Close not good enough for Ross girls

Little Giants drop opener

Joy Eischen and Fremont Ross came close, but Tiffin Columbian had just enough to slip past the Little Giants 36-34 in the season opening basketball game for both teams at Ross High School Tuesday night.

Eischen's 12-foot jumper from the right baseline rolled around the rim, slipped halfway in the bucket before spinning off with eight seconds remaining, preventing Ross from sending the game into overtime.

"It was a game of streaks," said Ross Coach Sue Wolf.

Streaks both physical and mental.

"We could have quit at the half," Wolf said, "but they came back."

Columbian hit six of seven first quarter shots for a 12-9 lead and ran off seven unanswered second quarter points for a 19-9 advantage.

Ross missed its first 14 shots of the second quarter before Becky Thiessen's bank shot from 18 feet out on the right side ended the Ross drought with 40 seconds left in the first half.

Ross made just one of 16 shots in the second and five of 28 in the first half.

The Little Giants trailed 19-11 at halftime but hit six of 11 shots in the third quarter, outscoring the Tornadoes 13-6.

Trailing 21-17, Ross scored six straight points on baskets by Kim Borys, Amy Ritzman and Shari Root for a 23-21 lead.

That's when a mental letdown hit Ross.

"It seemed that when we got ahead it was, 'Wow! That was hard work,' and we had a letdown," said Wolf. "I think that might have been our youth showing through."

Ross has just two seniors on the squad.

Columbian took the lead again

throw. Allen had missed five consecutive free throws in the final quarter before hitting the key shot.

Dian Schepflin canned two free throws for Ross with 41 seconds to play but the Little Giants failed to convert on three more

chances before Eischen's shot fell off the rim.

Borys led Ross with 10 points. Schepflin had eight and Ritzman six. Stiltner topped Columbian with 14.

Ross was 15 of 55 from the floor and Columbian 16 of 40.

Scrappy Ross falls at home

Ross may have out-scrapped Bellevue, but the Little Giants did not outscore the Lady Redmen.

Bellevue had just enough to hand Ross a 51-42 setback in a high school girls basketball game Saturday afternoon at Ross High School.

"That was a scrappy team," Bellevue Coach Ron Brown said about Ross. "Ross played well defensively; they played hard.

"We missed some easy shots on the inside after we had worked hard to get the ball there. We played aggressively, too, but we could not put them away."

Bellevue, 2-0, built up 11 and 13-point leads the final quarter but watched as Ross, behind Becky Thiessen and Joy Eishen trimmed the lead to four points twice, the last 46-42 with 1:40 remaining.

Ross was saddled with early foul problems. Point guard Kim Borys and sub Amy Brandt had four fouls in the first half. Borys fouled out with 2:55 remaining in the third quarter.

"The people coming off the bench did a nice job," said Ross Coach Sue Wolf, "but we really missed too many layups."

Ross was anemic from wherever it shot, making just 16 of 64 shots. Bellevue was five of 23 in the first half but was 13 of 23 in the second half, including a nine of 12 showing in the pivotal third quarter.

Leading 19-16 — only after Eishen had been called for traveling after making a three-point shot with two seconds remaining in the first half — Bellevue outscored the Little Giants 20-14 in the third period. Alisa Raifsnider, who finished with a game-high 16 points, scored six in the period with Kim Zelms and Tracey Powell canning two buckets apiece.

Thiessen kept Ross in the game in the third quarter, hitting three buckets to go along with four points by Dian Schepflin.

In the final quarter, Ross, 0-2, charged but Bellevue hit clutch baskets to take away the Little Giants' momentum each time. Raifsnider canned a bucket when Ross crept to within 44-39 and Zelms hit the clutch bucket when Ross got to within 46-42.

Schepflin had 11 points and Eishen had 10 for Ross.

Ross girls can't clear hump in loss to Huron

Huron rebounded from a sluggish first half with a third-quarter spurt and held on in the final quarter for a 42-37 victory over Fremont Ross in a high school girls basketball game at Ross Tuesday night.

Huron, 3-0, outscored the Little Giants 14-6 in the third quarter, opening up a 32-21 lead. Ross, 0-3, bounced back with a 16-10 advantage in the final eight minutes but the final margin was the closest the Little Giants got.

"I just feel we cannot get over

the hump," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said about her team's ability to charge but inability to cash in for the win.

In the third quarter, Huron, behind Donnelle Cowell, Stacie Esposito and Julie Zimmerman, took control. Cowell tossed in six points the other two, four points each.

The Tiger defense forced Ross into seven turnovers in the quarter.

"Huron was not doing anything differently defensively," Wolf said, "but we were standing around. We were not breaking to

the open gaps."

Huron's biggest lead was 40-27 with two minutes remaining in the game before Ross mounted a late charge. Kim Borys hit the Little Giants' first three-pointer of the season in the 10-2 run in the final two minutes.

Ross utilized a press in the final quarter.

"Maybe," Wolf second-guessed herself, "I should have put the press on sooner but really it did not take effect until the final two minutes."

By that time, Huron had a cushion too big for Ross to climb

over.

Borys led the Ross scoring with 15 points. Shari Root added five. Esposito had 16 for the Tigers.

Ross was 14 of 47 from the floor and Huron 17 of 45. Huron held a 37-33 rebounding edge and committed 28 turnovers, two more than Ross.

In the junior varsity game, Huron came from three points behind with less than a minute to play, pulling out a 26-23 victory. Tanya Stull paced Ross with 11 points on 11 of 12 free throw shooting.

CLYDE — Winning is not always pretty but losing is not always ugly.

Ross got its first win in six tries, defeating Clyde 46-38 Thursday night in a high school girls game at Clyde High School. The loss dropped Clyde to 1-3.

"It wasn't pretty but it was a win," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said, savoring the first victory. "At least it goes on the left hand side of the (won-lost) column."

Ross led by as many as 16

points, 41-25, but had to survive several turnovers in the final five minutes.

With two minutes remaining, Clyde cut the Little Giants' lead to 44-36. The point spread could have squeezed but the Fliers missed five layups and had a three-pointer bounce in and out in the final 20 seconds.

That comeback added a little beauty to the Fliers' loss for Coach Nancy Hanger.

"The kids played well and kept in the ball game," Hanger said.

"Defensively, I think we kept

Girls basketball teams on opposite ends of the won-loss spectrum hooked up at Fremont Ross High School Monday night.

In a well-played game, Port Clinton extended its winning streak to five games with a 54-51 victory over Ross.

The Redskins improved to 6-2 while the Little Giants fell to 1-7.

Jacque Mattox scored 23 points and Jennifer Heigel had 21 for Port Clinton, which led by as many as 12 points before holding off the scrappy Little Giants.

Ross never led after Kim Borys opened the game with a jump shot from the right side. The Little Giants caught the Redskins at 41-all at the outset of the fourth quarter but failed to cash in.

Joy Eishen led Ross with 20 points, including 16 in the second half. Eishen made five of six shots in the third quarter and three of four in the fourth period.

"I was a little disappointed that they caught up to us," said Port Clinton Coach Doug Armstrong. "I knew that if they kept hitting from the outside it was going to be close."

Ross, which shot 44 percent (24-for-54) from the field, relied mainly on the outside shooting of Eishen and Borys.

"We missed too many layups," said Ross Coach Sue Wolf. "We should have been in the game. We missed five layups in the

first quarter and 11 in the game. "You're not going to be in too many ballgames when you miss shots like that."

After Eishen tied the score with a jumper with 6:36 left to play, Port Clinton moved back to a four-point advantage at 45-41 on buckets by Debbie Tucker and Mattox.

The Redskins were clinging to a 49-48 edge when Heigel stepped to the foul line for a one-and-one with 37 seconds remaining.

Heigel made the first free throw. She missed the second, but Mattox grabbed the rebound and scored to make it 52-48.

"We don't like to box out," Wolf said. "We practice it, but we don't like to do it."

"We think we can jump with people ... when you're our size, you shouldn't think you can jump with anyone."

A Ross turnover resulted in Jennifer Armstrong's only basket of the night and sealed the PC victory.

Ross committed just 16 turnovers but every one seemed costly.

"They came at expensive times," Wolf said.

Port Clinton took advantage of Ross's layup woes for a 16-6 first-quarter lead. Heigel scored six points and assisted on Mattox's three baskets.

The Redskins led 21-9 with 5:12 to go before halftime, but seven

Bad shooting haunts Ross in 47-38 loss

Fremont Ross has a case of the "rerun blues."

Zanesville's 47-38 Buckeye Central Conference girls basketball victory Thursday afternoon in the Ross High School Purple Pit repeated a familiar script for the Little Giants.

They stay close but suffer from poor shooting.

"We've only been out of two games," Ross assistant coach Greg Storer said.

Ross, 1-8, has lost six games by 11 or fewer points. Three of the losses have been by five or fewer points.

In Thursday's loss, Ross took itself out of the game, going scoreless during a six-minute stretch in the fourth quarter.

The Blue Devils, 4-6 and 2-1 in the BCC, trailed 31-29 after Amy Ritzman gave Ross the lead with a basket 20 seconds into the final quarter. Zanesville pulled even on Felisha Johnson's driving layup, which began a 12-point run.

By the time Shari Root converted on a three-point play, Ross trailed 41-34 with 1:28 left to play.

"We still cannot shoot the ball," Ross head coach Sue Wolf repeated, a statement that manifested itself against Zanesville.

In the first half, Ross was fortunate Zanesville was misfiring just as frequently. The game was knotted 6-6 after one quarter and 13-13 at halftime. Both

teams combined for an eight-of-49 shooting performance in the opening half, with Ross four-of-28.

"Our passing game was looking good," Wolf said. She stopped there, however.

The passing was good but that phase of the game does not light up the scoreboard.

Both teams turned lukewarm in the third quarter, scoring 16 points apiece. Ross was eight of 16 from the floor and Zanesville seven of 14. The Blue Devils continued their .500 shooting pace in the final eight minutes while Ross took itself out of the game, making just two of 15 shots.

The Ross effort was summed up in one frenzy. With 4:57 remaining in the game and the Little Giants trailing 35-32, Ross collected three offensive rebounds but missed four shots, all from less than three feet.

After that, Zanesville steadily pulled away.

"What can you say?" Wolf asked no one in particular. "If we were taking bad shots, I could understand."

Ross was eight of 59 from the floor while Zanesville was 12 of 50.

Johnson paced Zanesville with 13 points. Mary Newton came off the bench to score nine points and Tracy Simmons added eight.

Kim Borys topped Ross with nine points and Shari Root had seven. Amy Ritzman and Joy Elshen added six apiece.

Ross girls find Friday night to their liking

Ross was leading, but Sue Wolf could not shake the thought.

"I kept waiting to see how we were going to lose," the Ross girls coach said as a smile crossed her face.

Instead of finding a way to lose, the Little Giants painted a portrait of how to win, posting a 49-46 win over Findlay in a rare Friday night game for the girls in the Purple Pit.

The Trojans, 13-7, needed a win over Ross, 3-17, to win the Buckeye Central Conference title but now is forced to share the crown with Lancaster with a 6-2 conference mark. The win enabled Ross to clinch fourth place in the final BCC standings with a 2-6 record.

Ross, which has made a habit of losing but not by much this season, trailed 38-33 early in the final quarter.

"We have only been beaten bad three times," Wolf said, "but this one, well, it

was really fun."

"I thought when we got up by five," Findlay Coach Bill Lobb said, "we had it turned around."

Instead, Ross turned it around, outscoring the Trojans 9-4, catching up at 42-42 on the second of three Amy Brandt back-door layups and Brandt's free throw with 4:25 remaining.

The Little Giants continued the hot streak, running off five more points for a 47-42 lead. The bucket giving Ross a five-point lead was another back-door layup by Brandt, who took passes from Kim Borys on both layups. Earlier in the run, Joy Eischen, who led Ross scoring with 17 points, had found Brandt on the first Ross back-door play, closing the Findlay lead to 42-39.

"We had just worked on that play yesterday (Thursday)," Wolf said.

"We were just outhustled," Lobb said.

After falling behind by five, Findlay got baskets from Kristin Petry and Ruthie

Johnston and trailed 47-46 with 50 seconds left. That's when Wolf began the wait that never happened.

Brandt, who finished with 11 points, all but two in the final quarter, sank two free throws with 42 seconds left. After that, Findlay committed three turnovers, missed two shots and lost another ball when Dian Scheepflin of Ross tied up Petry on a rebound with possession going to Ross with 13 seconds left.

Ross missed three free throws in the last 25 seconds, but Scheepflin came up with rebounds on two of them, helping preserve the upset.

"That was fun," Wolf was able to say.

"We had to keep them off the boards," she said, "because at Findlay (68-54) they had 46 shots in the paint, eight layups and just six shots from the outside. So we wanted to pack it in and force them outside."

Findlay outrebounded Ross 40-32 but the Little Giants had the key rebounds down

the stretch.

"This game shows what a little determination will do," Lobb said. "It doesn't matter whether the team is two and 17 or 18 and two, the team that plays hard is going to win."

Ross backed up Lobb's thinking.

Both teams committed 10 turnovers in the first quarter with Ross holding a 12-8 lead. Ross committed 10 more turnovers in the second quarter — Findlay cut its mistakes in half — and fell behind 20-19. After three quarters, the Trojans held a 37-33 advantage.
