FREMONT - During his 13-year tenure as softball coach at Fremont Ross, Mike Gilbert has never had team captains.

"I just thought, they're two fouryear seniors and they're two four-year seniors that I trust," Gilbert said. "So I just named them captains.

Clark, a catcher, was honorable mention all-state in Division I last season. She led all Div. I catchers in Northwest Ohio with a batting average of .472 and was in the top three in several other offensive cat-egories when district stats were submitted.

Clark had 34 hits, 15 runs and 23 RBIs. She added nine stolen bases and had a .526 on-base percentage as she helped Ross to a an 11-13 record and 6-4 mark in the Greater Buckeye Conference.

"She's been honorable mention all state for two years, which is quite an honor." Gilbert said. "It's really hard for someone from this

clark, a senior at Fremont Ross, signed to play softball at Ohio Dominican softball at Ohio Dominican University Wednesday. The Little Giants' catcher has been a first team all-Greater Buckeye Confer-ence and first team all-dis-trict player for Ross the

trict player for Ross the past two seasons, while also garnering honorable mention all-Ohio honors. "She did all the work," Ross coach Mike Gilbert said. "Tve just been lucky enough to be along for the ride."

Clark has been Gilbert's top hitter the past three years. She hit 3.73 as a freshman, 414 as a sophomore and 450 as a hiunis.

On defense, Clark has had fielding percentages of .981, 1.000 and .993 respectively.
"I love hitting," Clark said. "Lots of girls don't like to hit, but I love it.

Strong leadership was another skill that came naturally to Clark. So much so, Gilbert — in his 13th season — named her and teammate Christy Meggitt as his first-ever team captains this spring.

"It's a great honor to have and to know that he have and to know that he feels he can put me and Christy in that position," Clark said. "It feels good to know your coach has that much confidence in you."

Ross is off to a 5-2 start this season with a 1-travels in the CEC.

Thus far, Clark has once again been one of Ross's top hitters, while

"She's just so awesome to have as a catcher," Gallagher said. "She's definitely the best one I've ever had."

"My reaction time coming up out of my crouch to throw is a lot faster," Clark said. "And my baserunning is incredibly faster. I'm actually a threat on the base paths."

Casey is looking forward to the equal playing field that college sports will provide her.

"That's what really excites me about going to play," she said. "There's going to be some players that are better than you and some that aren't, but it's just equal. It's a lot more competitive."

The Panthers are members of the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in D-II. Others schools in their conference include the likes of the University of Findlay, Ashland University, Tiffin University, Wayne State in Michigan, Grand Valley State, Ferris State and Lake Superior State.

At Ohio Dominican, Casey will pursue a degree in business administration with a minor in sports management.

"My ultimate goal is to work for a sports team," Casey said. "Or to work for Nike or some kind of sports medium."

Little Giants light up Trojans

FINDLAY — The Fremont Ross softball team felt no hangover from having five of their last six games canceled because of weather.

In fact, the Little Giants played one of their best games of the season Friday in a 17-1 shellacking of the Findlay Trojans.

McKenzie Gallagher pitched a gem, striking out seven and limiting Findlay to four hits, and the Little Giants offense struck early and often on its way to the blowout five-inning victory.

"I'm really happy, especially since we only played two games in two weeks," Ross coach Mike Gilbert said. "To come back out here and hit the ball, well it's really nice to come out here after a week layoff and hit like this."

It didn't hurt that Findlay struggled fielding all afternoon, committing four errors that immediately lead to runs for Ross (7-3, 3-2 Greater Buckeye Conference).
