of Erchenbrecher, Huddle, Wisbon and Chestnutwood didn't finish their preliminary and qualifying heat for the 880 until 1 p. m. and at 1:30 p. m. had to run the 440. They managed to qualify for the finals in the latter, finishing second to Toledo Scott, but were seventh among eight teams in the finals.

Get Bad Break

The mile relay brought up another tough break. Fremont just happened to draw a fast heat in the preliminaries and finished sixth, not good enough to get into the finals. However, their time was three seconds faster than that of Sandusky, second in its heat.

Although the Little Giants didn't finish too high in the point totals, they did do better than at Mansfield and showed some improvement. Enough to give them a chance of finishing high in the DeVilbiss Relays on Saturday and to make them at least an even favorite to retain their Buckeye League title a week hence.

MEET DECIDED IN LAST EVENT

Bohnsack Wins Broad Jump On Last Try To Win Meet, 59 1/2-58 1/2

Dick Bohnsack who went through more monkeyshines before each of his jumps than a schoolgirl does preparing for her first date, made them finally pay off at Harmon stadium Tuesday afternoon. Bohnsack snatched almost certain victory away from the Little Giants and forced them to be content with a 59 1-2 to 58 1-2 defeat.

The meet was almost as close as the final score all the way and twice was deadlocked. Once at the end of 10 events, 43 all, and again at the end of 13, at 54 1-2 all. That was what paved the way for Bohnsack's historic final effort.

The DeVilbiss star had already kept his team in the running with a pair of firsts in the hurdle races. Everything was even when the last event, the broad jump, came up. A first would win for either team.

Foul Is Costly

Carl Erchenbrecher went for 20 feet on his first attempt in the qualifier and it looked like that effort would stand up. Bohnsack, chief contender, couldn't get over 19 feet six inches for all his preparations. On his next to last jump he managed to make 19 feet 10 inches and that looked like his best. But it wasn't. On his last jump he sailed 20 feet 6 3-4 inches and there it was. Erchenbrecher went about three inches better than that on his final try, but fouled enroute.

Fremont took firsts in six of the 14 events, but that wasn't enough. Failure in two events and an oversight in a third cost them the victory. Taking up the oversight first, it was in not entering Ed Fox in the discus. Fox hasn't been so hot in this event and so wasn't officially entered. He tossed the saucer, however, and his throw of over 111 feet would have been good for second, a spot that DeVilbiss took.

Several Disappointments

Perhaps the biggest disappointment was Henry Sewell in the half-mile. Expected to win handily, he failed badly and was a very poor fourth. The Purple's only points coming with Freshman Bob Schlea's third. The other was the mile relay team which finished second despite a heroic finish drive by Jim Wisbon that fell just short. It was loss of this event that erased Fremont's lead and tied the meet up for the second time.

Capt. Clarence Chestnutwood was also forced to look at a rival's back twice as Goodwin proved too fast for him in both the 100 and 220 dashes. He did win the 440, however.

Fremont's best performances were in the shot put, LaVern Nickels, Carl Hufford and Dick Frantz sweeping that event and in the high jump, where Jenkins and Robertson tied for first and Jack Carroll cut in for a third place tie.

As far as could be ascertained, it was but the second dual meet in recent history lost by the Little Giants and was the final tune-up before the DeVilbiss Relays Saturday.
