

Cuyahoga

Ross Boosters club members will assist and music will be furnished by the school band. Neil Berlekamp is in charge of the pep rally for the Boosters.

Braves Capture Comeback Victory Over Dodgers, 8-7

Milwaukeeans Hold Shaky First Place Grip Again In National

Milwaukee Braves call it "the biggest one yet."

The Brooklyn Dodgers kiss it off with a "so what?"

They both could be right about that humdinger of a comeback 8-7 victory the Braves grabbed from the Dodgers at Ebbets Field Wednesday, regaining undisputed possession of first place in the National League race.

Whether or not they were punchy from pennant pressure, the victory definitely was "the biggest one yet" for the Braves. It had to pick them up, relax some of the tension as they move into Philadelphia for a twin-night doubleheader tonight against the Phillies—only club in the league with an edge (8-10) over the Braves.

If any club was hurt by the decision, it was Cincinnati. The third-place Redlegs fell three games behind while being held to just three singles by Johnny Antonelli in an 8-0 loss to the New York Giants.

The Chicago Cubs defeated Pittsburgh 3-0 in the only other NL game scheduled.

The New York Yankees and the Kansas City Athletics, walloping three between them, erased the home run record set in 1950 at 973 as the A's beat the league leaders 7-4.

Boston took third place from Chicago, defeating the White Sox 4-1. Detroit made it six in a row, beating Washington 3-2.

CLEVELAND (B)—Early Wynn hit a home run to beat the Baltimore Orioles 2-1 Wednesday night—the second game in a row won on a homer by a Cleveland Indians pitcher.

Cuyahoga Falls Here For Little Giants As Crimson Streaks Travel To Genoa

Fremont's high school football breaks into the open Friday as Ross' Little Giants and the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's both are booked for non-league games.

Ross remains at home to host Cuyahoga Falls. Kickoff is at 8 o'clock at Harmon Field. Meanwhile, St. Joseph's travels to Genoa, facing the Comets in an 8 o'clock opener.

ROSS HIGH

Ross Outplays Cuyahoga Falls, 38-7;

Little Giants Outrun, Outpass Tigers In One-Sided Tilt On Harmon Gridiron

Using a well-mixed portion of long runs and looping pass plays, Ross high's Little Giants opened the 1956 grid season Friday night at Harmon field with a 38-7 victory over Cuyahoga Falls. Six touchdowns were netted by the Purple and White over the first three periods while the Black Tigers used a pass play with just seven minutes left in the fourth period to score its lone touchdown.

Before approximately 3,500

fans in the stadium, the Little Giants cracked the scoring column in the first eight minutes of the opening period when Left Halfback Jim Tiller went around right end to score on a 12-yard run. Tiller also carried on a 45-yarder in the second period, coming back later to snare a pass from Beebe Schneider working at quarterback, and carry over for a play that netted 49 yards in all. In the third period, Tiller broke over right guard, changed his field, and went along the left end for 42 yards and his fourth touchdown.

Bill Smiley, back in the Fremont ball yard after a stint last fall in Upstate New York, scored after 10 seconds of the second



He weighs 189 and is a junior, standing six feet. He'll be wearing a 54 on his jersey.

Some of the other standouts of this season for Latin are Bill Puskas, defensive end, tall at 6'3" and pretty much filled out with 186 pounds on his frame. Ernie DeRose and Gary Stevens, too, will work as defensive backs, Stevens with 170 pounds, and DeRose a real lightweight at 124 pounds.



Cathedral Latin Loses To Ross, 19-13

Tiller Registers All Three TDs On 56, 67 And Two Yd. Runs

First Period Goal Line Stand By Little Giants
Proves Turning Point; Schneider Suffers
Shoulder Separation, Leaves In Third Period

Left halfback Jim Tiller's third touchdown of the night, scored on a 67 yard run with 1:10 minutes of the fourth period elapsed, set up Ross high school's second straight victory in two outings as the Little Giants turned back a stubborn and hard-charging Cleveland Cathedral Latin squad, 19-13, on Harmon field Friday.

The game was in no manner the scoring carnival in favor of Ross as was the opener last week when Cuyahoga Falls fell 38-7. Last night it was a determined bid by Ross' entire crew that made the victory.

Score Summary

Scoring in a nutshell: With 3:16 minutes of the second period gone Tiller went 56 yards for the TD and Bill Smiley booted the first conversion and Ross went out from 7-0. Also in the second quarter Tiller made his second TD with a two yard carry around right end, Smiley missing the boot for conversion.

On the kickoff return immediately after Ross' score Otis Drayton, the athlete who ran fourth to Tiller in the state track finals of the 100 yard dash, took the oval on the 22 of Latin and went

the distance of 78 yards for the six points. Jim Goodrich ran the ball over for the point.

At the end of the third period Goodrich bolted one yard for a Latin score and after his PAT boot attempt failed Latin drew up to the 13-13 tie game.

Two plays in the fourth period had Tiller swept left end, eluded tacklers with shifty maneuvers, then flashed 67 yards for the final and winning touchdown.

Tiller received a cut on the head in the final period but returned to the game after a bandage was applied.

Schneider Hurt

Burdette (Beebe) Schneider left the game on the fourth play of the third period. Reports from the dressing room following the game point out that he suffered a shoulder separation and it's not known how long his injury will keep him out of action at this point. The Ross quarterback had carried for seven yards and a first down when he was injured on the east side of the field.

The game was played through a slow rain that kept the fans, numbering approximately 3,300 under protective wraps throughout.

Close competition on the turf down front, however, kept fans thinking about the game at hand, and their thoughts were aside from the rain for the most part.

Latin was the dominant factor of the opening quarter as Coach Fred George's crew rolled out three first downs from scrimmage to one for the Giants of Coach Mal Mackey.

Goal Line Stand

The Latin drive from the Ross 45 worked right smack down to the Ross one yard stripe and on fourth down, with the goal to go,

ROSS INJURIES

Dr. E. C. Swint, Ross' team physician, said Saturday morning that Beebe Schneider's shoulder separation will be given rest until at least Wednesday of next week and it is possible that he will not be in the Fostoria game next Friday here. Jim Tiller had two stitches taken in the cut on his head.

Latin's Goodrich bolted around left end, but Schneider was there to stop the play short of the goal. Consequently, after Latin had held the ball for the first seven and a half minutes, Ross picked up and went to work.

Tiller made a nine yard run to the Ross 15 after the locals got out of trouble on their goal line, and that marked the only first down scored in the period. Bob Helleman had a seven yard haul on one occasion and Smiley carried for nine on another, for the only other noteworthy gains of the period.

picked up seven for a first down but left the game with his injury. Tiller carried for 15 on one haul and 13 yards two plays later for the other two first downs picked off that period.

A Ross fumble was recovered by Latin and they set out at mid-field to climax the march with Goodrich's one yard plunge and the second TD. Two passes from John Cook, quarterback, to Goodrich, for 12 yards and another for 11 yards to Roger Stringer kept the Latin's aerial game a sharp threat.

Outside of Tiller's run in the final period which went the 67 yards, Ross gained no first downs more than the 13 yards Tiller had midway in the period to merit a first down that trip.

Latin Determination

Gary Etevens, who hauled Tiller down right on the goal in the final touchdown run, had the defensive gem for determination, even though the Ross marker was netted.

Latin absorbed its second loss of the season in the game, but only a Ross team full of rugged determination kept things in favor of the Purple and White at the end.

Ross was heavy on first downs, getting 14 to eight for Latin, and in the yards rushing the 352 Ross total eclipsed the 105 of Latin by a considerable margin. 

Ross Wins For Coach Mackey, 37-6

Grid Leader Suffers Heart Attack In Elyria At Half

ELYRIA, O. — Determined Little Giant gridders of Ross high school, following a mediocre first half game, returned to the field against Elyria, after Coach Mal Mackey was stricken with a heart ailment during the half time intermission, and ground out an inspired 37-6 victory over the Pioneers in a Buckeye Conference encounter before 4,000 fans in Ely Stadium.

He then added his first of five straight points in consecutive first movements and Ross was out front 7-0 with 5:05 minutes remaining in the first period, never to be headed.

With 2:20 gone of the second period Beebe Schneider broke through on what started as a

quarterback sneak, then developed into a 45 yard run that pay dirt. A smiley PAT made it 14-0.

Elyria's Only TD

Bob Heilman bolted over from the one in the late minutes of the third period to give Ross its third TD and the score was 21-6.

Chalk up that big victory that the Little Giants of Ross wanted to win for Coach Mal Mackey for the all-important conquest was annexed Friday night at Harmon field when Ross downed Lorain 14-13 in a Buckeye Conference thriller played before slightly over 7,000 spectators.

Two touchdowns scored by Left Half Jim Tiller and the crucial points kicked by Right Halfback Bill Smiley brought home the 14 points needed to keep Ross rolling along a perfect season with seven victories making it 17 straight since the beginning of the 1935 season.

Scoring Review

Ross' first score came as Quarterback Benji Schneider, engineering his steady brand of work in the slot, fired three rapid passes, for 11, 20 and the final was for 46 yards to Tiller, who scampered into the end zone after a 10 yard run by Lorain.

Quarterback Beebe Schneider Bags Three Touchdowns In Scoring Carnival At Harmon by Dan McCarthy

Schneider recovered a Marshall fumble on the Fremont 47 on third down for Cleveland's second TD. First out Tiller booted 33 yards for a TD with Clarence Glover throwing an important block to clear the only threat in Tiller's path. Smiley's kick was good and a homecoming halfback named Jim Smiley posed for a photo kick but was passed, intended for Ken Still. It was over the receiver's head and no good. Smiley lead 19-0.

Tiller's 95 Yd. Run

Tiller took the ball on his own 47 and ran 56 yards in the third period and raced in fancy-stepping fashion the 95 yards to his 24th TD of the season and Ross fourth for the night. Smiley made the kick good and Ross lead 26-0.

With 29 seconds left Marshall scored its only TD when Fred Loeffler went for a 10-yard plunge and the score. Duane Bernard missed the point try from placement and the teams entered the half with Ross leading 26-0.
