# "Bunk" Ross New High School Coach

In selecting William (Bunk) Ross, former Fremont grid star, as athletic director and football coach for Fremont high school to succeed Charles A. Taylor, the Fremont board of education made a very good selection, and one that is bound to make a decided hit not only with the F. H. S. grid candidates themselves, but with the local fan army as well.

Bill Ross, quiet, unassuming and a steady, deliberate type of a young man, is well fitted for the position he has been chosen for. He is a native of Fremont and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Ross of Lakeside, O., former residents of Fremont. W. D. Ross, a son of W. W. Ross, former beloved head of Fremont public schools for many years, was at one time prin-

cipal of Fremont high school and in his day a noted athlete. The son follows the father closely in the athletic line, but as the parent shone in baseball, it remained for Billy the second to do the grid honors for the family and he sure has done his chores very well.

"Bunk," a name handed him by his boyhood associates in Fremont, was always keen for his football and he has the great honor and the distinction of being the captain of the greatest football team that ever represented the old purple and white of Fremont high.

This outfit broke into its full power in 1920 and its heavy tread still rumbles, while its prowess will never be forgotten and the

swath it cut through Little Big Seven fields will never be closed.

End for end and back for back, this outfit that continued such men as Harold Wendler, Bus Beasley, Townner Smith, "Doggie" Miller, Tim McCarthy, Amos Boyer, Thrun, Willie Gahn and others, as well as the new coach. Never was such a combination of student gridlers gotten together in this section of the country and their like may never be seen again here.

It was in the college of hard knocks on Herbrand field and actual playing experience that gave "Bunk" Ross his rudiments in the great college game. He learned his lessons well for "Silent Bill" became famous in song and story among the Fremont fans

and with the Garvins, Leshers, Heids, Christys, O'Farrells, Proctors, Baumanns, Stouts, Wendlers, Esleys, McCarthys and other greats, he took his position in Fremont high's hall of grid heroes.

He was a speedy, sea-going end that hit like a sack of stone and used his gray matter while in action.

An injured ankle hampered "Bunk's" grid career in college, but at that, despite his injury, he showed enough to make his letter and win a berth on the varsity. He is not only a gridder but he can also step out there on the track and show himself in the sprints and hurdles, and as for basketball, he's another bearcat.

The new coach is but 22 years

of age and still a very capable athlete. He has learned his athletic lessons well, too, and should be able to impart his great knowledge to others.

"Silent Bunk" may be another "Silent Gill" Dobie in action. Who knows but what his new position may be but a stepping stone to coaching heights. He has profited by his lessons at Fremont high and Wesleyan and Wisconsin universities, where he recently received his A. B. degree and, if trying means anything, he'll be out there comparing notes with Fielding Yost, A. A. Stagg, Knute Rockne, Doctor Wilce and "Gloomy Gus" Henderson one of these days.

# ROSS PICKS LINEUP FOR LIMA OPENER

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Light But Speedy Team to Face Big  
Lima Aggregation Next Saturday—  
Foos or "Bim" Stults For Quarter  
Position.

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Coach Bunk Ross of the local high school gridders has not yet determined who will be in the lineup for the opening game against Lima South in that city on Saturday of next week. It is almost certain, however, that the team will line up with Harold Fangboner at right end with his brother Bob at the other end position. Johnny McCarthy will be at left tackle and Ollie Zink will hold down the tackle position on the other side of the line Jackie Mallon and Tucker center.

In the back field, Stults or Foos will start at quarter with Hawk and Russell holding down the half positions, Lance or Bowers in the full back position will complete the lineup with the chances favoring Bowers as it is somewhat doubtful that Lance will be able to get into the fray owing to his injured ankle.

There are several likely looking candidates on the second team and it is possible that some of those mentioned for the first team may be displaced during the coming week. Hoffman may get into the game at one of the guard positions and it is also probable that Johnny Meincer will play and end position during part of the game.

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## FREMONT HIGH SET FOR LIMA

# PURPLE AND WHITE TEAM OFF TO LIMA

**Coach Ross and His Crew of Grid Workers Leave to Play First Game of the Season—Light and Speedy, They Expect to Give Lima South High a Good Battle.**

Bunk Ross loaded his grid warriors into machines early this morning and started them for Lima, where they tackle the South High squad this afternoon in the opening game of the season. Twenty-two men made the trip. Only a few fans accompanied them, as interest in the Lima game has not reached the enthusiastic stage.

As predicted some time ago, "Bim" Stults will start the game at the quarterback position, with Butch Bowers at fullback, Ken Hawk and George Russell will fill the halfback positions with a possibility of Tucker displacing one or the other of them. The line will be made up with Harold Fangboner or Al Foos as left end; Johnny McCarthy, left tackle; Bob Hoffman, left guard; Capt. "Hype" Siler, center; Jack Mallon, right guard; Ollie Zink, right tackle, and Bob Fangboner, right end.

The second string men who made the trip were Foos, Brown, Lance, Halbelsen, Soldineer, Hetrick, Baumann, Swedersky, Meincer, Holmes and Tucker.

Ross was not over enthusiastic for the chances of the team in the opening game, but was hoping for a good showing. If the field is wet, which is more than likely, the purple and white should have a better chance than on a fast, dry field, at least this would be indicated from the way the boys have been going in the practice sessions during the past week.



## NEVER GIVEN AN EVEN CHANCE IN THE BETTING; ROSS COACHED CREW SPRINGS GREAT SURPRISE

**Flashy Purple and White Outfit  
Runs Rings Around Heavy  
South High Team—Kenneth  
Hawk Game's Big Star—Lima  
Scores Via Forward Pass  
Route — Fremont Team is  
Praised.**

Putting up a battle that surprised local followers of the game the Fremont high gridlers defeated South High of Lima in the opening game of the season at Lima Saturday afternoon in a tussle that had the spectators on their feet throughout the afternoon. The final score being Fremont 7, Lima 6.

The Rossmen used straight old-fashioned football tactics, failing to attempt a forward pass during the afternoon while their opponents resorted to the aerial game on numerous occasions and scored their only touchdown with two successive passes in the final quarter which netted them sixty yards. This was the only time during the game when the local post was in danger.

Hawk scored the touchdown for Fremont after a fifty yard run through the entire Lima team and Stults kicked the goal which put the Purple and White on the long end of the score at the finish.

South High used a number of substitutes but the locals got by with only three changes, one of these coming when Harold Fangboner was forced to retire when his nose was broken; Al Foos took his place with Meincer later replacing Foos, Hoffman and Tucker divided the work at left guard the other players going through the entire game.

Work will be started this afternoon in preparation for the game with Marion which will pry the lid on the local field Saturday afternoon. Ross realizes that he will have a tough foe in the Marion team and the boys will have to step every afternoon during the week if they are to be in shape for the game.

# FREMONT DROPS GAME TO BIG, SEASONED FOE

Siler's Warriors Battle Against  
Great Odds on First Ap-  
pearance at Home

Outweighed by several pounds to the man and outplayed during the first half, the Purple and White of Fremont, went down to defeat before Harding high of Marion, Saturday afternoon by a score of 13 to 0.

That Marion had the better team was demonstrated before the teams were fairly started and, when Johnson passed 20 yards to Knight over the Fremont goal line for the first score after nine minutes of play, it looked as if the locals were to be scored on almost at will by their heavier opponents, and when McWhorter smashed through on a delayed buck for the one yard needed for the second touchdown, after one minute of play in the second quarter, it looked even more like a heavy scoring day for Marion.

From the time of the second touchdown Fremont managed to prevent further scoring by Harding but were saved on one occasion when, with the ball on the Fremont one-yard line, Marion was penalized 15 yards for holding.

The only real chance that the Purple and White had for getting the ball into Marion territory and for a possible score, came in the third quarter when Hoffman picked up the ball after McCarthy had blocked Cunningham's attempted kick, and ran 20 yards before he was stopped. The opportunity was lost on the next play when Hawk fumbled on a criss cross play and Miller recovered the ball for Harding on the Fremont 40 yard line.

There were two bright spots in the Fremont offense, the playing of Bowers and Lance, both of whom deserve special mention for their steady plugging fight. Hawk was handicapped by injuries and several of the others were playing on their nerve.

Coach Ross will give the men plenty of work throughout the week in preparation for the opening of the league season next Saturday when the locals clash with Norwalk at the fair grounds.

## Zink, Big Tackle, Shifted to Back Field—Meincer Sent Into Line Position

That Coach Ross is dissatisfied with the way things have been going with the Fremont high gridders is evident from the fact that the team was given a shaking up at Tuesday night's practice session that was a big surprise to the spectators and to the boys themselves.

Lance was shifted from fullback to one of the half positions, Ollie Zink was given the fullback job, and Johnny Meincer was sent into the line to replace Zink at right tackle. Russell was sent to the second team.

A man that can play an offensive tackle and defensive halfback is the problem that confronts Ross and Tuesday's changes were made with that idea in mind. If a man of this caliber can be developed it will make the Fremont team a dangerous one at all times and a source of trouble to the other members of the Little Big Seven league.

That the changes made Tuesday night are permanent Ross would not say, but that others are to follow unless the team shows the form which is expected by the coach is assured as Bunk is determined to put a winner on the field and none of the boys can feel assured of their positions.

The new lineup looked good in their first workout of the week, in fact they showed up better than at any time during the season and it is more than likely that the team will line up against Norwalk with the positions filled as indicated above.

# FREMONT SPEED CREW READY FOR LEAGUE ACTION

# "MAPLE CITY" VETERAN CREW TAKES VERDICT

## Errors of Judgment and Lack of Punch at Proper Moment Spell Defeat

With less than five minutes to go, Dimon, Norwalk's left halfback, and captain went through the Fremont line for two yards which were needed to put the ball over the goal line, securing the only points made in the opening game of the Little Big Seven league here Saturday.

For three quarters the Purple and White were able to keep the tie from crossing the goal line although they were not match for the attacks of the Norwalk backs who repeatedly plunged through the line or went around the ends.

A passing attack which had been perfected by the Hyon county griders had the Ross men bewildered and with the exception of the first quarter the locals were unable to stop Dimon, Gabel or the rest of the gang when carrying the ball.

A bit of poor generalship, or at least what looked like that from the sidelines, probably cost the locals a touchdown when with one yard to go for a first down inside the ten-yard line, a run was called for which resulted in a three-yard loss after which a drop kick failed. From that time on, Fremont was on the defensive the greater part of the time and when they did have possession of the ball they were unable to keep it for any length of time.

On several occasions Norwalk took the ball from mid-field to the shadow of the local goal posts, but with one exception the Ross men stopped them before the line was crossed.

The Norwalk team was the better team on Saturday, making twelve first downs to three for the Purple and White. Dimon and Gabel were the stars for the visitors while the prettiest play of the day was made by Bob Pangbener when he carried a pass by Hawk on his own 13 yard line and carried the ball back to the field before being downed. Hawk fumbled on the next play and whatever chance Fremont had of scoring was lost.

**First Quarter**

Hawk kicked off to Gabel, defending the north goal post, who ran the ball back 25 yards to his 20 yard line. Gabel went through Hoffman for two yards. Dimon made four through center. On an off tackle play, Dimon went ten yards for first down. Brown fumbled on the next play, but recovered the ball on his 25 yard line. Brown gained two yards on an off tackle play before being spilled by McCarthy. Mayberry punted, the ball going out of bounds on Fremont's 40 yard line.

On the first play, Hawk went around right end for nine yards. Zink tried a sneak but was stopped without a gain. Hawk attempted another end run but was thrown for a four yard loss. Hawk kicked 45 yards to Gabel who ran the ball back to his own 25 yard line. Dimon was stopped on an off tackle play. Dimon attempted to go through center and fumbled but recovered. Mayberry dropped back for a punt but fumbled and was downed in his tracks.

Hawk went around left end for three yards. Zink failed to go through center. Lane went through line for a five yard gain. Bowers made three around left end. Zink gained two through center. Stults replaced Bowers. Hawk was thrown for a three yard loss on an attempted end run. Stults attempted a drop kick, which was blocked by Chapin.

Dimon went through center for one yard. Gabel failed on the same play. Mayberry was called upon to punt and again fumbled and had to hurry the kick, the ball going to the side of the field and out of bounds on Norwalk's 20 yard line.

Lamb, who had replaced Sweet, stopped Hawk's attempted end run. Lane made three around left end before being stopped by Gabel. Stults attempted pass was grounded. Hawk kneaded to Zink for a 12 yard gain for a first down. Hawk was stopped on a try around right end as the quarter ended.

**Second Quarter**

Zink made two off left tackle on the first play of the second quarter. Hawk fumbled but recovered. Stults tried a drop kick, which went wide of the goal posts. Brown made five through left tackle. Brown again went through for two yards. On a fake punt Gabel went through center for one yard. Dimon went through center for two for a first down. Dimon went through center for eight yards. Brown made eight around left end. On an attempt to go through center, Miller stopped Brown, who gained a yard on the play. Gabel then sent a pretty pass to Lamb, which accounted for 25 yards. Gabel got a yard on an off tackle play. Dimon got two through the line. A lateral pass, Chapin to Miller, gained one yard. Another pass by Dimon gave Norwalk another first down. Gabel went through center for two, as did Dimon on the next play. Brown got a yard off left tackle. Gabel failed on an attempted pass and the ball went to Fremont on their 25 yard line.

Hawk made a half yard on an attempted end run. His interference holding him back. Hawk tried an end run but was thrown for a yard loss. On a sneak, Zink made three yards. Hawk on his five yard line, kicked to Gabel on the 40 yard line and he ran it back to 15. Bob Pangbener replaced Solitner.

Gabel's pass to Lamb was grounded. Siler stopped Gabel, who made only a yard on an attempted end run. Dimon made a beautiful pass to Gabel, which netted 25 yards as the half ended.

**Third Quarter**

Between halves the band marched out on the field and played a number of selections, while the girls of the school got on a snake dance. Led by Jemite Walters, white Coach Ross and Dick Sherwood took the team into the ground stand, where they were told of their shortcomings during the half.

and given instructions which were to be followed in the final half.

The second half opened with Dimon, Norwalk's left halfback, who ran the ball back five yards to his ten yard line, where he was downed by Bhumann. Hawk dropped back to his five yard line for a punt, but fumbled. He recovered the ball. On the next play Hawk kicked to Gabel on his 45 yard line, where he was dropped in his tracks by Bob Pangbener.

Dimon made a yard through right guard. Gabel made seven yards around left end. Gabel tore off four more through center before Mallon brought him down. Brown went through right guard for four. Shurmer went through center for five. Dimon lost a yard on an attempt to go through the line. Gabel pushed Bowers aside for a four yard gain. Dimon lost a yard and Brown gained four through center. Dimon got through the line for two. Gabel tried second run but made only one yard. Zink stopped Dimon on Fremont's five yard line.

On the first play Hawk kicked to Gabel, who fumbled and was downed by Harold Pangbener on the 10 yard line. Sweet, who had replaced Mayberry, was thrown for a four yard loss by McCarthy. Dimon's attempt to pass to Lamb was grounded. A pass to Gabel, who was good for 20 yards and the ball was on Fremont's 35 yard line. Dimon tried another pass, which was grounded. Gabel went off right tackle for four yards. Gabel attempted a pass to Shurmer, which was grounded. Dimon tried a kick from placement, Hawk getting the ball and carrying it back three yards as the quarter ended.

**Final**

At the start of the final quarter Bowers replaced Stults. On an attempted end run, Hawk was thrown for an eight yard loss. On the next play, Hawk passed to Bob Pangbener, who made a beautiful catch. The play netted 17 yards. Hawk then went through center for eight yards, but dropped the ball as he was downed and it was recovered by Lamb.

Shurmer went through center for three yards and Gabel got one on an end run. Dimon passed to Lamb but the play was incomplete. With five yards to go on fourth down, Dimon kicked 25 yards to Hawk, who was dropped almost immediately by Shurmer.

Lane tried an end run which netted only a yard. Hawk kicked 25 yards to Gabel, who ran back 12 yards before being brought down. Dimon tried another pass, which failed. Gabel passed to Lamb for a six yard gain. Dimon's pass to Gabel again failed and Brown was sent around left end for three yards. Shurmer went through center for a first down. Gabel tore off 4 yards around right end. Norwalk was penalized 15 yards for holding, placing the ball on Fremont's 25 yard line. On the next play, with 21 yards to go on the third down, Dimon went through left tackle for five yards, then came the really decisive play of the game when Dimon went through center for eight yards. The ball 25 yards to Fremont's eight yard line. Dimon was thrown by McCarthy for a half-yard loss. Gabel went around left end for three yards. Shurmer went through the line for three and Dimon made the remaining distance for the touchdown. Brown failed to kick goal. Score, Norwalk 6, Fremont 0.

With three minutes to play, Dimon kicked off to Hawk, who fumbled, but recovered the ball back of his own goal line and ran it out to his right yard line. Hawk again fumbled and Bowers recovered, the play resulting in a four yard loss. Hawk kicked 20 yards to Gabel.

Dimon went through center for two yards. Poon replaced Bob Pangbener. Gabel made two on an end run and Dimon went through the line for six. Brown got a yard on an off tackle play and Gabel got four on the same kind of a play. Brown plunged through the line for two. On the next

play Dimon tried a kick from placement which failed. Bowers getting the ball and returning it to the 12 yard line. Bowers made a beautiful pass to Hawk for 26 yards and then the whistle blew, ending the game.

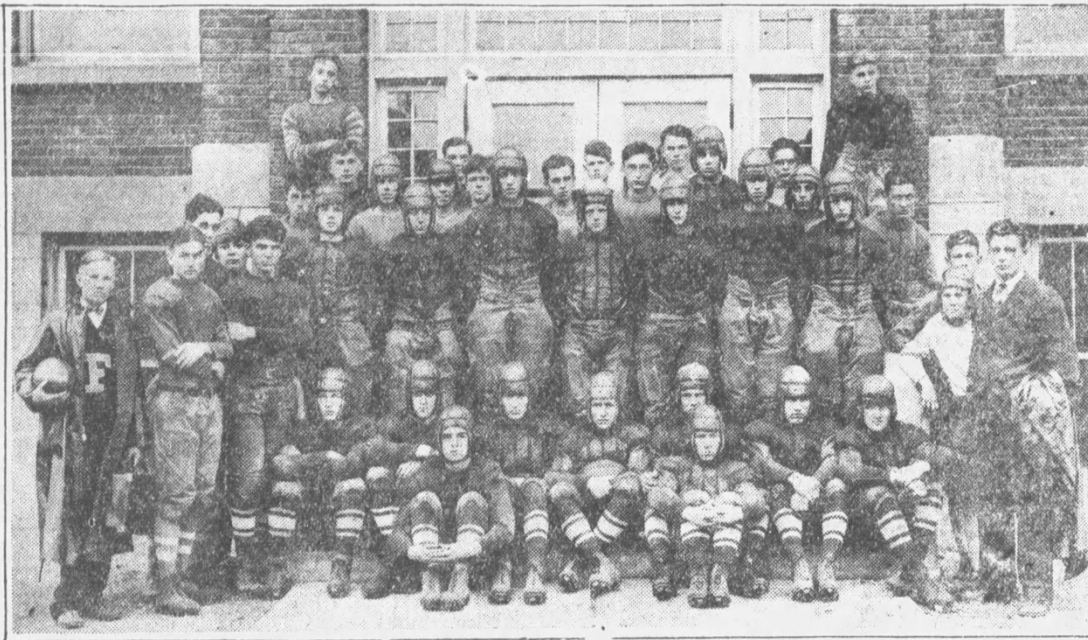

It was Lorain's sixth consecutive victory of the season and fourth in as many starts in the Little Big Seven league.

Incidentally the win kept the Laverder and White warriors at the top of the standings of the northern Ohio circuit. In only one of the four periods of play Saturday was Lorain's superiority over Fremont questioned. That was the second quarter when Coach McCaskey's eleven was held scoreless by the invaders.

Fremont was outclassed from the start, but it fought valiantly. Never once did the spirit of the visitors give. Led by their star halfback, Ken Hawk, they battled the Lorain horde the best they could, but it was a losing fight.

Play of both teams was hampered by the steady rain which continued to fall throughout the contest. The field was a quagmire and players were hardly distinguishable from the stands as the result of mud and water.

While Lorain put up one of its best games of the season, it got the breaks frequently, which twice aided the local eleven to score.

The McCaskeymen failed a few minutes after the start of the contest. Rogers, Lorain center, recovered a Fremont fumble on the visitors' 15 yard line. A series of line plays worked the oval to the two yard mark, from where Strick carried it over for the first points of the game. Stewart kicked goal.

A little later in the opening period, Hawk kicked to Lorain on Fremont's 45 yard line. Quarterback Martin and his Lorain backs dashed off tackle and around the ends, taking the pigskin to the one yard line, where they lost it on downs. One of Lorain's gains was an 18 yard dash by Martin.

Aided by a strong northeast wind, Hawk outpanted Martin in the second quarter, which turned out to be a kicking duel with Fremont having the edge. Martin kicked from behind his own goal to Lorain's 26 yard mark, as the half ended.

Coach McCaskey inserted a brand new backfield in the third period, using Ubeloy, a coming star, at quarter; Phillips and Proctor at half and O'Toole, full. This combination rippled the Fremont line to shreds with O'Toole's line plunging featuring.

Lorain took possession of the oval in midfield near the close of the session. With Phillips and O'Toole leading the way, the locals marched the ball to the Fremont 22 yard line. Here Ubeloy, who seems as a future grid luminary, took the pigskin and dashed off tackle, evading several would-be tacklers for a touchdown.

It was one of the best runs of the game. Stewart ran the Lorain total up to 20 by kicking goal.

Stewart attempted a goal from the field early in the fourth quarter from the 14 yard mark but failed. A forward pass, O'Toole to Stewart, resulted in the last points of the game. Stewart scoring on a 15 yard run after receiving a pass good for ten yards.

With a few minutes of play remaining, Lorain threatened the Fremont goal again, rushing the pigskin to the visitors five yard mark, only to fumble.

Fremont never once threatened to score. The invaders' lone first down of the game came in the last quarter, when Hawk gained 11 yards around the end. In addition to its four touchdowns, Lorain accounted for 14 first downs.

Hawk featured for Fremont both on the offense and the defense. In backing up the line. His return of the Lorain kickoff for 25 yards at the start of the game, was the best game made by the visiting team.

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## "BUNK'S" GANG WILL ENTER SANDUSKY GO WITH INTACT BATTLE FRONT AND MUCH PEP

Coach Bunk Ross of the Purple and White grid squad, announced Thursday that there will be no changes of importance in the lineup of the team when they take the field for the game with Sandusky Saturday afternoon at the fair grounds; the only change being the replacing of Hoffman by Joe Holmes. Holmes goes into the game at left guard, owing to the fact that he is heavier than "Sugar Foot" and Ross feels that the added weight will be a help in the Saturday battle.

Aside from the above change the team will line up as it did in the Lorain game, unless injuries sustained by Jackie Mallon in Wednesday night's scrimmage, make it necessary to keep him out of the lineup. In case Mallon is unable to play, McCarthy will go to the left guard position, Johnny Meiner will play Mack's tackle and Holmes will go to right guard. This change is hardly probable as Mallon says he will be in there when the whistle blows.

Harold Fangboner will get into Saturday's fray for Zink before the battle is finished, and Siler will probably replace Soldineer before the game is over.

When the second half opened Schaefer kicked off to Hawk on his 10 yard line and he ran it back 30 yards before being downed. In Sandusky Sunday, there was much comment, most of which was directed at Coach Jim Moore, and already the fans have started a movement to have him replaced before the opening of the next season. Many Sanduskians are of the opinion that it will be some time before they have as good a team as they had this year and the blame for their poor showing is being placed on the shoulders of the coach, so it is said.

## "RED" GRANGE'S ONE DAY'S LABOR

Philadelphia, Nov. 2.—Red Grange was fully 50 per cent of the Illinois attacking force against Pennsylvania Saturday, statistics of the game reveal.

The famous star carried the ball 32 times and piled up an amazing aggregate gain of 366 yards, whereas the entire Illinois advance amounted for only a little more than 400 yards. Grange covered 331 yards by skirting the ends or running back kicks, besides adding 35 yards more on two passes.

All told, Illinois made 17 first downs as compared with four for Pennsylvania. The westerners completed 120 out of five passes attempted, while Penn completed nine out of twenty, but most of the Quaker aerials were for short and ineffective gains, while two failed to net an inch. Illinois won 24 to 2, Grange making three of his team's four touchdowns.

Large Number on the "Honorable Mention" List—Heroes of Old Mingle With Modern Grid Knights on Mythical Outfit—Open for Suggestions

## MEMORIES

Turn backward! Turn backward! Oh, time in your flight,  
Let them all play again, here in my sight.

There was "Rinky," and "Duck," "Old Boney" and "Peck,"  
All playing the ball game way up to their neck.

I see "Shocky" and "Monk," "Babe" and "Big Fat,"  
Rushing 'em cockeyed and laying 'em flat.

There was "Butch," "Terry," "Dusty," and speedy "Old Hump,"  
Taking their naps on the lumpy hump.

Come on, Mr. Time, let the old gang parade,  
I'm picking a grid team, please come to my aid.

Many times during the past I have been asked to pick an all-time all-star Fremont high school football team, and just about as many times have I refused to shoulder this tremendous task which involves deep research into the dusty halls of memory and not a bit of digging about into the files of long ago.

Fremont high has had a football team since way back—I believe in 1896—and since that time, 29 years ago, some mighty great stars have come, flashed across the horizon, to lapse back into the channels of oblivion. Taking 11 men for a team, naturally, and giving it the 29 times over, just exactly 319 units are accounted for. Giving each team a few substitutes and making the varsity squad in each case no less than 15, mighty few for modern times, the number would be 485. Some group of hokies, you'll say yes.

Now, pity the fellow who is called upon to select from this outfit three teams that can be classed as the ace, king and queen teams of Fremont high school history, this season included, of course.

It is a difficult task, but I'm going to take a desperate chance. I surely know that I will not be able to please everybody. You all gotten names among the old-time fans.

My selections are open to criticism from all, and gladly will I listen to suggestions so that in time we, working together, may be able to pick the real, sure, bonafide all-time all-star Fremont high school team from the great old school that has sent many a good man to the front where he has earned fame and glory on hard fought fields in the east, west, south and the north.

Now Then All  
Having at least 29 years experience as a sport writer in and about this community, I have taken notes, and perhaps written reports on more F. H. S. athletics than any other writer in Fremont. This isn't a bit of mere blowing on my part. It is a fact. I have seen every high school team of the 29 play, too, and can remember vividly the first game of high school football here between the old purple and white originals and a team from Newark. It was played on the old fair grounds and Fremont led, and Johnny Garvin Fremont's first quarter back was the hero of the game.

This isn't written to let the world listen to the tale of a dried up old timer, who limps about on a crutch, either. They asked me to pick a team out of the big group of stars and here I come, as the immortal "Red" Grange is wont to say in times of excitement.

## 100 Strong

The three teams I am about to select are taken from a group of players selected out of nearly every team that played in the long roll call of games. They come from the days when three downs called for five yards and the pile were so high that one of those new fangled wedding cakes with its dozens of layers looked like a piece of rag carpet it is so flat in comparison.

They come from the semi-modern and the modern times, some of them great and some of them small, but, never-the-less, all of them heroes of the old purple and white.

I have looked back in my chair in a darkened room, while the flickers of fire raved with the shadows across an open grate. Here I have allowed my mind's eye to wander back and forth and in there, in that restless, ceaseless twitching, biting flames, I have gleaned my men for these three mythical teams.

At least 7 of the men selected in the big squad the very presence of which would make Yost, Zuppke, Jones, Stagg and Deke dance with glee, have heard time out and have faced the great referee. The facts of the matter are three of the men I pick for the first team have passed on and out, but they leave memories behind that will live as long as high school football endures.

You must remember that I have taken into consideration the change of rules and conditions. But, he if it may and so much for that, I'll stand hitched on my outfit and here goes:

## Backs

For my wing men on the first team I pick CHARLIE (BONEY) LEATHER and WILLARD PUNCH. The first named has been dead for several years, being killed in an accident, but his ability as a football player earns him a position on this mythical eleven. "Boney" was a smooth going machine. He didn't appear to be cutting fast, but he was and what a defensive man he proved to be. Leather was big and strong, had a great pair of hooks and would have been a star pass snuffer. He wins a berth. Leather after his academic days, played end on the famous Fremont Creagets and no man lives who can say that he ever shoved "Boney" around any.

Willard Punch, what a name to reckon with in Fremont high athletics. Not such a sensation in his high school days, but, at University of Michigan, a wizard on the wings and brought fame and glory to himself in huge goals.
