# 3-Way Scrap Looms District Track Meet

## Fremont, Tygers Expected To Threaten Blue Streaks

**Coach Althoff Names Purple Squad Of 13 To Make Trip; Bob Shaw Gives Team Strength In Field Events; Streaks Defend Title**

The 1938 district championship track and field meet to be held at Mansfield high school stadium Saturday afternoon looms as another tri-cornered battle between Fremont, Sandusky and Mansfield.

The Blue Streaks, who last year won their fifth straight Buckeye league cinder-path title, are slightly favored to retain their district laurels, but it would be no great surprise if the Tygers or the Little Giants slipped ahead of Bob Whitaker's thin-clads.

Sandusky won the 1938 meet with 64 points, Fremont was second with 52 and Mansfield third with 38.

Mansfield's championship hopes are encouraged by its recent dual victory over the Streaks, while Coach Whitey Althoff's Purple Squad holds no great respect for Sandusky, being edged by a scant five point margin by the Streaks in the Buckeye.

**Linta Is Star**

Coach Harry Brock's Tygers are confident of coping the pole-vault, 880-yard relay and high hurdle events. Johnny Linta, Mansfield's star pole-vaulter, soared 13 feet, six inches recently at Akron, and every indication points to another easy win for the youth. This means Wayne Albers, who snared the pole vault for Sandusky in the Buckeye will have to take a back seat at Mansfield.

But if Sandusky loses a few points in the pole vault, Fremont is also likely to drop a few in the half-mile relay. The Little Giants took first in this event in the Buckeye, but may find the Mansfield 880 team too much to handle. Neither Fremont nor Sandusky expects to score heavily in the high hurdles so Mansfield's strength over the tall timber goes unchanged.

**Holds Record**

Fremont looks forward to firsts in the shotput, the discus and 220, while Rogers figures to give Sandusky victories in the mile, in which he holds the district record, and in the half mile. The Blue Streaks also are strong in the quarter mile and mile relay.

The Little Giant squad last year produced the outstanding individual performer in the district here at Harmon field. He was Pete Erchenbrecher, who took firsts in the century, 220 and broad jump, and ran anchor on the victorious Fremont half mile relay. His 227 time in the 220 hung up a new district mark.

Although Erchenbrecher is gone from the Fremont team via graduation, Ross has another star in Bob Shaw, who shines in the discus, shotput, hurdles and high jump.

**Prelims at 10 a. m.**

Besides Fremont, Sandusky and Mansfield, other Class A schools which had filed entry before Friday morning included Tiffin, Columbiana, Shelby and Gallon. Preliminaries will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday with the finals slated for 2 p. m. The list of Class B entries, includes Clyde, Sulphur Springs, New London, Sycamore, Castalia, Carlin township, Huron, New Washington and Holmes-Liberty. Five places will be awarded on a 6-4-3-2-1 basis. Coach Althoff announced 13 Little Giants would comprise the squad making the trek to Mansfield with the entries as follows:

# Registers Mark of 49 Feet, 6 Inches As Ross Takes 3rd

Little Giants Score 35 1-2 Points; Qualify In Seven Events For State Meet At Columbus; Mansfield Cops Meet To End Sandusky Domination

Fremont Ross qualified in seven events for competition in the annual state interscholastic track and field meet to be held at Columbus this weekend as the thin-clad squad of Coach Harold Althoff placed third in the district meet at Mansfield last Saturday with 35 1/2 points.

Mentor Althoff stated Monday he was uncertain how large a team he would take to the state capital but hinted it was probable all the Purple and White athletes who won third place or better at Mansfield would make the trip.

These would include Bob Shaw, who set a new district record as he gave Fremont its only first with a toss of 49 feet, 6 inches in the shot put, and who tied for second in the high jump and took third in the high hurdles; Clarence Chestnutwood, who tied for third in the 40; Burdette Ballard, third in the 80; Dick Manahan, second in the broad jump; Bill Jenkins, who dethroned with Shaw for second in the high jump, and the 880-yard team of Manahan, Carl Hufford, Paul Huddle and Willie Clark, which finished second.

**Sandusky Second**  
Mansfield romped away with district laurels, amassing 91 points, thus ending the four-year district reign of Sandusky's Blue Streaks, who finished second with 52 1/2 points. Other schools figuring in the Class A scoring were: Bellevue 13 points, Norwalk 12, Ashland 11, Shelby 6 1/2, Tiffin Columbian 1.

Including Shaw's remarkable shot put performance, six records were shattered in the Class A competition, the other five being brought by Mansfield athletes. Johnny Linta vaulted 12 feet, 6 inches to establish a new mark. Rich Nagle tossed the discus 131 feet, 6 inches for a new standard. Joe Logan negotiated the 220 dash in 23.3 seconds to hang up a new record in this event, and the 880-yard and mile relay teams wrote new marks of 1:32 and 3:32.2, respectively into the record books.

Two of the record-breaking achievements bettered marks set in the district affair at Fremont last year in which Pete Zecherbrecher of Ross ran the 220 in 22.7 for a new record, and the Sandusky mile relay team registered a new standard of 3:32.9.

**On First Try**  
Shaw's 49-foot, 6-inch toss came on his first effort in the finals after he had failed to leave the iron pellet better than 47 feet in the morning preliminaries. It stamped him as the Little Giant's best bet in the state vic.

Manahan turned in his best leap of the year as he spanned 10 feet, 11 inches to take second in the broad jump. The Ross 880-yard relay quartet raced home in 1:35.3, two and a half seconds better than its previous time, to finish second in the record-breaking. In Mansfield's record-breaking team, Chestnutwood was given a tie for third with Thompson of Sandusky, in the 40 but it was apparent to most spectators, the Ross youngster finished ahead of the Blue Streaks. He was clocked in 32.8, only eight-hundredths of a second slower than the Ross school record of 32 flat held by Towner Smith.

**Close Behind**  
Ballard ran a surprisingly good half-mile to come in third in 2:05.6, bettering any time made by Ross in this event in the current season. Shaw was less than four yards behind the winner in the 120-yard high hurdles as he took third. Jenkins and Shaw cleared 5 feet, 5 inches to knot for second in the high jump.

Chestnutwood got away to a bad start in the century, finishing fifth in that event, while Clark, also of Ross, was sixth. Henry Sewell, Ross' high cross-country champ, and Burdette Klavetter failed to perform up to par in the mile, with the former finishing seventh and the latter 10th. Fremont's mile relay team of Gale Berger, Huddle, Hufford and Bud Goodwin, came in fourth in a field of four.

Fremont missed out in the discus as Bob Thomson, Harmon field record holder, failed to qualify and Shaw couldn't whirl the platter better than 118 feet. Chestnutwood and Clark, both tired by preliminaries and early competition in the finals, couldn't do better than fourth and fifth, respectively, in the 220.

They were there the day before—Charley Ruffing, Larry French, Schoolboy Rowe. And they'll be there again—Ves. Fernald, Willie Hudlin, Earl Whitehill, Charley Root and a handful of others. Most of them have been in the big show from 10 to 15 years and their names are as familiar in many households as that of the family dog or cat.

**First Start**  
Ole Diz, for instance, started a National league game Sunday for the first time this season and manufactured a stirring three-hit, four-out of the Boston Bees for the Chicago Cubs.

Lefty Grove, who came into the American league 15 years ago and still takes a turn once a week for the Boston Red Sox, bested Bridges in what was a hot pitching battle for five innings—until some of the younger Red Soxers cut loose for an 8-3 rout, which was Detroit's fifth straight setback.

Lyons, even more of a veteran inasmuch as he joined Chicago White Sox in 1923 after his graduation from Baylor, won a 10-inning 5-2 struggle from the Washington Senators.

**Hubbell Chased**
