


Next Thursday at 8 p. m., there will be a dress rehearsal at Harmon when players will be in game togs, brought out onto the field and introduced, then a series of runoffs of plays will be held for those in attendance. Ross Boosters club members will assist and music will be furnished by the school band. Neil Berlekamp is in charge of the pep rally for the Boosters.

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Braves Capture Comeback Victory Over Dodgers, 8-7

Milwaukeeans Hold Shaky First Place Grip Again In National

Milwaukee Braves call it "the biggest one yet."

The Brooklyn Dodgers kiss it off with a "so what?" They both could be right about that humdrum of a comeback 8-7 victory the Braves grabbed from the Dodgers at Ebbets Field Wednesday, regaining undisputed possession of first place in the National League race.

Whether or not they were punchy from pennant pressure, the victory definitely was "the biggest one yet" for the Braves. It had to pick them up, relax some of the tension as they move into Philadelphia for a two-night doubleheader tonight against the Phillies—only club in the league with an edge (8-10) over the Braves.

If any club was hurt by the decision, it was Cincinnati. The third-place Redlegs fell three games behind while being held to just three singles by Johnny Antonelli in an 8-0 loss to the New York Giants.

The Chicago Cubs defeated Pittsburgh 3-0 in the only other NL game scheduled.

The New York Yankees and the Kansas City Athletics, walloping three between them, erased the home run record set in 1950 at 973 as the A's beat the league leaders 7-4.

Boston took third place from Chicago, defeating the White Sox 4-1. Detroit made it six in a row, beating Washington 3-2.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Early Wynn hit a home run to beat the Baltimore Orioles 2-1 Wednesday night—the second game in a row won on a homer by a Cleveland Indians pitcher.

Bob Lemon drove in the deciding runs with a homer Tuesday night.

It was Wynn's first homer of the year, and there were some other firsts in the game:

Vic Wertz hit his 28th homer of the season—the first time he's ever hit that many.

The crowd numbered 4,738, the first time it has been that low for a night game in Cleveland.

Ross Outplays Cuyahoga Falls, 38-7;

Little Giants Outrun, Outpass Tigers In One-Sided Tilt On Harmon Gridiron

Using a well-mixed portion of long runs and looping pass plays, Ross high's Little Giants opened the 1956 grid season Friday night at Harmon field with a 38-7 victory over Cuyahoga Falls. Six touchdowns were netted by the Purple and White over the first three periods while the Black Tigers used a pass play with just seven minutes left in the fourth period to score its lone touchdown.

Before approximately 3,500 fans in the stadium, the Little Giants cracked the scoring column in the first eight minutes of the opening period when Left Halfback Jim Tiller went around right end to score on a 13 yard run. Tiller also scored on a 45 yard run in the second period, coming back later to snare a pass from Beebe Schneider, working at quarterback, and carry over for a play that netted 49 yards in all. In the third period, Tiller broke over right guard, changed his field, and went along the left end for 42 yards and his fourth touchdown.

Bill Smiley, back in the Fremont ball yard after a stint last fall in upstate New York, scored after 10 seconds of the second

by Smiley in the first play of the second period.

Fast Exchange

With the score 6-0 going into the second quarter, Ross and Cuyahoga Falls rolled out two fast exchanges. The Little Giants scoring 13 points with a minute and a half gone. Smiley's 18 yard run and the 45 yard huster of Tiller's bagged the markers.

With minutes running out, Schneider's pass to Tiller was unhealed, good for 49 yards all told, and Ross went into the dressing room with a 25-0 halftime advantage.

Three first downs by Falls, (one gained on an interference charge on a pass play and good for 16 yards) proved to be the visitor's punch for that session.

Beckman, Ron Lyons, and Bob Hall picked up the first down. Two minutes and 10 seconds of the third period were gone when Ross got Tiller through center and down the left side of the field for his 42 yard run, and the fifth touchdown in a game that marks the 60th year of football in Fremont.

Schneider and Bob Hellemann ground out additional first downs later, with Schneider getting his on a 15 yard streak and Hellemann going seven yards to the Falls' six. At this point Schneider unraveled his second touchdown aerial, this one to Smiley and the goal was crossed again.

Smiley's final point after touch-down attempt, the fifth try, included one that was booted but an offside play nullified the attempt, was good and Ross had the 30-8 bulge at that point.

A Ron Shaw pass to Jim Barton netted a fourth quarter first down.

Reserves' Action

Reserves rolled freely from the Ross bench in the third period and during their crack at Falls, the visitors picked off four first downs all told, three on passing plays, one on a ground gainer of 19 yards picked up by Cyrill, who quarter-backed the squad.

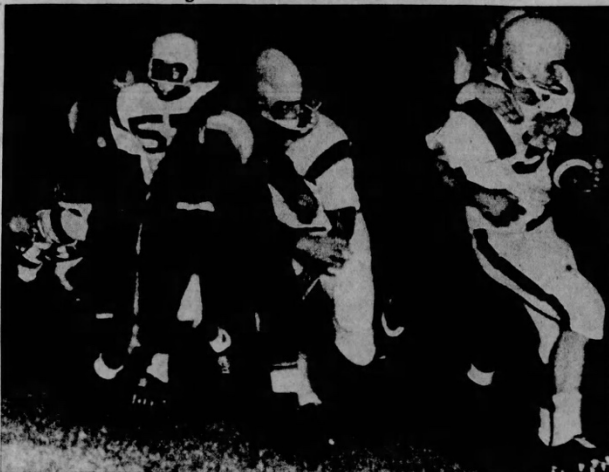
The aerial attack scouted by Ross in the Falls' preview last weekend worked effectively in the final period as first-downs were gained on pass plays good for 11, 10, and 18 yards. The final pass, netting 11 yards went from Cyrill to Beckman and to TD territory. Michael Gregory scored the PAT and that was the ball game: Ross 38 — Cuyahoga Falls, 7. Schneider and Wes Glover were game captains for Ross.

Milwaukee Loses, Dodgers Grab Win

The Milwaukee Braves, reduced to a one game lead once again in the hectic National League pennant race, had themselves a real worry today. In this slump by right-handers Bob Buhl and Lew Burdette just one of those things or is it serious?

They can't hope to win the pennant without the help of that pair, yet Buhl, a 17-game winner, has failed to finish his last three starts and has lost 'em all. And Burdette, with 18 victories and seven shutouts, was battered out for the second consecutive time Friday night as the Philadelphia Phillies maltreated the leaders 13-1.

The Milwaukee loss, coupled with Brooklyn's 4-2 victory over last place Chicago, left the one-two club even in games lost.

The fourth place St. Louis Cardinals, who had won six in a row, lost to New York's Giants 3-0. Cincinnati, in third place, was idle.

In the American League, the New York Yankees, with Yogi Berra setting a record for career home runs by a catcher, snapped Detroit's winning streak at seven 5-1. That reduced the Yankees' "magic number" for clinching the pennant to three as second place Cleveland lost to Boston 4-3 after winning the first game of their two-night doubleheader 10-2.

The Chicago White Sox, a half-game shy of Cleveland, defeated Baltimore 3-2 in 11 innings. Washington defeated Kansas City 4-1.

man crew which opened against Cuyahoga Falls last Friday.

Coach Fred George's Blue and Gold Latin eleven, according to the pre-game look into statistics, should be sporting a heavier line averaging about four pounds more from end to end than the Little Giant squad.

Cathedral Latin Loses To Ross, 19-13

Tiller Registers All Three TDs On 56, 67 And Two Yd. Runs

First Period Goal Line Stand By Little Giants Proves Turning Point; Schneider Suffers Shoulder Separation, Leaves In Third Period

Left halfback Jim Tiller's third touchdown of the night, scored on a 67 yard run with 1:10 minutes of the fourth period elapsed, set up Ross high school's second straight victory in two outings as the Little Giants turned back a stubborn and hard-charging Cleveland Cathedral Latin squad, 19-13, on Harmon field Friday.

The game was in no manner the scoring carnival in favor of Ross as was the opener last week when Cuyahoga Falls fell 38-7. Last night it was a determined bid by Ross' entire crew that made the victory.

Score Summary

Scoring in a nutshell: With 3:16 minutes of the second period gone Tiller went 56 yards for the TD and Bill Smiley booted the first conversion and Ross went out from 7-0. Also in the second quarter Tiller made his second TD with a two yard carry around right end. Smiley missing the boot for conversion.

On the kickoff return immediately after Ross' score Ols Drayton, the athlete who ran fourth to Tiller in the state track finals of the 100 yard dash, took the oval on the 22 of Latin and went

the distance of 78 yards for the six points. Jim Goodrich ran the ball over for the point.

At the end of the third period Goodrich bolted one yard for a Latin score and after his PAT boot attempt failed Latin drew up to the 13-13 tie game.

Two plays in the fourth period Tiller swept left end, eluded tacklers with shifty maneuvers, then flashed 67 yards for the final and winning touchdown. Tiller received a cut on the head in the final period but returned to the game after a bandage was applied.

Schneider Hurt

Burdette (Beebe) Schneider left the game on the fourth play of the third period. Reports from the dressing room following the game point out that he suffered a shoulder separation and it's not known how long his injury will keep him out of action at this point. The Ross quarterback had carried for seven yards and a first down when he was injured on the east side of the field.

The game was played through a slow rain that kept the fans, numbering approximately 3,300 under protective wraps throughout.

Close competition on the turf down front, however, kept fans thinking about the game at hand, and their thoughts were aside from the rain for the most part.

Latin was the dominant factor of the opening quarter as Coach Fred George's crew rolled out three first downs from scrimmage to one for the Giants of Coach Mal Mackey.

Goal Line Stand

ROSS INJURIES

Dr. E. C. Swint, Ross' team physician, said Saturday morning that Beebe Schneider's shoulder separation will be given rest until at least Wednesday of next week and it is possible that he will not be in the Fostoria game next Friday here. Jim Tiller had two stitches taken in the cut on his head.

picked up seven for a first down but left the game with his injury. Tiller carried for 15 on one haul and 13 yards two plays later for the other two first downs picked off that period.

A Ross fumble was recovered by Latin and they set out at mid-field to climax the march with Goodrich's one yard plunge and the second TD. Two passes from John Cook, quarterback, to Goodrich, for 12 yards and another for 11 yards to Roger Stringer kept the Latin's aerial game a sharp threat.

Outside of Tiller's run in the final period which went the 67 yards, Ross gained no first downs as a 15 yard holding penalty was more than the 13 yards Tiller got midway in the period to merit a first down that trip.

Jack Parish didn't work out Wednesday, favoring a bout with the flu but Mackey figured him to be ready for Elyria.

Working on a split T offense, Barton, who is in his second year as Pioneer coach, will have a veteran crew on hand.

Jack Bolinski, at quarterback, has tossed 36 passes to date, completed 19 for 311 yards. Left halfback Jack Machock, a senior, is co-captain and has scored eight times. Bill Brown, senior right half, has scored two TDs to date. Bill Mrukowski, the only non-letterman of the backfield, has 162 points of drive from the fullback slot.

Brown has a ground-gaining average of 8.3 yards net to lead the Pioneers. Chuck Stiles, listed as understudy to Brown, has a 6.1 yards. Machock averages 6.0 on 67 carries and 401 yards.

Bolinski, a junior, has been doing the point from placement work and has eight good boots in eight tries.

Doubtful Starter Zig Palagyi, a senior guard, has been out the past three games with an injury, and his appearance as a starter Friday is still listed as doubtful.

Ted Gottfried, big 6-4 end weighing an even 200 pounds, is the pass-receiving threat. He's gathered in nine for 183 yards, while his running mate at the other end of the line has five completions for 86 yards.

Dick Novak, substitute quarterback, has been doing the punting, holding a 31.6 yard average at the present.

Summing up, the Pioneer squad of 39 stalwarts, with 12 lettermen in the ranks, are gearing machinery to shoot for the "spillers" role in the coming meeting, the team that is working toward knocking off the pace-setters.

Friday night will be proof of that pudding, and there is a determined lot of Little Giant players who will have plenty of say-so in the matter.

Little Giants, Coaches Gain Victory For Coach Mackey

Chalk up that big victory that the Little Giants of Ross wanted to win for Coach Mal Mackey for, the all-important conquest was annexed Friday night at Harmon field when Ross downed Lorain 14-13 in a Buckeye Conference thriller played before slightly over 7,000 spectators.

Two touchdowns scored by Left Half Jim Tiller and the crucial points kicked by Right Halfback Bill Smiley brought home the 14 points needed to keep Ross rolling along a perfect season with seven victories making it 17 straight since the beginning of the 1955 season.

Defensively, you can credit a hard-charging squad of Little Giants for holding the determined Steelers to a point where they uncorked plenty over the evening, but not quite enough to stymie the Little Giants.

The night was rainy at the start, the field and oval slippery, and subsequent fumbles will be debated. But in the main, the win under capable direction of Coach Bob Seale was Ross' and that is the important thing.

The win was the fourth in league play for Ross and gives them at least a share of the title with only Marion Harding standing in the way of their second successive bid for the title. Lorain, on the other hand, has three wins and one loss now. Marion has a 2-1 record and still is in the running, for an outside chance share of the title with Lorain.

The game opened on a damp note from the rains of the afternoon, The slight showers continued through the first part of an opening period. A slippery oval, some tense players, and the fans found their share of thrills in fumbles. Ross lost four, Lorain two. And interspersed throughout the game was a fair share of fumbles that each team recovered to stay out of trouble.

Scoring Review
Looking over that scoring now, the teams battled to a 0-0 count at the end of the first period. However, Ross scored first as Quarterback Beebe Schneider, engineering his steady brand of work in the slot, fired three rapid passes, for 11, 20 and the final was for 46 yards to Tiller, who scampered into the end zone after he got it on the Lorain 14.

Bill Smiley, who has eight straight PAT boots going now (starting with the last TD against Sandusky and five in the Elyria game) booted his first important button. Ross lead 7-0. Three minutes, 50 seconds of the second period remained at the score.

Third period saw Lorain tie the score with a five yard carry of Steve Mikola for the TD and George Belu booted the point with a 7-10 left on the clock.

Then came the Lorain kickoff which Tiller caught on the right and started a southern course just about straight down the center of the field and into the Lorain end zone and the Little Giants had the big TD that counted. Tiller's 92 yard carry was his longest of the season and the first kickoff return that made the opposition wish that he hadn't received it.

Smiley booted the point, and with 7:25 left, (just 15 seconds after Lorain had tallied to tie it) Ross broke out on top again. Bill Smiley, who has eight straight PAT boots going now (starting with the last TD against Sandusky and five in the Elyria game) booted his first important button. Ross lead 14-7. And Homecoming fans were getting worked out the throat muscles, or whatever is used to make noises, loud noises.

Costly Fumble
Lorain was not to be denied, however. Although Ross held them well in the third period, one of the costly Little Giant fumbles set up the final Lorain TD on the Ross 10 yard line after Mikola had gobbled up the errant oval in recovery. Three plays later, when the ball rested on the line after Lorain got a first down on a penalty, Jim Foley cracked the center for the yardage and was in the end zone.

Belu again was called for the point from placement. The ball was wide to the right of the uprights and Ross clung to the slim 14-13 lead that held.

Ross Boosters who were present Tuesday at the meeting heard Eddie Jones Toledo Blade sports writer predict a Ross win with his cryptic "one point is enough, isn't it?" And, by golly, it was.

Ground gaining was at a premium last night. Ross, for example, who had ground out 336 yards rushing in the Findlay game on dry turf (Tiller getting 161 alone to lead) was held to 121 yards rushing against the Steelers, with Tiller leading with 53 yards. It was a slippery night, indeed. Lorain gained 132 yards rushing with Paul Raeder's 59 yards the tops.

Mikola bobbled and John Level (who, incidentally, spilled Jay Hershey for two very neat losses) when the Steelers failed to pass and was spilled for a minus 14 the first time, minus eight the second trip) recovered the ball for Ross.

Bob Heileman and Tiller picked off the only first downs that period on runs of two and 13 yards respectively. Lorain went down to the Ross 12 later when a fumble was scooped up Jim Haley and Ross got out of trouble. The quarter ended just after Pat Shanahan intercepted a Steeler aerial on the Fremont 25.

Lorain Excitement
Second period saw Level drop back to punt, fumble the oval, pick it up, then go 24 yards for a first down. A Ross fumble, however, lost the ball for the Purple and White. Big excitement for Lorain in the second period was the aerial from Foley to Belu for 25 yards to the Fremont five. Two plays later a 15 yard penalty against Lorain got Ross out of a jam.

Clarence Glover caught a pass from Tiller on one of the latter's option plays, either run or pass. He passed, Glover, however, was out of the end zone. Tiller also got back into the end zone for a pass, but didn't get it.

After Ross scored its first TD Raeder got off on a bolt for 36 yards and it looked like a TD in the making. Tiller caught up with Raeder, dropping him on the middle line.

In the third period, Lorain dominated the play, getting four first downs to none for Ross. Aerials to Belu and Dick Pesti for 13 and 10 yards netted two in the crowd-pleasing. If you happened to be a Lorain fan.

Tiller took a punt in the end zone in the fourth period and did some fancy stepping, enough to get back out to the 16 as Lorain forces closed in, but on the first play, Ross fumbled. Lorain recovered and started on the final TD drive that closed the gap to 14-13.

Level and Schneider got fourth period first downs on four and two yard pokes at the line, the last by Schneider carrying Ross to the Lorain 18. As the clock ran out of minutes in the game, Tiller poked up center to the Lorain 10 and that was the windup play of the evening.

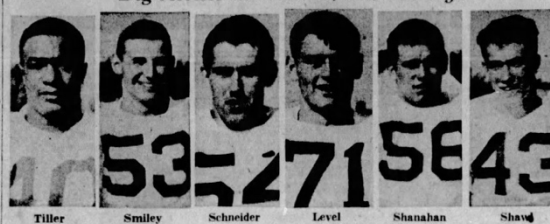

Speedy Halfback Has 26 TDs; Marshall Becomes 9th Victim

Quarterback Beebe Schneider Bags Three Touchdowns In Scoring Carnival At Harmon

Scoring five touchdowns Friday night at Harmon field in the 52-6 football trouncing that Ross high handed Cleveland John Marshall, Left Halfback Jim Tiller ran his season's total to 26, thereby setting a new school record for a season.

Tiller's total eclipses the mark of 22 set in 1951 by John (Big Thunder) Lewis, who later went on to star for Michigan State University.

The Victory for Ross was the 19th straight and the ninth this season with only Toledo Scott remaining next Friday at Harmon. Quarterback Beebe Schneider scored the other three Ross TDs and Bill Smiley added four points from placement. Approximately 4,000 fans were in the stands to watch the free-scoring game.

Scoring started with 4:45 seconds gone in the first period as Schneider broke over left guard changed his field and bolted down the right side for 52 yards and the opening TD in the long parade to the Marshall end zone. Smiley booted the first PAT with Pat Shanahan holding, and Ross took the TD lead.

Tiller's first TD came with 1:15 left in the first period when he caught a pass from Schneider, play covering 10 yards. Smiley's boot was wide and Ross led 13-0.

Schneider recovered a Marshall fumble on the Fremont 47 on third down for Coach Hal Smith's crew. First play out, Tiller bolted 53 yards for a TD with Clarence Glover throwing an important block to clear the only threat in Tiller's path. Smiley's kick was good, but a holding penalty nullified it. Smiley poked for another kick, but passed, intended for Ken Stull. It was over the receiver's head and no good. Ross led 19-0.

Tiller took the ball on his own five with 4:05 left in the third period and raced in fancy-stepping fashion the 53 yards to his 24th TD of the season and Ross' fourth for the night. Smiley made the kick good and Ross led 26-0.

With 21 seconds left Marshall scored its only TD when Fred Loeffler went for a two yard plunge and the score Duane Bernard missed the point try from placement and the teams entered the half with Ross leading 26-6.

Rifle-like scoring featured Ross in the third period as Schneider took the opening kickoff on his 25 and ripped up center for 75 yards and the TD, much to the continued enjoyment of Ross fans who were seeing a good show of long runs. Smiley booted the point and Ross had the 33-6 lead.

Tiller's turn next in the TD parade... this time he went 63 yards with 6:30 gone in the third period and with Smiley's kick splitting the uprights, Ross led 40-6.

Stull recovered a Marshall fumble on the Fremont 39 and Ross started TD yard again. With 1:45 left in the third period, Tiller went 16 yards for the six points; Smiley missed the kick and it was 46-6, Ross.

Scoring Ends
Schneider, who opened Ross scoring, also ended it with 3:10 minutes gone in the final period. He intercepted a Marshall aerial on their 47 and lumbered 53 yards for the score. The kick was no good. And things came to a halt in the scoring carnival with Ross holding the big 52-6 bulge. The total was just one point short of Ross' highest scoring game in 1956, when the Little Giants handed Findlay in 33-6 style.

The victory was the third first Assistant Coach Bob Seale and his aides have registered since Head Coach Hal Mackey was sidelined at the half of the Ross-Elyria victory.

Despite the top-heavy scoring, Ross reserves worked into the game beginning at the third period and the bench was cleared with all players who were suited up seeing action.

Ross went out to a new yardage gained from rushing total. They picked off 466 yards, an increase from the 396 yards of the Findlay game. Tiller went for

263 yards, bettering his mark of 161 against Findlay. Schneider picked off 119 yards last night from scrimmage and John Level, who showed well on the offense defense, too, churned up 77 yards, with a 42 yard haul his best effort which was a crowd pleaser.

Interpersed with the TDs, Ross had two pass interceptions, both gathered in by Schneider, with one going for the TD. Six fumbles by Marshall paved the way for four Ross recoveries with Schneider, Larry Longanbach, Stull and Shanahan grabbing the errant oval.

Ross had to punt only one time, with Level getting one for 22 yards in the fourth period.

During the second period Ross had only four plays from scrimmage, but two were Tiller tid-bits, one going for his 33 yard TD sprint, the other for the 95 yard run. Marshall got seven first downs to Ross' one in the second quarter, but five of the first downs were chipping off middle-of-the-field yardage and not too much trouble developed.

Tiller only carried 10 times, but his 26 plus average yardage will bulge his year's total when the week's statistics are tallied. Meanwhile, the workhorse of Marshall was Loeffler, who averaged a little over three yards per carry on 28 hauls and his 107 yards gained.

Ross was not a passing team last night, trying six and making good on one for 10 yards and the first period TD. But in the second period the yardage on the ground, the Purple and White rolled like tanks up the center and around the ends.

In Level's third period carry for 42 yards to the Marshall 16, only Bernard was in the way of him and the TD and the Marshall tackler hit Level on the 16 to end his bid for a TD. Tiller bolted over on next play and the Marshall action only delayed the TD one more play.

Marshall ended the season with three wins, six losses.

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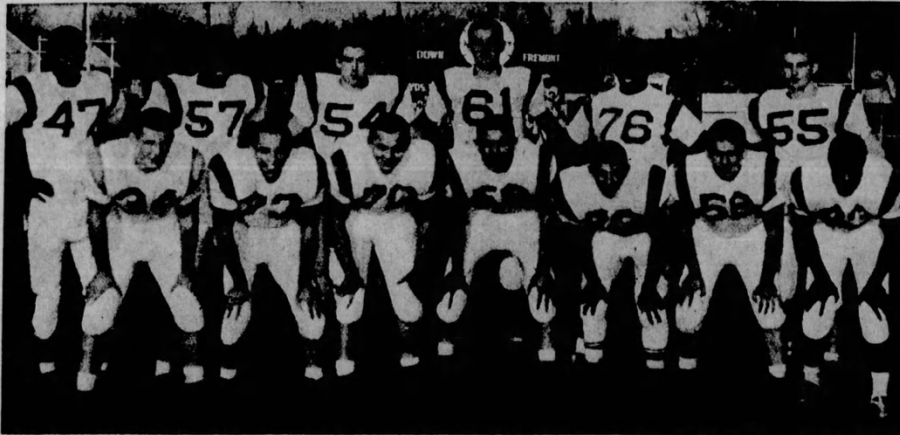

Bowl Bid At Stake For Iowa Gridders In Buck Clash

CHICAGO (AP)—Ohio State aims its league-leading attacking force Saturday against Iowa, one of the Big Ten's defensive leaders, with a share of the football title and assurance of the Rose Bowl trip at stake for the Hawkeyes.

Official conference statistics today show how the teams line up on paper for the important showdown at Iowa City.

The Buckeyes, who set a new one-game record for rushing with 465 yards against Indiana last week, boosted their average to 328½ yards per game, 308 of them on the ground.

Next to Ohio State in rushing is Illinois with a 239.2 average.

Second to the Buckeyes in total offense is Michigan State with 323.8. The Spartans have averaged 225 rushing and 98.8 through the air.

A feature of the Buckeye attack is an average of 4.9 yards for every rushing play. They have averaged 62.5 ground plays per game, a Big Ten record pace topping the mark of 61.5 by Ohio State in 1944.

Statistically, Iowa is one of the best equipped teams in the conference to check the Buckeyes' bid for an 18th straight Big Ten victory and an unprecedented third successive undisputed title. The Hawkeyes rank only fifth in overall defense, but have been particularly rugged against a running game, giving up only 144.5 yards a game. Purdue is No. 1 in this respect with a yield of 108.4.

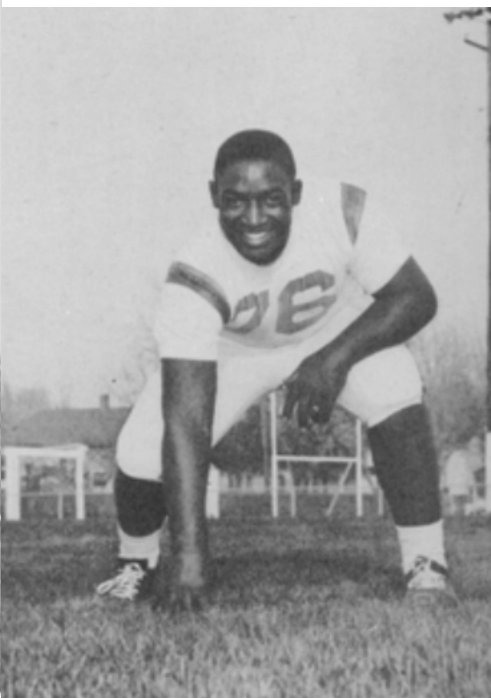

Hornung Wins Heisman Trophy

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Paul Hornung, the one bright spot in Notre Dame's most disastrous football season, Tuesday was awarded the Heisman Trophy as the nation's outstanding college football player of 1936.

Hornung's first reaction to receiving the trophy, established in 1933 in honor of famed coach John W. Heisman and awarded by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York, was to give credit to his teammates and coaches.

"I am grateful to Terry Brennan and his coaching staff and to the team as a whole — they deserve credit for making it possible for me to have a chance for such an award," said Hornung.

The senior from Louisville, Ky., started the season at quarterback but later was forced to play halfback and fullback because of thumb injuries which hampered him in taking snap-backs from centers.

Hornung became the 22nd winner of the trophy. Jay Berwanger of the University of Chicago was first and Ohio State's Howard Cassady won the award last year.

Hornung took issue with critics who accused the Irish of showing lack of spirit in losing eight games and winning two. "We had the spirit to win all the way this season," said Hornung. "But after losing the opener to Southern Methodist, maybe we lost a little confidence in each other."

"I think Brennan did as good a job, or better, this year as with his winning team of last season," he continued. "The responsibility of losing should be thrown on the players, not the coach."
